Legislative Intent and Findings. 24 25 I Liheslaturan Guahan find's that the gaming fee which was established on 26 Guam several years ago was designed to provide a supplemental funding 27 source for the Guam Memorial Hospital, including for the operations of an 28 Urgent Care Center. However data has shown that the amount of the fees 29 collected have drastically decreased over the years, questioning if any 30 system is truly in place to accurately determine the amount of receivables 31

owed to our government.

Centralized Monitoring Systems are standard units utilized in the gaming industries globally. Hence mandating these systems on authorized gaming devices on island will lead to an increase in funding into the Guam Healthcare Trust and Development Fund (GHTDF). This means additional money floating into the Guam Memorial Hospital to address its deficiencies.

Furthermore, increasing the fee from 4% to 14% would also enhance the amount the hospital receives. Gaming taxes are averaged at 15% to 20% nationally, and in some cases as high as 50% internationally, hence the 4% fee on Guam is relatively diminutive. Financial Statements indicate that between Fiscal Years 2015 to 2017, the Guam Memorial Hospital received an average of \$2.2M annually from gaming fees. Raising this fee could generate a minimum of \$5.5M at 10%, \$6.6M at 12%, and \$7.7M at 14%. However the same statements have indicated inconsistent collections from this assessment fee in those 3 Fiscal Years, thus by looking at the two highest years, the GHTDF received an average of \$3.7M annually and using these figures, if the fee is increased to 10%, this could amount to around \$9.25M a year, at 12% it could amount to \$11.10M, and at 14% it could be \$12.95M.

The current law requires that part of the funding from this special account be allocated towards the creation and the maintaining of an Urgent Care Center at the Guam Memorial Hospital. Because the hospital is currently in a state of financial despair, it is vital to remove this mandate, and allow the hospital to determine how to utilize the funds on their immediate priorities. With the mandated accounting devices in place, 70% of the estimated figures have the potential of providing GMH additionally around \$6.48M annually, which is a significant increase from what it presently receives. This amount potentially increases to \$7.7M when the gaming fee increases to 12% and \$9.07M at 14%.

The Liquid Fuel Tax, which impacts the cost of fuel for island residents, is earmarked into the Guam Territorial Highway Fund (GTHF). However, while the objective of this fund is to provide for road repairs and/or construction, a number of expenses outside of these requirements have adversely impacted the fund in fulfilling its objectives. Some of these expenses include payments to Capital Improvement Funds for both the University of Guam and the Guam Community College, along with monies for public education, transportation and transfers to the general fund.

I Liheslaturan Guahan was prompted to increase this tax in 2017 with the intent of providing more funds for the purposes outlined in the GTHF, but at a cost of increasing the price of fuel at the gas pumps. With an increase in the assessment fees associated with electronic gaming, additional monies can be allocated to increase the GTHF and thus road repairs and/or construction, while balancing things by reducing the recent increase in the Liquid Fuel Tax.

I Liheslaturan Guahan also believes that an Assistance to the Homeless program, which was created by public law decades ago, has not been able to achieve its objectives, since it has not been provided a dedicated funding source. With an increase in the gaming fees, coupled with mandated accounting devices would provide the Department of Public Health and Social Services funding to provide a Transitional Services Center for the Homeless, as identified in Chapter 17 or Title 10, Guam Code Annotated. This program would assist those most unfortunate in our island an opportunity to acclimate towards becoming contributing members of the community.

I Liheslaturan Guahan further finds that the Guam Office of Veterans Affairs has been underfunded over the years to provide essential services to those who proudly served our island and nation. While many other federal programs still need to be adequately provided for our island veterans, the

government of Guam must also be able to assure that basic needs can be funded immediately.

SECTION 2. §97102(b)2 is hereby amended, and §97102(b)3 and §97102(b)4 are hereby added to read as follows:

⁷ § 97102. Guam Healthcare Trust and Development Fund.

"(b) The Fund shall be financed by:

(1) licensing fees, business privilege tax, and income tax collected from the companies involved in gaming as provided by 3 GAR § 7001 et seq. This includes those electronic gaming devices referred to in § 7114(a)(5) and licensed per Title 11 GCA, Chapter 22, Article 2. These devices shall be known as the Liberty, Symbolix, and Match Play electronic gaming devices, and only those registered with the Department of Revenue of Taxation prior to August 1, 2001, pursuant to 3 GAR § 7114 (a)(5).

(2) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the collection of a special four ten percent (410%) assessment fee shall commence on October 1, 2019, and shall be increased to twelve percent (12%) on October 1, 2020, fourteen percent (14%) on October 1, 2021, and to remain at his rate infinitely. This shall be on income on all gaming devices authorized to be licensed pursuant to 11 Guam Code Annotated § 22202 (f) and 3 GAR § 7114(a)(5), to be and these funds will be known as the "GMHA Trust Fund Fee"."

(c) The Department of Revenue and Taxation (hereinafter the Department)
 shall collect such fees and transmit them to the Treasurer of Guam for
 deposit into the Fund. The Department shall:

11 (1) develop the necessary forms and instructions for the licensing of persons and companies as set forth in 3 GAR § 7001 and § 97102(b)(1)(2) and of this Act;

(2) act as the repository for the Fund for use as authorized pursuant to this Article in carrying out the purpose of the Fund.

