BUREAU OF BUDGET AND MANAGEMENT RESEARCH COMMENTS ON BILL NO. 291-36 (LS)

The proposed legislation intends to add a new Chapter 91B to Division 4 of Title 10 of the Guam Code Annotated, relative to abortions – including abortions after detecting the heartbeat of an unborn child. In addition, this bill also authorizes a private civil right of action in regards to abortions consummated – to be known as, "The Guam Heartbeat Act of 2022." The framework provided in this bill allows for physicians to make the determination if a fetal heartbeat can be detected using standard medical practices. Should a fetal heartbeat be detected, the proposed legislation prohibits the abortion from being adjudicated – with the exception of a medical emergency that may be life threatening (must be a written record in patient's medical records). The government has limited enforcement, as private civil actions shall be the exclusive enforcer of any provisions indicated in this bill. A ruling made on this matter may be subject to an overruling or an appeal. All civil actions shall be overseen by the Superior Court of Guam or the District Court; however, it may not be transferred to a different venue without written consent from all parties. This bill also indicates required documentation citing the reason an abortion is needed. Lastly, any physician that performs an abortion (under this bill – if passed) is required to provide a written report via the patient's medical records.

As stated in the legislation, there will be a civil liability for violation, aiding, or abetting violations. Any claim submitted which prevails in an action stated above, the court *shall* award no less than \$10,000 in statutory damages in addition to costs and attorney fees; the caveat is that a claimant must file a civil action no later than six (6) years after the date of cause of action accrues. In correspondence with the Office of the Attorney General (OAG), any testimony/comments on this bill will be submitted to the Speaker's office and a copy of shall be provided to the Bureau. Absent additional information, the Bureau is unable to determine the fiscal impact of the proposed legislation.
