AN ACT TO AMEND §§ 73108, 73109, 73110, 73111, 73112, 73113, 73116, 73121, 73123, 73133, 73153, 73154, AND 73155 OF CHAPTER 73, TITLE 5, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, **RELATIVE TO MANDATING A NOTICE OF ARRIVAL** FROM ALL INCOMING VESSELS AND AIRCRAFT TO THE GUAM CUSTOMS AND QUARANTINE AGENCY PRIOR TO ARRIVAL AT GUAM'S PORTS OF ENTRY AND TO REOUIRING THE ADVANCE PRESENTATION **INFORMATION TO THE** OF MANIFEST GUAM **CUSTOMS AND OUARANTINE AGENCY PRIOR TO** ARRIVAL AT GUAM'S PORTS OF ENTRY, AND TO **ESTABLISHING FURTHER PENALTIES** IN VIOLATION OF SUCH REQUIREMENTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* finds that proper manifesting is a standard requirement for vessel entry and for the issuance of a permit to unlade at a port of entry. The United States Customs and Border Protection (CBP) currently requires vessel carriers to submit their cargo manifest no later than forty-eight (48) hours *prior* to arrival in the United States (67 FR 66325). This advance manifest requirement was implemented by the CBP to more effectively enforce against smuggling via containerized cargo.

9 *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* finds that manifest requirements under Guam law, 10 however, permit that a manifest may be submitted "within four (4) hours *after* arrival" (5 GCA, § 73111). This requirement, listed under the Chapter governing
 operations and duties of the Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency (CQA), was
 enacted by the 13th Guam Legislature in the 1970s and has since not been updated
 to reflect technological advancements and current security concerns.

5 I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that over the past several years, the CQA has reported seizing an increasing number of drugs with over \$64 million in "ice" 6 infiltrating Guam's ports of entry (CQA Chief Vincent S.N. Perez, 2017). As the 7 8 "First Line of Defense" for the island of Guam, the CQA is tasked with protecting borders, securing ports of entry, and facilitating trade, commerce, and travel. The 9 10 information collected via manifest is a vital component of achieving CQA's mission. While Guam lies outside of CBP jurisdiction, an amendment to CQA law mirroring 11 12 federal requirements may aid those at Guam's front line. It is therefore the intent of 13 *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to strengthen border security by mandating a prior notice of 14 arrival and the advance presentation of manifest information from all incoming 15 vessels and aircraft, and to further quantify the penalties in violation of such 16 requirements.

Section 2. §§ 73108 through 73113 of Chapter 73, Title 5 Guam Code Annotated are hereby *amended* to read:

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"§ 73108. Clearing Vessels. Clearance Requirements.

20 (a) Any Customs Officer may board and examine any privately owned, privately leased, commercially owned, or commercially leased aircraft, vessel, or 21 contrivance arriving into Guam when it is necessary to carry out the provisions of 22 applicable laws of Guam or the United States, any rule or regulation promulgated 23 24 thereunder, any regulatory or enforcement agreement entered, or any public health 25 and guarantine purpose, and may further require the master or captain thereof to exhibit for examination by the Customs Officer the manifest or any documents or 26 27 papers, or any trunk, package or cargo on board, or any compartment, storage area,

1 cabin, galley, cockpit, lavatory, or any section of the vessel or aircraft. Any master, 2 captain, or person on any conveyance *shall* submit to the lawful instructions of a 3 Customs Officer from the time of boarding until such time the Customs Officer 4 disembarks and authorization to proceed with unloading operations is granted. Any master, captain, or person on any conveyance who fails to abide by lawful 5 6 instructions or obstructs the official duties of a Customs Officer shall be liable for 7 fines and penalties under this Chapter in addition to appropriate offenses contained 8 in Chapter 55, Title 9 Guam Code Annotated. 9 (1) Prior Notice Requirement. Under penalty and apart from the 10 manifest requirements provided in this Chapter, masters or their authorized 11 agent of all vessels or aircrafts must provide a notice of arrival with the 12 following information to the appropriate customs port of entry: 13 (A) For Vessels. Forty-eight (48) hours prior to arrival, a notice of arrival containing the following information must be 14 15 submitted: Vessel name, voyage number and national country 16 (i) of registry; 17 18 Type of vessel; (ii) 19 (iii) Date of arrival; 20 (iv) Guam seaport of arrival; 21 Break-water/or pilot on board time: (v) Assigned pier or wharf of berth; 22 (vi) 23 (vii) Berth time; 24 (viii) Number of crew and passengers; 25 Last Port of Entry; and (ix) Purpose of arrival into Guam. 26 (x)

