WHEREAS, one hundred years ago today, the Guam Chamber of Commerce

was established at a luncheon meeting that was held at the Butler's Hotel on April 26,

5 1924. The following business pioneers chartered the organization that day: Pedro

6 Martinez, owner of Pedro's Ice Plant; C.C. Butler, proprietor of Butler's Emporium;

7 H.U. Umstad, Manager of Atkins Kroll & Co.; Baltazar J. Bordallo, businessman and

8 statesman; William G. Johnston, owner of Johnston Theater; J.M. Gillespie of Pacific

9 Distributing Corporation; and A.H. White, U.S. Navy Controller; and

10 WHEREAS, issues that were at the forefront of the founding directors'

initiatives included the organization of business interests that would further advance

and enhance the economic growth of Guam. Also at the top of the list were a fire

insurance education program, trade issues, uniform commercial usages, internal and

external transportation infrastructure, and agriculture – all of which have held a place

on the Chamber's agenda throughout the years; and

WHEREAS, today, the Guam Chamber of Commerce continues to be an organization of citizens that invests its time and money to improve the economic, civic, and cultural well-being of the local community; and

WHEREAS, the Chamber's mission and is to develop, enable, promote, and protect the interest of all Guam businesses and their vision is to be the catalyst to sustainable economic growth that improves the quality of life in Guam; and

WHEREAS, the Chamber works toward the increasing evolution of highways, recreational areas, new industries, and the expansion of existing industries, all of which increases the demand for services; and the Chamber provides an expanding market for construction, real estate, and insurance professionals by promoting business and appealing to new industries and residents who long to make Guam their home; and

WHEREAS, members of the Guam Chamber of Commerce primarily consist of the business community, which benefits the present and future economic development of our island community; and

WHEREAS, with the establishment of the Na' La' Bonita Guam program in 2 2000, the Chamber has expressed its interest in preserving Guam's natural beauty; and 3 to the present day, this program continues to augment the Chamber's involvement in 4 the island's beautification; and

Each year the Guam Chambers memorializes the strength of its membership and their commitment to the island at its annual gala celebrating its anniversary.
