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AN ACT TO ADD A NEW ARTICLE 9 TO CHAPTER 1, DIVISION 1 OF TITLE 26, GUAM ADMINISTRATIVE RULES AND REGULATIONS, RELATIVE TO PERMITTING MORE THAN SIX CHILDREN PER FOSTER HOME IN THE STANDARDS FOR FAMILY FOSTER HOMES ON GUAM; AND TO FURTHER ADD SUCH UPDATED STANDARDS REFLECTING THIS ALLOWANCE TO THE GUAM ADMINISTRATIVE RULES AND REGULATIONS.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

- Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds
  that the rules and regulations governing the Standards for Family Foster Homes
  ("Standards") on Guam was established pursuant to § 2407 of Chapter 2, Title 10,
  Guam Code Annotated through Public Law 23-143 on January 2, 1997.

  Further, I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that the Standards permit no more than
  - Further, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* finds that the Standards permit no more than six (6) children in a family foster home, including the foster parents' own children.
  - ILiheslaturan Guåhan takes due note that the Child Protective Services (CPS) of the Bureau of Social Services Administration (Bureau), Department of Public Health and Social Services, has expressed a growing demand for more foster homes and families on Guam. As of May 2019, the CPS indicates that there are two hundred and seventy (270) children currently in foster care placement and thirty-seven (37)

1	licensed foster families on Guam. These figures indicate a substantial rise of children
2	in foster care when compared to previous years.
3	It is the intent of I Liheslaturan Guåhan to open more homes to children in
4	need by permitting more than the current standard's limitation of six (6) children,
5	provided the total number of children is approved by the Bureau, and to further add
6	such standards reflecting this allowance to the Guam Administrative Rules and
7	Regulations.
8	Section 2. A new Article 9 is added to Chapter 1, Division 1 of Title 26, Guam
9	Administrative Rules and Regulations to read:

6	§ 1901. General Provisions.
7	§ 1901.1. Purpose.
8	The purpose of these rules and regulations is to formulate standards for family
9	foster homes, and to provide guidelines for certification, issuance and operation of
10	licensing to persons interested in fostering parenting care. These standards are
11	applicable to all family foster homes, and are hereafter referred to as the "Standards
12	for Family Foster Homes."
13	§ 1901.2. Authority.
14	The Department of Public Health and Social Services (hereinafter referred to
15	as the "Department") is responsible for the placement of foster homes pursuant to
16	10 GCA §2401 et seq., the Child Welfare Services Act, and Public Law 96-272. The
17	Adoption Assistance and Child Welfare Act of 1980, as amended.
18	§ 1901.3. Definitions.
19	(a) Certificate means a license of approval issued by the Department of
20	Public Health and Social Services authorizing the operation of a family foster
21	<u>home.</u>
22	(b) Family Foster Home means a home certified by the Department of
23	Public Health and Social Services which provides substitute family care on a
24	twenty-four (24) hour basis. This care shall be for no more than six (6) children
25	in one home, including the number of children of the foster parents, unless
26	otherwise approved by the Bureau of Social Services Administration.
27	§ 1902. Procedures for Certification of Family Foster Homes.

1	All family foster homes shall be licensed by the Department through issuance
2	of a "Certificate for Family Foster Home" (hereinafter referred to as the
3	"Certificate"), indicating that the standards for the care of foster children under these
4	regulations have been met. All applications for Certification shall be submitted to
5	the Bureau of Social Services Administration (BOSSA), Department of Public
6	Health and Social Services (hereinafter referred to as the "Bureau").
7	§ 1902.1 Qualification of Applicants.
8	(a) Married couples may apply to become foster parents by filing a joint
9	application with the Bureau. A copy of the couple's marriage license should be
10	attached to the application form.
11	(b) Domestic partners may apply to become foster parents by filing a joint
12	application with the Bureau. A domestic partner may apply alone to become a foster
13	parent in the same manner as a single adult.
14	(c) A single person who is eighteen (18) years or older, may apply to
15	become a foster parent by filing an application with the Bureau. This would also
16	include single parents, eighteen (18) years or older.
17	(d) All applicants must provide the Bureau a consent for background check
18	to include the following information:
19	(1) <u>Guam Police Clearance</u> ;
20	(2) <u>National Crime Information Center Clearance</u> ;
21	(3) <u>Medical History;</u>
22	(4) <u>Employment Information;</u>
23	(5) Copy of recent check stub.
24	(6) Any additional information from whatever source the Bureau
25	deems necessary to complete the required background check.