1	(B) For Aircraft. Twenty-Four (24) hours prior to arrival,
2	commercial, privately owned, or privately operated aircrafts must
3	submit a notice of arrival containing the following information:
4	(i) Guam airport or airfield of arrival;
5	(ii) Aircraft operating name, flight number, registration
6	number, and country of registration;
7	(iii) Origin and last airport of departure;
8	(iv) Date and estimated time of arrival; and
9	(v) Number of transiting and terminating crew and
10	passengers.
11	(C) Exceptions. Vessel and aircraft arriving into Guam under
12	exigent or emergency circumstances wherein Guam was not their
13	intended destination, are exempted from parts (A) and (B) of this
14	subsection.
15	(b) Any individual who is not a Customs Officer or is not duly authorized
16	by Customs, and who goes on board any vessel, aircraft, or conveyance before entry
17	and clearance has thereto been granted, shall be subject to a penalty as prescribed in
18	§ 73133, Chapter 73, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, or imprisoned not more than
19	six (6) months, or both. The master or pilot of such vessel, aircraft, or conveyance
20	may take such person into custody, and deliver him up forthwith to any Customs
21	Officer or law enforcement officer, to be taken by him before any committing
22	magistrate, to be dealt with according to law.
23	(c) Under penalty as prescribed by this Chapter, no vessel, aircraft, or
24	conveyance may commence any activity or unloading operations without Customs'
25	presence, authorization, or clearance.
26	(d) Departures.

(a) (1) No <u>aircraft</u>, vessel <u>or contrivance</u> shall be cleared until her cargo,
 consigned to Guam, had been landed and properly accounted <u>for</u>.

(b) (2) Prior to the departure of any <u>aircraft</u>, vessel, <u>or contrivance</u>, the
master shall deposit with the Customs Officer at the port <u>or airport</u>, a manifest
of the outward cargo of such vessel <u>or aircraft</u>, specifying the marks and
numbers of packages, a description of their contents, with the names of
shippers and consignees; and also the names of passengers and their
destination. A clearance will then be granted to the vessel <u>or aircraft</u>.

§ 73109. Definitions.

(a) Vessel — The word *vessel* means a craft used, or capable of being used,
 for transportation on the water, and includes every description of watercraft or other
 contrivance used, or capable of being used as a means of transportation on the water,
 but does not include aircraft.

(b) <u>Aircraft — The word *aircraft* means any craft now known or hereafter</u>
 invented for transportation use in the air, and includes every description of craft or
 other contrivance used or capable of being used as a means of transportation in flight
 or in the air.

18 (c) Merchandise — The word *merchandise* means goods, wares and 19 chattels of every description and includes merchandise the importation of which is 20 prohibited.

(c) (d) Person — The word *person* includes partnerships, associations and
 corporations any individual, firm, co-partnership, joint venture, association,
 corporation, trust or any group or combination action as a unit and the plural, as well
 as the singular number as may be appropriate.

25 (d)(e) Master — The word *master* means the person having the command of
 26 the <u>aircraft</u>, vessel, or contrivance.

(e) (f) Day — The word *day* means the time from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. [or
 from 0800 hours to 1700 hours].

3 (f)(g) Night — The word *night* means the time from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m.
4 [the next day] [1700 hours to 0800 hours the next day].

5 (g)(h) Collector — The word *Collector* means the Collector of Customs and
6 includes Assistant Collector of Customs, Deputy Collector of Customs <u>Director of</u>
7 <u>Customs, sworn Customs Officers,</u> and any persons authorized to perform the duties
8 of the Collector of Customs.

