





The Bureau of Women's Affairs is proud to provide the following testimony *in full support* of Bill No. 97-36, RELATIVE TO REQUIRING GUAM DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AND GUAM CHARTER SCHOOLS TO PROVIDE AND REGULARLY STOCK MENSTRUAL HYGIENE PRODUCTS IN ALL GUAM PUBLIC AND CHARTER SCHOOLS; AND TO CITE THIS ACT AS THE "PERIOD POVERTY ACT OF 2021."

One of the first issues that I began to address when Governor Lou Leon Guerrero asked me to revive the Bureau of Women's Affairs is period poverty. It is an issue that many people on Guam, including myself, were unaware of until I spoke to Island Girl Power executive director Juanita Blaz, who assured me that period poverty on our island is very real for many girls and women.

Period poverty is the lack of access to sanitary products due to financial constraints. It is now recognized as a global issue, according to period.org.

In 2019, the Bureau of Women's Affairs and Island Girl Power launched Project *Sottera*, our effort to combat period poverty on Guam.

In partnership with the Department of Public Health and Social Services, the BWA conducted a Project *Sottera* survey of close to 300 public health clients about period poverty in 2019. We received 288 responses, covering nearly 700 females included in the survey responses - an 82% response rate. A similar survey of GDOE nurses and teachers revealed that many end up paying for these products themselves, in order to hand them out to girls in need.

Seventy-two percent of the Public Health survey respondents said they found period products too expensive; over 90% said they spent between \$6 to \$20 per month on menstrual products. These

90% said that when they couldn't afford menstrual products, they used the following: old socks, rags, tissues, paper towels, their baby's used diapers if just urine in the diaper, or they free-bled. Nearly 60% of the respondents said someone in their household missed school or work due to lack of access to menstrual products.

Through Project *Sottera*, the Guam Council of Women's Clubs member clubs, the Guam Women's Chamber of Commerce, private businesses, and private individuals have stepped up to periodically donate menstrual products to our public school females. These donated products are available for free in nurses' offices because we are told by the nurses that girls do leave school, or they simply stay home, when they menstruate. Project *Sottera* has allowed girls to stay in school every day of the month.

In the United States, period products are currently not covered by government assistance programs such as WIC and SNAP. It is important to note that these items are not a "luxury" for females. They are a need that clearly affects a female's sense of self, her sense of dignity, and her ability to participate in school, work, extracurricular activities, or just everyday life in general.

According to a February 2020 article in the Wall Street Journal, more than a dozen state legislatures have recently introduced bills that would require public schools to supply free tampons and other menstrual products in their bathrooms. California, Illinois, New Hampshire and New York have already enacted similar legislation, and a number of school boards and universities have started providing the products for free.

Scotland, England and Wales adopted measures to provide free menstrual products in schools in 2018, and in February 2021, New Zealand decided to provide free menstrual products in all schools for the next three years.

I am excited that the Guam Youth Congress, citing our BWA public health survey, has taken on this issue. Before the pandemic, the BWA and Island Girl Power gave presentations in two public high schools about period poverty; about respect for the fact that females menstruate and that it is a fact of life; and noting that when a girl starts menstruating, it means that she can get pregnant if she is either forced, or consents to sexual intercourse with a male. It is shocking how many people do not equate these two bodily functions.

This bill, if enacted, will help us to continue our education and awareness efforts. Because education and awareness of the issue of period poverty leads to discussions of how a female's body works. These discussions are key to preventing pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases, and sexual assault. A DPHSS 2019 survey reported that 37% of high schoolers have had sex. Nearly 60% of those young people did not use condoms, according to the survey.

Senators, we realize that this is an added cost to the government. But our hope - that of the Bureau of Women's Affairs and Island Girl Power - is that this cost will eventually be reduced by Project *Sottera* efforts toward sustainability within a few years. We are taking steps to promote the production and sale of reusable menstrual pads sewn locally by IGP, and the local sale of menstrual

cups. BWA is working with a mainland non-profit organization, Sustainable Sanitation Solutions, to provide menstrual cups at a reasonable cost to females on our island (one cup can be used for five or more years), as they are currently priced between \$40-\$60 per cup in most commercial retail outlets. We have already received sewing machine donations for the reusable pads effort from another mainland non-profit organization.

Guam's unemployment rate in December 2020 was 19.4%, according to the Guam Department of Labor. The pandemic has magnified many issues for the people of our island. One of the more unnoticed, or unseen, problems is the issue of period poverty.

