37TH **EXPRESSING** RELATIVE TO THE **GUAM** LEGISLATURE'S STRONGEST OBJECTIONS TO THE LACK OF COMPACT IMPACT FUNDING IN THE FISCAL YEAR 2024 BUDGET REQUEST SUBMITTED AND **PRESIDENT BIDEN** \mathbf{BY} TO **URGE** THE RESTORATION **COMPACT IMPACT OF** REIMBURSEMENT FUNDS AND DISCRETIONARY **FUNDS.**

1 BE IT RESOLVED BY I MINA'TRENTAI SIETTE NA LIHESLATURAN

- 2 **GUÅHAN**:
- WHEREAS, the United States has entered into free association relationships,
- 4 respectively, with the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall
- 5 Islands, and the Republic of Palau, have known as the Compacts of Free Association
- 6 (Compacts); and
- WHEREAS, the Compacts, among other things, stipulate that nationals of these
- 8 Freely Associated States are permitted to enter the United States and its territories and
- 9 possessions, for the purposes of employment or education, and in so doing be able to
- 10 establish residence as nonimmigrants; and

1	WHEREAS, since the signing of the Compact of Free Association Act of 1985
2	(P.L. 99-239), Guam, as the nearest traveling hub to the Freely Associated States (FAS)
3	has been host to tens of thousands of citizens from freely associated states, and
4	WHEREAS, as of the Fiscal Year 2019-2020 Compact Impact Report - the FAS
5	population residing in Guam is estimated at thirty thousand three hundred and thirty-
6	four (30,344) FAS citizens; and
7	WHEREAS, Guam continues to do its part hosting our island brothers and sisters
8	and sharing in Guam's resources, with the FAS Migrant community becoming an
9	integral part of Guam's economy, seeking employment in every industry in Guam and
10	improving the delivery of many services; and
11	WHEREAS, according to the Fiscal Year 2019-2020 Compact Impact Report -
12	Guam, the total compact impact costs to Guam for services in Fiscal Year 2020 was
13	Seventy-six Million Eight Hundred Thirty-Seven and Eight Hundred twenty-six Dollars
14	(\$76,837,826); and
15	WHEREAS, Guam remains burdened by the United States' inability to
16	adequately offset the additional costs to Guam attributed to the FAS citizens residing
17	on Guam, with past efforts to arrive at a mutually acceptable formula for determining
18	compact impact having been discussed, but yet to find agreement and adoption; and
19	WHEREAS, I Liheslaturan Guåhan stands behind offering a formula that is to
20	be embedded in statute and is to be used to determine compact impact; and
21	WHEREAS, I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds the exclusion of discretionary
22	compact impact funding in President Biden's proposed FY2024 Executive Budget
23	submission totally unacceptable; and
24	WHEREAS, I Liheslaturan Guåhan fully supports efforts by the US House of
25	Representatives to make available funds that approximate no less than a status quo

1 approach to compact impact reimbursement financial impact upon the entities who have

2 the largest FAS groups; and

WHEREAS, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* also endorses and supports efforts by government of Guam representatives to offer alternatives beyond the annual direct funding to pay down the millions of dollars in uncompensated compact impact costs, such as an offset of matching funds for federal grants; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that *I Mina'trentai Siette Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, register its strongest objections to the lack of compact impact funding in the Fiscal Year 2024 budget request submitted by President Biden; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that *I Mina'trentai Siette Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, fully endorse the efforts by the U.S. House of Representatives to restore no less than Thirty Million Dollars (\$30,000,000) in compact impact reimbursement funds, and Six Million Dollars (\$6,000,000) in discretionary funds; and be it further

RESOLVED, that *I Mina'trentai Siette Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, request language is appended to the House appropriation to mandate the adoption of a mutually acceptable formula for determining compact impact in the affected states and territories by March 1, 2024; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that the Speaker and the Chairperson of the Committee on Rules

certify, and the Legislative Secretary attest to, the adoption hereof, and that copies of the same be thereafter transmitted to the Honorable Joseph R. Biden, Jr., President of the United States; the Honorable Antony Blinken, U.S. Secretary of State; to the Honorable Deb Haaland, U.S. Secretary of the Interior; The Honorable Carmen G.
