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## I MINA'TRENTAI TRES NA LIHESLATURAN GUÂHAN 2016 (SECOND) Regular Session

Bill No. 364-33 (COR)

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AN ACT TO AMEND § 3602 OF ARTICLE 6, CHAPTER 3, TITLE 16, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO THE RECALCULATION OF THE OFFICIAL VEHICLE INSPECTION SAFETY FEES (OVIS FEES) FOR THE ACQUISITION AND REPAIR OF THE GUAM POLICE DEPARTMENT PATROL VEHICLES.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

2 Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds

that in Bill 294-32, which became Public Law 32-205, I Mina' Trentai Dos Na

Liheslatura made extensive findings, to wit:

"I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that the annual vehicle safety inspection program is an effective tool to keep dangerous vehicles off the roadways and keep our community safe. However, I Liheslatura realizes that it is the police officer that patrols the beat who is key to ensuring the safety and security of the community every day of the year. I Liheslaturan Guåhan also finds that the number of cars in the Guam Police Department's fleet that are in-service and available for patrolling our streets and neighborhoods has dropped to an unacceptable level, delaying police services to our community and hindering response to emergencies, thus endangering the lives of our residents. In order to keep the Guam Police Department's vehicle fleet operating, GPD has had to rely on

1 generous donations of patrol cars, motorcycles and scooters from private business,

2 as well as the occasional identification of federal funds to ensure that the heart of

3 our economic center in Tumon is protected. Additionally, throughout the Guam

Police Department, our dedicated public servants have been spending their

5 personal funds for many years to keep the Guam Police Department's aging fleet

and equipment operating, so that they can continue to serve and protect our

7 community, island-wide."

*I Mina' Trentai Tres Na Liheslatura* wholeheartedly adopts and republishes 9 those findings.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that Patrol Vehicle and Equipment Revolving Fund, is funded by the administrative fees (also known as the Official Vehicle Inspection Safety (OVIS) Fee) of the current vehicle safety inspection fee of Fifteen Dollars (\$15). The OVIS fee is calculated at twenty percent (20%) or Three dollars (\$3) of the current vehicle safety inspection fee.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that the revenue collected in Fiscal Year 2015 from the OVIS fees totaled the amount of Three Hundred Thirty-Three Thousand, Four Hundred Eighteen Dollars (\$333,418). This permitted the Guam Police Department to submit requisitions totaling Two Hundred Thirty-Three Thousand, Three Hundred Ninety-Two Dollars (\$233,392) to General Services Agency (GSA) for the maintenance and repair of its fleet and for the purchase of four (4) marked Police Sport Utility Vehicles (SUVs) through the procurement process.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that the Chief of Police re-implemented the Fifty Dollar (\$50) Special Vehicle Permit Fee requirement for automobile dealers to transport new vehicles from the port to their respective car lots. As a further matter, the Chief of Police discontinued the practice of approving and continuing previous waivers of the Fifty Dollar (\$50) Special Vehicle Permit Fee

in an attempt to provide an additional funding source to purchase new patrol vehicles, special purposes vehicles and to purchase parts and make repairs to our current vehicle fleet each and every year.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) registered approximately ten thousand nine hundred (10,900) new vehicles in calendar year 2013; approximately twelve thousand nine hundred (12,900) new vehicles in calendar year 2014; and approximately thirteen thousand four hundred (13,400) new vehicles in calendar year 2015. Based on the number of newly registered vehicles with DMV and the reimplementation of the Fifty Dollar (\$50) Special Vehicle Permit Fee, the revenue potential would have positively impacted patrol operations while granting some relief with respect to budgetary management and considerations.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that a Preliminary Injunction was granted by the Superior Court of Guam to the Guam Automobile Dealers Association (GADA) which allowed qualified dealers and distributors to operate motor vehicles from the Port Authority of Guam to their place of business pursuant to 16 GCA § 7127. The Preliminary Injunction (Civil Case No. CV1151-15) further orders the Defendants Guam Police Department and the government of Guam from issuing traffic citations to dealers and distributors, their agents and employees, for operating vehicles on the roadways without a special permit as set forth in 16 GCA § 7103 until further order by the court.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that the "Cars for the Community CAPE Fleet Use Agreement" between Atkins Kroll, Inc., dba Toyota Rent-A-Car ("TRAC") and the Guam Police Department ("GPD") is set to expire on December of this year. This Agreement temporarily provided GPD with an additional fifteen (15) Toyota Prius' which enhanced Neighborhood Watch Programs by creating an immense impact in patrol visibility in our villages. With a fleet capability of

twenty to twenty-five (20-25) marked patrol vehicles on duty for all precincts, the fifteen (15) Toyota Prius' account for forty to forty-five percent (40%-45%) of the patrol fleet.

It is, therefore, the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to recalculate the Official Vehicle Inspection Safety Fees from twenty percent (20%) or Three dollars (\$3) to forty percent (40%) or Six Dollars (\$6) of the current vehicle safety inspection fee for the acquisition and repair of patrol vehicles.

**Section 2.** § 3602 of Article 6, Chapter 3, Title 16, Guam Code Annotated, is hereby *amended*, to read:

"§ 3602. Regulations: Fee. (a) (1) The Director of Revenue and Taxation is hereby authorized to make necessary rules and regulations, subject to the approval of *I Maga'låhi Guåhan*, for the administration and enforcement of inspections required under § 3601, including designation of the period or periods of time within which said inspections shall be made and for the issuance and use of decalcomania or other identification to be attached to vehicles with reference to inspection status.

(2) The Director shall, commencing on January 1, 2015, and every two (2) years thereafter, review the safety inspection fee, and may increase the fee by an amount not to exceed ten percent (10%) of the fee on December 31, 2014. This adjustment shall not require the concurrence of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* (the Legislature) nor require compliance with the AAL, but the Director shall cause a notice describing the original fee and the increase to be published on its website and in a newspaper of general circulation in Guam; and to be given to the media and to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guahan* at least sixty (60) days prior to the implementation date. A proposed increase in excess of ten percent (10%) of the fee on December 31, 2014, shall require the Director to conduct the rate review and

adoption process of the proposed increase pursuant to Article 3, Chapter 9 (Administrative Adjudication Law), Division 1, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated.

- (b) (1) The fee to be charged for each such inspection shall be Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00), inclusive of the administrative fee (also known as the 'Official Vehicle Inspection Safety (OVIS) Fee'), which shall be calculated at twenty forty percent (240%) of the current fee; provided, that the existing OVIS Fee of Three-Six Dollars (\$36.00) shall not be adjusted below this amount.
- (2) The fee for re-inspection done pursuant to § 3601(c)(3) shall be Two Dollars (\$2.00).
- (3) Commercial and Armed Forces of the United States vehicle safety inspection stations shall retain all fees collected, as payment for inspection services rendered, however, such stations shall be required to purchase official inspection administrative forms from the Department of Revenue and Taxation.
- (4) All OVIS Fees shall be deposited into the "Police Patrol Vehicle and Equipment Revolving Fund", a separate account established pursuant to § 77135 of Article 1, Chapter 77, Title 10, Guam Code annotated, for that purpose."