Please help our young females to be able to be part of the solution by providing them with free menstrual products in our public and charter schools for the next several years. When you help females to succeed, our whole society benefits.

Si Yu'os Ma'ase for the opportunity to testify in favor of Bill 97-36 this afternoon.

The GWCC was one of the first organizations to donate to Project *Sottera*, the Bureau of Women's Affairs/Island Girl Power effort to combat period poverty on Guam. In August 2019, the GWCC teamed up with the Bureau, Island Girl Power and Guam Community College (GCC) to host a screening of the Oscar-winning documentary, "*Period. End of Sentence.*" for 75 students enrolled in the George Washington High School (GWHS) CTE Allied Health program through GCC. Corporate sponsors enabled us to raise over \$1800 for Project Sottera through the screening, with which Island Girl Power purchased menstrual products for distribution to public middle and high school nurses' offices.

We recognize period poverty as a global issue for females, and fully support the efforts of the Bureau of Women's Affairs and Island Girl Power to combat this issue through education, awareness, and sustainability.

We laud the efforts of the BWA and Island Girl Power to build sustainability into menstruation for Guam and all of Micronesia through the eventual production of locally sewn and marketed reusable menstrual pads and the local sale of menstrual cups. These efforts will serve a dual purpose: to eliminate period poverty on our island; and to provide sustainable menstrual solutions that can greatly reduce the amount of waste being sent to our island's landfill.

The GWCC stands ready to assist in the promotion of local women-owned startup businesses that produce and sell sustainable menstrual products. Such businesses will empower women and girls economically and socially.



However, we recognize that such efforts will take time, and that there is a stigma associated with menstruation that must be overcome. II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY AND DISCUSSION

The Virtual Public Hearing was called-to-order at **4:01 p.m.**

Chairwoman Amanda L. Shelton:

Buenas and Hafa Adai, everyone. This public hearing by the Committee on Air Transportation, Parks, Tourism, Higher Education, and the Advancement of Women, Youth, and Senior Citizens is hereby called to order. Today is Tuesday April 20, 2021. and the time now is 4:01 p.m.

For the record and in accordance with the open government law, notices for this hearing were sent on April 13, 2021 and again on April 16, 2021. In addition, this hearing was noticed on the Guam Legislature's website.

Joining me for this hearing this afternoon are my colleagues, my Vice Chair and the Vice Speaker Tina Rose Muna Barnes, Senator Joanne Brown, and Senator Chris Duenas. Thank you very much colleagues for being here with me this afternoon.

Just some general rules of conduct before we begin. All must abide by the rules of conduct and quality assurance standards. Please keep your video on at all times and ensure that you are in a room with little interruptions and adequate lighting specifically to make sure that your face is visible at all times. When speaking please ensure that you are unmuted and that you are speaking into the microphone. The chair will invite individuals who have signed up to testify to begin speaking and individuals testifying shall first be recognized by the chair before speaking. We ask that you please state your name and your organization for the record. The order of questioning will begin with a panel of senators and will come back again for a second round if senators need more time. Questions and testimony shall be confined to the substance or nature of the agenda. Personal inference as to the character motive of any senator or any individual testifying is not permitted any violations of this general rule of conduct will result in removal from the meeting room.



We will now discuss Bill No. 97-36 (LS) as introduced by the Committee on Air Transportation, Parks, Tourism, Higher Education, and the Advancement of Women, Youth, and Senior Citizens by the request of the Guam Youth Congress in accordance with GCA Section 1, Section 7102, an Act to add a new Section 7117 to Chapter 7 of Title 17, Guam Code Annotated, relative to requiring Guam Department of Education and Guam charter schools to provide and regularly stock menstrual hygiene products in all Guam public and charter schools and to cite this act as the period poverty act of 2021. For the benefit of the Committee and the public, Bill No. 97-36 was introduced by this Committee on behalf of the Guam Youth Congress, in accordance with Section 7102 of Chapter 7 Title 2 Guam Code Annotated. All bills passed by the Guam Youth Congress will be introduced by this committee on their behalf. The 33rd Guam Youth Congress held a regular session on March 13, 2021, where they passed Bill No. 8-33 (COR) introduced by Speaker Stephanie Lorenzo, and representatives Anica Camacho, and Kiana Yabit. This Committee received the certification of passage for Bill No. 8-33 on March 19, 2021, and subsequently introduced it as Bill No. 97-36 (LS) in the 36 Guam Legislature. At this time, I'd like to invite the Guam Youth Congress, Speaker Stephanie Lorenzo, to provide some remarks on this bill.

