AN ACT TO REPEAL AND RE-ENACT SECTIONS §1105 OF CHAPTER 1, TITLE 2, AND §5101 OF CHAPTER 5, TITLE 3, AND §6103 OF CHAPTER 6, TITLE 3, OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED AND TO AMEND SECTIONS §7105 OF CHAPTER 7, TITLE 3, AND §16301 (e) ARTICLE 3 OF CHAPTER 16, TITLE 3, OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO AMENDING THE TERM OF OFFICE FROM TWO YEARS TO FOUR YEARS AND TO PROVIDE FOR STAGGERED TERMS FOR MEMBERS OF THE GUAM LEGISLATURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that four-year terms allow 2 Senators time for essential legislative work, without reelection in a short two 3 4 years. Instead of working to raise election funds every two years, Senators in four-year terms may concentrate on Legislative work. Longer terms 5 allow senators to take responsibility for measures over time, making senators 6 largely independent of special interests. Concerning the public, voters will 7 still have the ability to vote for elected officials every two years due to the 8 constitutional casting of lots. Staggered terms every two even years for 9 seven or eight Senatorial positions will create more candidates that run for 10 Legislative office. 11

- 1 It is, therefore, the intent of *I Liheslatura* to amend the terms of Senatorial
- 2 office from two years to four years and to provide for staggered terms for
- 3 members of the Guam Legislature.

Section 2. §1105 of Chapter 1, Title 2, Guam Code Annotated is repealed and re-enacted to read:

"§ 1105. Senators, Terms of.

- (a) Pursuant to Section 10 (d) of the Organic Act of Guam, the general election for the office of Senator of the Guam Legislature shall be held in even-numbered years on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.
- (b) In the general election of 2010, fifteen (15) persons shall be elected Senators to the Guam Legislature. Of that number eight (8) shall be elected to a term of four years, the term to commence at 10 a.m. on the first Monday in January of 2011 and to end at 9:59 a.m. on the first Monday in January 2015. The other seven (7) persons elected Senator shall serve a term of two years, the term to commence at 10 a.m. on the first Monday in January of 2011 and to end at 9:59 a.m. on the first Monday in January of 2013.
- (c) Commencing in 2010 and continuing every four years thereafter eight (8) persons shall be elected to a term of four years as Senators of the Guam Legislature, the term to commence at 10 a.m. on the first Monday in January following the election and continuing until 9:59 a.m. of the first Monday in January four years after the election. The decision of which persons shall serve terms of two years shall be as provided by Section 5101 Chapter 5 Title 3 of the Guam Code Annotated.

(d) Commencing in 2012 and continuing every four years thereafter seven (7) persons shall be elected to a term of four years as Senators of the Guam Legislature, the term to commence at 10 a.m. on the first Monday in January following the election and continuing until 9:59 a.m. of the first Monday in January four years after the election."

Section 3. §5101 of Chapter 5, Title 3, Guam Code Annotated is repealed and re-enacted to read:

"§5101 General Elections for Legislature.

- (a) General Election for the Guam Legislature shall be held on Tuesday next after the first Monday in November every two years in even-numbered years. In 2010, eight (8) persons shall be elected to a term of four years and seven (7) persons shall be elected to a term of two years. In 2012 and every fourth year thereafter seven (7) persons shall be elected to a term of four years and in 2014 and every fourth year thereafter eight (8) persons shall be elected to a term of four years.
- (b) Within ten (10) days of the declaration of the results of the election for the Legislature in 2010, the Commission shall choose by lot in the same fashion by which ballot placement is determined, the eight (8) persons elected to terms of four years and the seven (7) persons elected to terms of two years. Any person who is successful in contesting the declaration of any person shall serve the same term as would have been served by the first person declared elected by the Commission."
- **Section 4.** §6103 of Chapter 6, Title 3, Guam Code Annotated is repealed and re-enacted to read:

"§6103 Terms of Office.

In 2010 eight (8) persons elected to the Legislature shall serve a term of four years and seven (7) persons shall serve a term of two years. In 2012 and every fourth year thereafter seven (7) persons shall be elected to a term of four years and in 2014 and every fourth year thereafter eight (8) persons shall be elected to a term of four years."

Section 5. §7105 of Chapter 7, Title 3, Guam Code Annotated is *amended* to read:

"§7105 Order of Names on Ballot - Legislature.

The Commission shall prepare the ballot in such a manner that a nominee's name shall appear under the name of the political party, if any, sponsoring such nominee.

In all elections, the names of all nominees or candidates for a specific office shall be listed in a random manner. Each contestant for any office under a party or independent designation shall be listed according to lot drawn by the Election Commission. All drawings for ballot position shall be done publicly and persons appearing on the ballot shall be specifically invited to attend. The drawings for ballot placement shall be accomplished as soon as is reasonably possible after the identity of the persons to appear on the ballot is known to the Election Commission.

The names of the nominees shall appear in columns vertically in such order as is determined by lot.

Columns for recognized political parties shall be listed on the basis of the number of nominees elected to seats held in the Legislature at the last preceding regular general as of October 1 in the year of the election in descending order from left to right; last shall appear the names of those nominees not sponsored by any political

party, which shall appear under the designation "Independent". The names of all nominees holding the office for which they are seeking election shall have the word **INCUMBENT** printed immediately after them."

Section 6. §16301 (e) of Chapter 16, Title 3, of the Guam Code Annotated is repealed and re-enacted to read:

"§16301 Form of Primary Election Ballot (e).

The ballot shall be divided so that the party holding the greatest number of seats in the Legislature as of August 1 in the year of the election shall appear first on the left on the ballot below the words, in bold face type, "______PARTY PRIMARY CANDIDATES";

The ballot for each office for which party nominations are sought shall contain instructions to the voters as to the maximum number of candidates that may be selected for that office; that party's candidates for nomination for each office shall be listed on the ballot in random order in a manner similar to that established for General Election Ballot listing and placement;"
