## Bureau of Budget & Management Research Comments on Bill No. 168-36 (LS)

1/: The intent of Bill No.168-36 (LS) is to require any practitioner on Guam who engages in the practice of dispensing, prescribing, or administering a controlled substance to be registered in the Guam PDMP. Dispensers and prescribers shall be required to utilize the PDMP and obtain any prescription information insofar as the information relates to the patient under the purview of the dispenser or prescriber.

The proposed legislation will add a new Section 41806.1 to Article 18 of Chapter 4, Division 1, Title 26, Guam Administrative Rules and Regulations which states, "Any person or practitioner on Guam who intends to engage in the practice of dispensing, prescribing, or administering of a controlled substance within Guam shall be registered in the Guam Prescription Drug Monitoring Program." In addition, the proposed legislation amends Section 41810 (d) of Article 18, Chapter 4, Division 1, Title 26. A prescriber must obtain a patient utilization report regarding the patient for the preceding (12) months from the computerized program established by the Department (DPHSS) if: 1) the patient is a new patient of the prescriber, or 2) the patient has not received any prescription for a controlled substance.

The proposed legislation, Bill 168-36, is related to the prior proposed legislation, Bill 6-36 in regards to the Guam PDMP. Bill 6-36 notes that any person or practitioner on Guam who intends to engage in the practice of dispensing, prescribing, or administering of a controlled substance within Guam shall be registered in the Guam Prescription Drug Monitoring Program. Section 6 of Bill 6-36 states that the Department (DPHSS) shall develop and maintain as part of the Guam Prescription Monitoring Program a system to provide prescription report cards to practitioners to inform the practitioners about certain prescribing trends.

As per prior correspondence from DPHSS in regards to the fiscal impact of Bill 6-36, DPHSS stated that the implementation of the Prescription Drug Monitoring Program would pose a significant financial impact as the program is funded via Federal Grants. DPHSS estimates that the Cost per- fiscal year to manage the Prescription Drug Monitoring Program would be approximately \$299,171.37. No local funding has been appropriated to support the staff salary, database, and the implementation of report cards, and mandatory compliance tracking. The current grant expires on September 30, 2021; however, funding for the new implementation of the report card feature and Mandatory Compliance Tool is not appropriated in the current grant.

If the proposed legislation (Bill 168-36) were to be enacted, the DPHSS's most likely next course of action would be to apply for a federal grant to provide funding for the implementation of the PDMP Program.