Speaker Stephanie Lorenzo, Guam Youth Congress:

Si Yu'os Ma'ase Senator Shelton. Buenas and Hafa Adai, buenas Vice Speaker Muna Barnes and members of the 36th Guam Legislature. My name is Stephanie Lorenzo, and I'm here in my official capacity as Speaker of the 33rd Guam Youth Congress. Before I begin my testimony, I would just like to give a brief definition of what period poverty is.

Period poverty refers to the prevalent phenomenon of being unable to afford products such as pads, tampons or liners to manage menstrual bleeding. It is essential that when we talk about period poverty that we recognize that not all menstruators are women and that not all women menstruate. Period poverty prevents low income menstruators from bleeding with dignity. With the economic crisis of our island and the price of menstrual products at a high of nine to fifteen dollars for a pack of 12 to even 15 medium wing pads. This leaves people with the choice between buying menstrual menstruating products or providing other necessities for their family, an effect that has prevented menstruators from carrying out daily tasks or attending school. Access to menstrual products is a right, and feeling clean, confident, and capable during one's period is a necessity. Whenever menstruators resort to unhygienic alternatives, they are vulnerable to harmful physical and mental outcomes.



According to a survey taken in 2019 by the Bureau of Women's Affairs, Director Flores is here right now, *Si Yu'os Ma'åse'*, we they received an overwhelming response rate of 82 stated that alternatives of proper menstrual products include cut up clothes, rags, socks, tissues, napkins, toilet papers, even used pampers, and others stated that they would simply free bleed. Products like these put menstruators at a higher risk of urinary tract infections which can cause skin irritation, vaginal itching and even green discharge. Furthermore the emotional toll accompanying the lack of access is related to poor mental health outcomes such as elevated anxiety, depression and distress scores. Senators and everyone here, we give out condoms to keep ours to keep students safe yet we don't provide the dimensional products to keep them in school. With one in five individuals missing school due to the lack of mentoring products, period poverty is an important and often ignored public health crisis. However this bill aims to resolve that issue.

This bill aims to keep our students in school. When parents drop off their kids to school, they expect that their education is their number one priority, and this bill will ensure that our students who menstruate, our future and our youth, will not have to worry about their menstrual cycle disrupting their education. With the passage of this bill, it will ensure menstruation products will be accessible to all students who do have a monthly cycle the same way that a student will go and to the nurse office to request for a band-aid, they can request for menstruation products. I just want to take this time to thank Vice Speaker Muna Barnes. This bill was actually first thought of when I was a policy writer in her last term and I followed her to a lot of aauw meetings, and so this bill kind of came from a reputation of that so Si Yu'os Ma'ase. I welcome any discussions that we can discuss about the bill. Thank you Senator Shelton.

Chairwoman Shelton:

Thank you very much, Speaker Lorenzo, and I'd like to recognize some other folks who've also joined us here to give testimony today. We have Miss Jayne Flores, the Director of the Bureau of Women's Affairs. We have the Chairwoman of the Guam Charter School Council, Miss Vangie Cepeda as well as her Vice Chair, Miss Jennifer Sanchez, and Mr. Cel Babauta, council member. We have the Guam Women's Chamber of Commerce Ms. Rene Logie here, and the Guam Council of Women's Clubs Miss Jessica Castro as well as Miss Lori Boss from Ohala' Adoptions who's here to testify, so I'll just go in the order of those on my screen this morning and this afternoon. We'll start with you, Jayne, from the Bureau of Women's Affairs.



Mrs. Jayne Flores, Director, Bureau of Women's Affairs:

Thank you very much, Senator Amanda for introducing this bill, and thank you Speaker Lorenzo for taking this issue on. Chairwoman Shelton and members of the committee, my name is Jayne Flores. I'm the director of the Bureau of Women's Affairs, and the Bureau of Women's Affairs is proud to provide the following testimony in full support of Bill 97-36.

See written testimony.

Chairwoman Shelton:

Thank you very much, Miss Flores. I will now move to Ms. Jessica Castro.

