## BUREAU OF BUDGET AND MANAGEMENT RESEARCH COMMENTS ON BILL NO. 9-37 (COR)

The proposed legislation intends to legalize and regulate the use of consumer-grade or "Safe and Sane" fireworks by amending §§ 58109 and 58110 of Chapter 58 and adding a new Chapter 58b to Division 3 of Title 10 Guam Code Annotated (Title 10 GCA). In its present form, § 58109 does not permit any fireworks on Guam unless consigned to the local or federal government. The proposed amendments will allow for consumer-grade fireworks to be permitted on Guam, but excludes commercial-grade and display fireworks, at the discretion of the Fire Chief. The proposed Chapter 58b, titled Use of Consumer-grade Fireworks, outlines the definitions of relevant terms; permissible uses of consumer fireworks; issuance, termination, revocation, and seizure of licenses and permits; applicable penalties resulting from violations; and storage and handling of consumer-grade fireworks.

Relative to the issuance of licenses and permits, the proposed legislation states that a "Consumer Fireworks License" shall be issued upon meeting all licensing and fire safety requirements outlined by the Guam Fire Department (GFD). The proposed legislation does not state any cost associated with obtaining the "Consumer Fireworks License" nor whether a separate business license will need to be obtained from the Department of Revenue and Taxation. In terms of permits, the proposed legislation states that a permit shall be required to sell any consumer-grade fireworks with a fee of \$35. It is unclear as to which fund(s) the collections from licenses and permits will be deposited into. Penalties ranging from \$100.00 to \$1,000.00 is also proposed for violating the provisions of the proposed Chapter 58b, with all fines to be deposited into the Fire, Life, and Medical Emergency (FLAME) Fund. GFD uses the FLAME Fund for the purchase, maintenance, and repair of emergency rescue and firefighting vehicles, emergency life support, and medical equipment, training for Emergency Medical Technician and Paramedics certifications, and allowable personnel expense.

The audited FY2021 revenues for the FLAME fund was \$1,153,395. On average, the FLAME Fund brings in annual revenues of \$1.1M for GFD and the department stands to collect additional revenues as a result of this proposed legislation. On the other hand, the mandates of this proposed legislation also appear to require additional resources for GFD to perform the new responsibilities, in addition to what GFD is already enforcing. The proposed legislation will also require GFD's fee schedule to be updated in accordance with the Administrative Adjudication Law. Absent pertinent information from GFD to include: 1) additional resources needed to carry out the mandates of this proposed legislation; 2) additional revenues that GFD may collect from licenses, permits, fees, and penalties; 3) anticipated volume of consumer-grade fireworks that may be brough to Guam; 4) anticipated number of interested parties that will obtain licenses and permits; and 3) any other costs associated with implementing the proposed legislation if enacted, the Bureau is unable to determine a fiscal impact at this time.
