# AN ACT TO *ADD* A NEW CHAPTER 72 TO TITLE 9, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO ESTABLISHING A STATUTE RELATED TO BIAS-MOTIVATED CRIMES, INCLUSIVE OF PENALTIES, CIVIL ACTIONS, AND DATA COLLECTION.

# **BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:**

2 Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds 3 that according to the Department of Justice, Guam joins 7 other states and territories as jurisdictions that either don't have statutes in place to address Hate or 4 5 Bias-Motivated Crimes, nor do they have any mandates to collect data on such 6 activities. As the world slowly recovers from the global COVID-19 pandemic, an 7 old and long standing issue has resurfaced and has taken the priority within the 8 eyes of humanity, which is the realities that crimes with prejudiced motives 9 continue to remain in rampant existence.

While peaceful protests take place locally, nationally, and internationally, to echo the need for a change in the mindset, a semblance of a sturdy statement would be made by establishing a local statute that recognizes such crimes, and assures that those guilty of actions are additionally penalized if the motive of the crime was due to hate. This Act recognizes the crimes that are pursued due to the prejudices of the victims perceived race, religion, color, ethnicity, physical, emotional or developmental disability, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity,
political affiliation, national origin, job or occupation, or ancestry, shall be
punishable with extensions towards the fines and sentences that are prescribed by
law for the underlying crime.

5 This Act recognizes the potential of Bias-Motivated Crimes related to homicide, assault, reckless endangering, terrorizing, kidnapping, sexual offenses 6 7 (inclusive of crimes against children), family violence, arson, criminal mischief, 8 burglary, robbery, official misconduct, extortion, riot, disorderly conduct, and 9 other miscellaneous crimes, and the impact it may have towards victims and/or 10 their properties if damaged or destroyed due to the hate crime. If one is convicted 11 of such crimes, the fines and sentences may be increased if the motive involved 12 prejudice. The measure also establishes language to allow victims to pursue civil 13 action in addressing the opportunity to secure an injunction, damages, or other 14 relief against their perpetrator.

15 This Act further mandates that the Guam Police Department not only 16 maintain a central repository of information and analytics associated with Bias-17 Motivated Crimes that take place, but also provide the necessary training to law 18 enforcement officers in identifying, responding, and reporting such actions as they 19 occur. This is information that may assist with future statutes, assist federal 20 counterparts, or essentially help families and/or victims in the future.

Section 2. A new Chapter 72 is hereby *added* to Title 9, Guam Code
Annotated to read as follows:

- A person commits a Bias-Motivated Crime if, by reason of the actual or 3 4 perceived race, religion, color, ethnicity, physical, emotional or developmental disability, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, political affiliation, national 5 6 origin, job or occupation, or ancestry of another individual or group of individuals; 7 he violates Chapters 16, 19, 22, 25, 25A, 30, 34, 37, 40, 49, 52, 61, and 70 of 8 9GCA, or commits attempt, solicitation or conspiracy to commit a crime under 9 said Chapters, *supra*. 10 § 72102. Bias-Motivated Crimes, Penalties. 11 (a) Notwithstanding any other provisions of the law, if a person is 12 convicted of any crime(s) pursuant to Chapters 16, 19, 22, 25, 25A 30, 34, 37, 40, 49, 52, 61, and 70 of 9GCA, or commits attempt, solicitation or 13 14 conspiracy to commit a crime under said Chapters, supra, where it is 15 determined that a Bias-Motivated Crime as defined in § 72101 of this Chapter was also committed, where they intentionally select the person(s) 16 17 against whom the crime is committed or selects the property that is damaged 18 or otherwise affected by the crime pursuant to this subsection in whole or in 19 part because of the actor's belief or perception regarding the race, religion, 20 color, ethnicity, physical, emotional or developmental disability, sexual 21 orientation, gender, gender identity, political affiliation, national origin, job 22 or occupation, or ancestry of that person or the owner or occupant of that property, whether or not the actor's belief or perception was correct, if the 23 24 conviction: 25 (1) is a petty misdemeanor, the revised maximum fine 26 prescribed by law for the crime shall be Ten Thousand Dollars
- 27 (\$10,000) and the revised maximum period of imprisonment