Ms. Jessica Castro, Immediate Past President, Guam Council of Women's Clubs:

Hafa Adai senators. My name is Jessica Castro, and I am the immediate past president of the Guam Council Women's Club. GCWC is the umbrella organization of 14 non-profit women clubs on Guam and, for the past two years GCWC has partnered with the Bureau of Women's Affairs and other organizations on Guam during the launch of meta and period prime, and we recognize a fair amount of Guam's population receives wealth methods and or food stamps. However, as mentioned earlier, feminine hygiene products are not on the list of approved food stamps, leaving the girls in our community vulnerable without this type of necessity, so our club members committed to the cause by donating 42 cases of pads to the 14 public schools on Guam, both middle school and high school.

We took on a hands-on by coordinating a special visitation and delivered these items directly to each school's prospective school nurse offices, and it was through these efforts that we realized that there was a tremendous need for more menstrual hygiene products to be made accessible in our Guam school systems. Many of our island satedas girls who have reached puberty come from extremely low income families, placing our satedas with the burden of fending for themselves, and this kind of burden is very detrimental with the community, and it is with this that GCWC supports Bill No. 97-36. Thank you for this opportunity.

Chairwoman Shelton:

Thank you very much Jessica. Will now move to Ms. Rene Logie from the Guam Women's Chamber of Commerce.

Ms. Rene Logie, Executive Director, Guam Women's Chamber of Commerce



Thank you, Chairman Shelton and members of the committee.

See written testimony.

Chairwoman Shelton:

Thank you very much, Rene. We'll move now to Miss Vangie Cepeda, the Chairwoman of the Guam Charter School Council.

Mrs. Evangeline Cepeda, Chairwoman, Guam Academy Charter Schools Council:

Håfa Adai and good afternoon. Thank you Chair Amanda Shelton and all the senators present. On behalf of the Guam charter school council, I have the president, our vice chair as well as Mr. Babauta. Just want to say that we are in full support of this. We applaud the Guam Youth Congress Speaker Lorenzo for this, and we want to say that this is a reality. I just want to say that the basic need for every young lady to have this available to them is a need. When I worked at gore, I just want to share this and I did site base with the families, many of the young girls didn't have this, and as I heard mrs flores mentioned, many times I would go and purchase and buy this because this wasn't taught or this wasn't available and so this is close to home because I've seen this happen for over 18 years and I just want to say that the council is in support of this bill No. 97-63 Is and we like and hope that you get all the support from the senators to move this and and come into law and the council is in full support of this in the charter schools. Thank you.

Chairwoman Shelton:

Thank you very much Mrs. Cepeda, and now we'll move on to miss Lori Boss from Ohala' Adoptions.

Ms. Lori Boss, Director, Ohala' Adoptions:

I apologize, Senator. I wasn't prepared to do a formal thing, it was more to watch this. I am associated with the Project Sotera through the DAR women's group and we have adopted a high school and been providing menstrual products to the high school through this project, and we have submitted a formal written testimony for all of the senators, but I'm in support of this bill to provide these products and I've heard directly on many occasions from several young women in my neighborhood and in my church group that I serve with that have commented how grateful they are that these items are available at their high school for them and their friends because they know several people who simply miss school as has been mentioned during the week of their menstrual cycle, and they are delighted to have the



opportunity to have these things that have been provided thus far and we support this at DAR. Thank you.

Chairwoman Shelton:

Thank you very much Lori, and thank you to everyone who is here to testify today. I want to state for the record that we also invited the Guam Department of Education to join us and we will seek out testimony from them as well, and we do have a fiscal note on the bill. Though the bill does not include an appropriation at this time the bureau of budget and management research does note that the bureau does anticipate that should Bill 97-36 be enacted, there will be a financial cost impact to both GDOE and GAX. The bureau estimates that it will cost from 202 thousand dollars to 313 dollars for GDOE and twenty three thousand dollars to thirty six thousand dollars for GAX each school year to provide free menstrual products to its female students.

There is also an attachment of the cost estimate. With this fiscal note, the cost estimate provided could potentially increase as it is dependent on certain factors such as the actual number of female students, the type and unit cost of menstrual hygiene products that is procured, and the rate of consumption of these menstrual products. as bill 97-36 does not provide for an appropriation to fund such purpose, the gdoe and gax would have then have to absorb the cost of these menstrual hygiene supplies required from its annual fiscal year budget and ensure that the appropriate fund allocations are made in each middle high and charter school to provide for tampons and pads to students in need at no charge, so that again was from the fiscal note of the bureau of budget and management research, and now I will open the floor to any of my colleagues here today. I'll start with my Vice Chair, the Vice Speaker of the legislature Tina Rose Muna Barnes.

