AN ACT TO AMEND §§ 34102 AND 34116, BOTH OF ARTICLE 1, CHAPTER 34, TITLE 10, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, TO AMEND §121903(c) OF ARTICLE 19, CHAPTER 12, TITLE 10, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, AND TO AMEND §§ 3106(e) AND (f), BOTH OF ARTICLE 1, CHAPTER 3, TITLE 9, GUAM ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS, RELATIVE RULES AND UPDATING FEES, IMPOUNDMENT, SPAY/NEUTER VET REQUIREMENTS, PET LICENSURE REQUIREMENTS, AND MANDATING MICROCHIPS FOR LICENSED PETS, ALL **PART** AS COMPREHENSIVE STRAY PET CONTROL PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

2 Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds

3 that the feral population of animals pose threats to public health and safety. Guam's

feral dog and cat population has been a grave, long-standing concern, and it is

5 important for the well-being of the community to control the population of feral dogs

and cats to prevent nuisances, the spread of diseases, and minimize the threat to public safety caused by these animals.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that there are many benefits to pet 3 licensure laws, such as assisting in finding lost pets, differentiating pets from feral 4 5 animals, and allows the consistent monitoring of pets in order to ensure proper health and to prevent the spread of diseases. All these reasons prompted the original 6 implementation of pet licensing in Guam; however, the Department of Agriculture 7 (Department), which is responsible for enforcement, is in critical need of resources 8 to fulfill their mandated obligation to address the need for controlling these animals. 9 Updating the fees for pet licensing and violations of existing rules and regulations 10 will provide the Department with access to much needed revenues and resources for 11 the roundup of feral cats and dogs, the spaying and neutering of these animals to 12 prevent further population growth, the assessment and euthanizing of animals that 13 are dangerous to the community, and the identification of animals that are safe for 14 adoption. 15

It is, therefore, the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to update the pet licensing requirements to assist pet owners with locating lost pets, to provide resources to the Department for its implementation of its Control and Licensing of Pets Program, and to address the stray animal population in Guam for the health and safety of our island community.

Section 2. § 34102 of Article 1, Chapter 34, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, is hereby *amended* to read:

"§ 34102. Pet License Required.

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No person shall own a pet unless it is <u>registered and</u> licensed <u>with the</u> <u>Department of Agriculture, implanted with a pet identifier microchip that shall be registered with a pet registry or controlled database and wearing a license tag as provided by this Article. This shall not apply to pets under the age of three (3)</u>

- 1 months, pets in quarantine or pets brought into Guam for a temporary term not to
- 2 exceed one (1) month for the exclusive purpose of entering such pets in a show or
- 3 exhibition."
- Section 3. § 34116 of Article 1, Chapter 34, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated
- 5 is hereby *amended* to read:
- 6 "§ 34116. Dog Running at large, Impoundment, Holding Period,
- 7 Sterilization and Adoption.
- 8 (a) It shall be unlawful for any dog owner to negligently allow a dog owned
- 9 by him to run at large.
- 10 (b) Any pet over three (3) six (6) months old that is not licensed as required
- by § 34102 of this Article or any dog that is not wearing a current tag in accordance
- with § 34106 of this Article or any dog that is running at large shall be apprehended,
- 13 sterilized and released as part of a Department-sanctioned sterilization program, and
- 14 impounded or disposed of in accordance with regulations adopted by the Director.
- 15 The Department maintains its authority to declare a pet vicious and may order the
- 16 confinement or the humane euthanizing of pets deemed vicious or wild as defined
- 17 in this Chapter.
- (c) The owner, as shown on the license, of any licensed pet that has been
- 19 impounded shall be notified of such impoundment and that the pet, if not claimed
- within ten (10) days after such notification, may be given for adoption upon payment
- of the applicable per diem costs and adoption deposit or humanely destroyed. Such
- 22 notice may be delivered personally to the owner digitally, via notice on the
- 23 Department website or via email, left at his place or residence in Guam, or sent by
- 24 regular mail to his last known address, or informed by telephone or fax to the
- number(s) as shown on the license. At the end of ten (10) days after notification, any
- licensed pet not claimed may be given for adoption upon payment of the applicable
- per diem costs and adoption deposit or humanely destroyed.

(d) Any unlicensed pet that has been impounded shall be kept for three (3) days and may be claimed by the owner by obtaining a license as provided in this Article and paying for the costs for care and keep. At the end of three (3) days after impoundment, any such pet not claimed may be given for adoption or humanely destroyed.