	prescribed by law for the crime shall be one (1) year. This sentence
2	may run consecutively to the sentence for the underlying offense.
3	(2) is a misdemeanor, the revised maximum fine prescribed by
4	law for the crime shall be Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) and the
5	revised maximum period of imprisonment prescribed by law for the
6	crime shall be two (2) years. This sentence may run consecutively to
7	the sentence for the underlying offense.
8	(3) is a felony, the maximum fine prescribed by law for the
9	crime shall be increased by no more than Twenty Thousand Dollars
10	(\$20,000) and the maximum period of imprisonment prescribed by the
11	law for the crime shall be increased by no more than ten (20) years.
12	This sentence may run consecutively to the sentence for the
13	underlying offense.
14	(b) This section provides for the enhancement of the penalties
15	applicable for the underlying crime. The court shall direct that the trier of
16	fact finds a special verdict as to all the issues specified in § 72102(a) of this
17	Chapter.
18	(c) This section <i>shall not</i> apply to any crime if proof of race, religion,
19	color, ethnicity, physical, emotional or developmental disability, sexual
20	orientation, gender, gender identity, political affiliation, national origin, job
	or occupation, or ancestry, or proof of any persons perception of belief

1	(a) Irrespective of any criminal prosecution or result thereof, any person
2	incurring bodily injury or damage or loss to his property as a result of conduct in
3	violation of § 72102(a) of this Chapter shall have a civil action to secure an
4	injunction, damages or other appropriate relief in law or in equity against any and
5	all persons who have violated a Bias-Motivated Crime pursuant this Chapter.
6	(b) In any such action, whether a violation of § 71102(a) of this Chapter has
7	occurred shall be determined according to the burden of proof used in other civil
8	actions for similar relief.
9	(c) Upon prevailing in such civil action, the plaintiff may recover:
10	(1) Both special and general damages, including damages for
11	emotional distress;
12	(2) Punitive damages; and/or
13	(3) Reasonable attorney fees and costs.
14	(d) Notwithstanding any other provision of the law to the contrary, the
15	parent(s) or legal guardian(s) of any unemancipated minor shall be liable for any
16	judgment rendered against minor pursuant to this subsection.
17	§72104. Bias-Motivated Crime, Reporting and Training.
18	The Guam Police Department shall establish and maintain a central
19	repository for the collection and analysis of information regarding Bias-Motivated
20	Crimes as defined in § 72101 of this Chapter. Upon establishing such a repository,
21	the Guam Police Department shall develop a procedure to monitor, record, classify
22	and, analyze information relating to crimes apparently directed against individuals
23	or groups, or their property, by reason of their actual or perceived race, religion,
24	color, ethnicity, physical, emotional or developmental disability, sexual
25	orientation, gender, gender identity, political affiliation, national origin, job or
26	occupation, or ancestry. The Guam Police Department shall submit its rules and

regulations to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* for approval consistent with the provisions
 of Chapter 9 of 5GCA.

All law enforcement agencies *shall* report monthly to the Guam Police Department concerning such offenses in such form and in such manner as prescribed by the rules and regulations adopted by Guam Police Department. The Guam Police Department *shall* summarize and analyze the information received and file an annual report with *I Maga'Hagan Guåhan* and the appropriate committee of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*.

Any information, records and statistics collected in accordance with this
 subsection *shall be* available for use by any local law enforcement agency of the
 Government of Guam to the extent that such information is reasonably necessary
 or useful to such agency in carrying out the duties imposed upon it by law.
 Dissemination of such information *shall be* subject to all confidentiality
 requirements otherwise imposed by Public Law.
 The Guam Police Department *shall* provide training for police officers in

16 <u>identifying, responding to, and reporting all Bias-Motivated Crimes.</u>"

17 Section 3. Severability. If any provision of this Act or its application to 18 any person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such 19 invalidity *shall not* affect other provisions or applications of this Act that can be 20 given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the 21 provisions of this Act are severable.

Section 4. Effective Date. The act *shall* become effective immediately
upon enactment.