Vice Speaker Tina Rose Muña Barnes:

Thank you so very much Madam Chair for giving me the opportunity. I do want to take the time to thank Speaker Lorenzo from the Guam Youth Congress for literally taking the time to facilitate with her colleagues the introduction of this bill, but more importantly for facilitating it through for us to introduce here, the legislature. On their behalf, this issue I know may have some fiscal impacts. I think the most important thing was being able to provide this as a necessity for all the female students that are in need. I did have a couple of questions and maybe bureau women's affairs or anybody who's presented here today, if they could help out, if they talked about possible projects to terra helping out in providing these pets and maybe another couple of other non-profits to help out if this legislation were to go through. I first had taken a look at the financial impact statement and



when I saw that being over the estimated costs of being over 300 thousand, I was literally taken aback because if that was an average of every single female that was there or those that are in need because not everybody's going to have asked to access that, so maybe I don't know, that was a little if that was too high. So maybe that would be the first question for you Jayne, and then I'll ask about the federal grant. Thanks.

Mrs. Flores:

Senator, so when we first approached the Guam Council of Women's Clubs, and it's weird because when I first presented, everyone was so silent because they were all absorbed. It's like oh my god yeah this is a real thing. People, women, girls don't have this sometimes but as to the cost, I actually just spoke with Bill Taitingfong yesterday at BBMR because he was asking me about the cost, and he has included it so that cost is a little bit inflated. I would actually say a lot of inflated because he used pads and tampons, and his wife Naomi who I know is a principal or a former principal at petey middle school, and she told him it's too high. Don't put tampons in there, just pads. Just estimate the concept pads, and you don't have to get the super high, basic pads that the schools can provide. And so that cost is probably well inflated.

I would say it's probably at least a third less to a half less because if you're if you're going to provide tampons, and in the middle schools they don't the girls usually don't use tampons. In the high schools, maybe, but if they you take whatever is free so we're just we're just trying to get these girls to come to school so with regard to that, and I told bill I think your cost is too high because you're you're estimating these costs for all these things and he also was estimating four pads a day per girl which everyone knows, during school maybe two, you're gonna be okay. So like I said that cost is really high, and so when we first went to the Guam council women's clubs there was some concern, the government should be providing this in schools and we said well look we we're gonna work on that, but in the meantime the girls need the pad so can you donate and everybody was willing to donate, and I want to thank jessica castro because she was one of the biggest cheerleaders for this, and some of the some of the women's clubs have really stepped up to the plate for this because they they know that it's a real need, but with regard to the cost, I would suggest, because it is my hope, that you put this in for three years and and within that three years, hopefully we will be able to build some, like I said in my testimony, we want to try to build some sustainability into this because we're trying to get island girl power to do it to be a stand-alone non-profit, and one of the ways that we want to do that is for them to produce locally sewn



reusable menstrual pads because we want to try to get the girls and the women to use reusable pads because they're more sustainable.

There's also this menstrual cup, and if no one knows what a menstrual cup is, it is made of silicone and it is reusable for five to ten years. You use it, you boil it, and then you put it away and then use it again your next period. It's the latest greatest thing. Don't ask me about it because I'm too old, but what we are trying to do is we have a supplier because these things are very expensive at Kmart or some of the some of the retail stores. They retail for like 40 to 60 which is astronomical for someone who is on food stamps or whatever, and so we are trying to get island girl power with a supplier that we have to sell them for like ten dollars. So we are trying to build some sustainability into this issue.

We want to promote sustainability with regard to not having so many menstrual products go into the landfill we're hoping that the cost to the government will be reduced after about, if we can get this up and running in two to three years, that the cost will be seriously reduced because a lot of girls will use reusable pads or the menstrual cup and also be more sustainable and environmentally aware. So I hope that answers some of your questions about the cost.

Vice Speaker Muña Barnes:

Yes, I was also trying to ask if the non-profits today I guess there was a conversation I think from badger and Jessica about how they donated to the different schools and if we were to work with that, is there an ongoing MOU in any of the public schools or charter schools that that have a working relationship with the nonprofit organizations to start to have this program implemented in the schools? Is there anything of any nature happening at any of this right now?

