AN ACT TO DECREASE THE BUSINESS PRIVILEGE TAX TO FOUR AND ONE HALF PERCENT (4.5%) BEGINNING ON OCTOBER 1, 2021 AND FOUR PERCENT (4%) ON OCTOBER 1, 2022; AND TO FURTHER DEPOSIT ONE EIGHTEENTH (1/18) OF THE **BUSINESS AMOUNT OF PRIVILEGE COLLECTED FOR THE PERIOD OF OCTOBER 1, 2021** THROUGH **SEPTEMBER** 30, 2022 TO UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION TRUST FUND: AND TO FURTHER ADD A NEW ARTICLE 4 TO DIVISION 1 OF CHAPTER 1, TITLE 22 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED. RELATIVE TO THE **ESTABLISHMENT** THE **COMMISSION OF** ON UNEMPLOYMENT RELIEF AND EQUITY FOR THE DEVELOPMENT **OF** AN UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE PROGRAM IN GUAM UNDER THE U.S. UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE FEDERAL-STATE SYSTEM; AND TO FURTHER CITE THIS ACT AS THE "GUAM EMPLOYMENT ASSISTANCE AND RELIEF **ACT OF 2021."**

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

- 2 Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds
- 3 that economic insecurity due to unemployment is a threat to the health, morale, and

welfare of the people of Guam, and protection against this hazard requires appropriate action by the Legislature.

Insurance Program was established to address this need by providing partial wage replacement to those unemployed through no fault of their own—safeguarding individuals against distress for a period of time after they become unemployed. Presently, all fifty (50) states plus the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands have established unemployment insurance programs through a federal-state joint venture under the Unemployment Insurance system.

I Liheslaturan Gudhan further finds that local lawmakers have sought to establish a permanent unemployment compensation program in Guam for decades. While the late Speaker Don Parkinson introduced unemployment insurance legislation during each of five (5) terms (Bill No. 929 during the 19th Guam Legislature, Bill No. 285 during the 20th Guam Legislature, Bill No. 101 during the 21st Guam Legislature, Bill No. 123 during the 22nd Guam Legislature, and Bill No. 99 during the 23rd Guam Legislature), none of these proposals were successful in establishing such a program. Further, former Vice Speaker Telena C. Nelson—having the prescience to propose a financial assistance program for Guam's working families during the 2019 Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic—introduced Bill No. 313-35 (COR) in the 35th Guam Legislature prior to Governor Leon Guerrero signing an agreement with the United States Department of Labor (USDOL) to establish the Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) program in Guam.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that the global COVID-19 pandemic has only compounded Guam's state of economic insecurity. According to an unemployment report published by the Guam Department of Labor in December of 2020, the number of individuals unemployed in Guam as of June 2020 totaled 12,890

1 while 48,920 individuals were labeled as those not in the labor force. These figures,

2 which do not take into account the second half of the year, underscore the need to

finance a safety net in Guam beyond the expiration of the federally funded Pandemic

4 Unemployment Assistance program.

While an unemployment insurance program traditionally requires the compulsory setting aside of reserves over a period of time, to be used to fund the first benefits to eligible unemployed persons, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* recognizes that the business community has been unduly impacted by the present pandemic, and that the financing of such a reserve should not sacrifice the ability of the community to recover economically.

It is therefore the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to reduce the Business Privilege Tax by one half percent (0.5%) from five percent (5.0%) to four-and-one-half percent (4.5%) beginning on October 1, 2021, and to redirect one quarter percent (0.25%) of the remaining four and one half percent (4.5%)—or an equivalent of one eighteenth (1/18) of the Business Privilege Tax collected until September 30, 2022—into a newly-created Trust Fund for the sole purpose of building a reserve for unemployment compensation. On October 1, 2022, *I Liheslatura* intends to reduce the Business Privilege Tax to four percent (4.0%).

I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that this phased in approach provides for financial reprieve for our business community with a reduction in the Business Privilege Tax on October 1, 2021, the government of Guam, which is provided a phased-in reduction in tax revenues to allow for the adjustment in budgetary priorities, and the people of Guam which will be provided a safety net with a funded unemployment trust fund where benefits can begin as early as Fiscal Year 2023.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan therefore declares, in its considered judgment, the public good and the general welfare of the people of Guam, that the enactment of

- this measure is required to ensure a basic level of protection for Guam's working population in the years to come.
- Section 2. Business Privilege Tax Decrease. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, rule, or regulation, the business privilege tax shall be four-and-one-half percent (4.5%) beginning on October 1, 2021 and four percent (4 %) on October 1, 2022.

Section 3. Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund.

(a) Creation. There is hereby created, separate and apart from all other funds of the government of Guam, a trust fund, known as the Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund ("Trust Fund"). The Trust Fund shall not be commingled with the General Fund or any other funds of the government of Guam, and it shall be maintained in a separate bank account, administered by the Department of Administration.

(b) Deposit to Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund.