1	Active duty military applicants, or their dependents, must obtain clearance
2	from their respective investigative agency (Navy Criminal Investigative Services;
3	Office of Special Investigation).
4	(e) All applicants must be residents of Guam, unless they qualify as active
5	duty military or their dependents; United States citizens, or resident aliens.
6	(f) All applicants are required to submit three (3) letters of reference,
7	preferably within Guam, from persons who have adequate personal knowledge of
8	the applicant(s) within the past twelve (12) months prior to application, and who can
9	attest to the good moral character of the applicant(s), members of the applicant(s)
10	immediately family, and ability of the applicant(s) to provide for a good healthy
11	family environment for children.
12	(g) Any person desiring to become a foster parent is not eligible to apply
13	for adoption proceedings during the initial placement of foster children in their
14	home.
15	(h) Relative applicants (persons who are not related by blood or through
16	marriage to the foster child) will be required to apply for foster parent certification.
17	Relative applicants will be referred to the Bureau of Economic Security (BES) for
18	Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC).
19	(1) AFDC compensation is retroactive to day of application.
20	(2) Foster care supplemental payments will be made to eligible
21	applicants.
22	§ 1902.2. Social Evaluation.
23	(a) The Bureau will conduct a social evaluation of the applicant(s), as well
24	as the home environment, to determine qualifications under these regulations. The
25	social evaluation shall be maintained in the applicant(s)' file.
26	(b) The social evaluation will take into account the applicant's personal
27	character, fitness, and factors which show competency for the care of foster children.

1	§ 1902.3.	<b>Approval</b>	and Issuan	ce of Certificate.

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- 2 On the basis of the social evaluation indicating the applicant has 3 satisfactorily met the requirements under these regulations, the Department shall 4 issue a Certificate showing approval for licensing as a family foster home. The 5 Certificate shall provide for the name of the applicant, maximum number of foster children permitted, and the period for which the Certificate is issued. 6
- If the foster home under evaluation will accept only a specific child, or 7 a child for whom service is requested, who is already living in the foster home, the Department may issue a Certificate for a specific child if the home meets the requirements under these regulations. Studies on foster homes for a specific child already living in the home shall be completed no later than two (2) months from the date the Bureau became aware of the placement.
  - The Certificate shall be effective for a period of two (2) years from the (c) date of issuance. The Certificate is non-transferable or assignable, and any attempt to transfer or assign the Certificate is void. The Certificate may be terminated sooner either by revocation, decision of the foster parent to no longer engage in the services as a foster parent, displacement of the child by order of the Court, or change of residency.
  - A Provisional Certificate may be issued for a period of sixty (60) days for those unable to meet requirements under the social evaluation, if it has been reasonably determined that all requirements will be met no later than forty-five (45) days from date of issuance of the provisional certificate, and provided that the health and safety of the child is not in jeopardy by such temporary placement.
  - The Certificate should be available for inspection by the Bureau upon request.

#### Renewal of Certificate. **§ 1902.4.**

A Certificate may be renewed by the Bureau every two (2) years upon submittal of a satisfactory re-evaluation report indicating that the home continues to provide the standard of care which meets the requirements of these regulations. A Provisional Certificate cannot be renewed.

## § 1902.5. Denial, Suspension, Revocation of Certificate.

- (a) The Department may deny a Certificate when an applicant fails to meet the standards for issuance of a Certificate under these regulations, has been convicted of a felony, or a crime involving violence, alcohol or drug abuse, sex offenses, crimes involving moral turpitude, or any other offense which indicates that the applicant may pose a threat to the welfare of the foster child.
- The Bureau must provide the Director of Public Health and Social Services (hereinafter referred to as the "Director") in writing, the basis for its recommendation and reasons for denial of the Certificate. The applicant is entitled to a written explanation of the Bureau's recommendation for denial. The applicant may request to meet with the Director after denial, to discuss the basis for the denial. No hearing is required or mandated. The decision of the Director is final.
- (b) A Certificate may be suspended for a period of ninety (90) days by the Bureau if it has been determined that the foster parent has fallen into noncompliance with the Standards for Family Foster Homes. The foster parent will be informed of the specific violations of the standards in writing, and will be allowed to correct the failures within a given period of time not to exceed the period of suspension. If the foster parent continues to violate the standards without effort for corrective action for the period of the suspension, the Bureau may recommend that the Certificate be revoked.
- (c) A Certificate will be revoked if it is determined by the Bureau that the foster parent is in violation of any of the provisions of 10 GCA § 2408, has been convicted of a crime involving violence, alcohol, drug abuse, sex offense, moral