Mrs. Flores:

There's no formal thing. One of the most steady ones is NAWIC and they have adopted Inarajan Middle School so they go once a semester, they'll have a drive, and they go there and I told them probably the best time is in August and in January when school starts, and then when second semester starts, so they will have a drive and they'll have these menstrual cups. Now, one of the issues that has come up, and I spoke to one of the nurses at Piti Middle School, is that the girls, when they learn that these are free and this is why we said we interviewed all the school nurses and the teachers, we also had a survey and they said do not put them in the bathrooms because unfortunately the kids will take them and take them home. So they'll break into whatever container it is.



We decided the best way to handle this is to have the girl go to the nurse's office and say miss and then she'll give her one or two pads for the day and so at pea middle school, the nurse told me that she has started to have the girls sign in because the girl will go in like every week and say miss I have my period because the people at home will say hey get me some pads from school, bring them home and so the nurses have started saying hey wait a minute you only menstruate once a month. You had your period last week. I know you don't have it again. So that's also an issue, so this is why we are trying to build sustainability into it because we don't want gdoe supplying pads for the entire island, and so the the whole sustainability issue is you get these reusable menstrual pads that you can wash and reuse again, and or the menstrual cup, which we have we've got a donation. When I first started this organic cup for about 600 menstrual cups, we gave them all out and we've heard good things from the people that use them.

Vice Speaker Muña Barnes:

Thank you very much Jayne, and I want to thank the panel here. Madam Chair, I think that this bill is very important, and it's needed. I understand that this issue, as we even talked about it last term with the youth congress, was that sometimes you have to pick these kind of bills and just move it forward because some may think they're too embarrassed to even talk about it or ask it right, but if you don't do it then the problem continues to persist so I support the efforts. I want to again thank Speaker Stephanie for pushing this through with her colleagues, but more importantly, to bringing it up to the stage so I'm hoping that with these efforts, that there will still be an opportunity from the administration working closely with the Department of Education and the charter schools, that there will be a plan of how we can ascertain grants and then also work the public-private partnerships whether it be businesses or nonprofits to help move this program or to get the resources there because and even though, I think this is inflated I know it would cost some amount of money, and if they can work that through I think that this would be a very positive program implemented for all the schools.

Chairwoman Shelton:

Thank you very much, Vice Chair Muna Barnes and I will certainly seek out an updated fiscal note on the bill so that we can make sure that we have an accurate number for the cost. So thank you very much for that, jane. I also like to recognize my committee member, Senator Tony Ada. Thank you very much for joining us, and I'd like to ask Senator Brown if you have any questions for the panel.

Senator Joanne M. Brown:



Well, I don't have any questions, Madam Chair, but certainly thank you to everyone including our Youth Congress representatives who brought this legislation back to life, and having it introduced. I mean, it's not something most of us think about. Our age is a very natural part of processes for young women, and I think this is a good thing to encourage them not just getting back in school, but their overall sense of themselves and their self-esteem, and it's pretty much unfortunate that this event has to be addressed at a public school level, but certainly with regards to issues of finances and things of that nature, not everyone has the same opportunity. So I'm certainly supportive of this legislation, and thank you very much. It's not a normal conversation that we would have, but it's a very important conversation. So thank you to everyone who took the time to provide testimony this afternoon. Thank you very much, Madam Chair.

Chairwoman Shelton:

Si Yu'os Ma'ase. Senator Chris, any questions?

Senator Christopher M. Duenas:

Thank you Madam Chair. No questions, I just had a few comments. First of all, thank you to all the organizations that provide this care for our young women. First of all, as the director of department of youth affairs, many years ago this was one of the No. one requests, that we would give out to those individuals or organizations that would come and ask the department of youth affairs how we can help the children. Speaker Lorenzo really kind of made an excellent point, and I thank the used congress for their participation. The other thing that I learned as director of department and youth affairs is to reduce recidivism, one of the greatest turnarounds for a young person is when they're attach to their educational opportunities, and so when we think of our young people in school, especially the vulnerable those who have limited resources, they're always vulnerable to dropping out of school, or having getting behind on their education and, so when you think of even one week and what it could mean to a young person who has financial challenges and lives in a household where they don't have resources, that one week over a period of a year could make the difference in their grade level, could make the difference of whether or not they even stay in school. That's how important this issue is to me, and so I certainly support it regardless of what the cost may end up being. I think it is a proper investment.

