BUREAU OF BUDGET AND MANAGEMENT RESEARCH COMMENTS ON BILL NO. 176-36 (LS)

The proposed legislation intends to amend §19603 of Article 6, Chapter 19, Title 11 of the Guam Code Annotated relative to vaccination and treatment during a declared state of public health emergency. The amendment is to add language to specify that vaccines to be administered are "unconditionally approved (not Emergency Use Authorization) by the United States Food and Drug Administration".

Should this proposed legislation pass, the public health authority will not be able to exercise its emergency powers and require vaccination to protect the community against COVID-19 unless the COVID-19 vaccines are issued full approval by the FDA.

It should be noted that the island, on August 17, 2021, reported its 144th COVID-19 related death. The Bill's passage will result in a higher chance for the prevalence of more serious cases related to COVID-19, which could potentially lead to higher hospitalization rate, not to mention the increased need for intensive care. The need for first responders, as the island experienced at the onset of this pandemic, will continue to rise. The potentially higher number of COVID-19 cases could lead to another lockdown, which could then lead to stunted tourism activities and higher unemployment rate.

As an unintended consequence, reliance on government's financial assistance will also rise along with crime rates as the people impacted by poverty may become desperate. This then would require higher demand for law enforcement resources. The ripple effect of the pandemic is far-reaching and will continue to negatively impact our island unless countermeasures such as administration of vaccines, either fully approved or issued Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) by the FDA, is in place.

As illustrated above, there will be corresponding effects and fiscal impacts should this proposed legislation be enacted. However, absent pertinent information from all the government instrumentalities directly and indirectly affected by a public health emergency such as the COVID-19 pandemic, the Bureau is unable to determine a reasonable fiscal impact at this time.

The Bureau also notes that there are technical corrections to the Bill that should be made.