- (i) Legislative Intent. The amount of one quarter of one percent (0.25%) of the four-and-one-half percent (4.5%) Business Privilege Tax for the period October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2022 is intended to be deposited into the Trust Fund. This amount represents one eighteenth (1/18th) of Business Privilege Tax revenues.
- (ii) Deposit. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, rule, or regulation, the Director of the Department of Administration shall deposit the amount of one eighteenth (1/18) of the total Business Privilege Tax revenues in the preceding quarter, to the Fund no later than thirty (30) days after the end of each quarter in Fiscal Year 2022.
- (c) Expenditures from the Trust Fund. No withdrawals or transfers of cash or funds shall be made from the Trust Fund for purposes other than to transfer such

1	cash or funds to an established Unemployment Trust Fund account in the Treasury
2	of the United States.
3	(d) Prohibitions Against Expenditures. Any and all expenditures from the
4	Trust Fund shall be for the payment outlined in Section 3(c) of this Act, and for no
5	other purpose. Any person in violation of this Section shall be guilty of a
6	misdemeanor.
7	(e) No Transfer Authority. The money placed in the Trust Fund is not subject
8	to any transfer authority of I Maga'hågan Guåhan.
9	Section 4. A new Article 4 is hereby added to Division 1 of Chapter 1, Title
10	22 of the Guam Code Annotated, to read:

18	§ 1401. Establishment. The Commission on Unemployment Relief and
19	Equity (CURE) is hereby established for the special purpose of developing policy
20	direction and recommendations relative to coordination, planning, promotion, and
21	implementation of an unemployment insurance program in Guam under the U.S.
22	Unemployment Insurance federal-state system.
23	§ 1402. Composition. The composition of the Commission shall be as
24	follows:
2425	follows: (a) The Director of the Department of Labor, or his or her assigned

1	(b) The Director of the Department of Revenue and Taxation (DRT) or his
2	or her assigned representative, shall serve as the Vice Chairperson;
3	(c) The Chief Economist of the Bureau of Labor and Statistics;
4	(d) The Legislative Chairperson with oversight over the Department of

6	(e) Six members appointed by the Governor of Guam
7	(1) Two of which are employers with twenty-five (25) or more
8	employees;
9	(2) Two of which are employers with less than twenty-five (25)

12	(4) One employee not holding a managerial position.
13	The Guam Department of Labor shall provide the administrative support for
14	the Commission toward carrying out its duties and responsibilities herein.
15	§ 1403. Duties of Commission.
16	(a) The Commission shall work collaboratively to create policy
17	recommendations, rules, and regulations to establish an unemployment insurance
18	program in Guam under the U.S. Unemployment Insurance federal-state system. The
19	Commission may hire professional and legal or technical services to assist and
20	perform studies, roundtables, conduct polls and or surveys to report findings and
21	present initial guidelines for an unemployment insurance program so that a proposal
22	can be presented to the broader community as a concrete, well-considered, and
23	cohesive program. Policy recommendations and the rules and regulations shall
24	include but not be limited to the following:
25	(1) Workers to be covered for unemployment insurance,
26	(2) Benefits (qualifying requirements, weekly benefit amount,
27	maximum potential benefits, benefit for a week of unemployment, etc.)

1	(3) Conditions for receipt of benefits (eligibility for benefits,
2	disqualifications)
3	(4) Determinations, notices, and payments of benefits
4	(5) Appeals (review by hearing examiners, hearing procedures and
5	record, notices, rules of decision, limitation of fees, etc.)
6	(6) Coverage (determination and re-determination of whether
7	service performed is employment)
8	(7) Contributions (payment of contributions)
9	(8) Collections of delinquent and contested contributions—interest
10	on past due contributions
11	(9) The establishment and control of the Unemployment Insurance
12	<u>Fund</u>
13	(10) Administration (Unemployment Insurance Service)
14	(11) Penalties (misrepresentation to obtain benefits)
15	(12) Reciprocal Arrangements (interstate benefit payments)
16	(13) Funds necessary for the launching of the program
17	(b) The Commission shall report its findings and recommendations
18	together with proposed rules and regulations for a Guam Unemployment Insurance
19	Program to I Liheslaturan Guåhan no later than July 31, 2022, and shall be subject
20	to legislative approval and perform all functions necessary to effectuate the mission
21	of the Commission as adopted.
22	§ 1404. Conduct of Meetings. The Commission shall meet once a month to
23	discuss and assess progress and recommendations. A simple majority of members
24	of the Commission shall constitute a quorum to do business; any action taken by the
25	Commission shall be by a simple majority of the members."
26	Section 5. Appropriation. The sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) is
27	hereby appropriated from the General Fund in Fiscal Year 2022 to the Guam

- 1 Department of Labor to fulfill the requirements of § 1403 of Article 4, Division 1,
- 2 Chapter 1, Title 22 of the Guam Code Annotated and to provide administrative
- 3 support to the Commission on Unemployment Relief and Equity (CURE) in Fiscal
- 4 Year 2022. Any unexpended funds shall continue to be available until fully
- 5 expended for the administration of an unemployment insurance program under the
- 6 U.S. Unemployment Insurance federal-state system.
- 7 Section 6. Effective Date of Commission. The first meeting of the
- 8 Commission shall take place no later than twenty (20) days after enactment of this
- 9 Act. If the twentieth (20th) day of the first meeting and subsequent meetings fall on
- 10 a Saturday, Sunday or a government of Guam holiday, then the first meeting of the
- 11 Commission shall take place on the next available business day.
- 12 Section 7. Sunset Provision. The Commission on Unemployment Relief
- 13 and Equity (CURE) shall remain in effect until the recommendations of the
- 14 Commission are approved by I Liheslaturan Guåhan.
- 15 Section 8. Short Title. This Act shall be cited as the Guam Employment
- 16 Assistance and Relief (GEAR) Act of 2021.
- 17 Section 9. Severability. If any provision of this Act or its application to
- 18 any person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such invalidity
- 19 shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Act that can be given effect
- 20 without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this
- 21 Act are severable.