I think it brings dignity to our young people who otherwise have financial issues and the kind of difficulties it must be to just ask for a basic product that helps them get through their day and maintain dignity, and their self-respect, and their health and hygiene. So I certainly support this effort, and I also want to say I support the



fact that these organizations have really been forward thinking in the sustainability aspect of it. A lot of times in government we have requests come forward and it seems like a request. Sometimes that well then it will just be something in perpetuity but all the presentations today were that folks are working on trying to help to make this something that won't be a constant cost for the government, but certainly regardless of the situation I do support it. In the final comment, kind of interesting the timing, I don't want to mention the organization because they don't want to be recognized but our office was solicited in the last couple of days to do exactly this, provide feminine products to this organization that's going around and asking different legislators and others to please provide this. So it really is something that I can tell is of great need and this bill certainly has my support, *Si Yu'os Ma'ase*, Madam Chair.

Chairwoman Shelton:

Si Yu'os Ma'ase, Senator Duenas. Senator Ada, any questions or comments for the panel?

Senator V. Anthony Ada:

No questions, Madam Chair. Just thanking the youth congress for bringing this forward to you Madam Chair, and most especially for you to bring it out for the public hearing. Being a father of three daughters, it's about dignity and respect, and we always have to ensure that many of us don't think that things like this make a difference in in someone's lives, but it does because all it takes is just one little incident to happen to be made fun of or get bullied at school and things like that, and especially to our young ladies. These are things that can make a difference in one person's life right. I mean you would think a feminine product would make a difference, well it does, and I just thank you Madam Chair for bringing it forward again and I look forward to supporting this legislation, and to thank the different organizations for always being at the forefront of things, right.

I mean us as legislators, we try to do the best that we can, but we don't have all the answers to everything, and we don't have all the ideas, and that's where all of us come together to think of things like this to bring it forward to the community so that we can take action and ensure that our younger generations can can live with respect and dignity, and this is part of that respect and dignity. So thank you Madam Chair, and thank you to everyone for being here. Thank you, and I apologize for my tardiness.

Chairwoman Shelton:



Thank you very much, Senator Ada for being with us today, and to all of my colleagues and I want to especially thank the panel for being here and the Guam Youth Congress. So on my part I know that there is a cost associated with this bill and I do want to see this bill move forward very much. I know that we were working with the Youth Congress last year with Senator Tina Muna Barnes, Speaker at the time her office, and the Bureau of Women's Affairs because we we wanted to see this happen, and I'm thankful to GYC as was stated earlier for bringing this up again and helping us to pursue this, so I commit to working with our chair of the office of finance and budget and my vice chair here for us to include some kind of funding for this provision in in the upcoming fiscal year budget, and I do see another member of our Guam Youth Congress who logged on and I think she would like to give some testimony. Chloe, I'd like to give you a moment if you'd like to give testimony at this time.

Representative Chloe Lizama, 33rd Guam Youth Congress:

Hi, I'm sorry I apologize for being late. I just came out of class. I'm currently on the road right now, just thinking fast... Just really support this legislation. Huge props to legislative secretary of county gablet and our Speaker Lorenzo for creating this legislation, and obviously period poverty has been such a long overdue issue and period products should be free for, especially girls in our education. I've heard many slurs from males as well where girls would get bullied in school because they didn't have any menstrual products at hand. I want to thank everyone here for coming today. I apologize again for being late, I just came out of class. So yes, thank you Senator Shelton for inviting all of us here today.

Chairwoman Shelton:

Thank you very much, representative lazama. And I'm glad to see you here, the busy life of a student and GYC representative, so glad to have you here. I'm going to give Speaker Lorenzo the opportunity to close on the bill.

Speaker Lorenzo:

Hi, thank you so much Senator Shelton. Thank you so much to all the senators, Vice Speaker Muña Barnes, thank you so much to all the organizations and the panels that were here to testify in support for this bill. It truly does mean a lot, and yes Senator Shelton, GYC, will love to collaborate in getting this bill heard during the annual fiscal here hearing in august or September so this is a small scene. Thank you very much.

Chairwoman Shelton:



Thank you very much Speaker Lorenzo, and I know that I'm sure that we will have many other colleagues who are supportive of this legislation as well since in the 35th Guam legislature, during our ladies later term, we did participate in the Bureau of Women's Affairs efforts and we were able to make a donation all together to sanctuary incorporated, not one of the schools but sanctuary who also needed the products and would benefit from this as well. So maybe we can also consider them, and I think the department of youth affairs is another beneficiary from this project, so all food for thought right now, and a lot of work to do to move this forward. So we're looking forward to working with you, GYC, and all of my colleagues and our partners here today.