- (e) A per diem charge to be fixed annually by the Director on the basis of operating costs shall be charged for every day, or part thereof, for any pet, kept in the pound. Such charge shall be borne by the owner of the impounded pet, if known, and shall be included in costs to any claimant.
- (f) All pets over the age of six (6) months given for adoption shall be sterilized and licensed, pursuant to § 34102 of this Chapter before being released to new owners. Any expense incurred for such operations or vaccinations shall be included with the costs of care and keep and borne by the new owner.
- (g) No dog or cat under the age of six (6) months to be given for adoption shall be released without being licensed, pursuant to § 34102 of this Article and without a written agreement from the adopter guaranteeing that such animal will be sterilized at the age of six (6) months. A deposit of at least Seventy-Five Dollars (\$75) must be paid at the time of adoption of a dog, and Fifty Dollars (\$50) for a cat to guarantee for sterilization. Failure to perform the sterilization shall be a forfeiture of the amount deposited and the animal shall be returned to the pound.
- (h) There shall be a fee for all pets entering Guam that are not sterilized at a cost not to exceed One Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$120) and shall be set by the Director. This fee shall be called the Intact Pet Entry Fee and shall not apply to registered breeders in good standing with the Department and the Department of Revenue and Taxation as determined by the Director. All funds collected shall be deposited into the Stray Dog Revolving Fund, pursuant to § 34123 of this Chapter."

Section 4. §121903(c) of Article 19, Chapter 12, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated is hereby *amended* to read:

- "(c) A person advising or performing acts which the Board or Guam law recognizes as accepted animal control or livestock management practices, provided that animal control shall be subject to the following conditions:
 - (1) such services must be rendered under the direction and sponsorship of a charitable organization or government agency that assumes full responsibility for the treatment or services;
 - (2) veterinary services must be performed by, or under the supervision of, a person currently licensed to practice veterinary medicine in any state, province, territory, commonwealth or possession of the United States, Canada, the United Kingdom, Australia, New Zealand, Japan or the Philippines, and such other jurisdictions as the Board may from time-to-time designate. Copies of the visiting practitioners' licenses must be submitted to the Board prior to a project of animal control and shall be available on the premises for inspection. These license copies shall serve as licenses to work on an animal control project for no longer than eight (8) days per project and shall be subject to revocation by the Department of Agriculture at any time as determined by the Director of the Department of Agriculture. Controlled substances shall be administered pursuant to the Uniform Controlled Substances Act of Guam, Chapter 67, Title 9 GCA;
 - (3) no person shall receive any fee or remuneration of any kind, other than payment of or reimbursement for travel, lodging, meals and expenses reasonably incurred by participating service providers. The sponsoring organization may charge and receive a fee or donation for services rendered, which fee shall be reasonably calculated to recover actual or anticipated project costs, including reimbursement of expenses incurred by service

1	providers. Services shall be provided free of charge to persons receiving						
2	public assistance who are the lawful owners of animals which receive						
3	services;						
4	(4) animal control projects shall not be conducted by a charitable or						
5	government organization more than two (2) times per calendar year; and						
6	(5) within thirty (30) days after each project, the project sponsor shall						
7	provide the Board with a written report identifying the number and nature of						
8	procedures performed, and the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of						
9	all veterinarians participating in the program."						
10	Section 5. §§ 3106(e) and (f) of Article 1, Chapter 3, Title 9, Guam						
11	Administrative Rules and Regulations, are hereby amended to read:						
12	"(e) The Director shall set the annual license fee for pets on the basis of						
13	operating costs related to the issuance of licenses. Until changed by the						
14	Director and issuance of a public notice, the annual license fee shall be Five						
15	Dollars (\$5.00) Twenty Dollars (\$20.00). Payment of the fee may be made a						
16	the Department or any other place authorized by the Director and shall be						
17	made payable to the Treasurer of Guam. The fee shall be paid in full for any						
18	fraction of the year for which the license is issued.						
19	(f) A penalty of One Dollar (\$1.00) Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) per month						
20	shall be assessed for late renewal of a license. The penalty shall be in addition						
21	to the license fee and shall be paid in full at the time of issuance."						
22	Section 6. Severability. If any provision of this Act or its application to any						
23	person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such invalidity shall						
24	not affect other provisions or applications of this Act that can be given effect without						
25	the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Act are						

severable.

- 1 Section 7. Effective Date. All sections of this Act shall be effective upon
- 2 enactment.