- turpitude, or any offense which would indicate the foster parent presented a threat 1 2 to the welfare of the foster child. The Bureau shall provide the foster parent a notice 3 of intent to revoke the Certificate, and allow the foster parent ten (10) days to 4 respond to the notice. The foster parent may request to meet informally with the 5 Bureau to discuss the basis for the notice to revoke. After the ten (10) days has 6 elapsed, whether or not response is made by the foster parent, the Bureau may 7 forward its recommendation to revoke to the Director. The foster parent is entitled 8 to a hearing before a decision is made by the Director. The Director shall make a final determination no later than thirty (30) days after the hearing. The final decision 9 10 shall be provided to the foster parent in writing in the same manner as the service of 11
- 12 All notices required under this section to be provided, shall be made by 13 registered mail, or by personal service.

#### § 1903. Administration of the Family Foster Home.

(a) Number of Children to be Cared.

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- There shall be no more than six (6) children in a foster home, including the foster parents' own children, unless approved by the Bureau. In the event the foster family is interested in providing day care to children, in addition to caring for foster children, the total number of children shall not exceed six (6) unless approved by the Bureau. This does not prevent older foster children from providing day care for younger children, provided it is not detrimental to the children in the home. The foster home, however, must meet the requirements under both the standards herein and those under family day care homes.
- No more than two (2) children under the age of two (2), shall be cared for in a home by one (1) foster parent, unless there is additional help

i	approved by the Bureau. At no time should there be more than four (4)
2	children under the age of two (2), including the foster parent's children.
3	(3) A home which accepts Bureau placements, shall not accept
4	children from any source without the Bureau's permission.
5	(b) Records.
6	(1) A current register of all children admitted shall be kept by the
7	family foster home, and shall be open to inspection by the Bureau upon
8	request. The register shall include:
9	(A) A listing of children accepted for placement by name, age,
10	date placed and date removed, Power of Attorney, foster child's
11	attorney name, and contact person from the Bureau;
12	(B) A health record including proof of medical/dental
13	insurance coverage, on each foster child with a record of immunization
14	dates, name of physician and the physician's address, telephone
15	number, and the information of how and when to contact the Bureau;
16	(2) All records concerning the foster child shall be kept
17	confidential and available only to duly authorized persons of the
18	Department:
19	(c) Contacts with the Family Foster Home. The family foster home shall
20	be visited by the Bureau staff once a month, or as frequently as needed to assure the
21	continued well-being of the foster child and that the family foster home continues to
22	meet the requirements for certification.
23	§ 1904. Rights and Responsibilities of Child, Family, Foster Parents
24	and Caseworker.
25	The Department recognizes that the child, family and foster parents have
26	certain rights and responsibilities as set forth herein:
27	§ 1904.1 The Child.

1	It is important for the child to have a voice and participate in decisions
2	consistent with his age and ability. The child has the right to receive hones
3	information, have regular visitation with family and significant others, as per the
4	service plan agreement, and to have and contact a Guardian Ad Litem or Attorney
5	appointed by the Court. The child has a right to participate in permanency planning
6	at the earliest possible time.
7	§ 1904.2 The Family.
8	Responsibilities of the parent(s) include:
9	(a) Cooperating and planning with the Bureau for their child(ren);
10	(b) Retaining their parental role as much as possible;
11	(c) Maintaining contact with their child(ren); and
12	(d) Maintaining contact with the Bureau.
13	Parent(s) have certain basic rights as it relates to their child(ren), these
14	include:
15	(e) The right to be informed about major decisions regarding their
16	child(ren);
17	(f) The right to consent to: adoption, surgery, enlistment in the armed
18	forces, marriage of their child(ren);
19	(g) To receive notification of hearings and other reviews concerning the
20	welfare of their child(ren); and
21	(h) To receive current information on the child's health, status, and
22	placement adjustment.
23	§ 1904.3 The Foster Parents. The foster parents' rights and
24	responsibilities include:
25	(a) The decision to remain a foster parent;
26	(b) The evaluation of their capacity to work with a particular foster child
27	and the problems involved in the child's situation; and