III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee finds that Bill No. 97-36 (LS) seeks to require all Guam public schools, inclusive of charter schools, to provide and regularly stock menstrual hygiene products. The Committee further finds that menstrual hygiene products can be costly, according to the Project *Sottera* survey conducted by the Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS) and the Bureau of Women's Affairs (BWA). The survey shows that seventy-two percent (72%) of respondents said they found period products too expensive, and over ninety percent (90%) said they spent between \$6 to \$20 per month on menstrual products.

The Committee further finds that the cost of menstrual hygiene products may serve as barriers to education for many young women and girls in Guam today. Oftentimes families must prioritize other needs over hygiene products for their children. The Committee further notes that the pandemic has only exacerbated these obstacles.

All those providing testimony to the Committee expressed favorable support of **Bill No. 97-36 (LS).** The Committee received and accepted the following recommendation from the legislative Legal Bureau as to format and style, and a recommendation from



the Guam Youth Congress to expand the requirements to provide menstrual hygiene products to institutions of higher learning, i.e., the University of Guam and the Guam Community College (see mark-up attached).

The Committee notes that although Bill No. 97-36 (LS) does not include an appropriation, the Bureau of Budget and Management Research (BBMR) initially anticipated that should the bill be enacted, there will be a financial cost impact to both the Guam Department of Education (GDOE) and the Guam Academy Charter Schools Council (GACS), estimating a cost from \$202,685 to \$313,240 and \$23,327 to \$36,050, respectively. Mrs. Jayne Flores, Director of the BWA, provided testimony regarding the cost impact of the Bill, noting that the estimates provided by BBMR are "a little bit inflated" and should "probably [be] at least a third (1/3) to a half (1/2) less." Mrs. Flores further noted that the BBMR-estimates include the cost of tampons, which she said do not need to be accounted for because schools will be providing basic menstrual pads.

In addition, the Committee finds that the Fiscal Year 2022 budget includes provisions for the allocation of \$100,000 from the Guam Department of Education's General Fund appropriation for menstrual hygiene products, and recommends that appropriations or allocations be made to the GACS, the UOG and the GCC to support the initiative provided in Bill No. 97-36 (LS) in future budgets.



Bureau of Budget and Management Research Comments on Bill No. <u>97-36 (LS)</u>

Bill 97-36 will require the Guam Department of Education (GDOE) and the Guam Academy Charter Schools (GACS) to provide free menstrual hygiene products for students in grades 5 through 12 and to cite the act as the "Period Poverty Act of 2021".

Section 2 of Bill 97-36 adds a new § 7117 to Chapter 7 of Title 17, Guam Code Annotated requiring that all public schools in Guam that serve students in grades five (5) through grade twelve (12) provide menstrual hygiene products, such as tampons and sanitary pads, in the nursing or counselor's offices of such school buildings to students and at no charge to the students.

According to the legislative intent, the lack of access of menstruating individuals to basic feminine hygiene products, such as tampons and sanitary napkins, during their monthly menstrual cycle, hampers the individual's ability to participate in basic activities, including, regular attendance in school and participation in sports. The proposed measure is to address period poverty in Guam.

The Bureau has sought input on the financial impact of the proposed Bill 97-36 from both GDOE and the GACS Council and have not received any official comments from either entity as of the date of this fiscal note.

The Bureau does anticipate that should Bill 97-36 be enacted, there will be a financial cost impact to both the GDOE and GACS. The Bureau estimates that it will cost from \$202,685 to \$313,240 for the GDOE and from \$23,327 to \$36,050 for GACS each school year to provide free menstrual products to its female students. See attachment to this fiscal note for the cost estimate. The cost estimate provided could potentially increase as it is dependent on certain factors such as, the actual the number of female students, the type and unit cost of the menstrual hygiene product that is procured, and the rate of consumption of these menstrual products.

As Bill 97-36 does not provide for an appropriation to fund such purpose, the GDOE and GACS would then have to absorb the costs of these menstrual hygiene supplies required from its annual fiscal year budgets and ensure that the appropriate fund allocations are made to each middle, high, and charter schools to provide for tampons and pads to students in need at no charge.