- 9 (i) Entry The word *entry* means the manner of submitting the required 10 documentation or electronic data required by this Chapter to the appropriate 11 <u>Customs Office to secure the release of imported or exported merchandise, clearance</u> 12 <u>of arriving or departing conveyances, and arriving individuals with customs.</u>
- 13 § 73110. Manifest. The master of every <u>aircraft</u>, vessel, or contrivance 14 arriving in Guam shall have on board his vessel a manifest of for passengers, crew 15 <u>and cargo destined</u> for Guam, signed by such master under oath <u>as at to the truth of</u> 16 the statement therein contained. <u>Failure to provide such manifests in the prescribed</u> 17 <u>manner and or requirements constitutes a penalty as contained herein</u>. Such 18 manifests shall contain <u>all of the following information as required:</u>

- (1) Cargo Manifest:
- 21 (A) The names of the ports or places at which the merchandise

- (B) The name, description and build of the vessel, the true

(E) The names of the several passengers and crew aboard the vessel, stating whether cabin or steerage passengers, with their baggage, specifying the number and description of the pieces of baggage belonging to each and a list of all baggage not accompanied by passengers.

(F) An account of the sea stores and ship's stores on board the
vessel.

13 (G) If the vessel is from the United States port the manifest
14 shall be certified by the Collector of the port sailing. If from a foreign
15 port, by the United States consul or commercial agent of the port. If
16 there is no United States consul or agent, then by the <u>foreign</u>
17 <u>government consul or agent of any nation at peace with the United</u>
18 <u>States.</u>

20	shipper to such importer or consignee, unless the Collector determines
21	that the confidentiality of any particular information is necessary for
22	the good of the Agency or national security;
23	(B) Airway Bill of Lading Number of each cargo destined for
24	<u>Guam;</u>
25	(C) The general description of the cargo;
26	(D) The number of packages and gross weight;
27	(E) The name of the aircraft carrier and flight number;

1	(F) The port of loading;
2	(G) The port of discharge; and
3	(H) The country of origin of the shipment;
4	(2) Crew and Passenger Manifest. The master or agent of each
5	privately owned, privately operated, commercially owned, or commercially
6	leased aircraft arriving into Guam from any place outside of Guam must
7	transmit to the Agency an electronic passenger, crew, and cargo manifests
8	aboard the flight. The electronic manifest must be transmitted as required by
9	regulation to the Customs Office in Charge of the clearance for the arriving
10	aircraft.
11	(A) Full name (last, first, and, if available, middle);
12	(B) Date of birth;
13	(C) Gender ($F = female; M = male$);
14	(D) Citizenship;
15	(E) Country of residence;
16	(F) Status on board the aircraft;
17	(G) Travel document type (e.g., $P = passport; A = alien$

17	(c) Discrepancies. If any discrepancy that occurs in any way with respect
18	to any manifest or bill of lading data, the owner or operator of the vessel, aircraft, or
19	contrivance, or any party responsible for such discrepancy, shall be liable for any
20	fine or penalty prescribed by law with respect to such discrepancy or violation. The
21	Agency may take appropriate action against any of the parties.
22	(d) Public Disclosure of Certain Manifest Information. The Collector, in
23	order to allow for the timely dissemination and publication of the information listed,
24	shall adhere to the provisions as set in the Sunshine Reform Act of 1999, Chapter 10
25	of Title 5, Guam Code Annotated. In accordance with the 5 GCA Chapter 10, and
26	when requested, the Collector shall make available for public disclosure the
27	following information:

1	(1) The general character of the cargo;
2	(2) The number of packages and gross weight;
3	(3) The port of loading;
4	(4) The port of discharge; and
5	(5) The country of origin of the shipment.
6	§ 73111. Manifest Delivered to Customs Officer.

15	belong to be employed in the transportation of passengers or merchandise.

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"§ 73116. Unloading Prohibition.

