AN ACT TO ADD § 160.50.1, AND TO AMEND § 160.50(o), BOTH OF CHAPTER 160, TITLE 8, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO THE BASIC BILL OF RIGHTS FOR VICTIMS, AND TO ESTABLISH PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

2 Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that the protection and support of those victims who were casualties of hemous 3 crimes needs to be paramount, hence the passage of the Basic Bill of Rights for 4 Victims in 2004. Chapter 160 of Title 8, GCA outlines a number of other aspects 5 6 to protect victims, their families and witnesses of such crimes from an array of issues from being aware of parole, escapes and prison releases. It further provides 7 several pre-trial and trial phases to assure that the victim is treated with respect, 8 9 fairness, and dignity, and to assure that a number of safeguards exist from the judicial and law enforcement aspect.

In some instances, rights afforded to the victim which are outlined in Chapter 160 of Title 8, GCA are violated, be it due to an oversight, or in certain cases, knowingly or intentionally. As vital and critical as the *Basic Bill of Rights* for Victims is portrayed, there are no mentions of penalties from those who breach the very rights and protections that the respective law establishes. Considering that

one of the primary objectives of Chapter 160 is intergovernmental cooperation in assuring that rights and services are delivered to victims, it is only proper that fines be established to create accountability in the process.

The Basic Bill of Rights for Victims mirrors 18 U.S. Code § 3771, which established the Crime Victims' Rights for those victims of federal crimes, which included protection from actions that may deter the victim from proceeding with the trial against the defendant. Therefore it was critical to establish similar language in the local law to also provide victims the protection from intimidation, harassment, or abuse that may take place during the criminal justice process, thus the importance of amending § 160.50(o) of Chapter 160, Title 8, GCA.

**Section 2.** § 160.50.1 of Chapter 160, Title 8, Guam Code Annotated is hereby *added* to read as follows:

## "§ 160.50.1 Basic Bill of Rights for Victims. Penalties.

- (a) Any person or persons who knowingly or intentionally violates any provisions of the Basic Bill of Rights for Victims, pursuant to § 160.50 of Chapter 160, Title 8, Guam Code Annotated, *shall be* guilty of a violation punishable of a fine of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00).
- (b) Any person or persons who unknowingly or unintentionally violates any provisions of the Basic Bill of Rights for Victims, pursuant to § 160.50 of Chapter 160, Title 8, Guam Code Annotated, *shall be* guilty of a violation punishable of a fine of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00). This penalty *shall* only apply to an individual who has the authority or job description to deliver a respective section of the Basic Bill of Rights, and because of an oversight, failed to provide the required service to the victim or their family."
- **Section 3.** § 160.50(o) of Chapter 160, Title 8, Guam Code Annotated is hereby *amended* to read as follows

**Section 3. Severability.** If any provision of this Act or its application to any person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such invalidity *shall not* affect other provisions or applications of this Act that can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Act are severable.

**Section 4. Effective Date.** The Act shall become effective immediately 10 upon enactment.
