AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE INTERNAL HARD DRIVE MEMORY ON COMPUTERS AND DIGITAL COPIER MACHINES USED BY GOVERNMENT OF GUAM DEPARTMENTS AND AGENCIES.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that now, more than ever, the use of computers and digital copier machines are more prevalent within government of Guam offices. Computers and digital copier machines are slowly evolving into "do-all" pieces of equipment and many current models offer a variety of services to fulfill everyday office needs. These services include, but are not limited to, printing, copying, scanning, sending electronic mail and sending facsimiles. Computers and digital copiers have become a valuable piece of office equipment that has helped make office work more efficient and effective.

However, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* further finds that there are serious dangers posed by the use of computers and digital copier machines, many of which are unknown by the general public. Many of the current computers and copier machines include a hard drive which keeps track of all the activity that takes place on that particular machine. When using a computer or digital copier, images of documents which are printed, copied, scanned, e-mailed or faxed, are stored in the machine's

memory. This is particularly alarming because the government of Guam deals with sensitive documents on a daily basis especially within agencies and departments that address the areas of public health and safety.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that the digital storage of certain images may possibly compromise the general well-being of the public because these documents may include classified information such as medical history, and the public disclosure of an individual's medical history violates federal privacy laws, whether intentional or unintentional. This risk is further compounded by the practice of many local governments to resell computers are copier machines to non-government entities, after using them and opting to either discard or replace them. This allows the new owner or owners of these machines access to any information stored in the machine's memory.

While the knowledge of hard drives in computers is fairly common, a survey conducted by a leading copier machine manufacturer in the United States revealed that sixty percent (60%) of Americans were unaware that digital copiers stored images on an internal hard drive. Even fewer members of the public did not know that a simple way to remove stored information is to erase the memory using additional equipment and software, which costs as little as five hundred dollars (\$500.00) per machine. The cost incurred goes a long way toward ensuring that the privacy of our people, along with the provision of government services and the information needed to effectively provide these services, is protected and preserved.

It is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to have no stored images remaining on computers or digital copier machines used by government of Guam departments and agencies by requiring the Department of Administration (DOA), the General Service Agency (GSA) and the Bureau of Information Technology (BIT) to conduct a

review of all computers digital copier machines and ensure that all images are removed before the machines are resold, replaced or discarded. Furthermore, it is the intent to require all government of Guam procurement of digital copier machines include equipment or software designed with the specific purpose of erasing internal hard drive memory.

Section 2. The Director of the Department of Administration (DOA), the Chief Procurement Office of the General Service Agency (GSA), and the Chief Information Officer of the Bureau of Information Technology (BIT), shall be jointly responsible for conducting a review of all current computers, digital copier machines or digital copier machine services utilized by the government of Guam. They shall be responsible for ensuring that all stored images or memory be removed before said machines are replaced or refurbished and resold to non-governmental entities, or discarded.

The Director of DOA, the Chief Procurement Officer of GSA, and Chief Information Officer of BIT shall be observers throughout the procurement of computers, digital copier machines or digital copier machine services; shall receive copies of all documents involved; and shall be invited to and participate in any meetings relating to the procurement of said machines and services.

Section 3. The Director of DOA, the Chief Procurement Officer of GSA, and the Chief Information Officer of BIT shall conduct a cost assessment on procuring digital copier machine equipment or software, which erases internal hard drive memory, for all government of Guam instrumentalities. Any government procurement for digital copier machines or digital copier machine services after January 1, 2012, shall include equipment or software which erases internal hard drive memory.

- Section 4. Enactment. The provisions of this Act shall become effective upon enactment.
- Section 5. Severability. If any provision of this Law or its application to any person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Law which can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application, and to this end the provisions of this Law are severable.