6 (a) Except as otherwise provided (relating to vessels not required to enter), no merchandise, passengers or baggage shall be unloaded from any vessel until entry 7 8 of such vessel has been made and a permit for the unloading of the same issued by the Collector; *provided*, that the master may make a preliminary entry of a vessel by 9 10 making oath or affirmation to the truth of the statements contained in the vessel's manifest as provided in § 73110, Chapter 73, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, and 11 12 delivering submitting the manifest to the Customs Officer as provided in § 73111, 13 Chapter 73, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, but the making of such preliminary entry 14 shall not excuse the master from making formal entry of his vessel at the Customs 15 House, as provided in these regulations. After the entry, preliminary or otherwise, of any vessel, the Collector may issue a permit to the master of the vessel, to unload 16 merchandise or baggage but except as provided in subsection (b) of this section, 17 18 merchandise or baggage so unladen shall be retained at the place of unlading until 19 entry therefor is made and a permit for its delivery granted. Any merchandise or 20 baggage so unladen from any vessel for which entry is not made within forty-eight 21 (48) hours from the time of the entry of the vessel, unless a longer time is granted 22 by the Collector, shall be sent to the Customs storehouse and held as unclaimed at 23 the risk and expense of the consignee in the case of merchandise and of the owner in case of baggage, until entry thereof is made. A master in violation of this Section 24 25 shall be subject to a penalty as prescribed in § 73133, Chapter 73, Title 5, Guam 26 Code Annotated.

1 (b) The Collector of Customs is authorized to issue special permits for 2 delivery, prior to formal entry thereof, of perishable articles and other articles, the 3 immediate delivery of which is necessary."

4 Section 4. §73121 of Chapter 73, Title 5 Guam Code Annotated is hereby
5 *amended* to read:

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"§ 73121. Sale of Merchandise: Storage: Fees, Lien, Sale.

Any imported merchandise in the possession of the Collector of Customs, or 7 8 properly entered or otherwise, remaining in government custody from than five (5) to ten (10) fourteen (14) calendar days (including Sundays or holidays) after receipt 9 10 therein and except when delay in removal may be caused by some failure on the part 11 of the government, shall be liable to a storage charge of fifty cents (\$0.50) per diem 12 or fraction thereof per ton (2,000 pounds or 40 cubic feet) or fraction thereof for each day thereafter (excluding Sundays and holidays) flat rate fee of fifty U.S. dollars 13 (\$50.00) upon seizure or until such time the Director of Customs promulgates a fee 14 15 schedule for said subsection.

16 The Collector may direct removal at any time when efficient operation of the Customs Warehouse may necessitate such removal. The above rates of storage 17 charges will then become effective on the fifth day following the order to remove 18 19 the merchandise concerned. Any storage charges shall constitute a lien against the 20 property for payment of all storage charges before removal. Storage charges shall be 21 paid every ten (10) days and if not so done and whenever charges against such 22 merchandise shall have accrued in an amount equal to two-thirds the entered value 23 of the merchandise in question, it shall be subject to seizure and sale by the 24 government in the same manner and subject to the same conditions as prescribed in 25 § 73120 of this Chapter.

Stores not removed within thirty (30) days after the Collector has directed
 their removal shall be subject to sale at public auction in the manner prescribed in §
 73120 of this Chapter."

4 Section 5. §73123 of Chapter 73, Title 5 Guam Code Annotated is hereby

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"§ 73123. Sale of Merchandise.

Destruction by Authorities. Except as otherwise provided, any merchandise abandoned or forfeited to the government under the preceding or any other provision of this Chapter, which is subject to internal revenue tax and which the Collector shall be satisfied will not sell for a sufficient amount to pay such taxes, shall be forthwith destroyed instead of being sold at auction. <u>Importers of abandoned or forfeited</u> <u>merchandise set for destruction shall be liable and billed the full cost of destruction</u>."

Section 6. §73133 of Chapter 73, Title 5 Guam Code Annotated are hereby *amended* to read:

15 "§ 73133. Penalty. Penalties and Fines. Penalties for violations of arrival, 16 reporting, entry, and clearance requirements.