"(3) all Electronic Devices licensed in this chapter shall be subject to 5 continuous monitoring by a centralized accounting system that complies 6 with an International Standardization Organization (ISO) certified testing 7 lab. The Department shall be permitted to have unlimited remote access to 8 this system at all times. Any electronic device that fails to maintain proper 9 communication with the implemented Centralized Monitoring System shall 10 have the associated Electronic Gaming License suspended 11 immediately removed from service by the Department." 12

"(4) The Department shall procure an entity to provide the centralized 14 accounting system, whose responsibilities will include 1). To set and link 15 up licensed devices, 2). Monitor daily revenue reports, 3). Provide the 16 Department with timely data, and 4). Any other requirements established 17 by the Department. The licensed operator of the electronic device shall be 18 responsible to shoulder the implementation and daily monitoring costs of 19 the accounting system. The selected entity must be an accredited lab on 20 Guam." 21

23 (d) The Department of Administration shall be the disbursing and 24 certifying officer for the Fund, and shall comply with the provisions of 25 Chapter 14 of Title 46, Guam Code Annotated. The Director of 26 Administration shall maintain appropriate records of the Fund and shall 27 provide accounting and auditing services for the Fund.

(e) The Department of Administration shall disperse funds in a manner compliant with § 97105 of this Chapter.

SECTION 3. §97103(a) and §97103(b) are hereby amended, and §97103(c) and §97103(d) are hereby added to read as follow:

"§ 97103. Allocations and Use of Funds; Authorized.

(a) Up to seventy (70%) sixty percent, of the funds in the GMHA 4 Healthcare Trust and Development Fund, shall be allocated to the Guam 5 Hospital Authority for the purpose of subsidizing the 6 Memorial establishment, and operation, and delivery of healthcare services. in whole 7 or part., including as seed or start-up money, of an Urgent Healthcare 8 Center within the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority facility and 9 grounds. The fees collected pursuant to this Article shall be annually 10 allocated and is hereby appropriated, and shall continue to be deemed 11 appropriated, annually, to the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority for the 12 sole and specific purpose of subsidizing the establishment and operation, 13 in whole or part, including as seed or start-up money, of an Urgent 14 Healthcare Medical Center within the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority 15 facility and grounds. This shall continue and shall remain in full force and 16 effect until specifically revoked or amended pursuant to law. Delivery of 17 healthcare services shall include: 18

(b) Up to forty percent of the funds in the GMHA Healthcare Trust and Development Fund shall be allocated to the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority for the purpose of subsidizing its delivery of healthcare services. The fees collected pursuant to this Subsection (b) shall be annually allocated and is hereby appropriated, and shall continue to be deemed appropriated, annually, to the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority for the sole and specific purposes outlined below:

(1) local matching funds for the Medicaid program, specifically for patients seen and treated at the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority;

(2) in an effort to free up cash flow for other expenses of the Authority, funds from this Subsection (b) may be used as additional debt service payments for any existing borrowing by the Authority;

2 (3) funding for the establishment of new revenue generating medical services; and

5 (4) funding for medication, supplies, and medical equipment.

(b) Up to twenty (20%) percent, of the funds in the GMHA Healthcare
Trust and Development Fund, shall be allocated to the Guam Territorial
Highway Fund and shall only be utilized for the purpose of any capital
improvement of road construction or repairs. The fees collected pursuant
to this Article shall be annually allocated and is hereby appropriated, and
shall continue to be deemed appropriated, annually, to the Guam
Territorial Highway Fund for the purposes outlined in this Subsection.

(c) Up to five (5%) percent, of the funds in the GMHA Healthcare Trust and 15 Development Fund, shall be allocated to the Department of Public Health 16 and Social Services for the Assistance to the Homeless provisions identified in 17 Chapter 10 of Title 17, Guam Code Annotated. The entire amount shall be 18 expended towards the Transitional Services Center for the Homeless 19 program. The fees collected pursuant to this Article shall be annually 20 allocated and is hereby appropriated, and shall continue to be deemed 21 appropriated, annually, to the Department of Public Health and Social 22 Services for the purposes outlined in this Subsection. 23

(d) Up to five (5%) percent, of the funds in the GMHA Healthcare Trust 25 and Development Fund, shall be allocated to the Guam Office of Veterans 26 Affairs to supplement operational expenses related to services for Guam's 27 veterans. This would include any burial expenses that would qualify for 28 federal expenses. The fees collected pursuant to this Article shall be 29 annually allocated and is hereby appropriated, and shall continue to be 30 deemed appropriated, annually, to the Guam Office of Veterans Affairs for 31 the purposes outlined in this Subsection." 32

- 1 SECTION 2: EFFECTIVE DATES. §97102(b)4, shall be effective
- 2 immediately upon enactment. All other sections and subsections of this
- 3 Act shall be effective on October 1, 2019. The assessment fees identified in
- 4 §97102(b)2 shall be increased to ten percent (10%) on October 1, 2019,
- twelve percent (12%) on October 1, 2020, and fourteen (14%) on October 1,

- 8 **SECTION 3: SEVERABILITY.** If any provision of this Act or its application to any person or circumstances is found to be invalid or
- 10 contrary to law, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or
- applications of this Act that can be given effect without the invalid
- provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Act are