1	(c) Being informed of decisions regarding the foster child, including
2	placement decisions.
3	§ 1904.4 The Caseworker.
4	(a) The caseworker's responsibilities with the foster child include openly
5	dealing with the separation and loss from the child's family. The trauma is lessened
6	if the worker helps the child face such feelings before removal by explaining reason
7	for removal and the service plan. The child, dependent on age, should understand
8	the purpose of placement, the rules of, and participate in the development of case
9	<u>plan.</u>
10	(b) The caseworker's responsibilities with the parents of the foster child
11	include:
12	(1) Understanding the parents' feelings regarding the placement,
13	arid proceeding accordingly;
14	(2) Making clear the reasons for separation;
15	(3) Maintaining frequent contact, if possible, with the parents; and
16	(4) Having the parents understand the rules and expectations of
17	placement, their expected role, the type of care offered, and anticipated
18	duration.
19	(c) The caseworker's responsibilities with the foster family include:
20	(1) Sharing information about the child they are to care for and the
21	child's feelings and ensuing behaviors regarding the separation; and
22	(2) Help the foster parents in coping with the child's reactive
23	behavior until the child can understand separation, process feelings and
24	adjust to the new situation.
25	(d) The caseworker's responsibilities include:
26	(1) Assessing clothing and personal needs prior to placement of the
27	child;

1	(2) Conducting visitations for the child;
2	(3) Arranging for all counseling services;
3	(4) Ensuring that educational and medical needs of the child are
4	met;
5	(5) Supporting the role of the foster parents by maintaining
6	monthly contacts with the foster parents, or more often if indicated;
7	(6) Assisting in respite arrangements when needed; and
8	(7) Keeping the foster parent abreast of the child's permanency
9	plans.
10	§ 1905. Care of the Foster Child.
11	(a) Member of Foster Family. A foster child shall be cared for as a family
12	member and shall share in the family's pleasures and responsibilities. The foster
13	parents shall report to the Bureau any change which adversely affects the child.
14	under foster care.
15	(b) Health. A foster child shall have a complete physical examination by a
16	licensed physician on initial placement or as soon as appointments can be secured,
17	and at least once a year thereafter. The examinations shall indicate:
18	(1) The presence of any communicable condition;
19	(2) Known allergies;
20	(3) Physical and/or mental handicaps or limitations; and
21	(4) Other specific health needs.
22	The foster parents shall be provided pertinent information on the health of
23	each child placed in their home.
24	(c) Emergencies. Foster parents shall obtain instructions from the Bureau
25	regarding procedures to follow in case of natural disasters, and if the foster child
26	experiences sudden illness or accidents. Severe illness, serious injuries, accident,
27	runaway, or death of the child shall be reported immediately to the Bureau.

(d) Nutrition. Food provided for the foster child must be age-appropriate, sufficient in quantity, and adequate for good nutrition. Special care must be given to the child's nutritional needs, i.e. age factors, special health concerns, allergies, etc.

- (e) Clothing and Personal Supplies. A foster child's clothing shall be kept
   clean and in proper condition of repair, and shall be of appropriate size. Each foster
   child shall be provided with individual combs, toothbrushes, and other necessary
   toiletries.
  - (f) Recreation and Social Activities. A well-balanced daily program including time for rest appropriate to the child's age, regular meal hours, and recreation shall be provided for the foster child. The foster parents shall cooperate with the Bureau for the child to participate in appropriate social and recreational activities in the community. Foster parents shall cooperate with the Bureau to make it possible for the child to visit with parents and relatives.
  - (g) Training and Discipline. Child training and discipline shall be carried out with kindness and understanding. No child shall be subjected to any form of punishment or action which would endanger the child's physical or emotional well-being. As a member of the family, a foster child shall participate in home duties commensurate with the child's age, which do not interfere with school, health, and necessary recreation, and which are shared with any other children in the foster home.
  - (h) Education. Regular school attendance shall be expected of all children in accordance with state laws. Attention shall be given to the special educational needs of the foster child.
  - (i) Religion. The religious faith of each child shall be respected and the child shall be afforded the opportunity to attend the church, Sunday school, or both, of the child's parent, or legal guardian or, in their absence, of the child's choice.