Any master of any vessel who does not produce the manifest to the officer 17 demanding the same shall be guilty of a violation, and if any merchandise is found 18 19 on board on or after having been unloaded from such vessel which is not included 20 or described in said manifest or does not agree therewith, the master of such vessel 21 or the owner of such vessel shall be liable to a penalty equal to the value of the 22 merchandise so found or unladen, and any merchandise belonging or consigned to the master or other officer or to any of the crew of such vessel shall be subject to 23 forfeiture, and if any merchandise described in such manifest is not found on board 24 25 the vessel the master or other person in charge or the owner of such vessel shall be guilty of a violation; provided, that if the Collector shall be satisfied that the manifest 26 was lost or mislaid without intentional fraud, or was defaced by accident, or is 27

1	incorrect by reason of clerical error or other mistake and that no part of the
2	merchandise not found on board was unshipped or discharged except as specified in
3	the report of the master, said penalties shall not be incurred.
4	(a) Unlawful Act
5	(1) Failure to comply with §§ 73104, 73106, 73107, 73108, 73110,
6	and 73111 of this Chapter;
7	(2) Failure to present or transmit, electronically or otherwise, any
8	forged, altered, or false document, paper, information, data or manifest to the
9	Customs Service without revealing the facts; or
10	(3) Failure to make entry or to obtain clearance as required.
11	(b) Civil Penalty. Any master, person in charge, or aircraft pilot who
12	commits any violation listed under § 73133, Chapter 73, Title 5, Guam Code
13	Annotated, is liable for a civil penalty of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) for the first
14	violation, and Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) for each subsequent violation, and
15	any conveyance used in connection with any such violation is subject to seizure and
16	forfeiture.
17	(c) Criminal Penalty. In addition to being liable for a civil penalty under
18	subsection (b) of this Section, any master, person in charge, or aircraft pilot who
19	intentionally commits any violation listed in subsection (a) of this Section is, upon
20	conviction, liable for a fine of not more than Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) or
21	imprisonment for one (1) year, or both; except that if the conveyance has, or is
22	discovered to have had, on board any merchandise (other than sea stores or the
23	equivalent for conveyances other than vessels) the importation of which into Guam
24	is prohibited, such individual is liable for an additional fine of not more than Ten
25	Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or imprisonment for not more than five (5) years, or
26	both.

1 Additional Civil Penalty. If any merchandise (other than sea stores or (d)2 the equivalent for conveyances other than a vessel) is imported or brought into Guam 3 in or aboard a conveyance which was not properly reported or entered, the master, person in charge, or aircraft pilot shall be liable for a civil penalty equal to the value 4 5 of the merchandise and the merchandise may be seized and forfeited unless properly 6 entered by the importer or consignee. If the merchandise consists of any controlled 7 substance listed in Title 9 Guam Code Annotated, the master, person in charge, or 8 aircraft pilot shall be liable to the penalties prescribed in that Section." Section 7. §§ 73153 through 73155 of Chapter 73, Title 5 Guam Code 9 10 Annotated are hereby *amended* to read: 11 *****§73153. Customs Fines and Penalties Revolving Fund. 12 Fund Established. There is hereby established within the Customs and (a) 13 Quarantine Agency, a fund to be known as the 'Customs Fines and Penalties' 14 Revolving Fund' which shall be separate and apart from other funds in the 15 government of Guam, and for which independent records shall be maintained. The Director of Customs is hereby authorized to expend collected funds without 16 appropriation. 17 18 Deposits. All money received in accordance with this Section as it (b)19 relates to fines and penalties shall be deposited into the Customs Fines and Penalties 20 Revolving Fund. 21 (c) Authorized Expense(s). §73154. Penalties and Payments.

4 (a) Payments Due. All person(s) found in violation and issued a penalty or
5 fine under §73133, Chapter 73, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, shall make payments
6 to the 'Treasurer of Guam' immediately.

(b) Interest Penalty. Each person found in violation and issued a penalty or 7 8 fine under §73133, Chapter 73, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, who fails to make 9 payment for such penalty or fine within thirty (30) days of the date of issued penalty 10 or fine, shall pay an interest penalty of fifteen percent (15%) per annum to the Treasurer of Guam, on the amount of past due or balance thereof. No interest penalty 11 12 shall be assessed on payments made in full on or before the thirtieth (30th) day from 13 the date payments are due. 14 (c) Unpaid Interest. Interest penalty applicable under § 73154(b) which remains unpaid shall accrue to the balance due for purposes of computing current 15 16 interest due. §7315373155 Severability.
