Bureau of Budget & Management Research Comments on Bill No. 24-36 (COR)

1/: The proposed legislation is an act to amend § 3105 of Article 1, Chapter 3, Title 22, Guam Code Annotated, relative to redating the implementation of the second tier of Public Law 35-38 from March 1, 2021 to March 1, 2022.

Bill No.24-36 aims to delay the second tier of the minimum wage increase from March 1, 2021 to March 1, 2022. The minimum wage is currently \$8.75 and is scheduled for a \$0.50 increase to \$9.25 on March 1, 2021 through Public Law 35-38.

Per previous correspondence with the Department of Labor for preparation of the Fiscal Note for Bill 142-35, a minimum wage increase from \$8.75 to \$9.25 will likely cause a direct impact to DOL's Employment and Training Program. The current cost per participant at \$8.75 is \$9,796. If the minimum wage rises to \$9.25 the current cost per participant would be \$10,356, resulting in a \$560 increase. Absent an increase in federal funding for the program, DOL may have to reduce work hours and/or the number of program participants.

In the same correspondence to the Bureau, DOL estimated that the number of Government of Guam employees that would be affected by an increase to \$9.25 per hour is less than 250 employees. Further stating that the majority of these employees are "program enrollees" or "work study" participants under federally funded programs the payroll cost to the Government of Guam would be negligible. The effect on the overall economy's and General Fund revenues is expected to be approximately neutral overall and of a magnitude slight enough as to not create discernable changes in economic aggregates such as GDP, employment and tax revenues.

Should the proposed legislation become law, the above-mentioned impacts will not take effect until March 1, 2022. However, the Bureau notes DOL's comments that the effects to the economy and revenues of the Government of Guam would be nominal.