1	(j) Absence from Foster Family Home. When a child is to be absent from
2	the family foster home overnight or longer, the foster parents shall secure permission
3	from the Bureau. Absence of a child without permission of the foster parents shall
4	be reported immediately by the foster parents to the Bureau. After working hours,
5	runaways shall be reported to the Bureau as soon as possible.
6	§ 1906. Foster Family and Home Environment.
7	(a) Health of Foster Family.
8	(1) All members of the household shall be free from communicable
9	disease(s) and from physical and emotional conditions which may adversely
10	affect the foster parents' ability to care for the children.
11	(2) The following written medical reports shall be submitted by the
12	foster parents to the Bureau prior to the initial approval of a family foster
13	home:
14	(A) Physical examination of the foster parent by a licensed
15	physician;
16	(B) Tuberculosis clearance in accordance with current
17	Department regulations.
18	(C) Annual tuberculosis clearance shall be required of all
19	household members with known positive tuberculin reactions.
20	(D) Any person who moves into the family foster home after
21	a Certificate has been issued, shall have a tuberculosis clearance and a
22	physical examination certification.
23	(E) Failure to comply with this section may result in
24	revocation of the Family Foster Home Certificate.
25	(b) Income.
26	(1) Income of the foster family shall be reasonably steady and
27	sufficient to maintain an adequate standard of living. The foster family shall

1	have an income adequate to meet their needs from a source other than board
2	payments for the care of foster children.
3	(2) No business shall be conducted on the premises which would
4	adversely affect the welfare of the children under the foster parents' care.
5	(c) Employed Foster Parents. The employment of the foster parents shall
6	not interfere with the care of the children. Child care arrangements must have
7	prior approval by the Bureau.
8	(d) Absence from the Home. When the foster parents are absent from the
9	home because of emergencies or planned vacations or other reasons, the
10	arrangements for the supervision of the foster child(ren) must be approved by the
11	Bureau prior to the implementation of such arrangement.
12	§ 1907. Housing and Sanitation.
13	(a) Requirements. The home shall comply with acceptable state standards
14	on housing and sanitation as follows:
15	(1) Sleeping Arrangements.
16	(A) The sleeping arrangement for a foster child shall include:
17	suitable light, ventilation, and provision for proper rest.
18	(B) The foster parents' own child(ren) shall not be displaced
19	because of the presence of a foster child(ren).
20	(C) Sleeping arrangements should be such that a separate bed
21	can be provided for each child.
22	(D) There should be sufficient sleeping space for the foster
23	family and foster child(ren).
24	(E) Sleeping rooms should not be shared by children of
25	opposite sexes over the age of five (5), or with other adults, unless
26	approved by the Bureau.

1	(F) Except for infants, sleeping arrangements should be such
2	that a space is provided within the sleeping room for the child's
3	personal possessions and for a reasonable degree of privacy.
4	(G) No foster child shall sleep in a detached building without
5	supervision, or in an unfurnished attic, basement, hallway, or
6	stairwell.
7	(2) Running water shall be available for bathing facilities and the
8	waste from the running water shall be connected to a public sewage system or
9	other approved method.
10	(3) The home shall have sanitary flush toilets.
11	(4) There shall be adequate artificial and natural light and ventilation
12	available where the foster home is located.
13	(5) Storage of food in the home shall be free from vermin infestation
14	and perishable food shall be stored in a refrigerator.
15	(6) Preparation of food shall be in a kitchen properly screened with
16	adequate sink facilities.
17	(7) All eating and drinking utensils shall be thoroughly cleaned after
18	each usage.
19	(8) The home shall have an approved source of potable water.
20	(9) Adequate laundering facilities shall be available.
21	(10) The home shall have adequate facilities for the proper disposal
22	of sewage with all plumbing connected to a public sewage system or other
23	approved method.
24	(11) The home shall have proper facilities for the disposal of garbage
25	and refuse.

1	(12) The premises shall be kept in a sanitary and safe condition. There
2	shall be protection from fire hazards, medications, poisons, household
3	cleaning supplies, dangerous tools, and weapons.
4	(b) Equipment and Furnishings.
5	(1) Each child shall be provided adequate space for clothing and
6	belongings.
7	(2) Each child shall be provided with an individual bed, except that
8	two (2) brothers or two (2) sisters may share a double bed, preferably for a
9	temporary period only. Bunk beds with no more than two (2) tiers shall be
10	used only on a selected basis as appropriate to the child's age and situation.
11	Proper ladders and guards must be provided for upper bunks.
12	(3) Each bed or crib shall be of a size as to insure comfort of the
13	child, shall have good level springs and mattress, clean, comfortable bedding
14	and linen, and waterproof covering, if needed."
15	Section 3. Effective Date. The Department of Public Health and Social
16	Services shall have thirty (30) days from the enactment of this Act to amend the
17	Standards for Family Foster Homes in compliance with the rules promulgated in
18	Section 2 of this Act.
19	Section 4. Severability. If any provision of this Act or its application to any
20	person or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions
21	or applications of this Act which can be given effect without the invalid provision
22	or application, and to this end the provisions of this Act are severable.
