Relative to raising awareness of the importance of the ocean to our island community and to the world, and to respectfully petition the Government of Japan to reconsider their decision of dumping more than one million tons of contaminated water from the Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Disaster into the ocean.

1 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMITTEE ON RULES OF *I* 2 *MINA'TRENTAI SAIS NA LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN*:

3 WHEREAS, The ocean holds meaning to many cultures and communities 4 around the globe, as it contains a wealth of diverse and beautiful ocean creatures and 5 habitats, and encourages us to take action to become a caretaker and protector of the 6 ocean environment; and

WHEREAS, the island of Guam has a unique relationship with the ocean,
which has provided resources to islanders, served as a foundation for our culture for
generations, and will continue to do so for future generations to come; and

WHEREAS, the oceans face existential threats from pollution, overfishing,
 dumping of trash, proliferation of plastic and threats to the marine life and
 environment due to global climate change; and

WHEREAS, on April 13, 2021, the Government of Japan held a press
 conference where they announced their decision to dump stored radioactive waste
 from the Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Disaster into the ocean; and

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4 **WHEREAS**, this decision will see the dumping of more than one million tons 5 of contaminated water into the Pacific Ocean starting in 2022, and will continue to do 6 so for decades after; and

**WHEREAS,** while the Government of Japan has made it clear that precautionary steps shall be taken to assure the safety of the dumped water, they have failed to address the problems with their treatment processes such as the Advanced Liquid Purification System (ALPS), which do not take into account other radionuclides such as Carbon-14, Cobalt-60, and Strontium-90, all of which are more readily bioaccumulated into the environment such as in fish and seafloor sediments; and

WHEREAS, the ALPS is also unable to properly remove another harmful radionuclide named Tritium, and that both the Government of Japan and the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) concur that existing technology for tritium separation are neither feasible nor provide an advantage in terms of volume of the ALPS treated water storage; and

WHEREAS, despite this problem, Japan has still made the decision to dump
 contaminated water without properly finding a solution to Tritium separation; and

WHEREAS, Tritium can pose a significant problem for the marine environment and can gradually build up in the form of Organically Bound Tritium (OBT), which have long residence times within tissues and organs, and can have severe consequences such as increased cancer risk or even congenital malformations; and

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WHEREAS, the addition of more radioactive contaminated water would
 increase the already elevated radiation levels in the ocean and its marine life, which
 still bears traces of radioisotopes from the atmospheric weapons testing during the
 Cold War Era; and

5 WHEREAS, more radioactive contaminated water would also impede our 6 efforts to fully understand and utilize the marine environment, as it would add to the 7 growing problems of organic and man-made pollution; and

8 WHEREAS, the ocean plays a vital role to the world's economy and 9 ecosystems, as it is one of the worlds largest carbon sinks, can absorb up to twenty 10 times more carbon than land based forests, produces more than half of the world's 11 oxygen, provides roughly fifteen percent of the world's protein source, and is the 12 largest factor in global climate regulation; and

WHEREAS, as an island community, we have an inherent responsibility to take charge in helping to protect the environment that has provided for us for thousands of years, and we must recognize that should we continue to neglect the protection and safety of our environment, irreparable damage will only bring about long-term consequences for this generation and future generations to come; therefore, be it

**RESOLVED**, that the Committee on Rules of I Mina'trentai Sais Na 19 Liheslaturan Guåhan does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, respectfully 20 21 petition the Government of Japan to reconsider the dumping of more than one million 22 tons of contaminated water, to find safer alternative solutions, to make strides towards 23 the safety and protection of the ocean, to celebrate and remember how much the ocean 24 has provided for people all over the globe, and to ensure that steps shall be made to assuring the continuation of maintaining the marine environment for future 25 26 generations to come; and be it further
