AN ACT TO AMEND §3305 OF CHAPTER 3, TITLE 16, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED; RELATIVE TO MOTORCYCLE SAFETY HELMETS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

- 2 Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds
- that in 1997, Public Law 24-02 repealed the then existing law requiring the
- 4 mandatory use of helmets for motorcyclists on Guam. The legislative intent of
- 5 Public Law 24-02 was to change the motorcycle helmet laws due to the relaxation
- of federal mandates that allowed states and territories to determine their own
- 7 highway requirements and safety standards without the threat of losing federal
- 8 highway funding. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that twenty (20) states, the District
- 9 of Columbia, the Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico, and the United States
- 10 Virgin Islands currently have laws requiring the mandatory usage of helmets for
- motorcycle riders. Guam is the only United States territory with no such law in

- effect. In the past two months, Guam has had one motorcycle fatality with another
- 2 motorcyclist severely injured. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety
- 3 Administration (NHTSA), head injury is the leading cause of death in motorcycle
- 4 crashes. An unhelmeted motorcyclist is forty percent (40%) more likely to suffer a
- 5 fatal head injury. The NHTSA estimates that motorcycle helmets reduce the
- 6 likelihood of a crash fatality by thirty-seven percent (37%). A Crash Outcome
- 7 Data Evaluation System study found that motorcycle helmets are sixty-seven
- 8 percent (67%) effective in preventing brain injuries and that unhelmeted
- 9 motorcyclists involved in crashes were three (3) times more likely to suffer brain
- injuries than those wearing helmets. After the first year of the enactment of
- universal helmet laws, the following reductions of motorcycle fatalities occurred:
- 12 California, thirty-seven percent (37%); Oregon, thirty-three percent (33%);
- Nebraska, thirty-two percent (32%); Texas, twenty-three percent (23%); Maryland,
- twenty percent (20%); and Washington State, fifteen percent (15%). Therefore, it
- is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to amend §3305 of Chapter 3, Title 16,
- 16 Guam Code Annotated to mandate the use of motorcycle helmets on Guam by
- including drivers and passengers of all ages and by further increasing the fines,
- should a person be in violation, in order to encourage the use of helmets.
- Section 2. §3305 of Chapter 3 of Title 16, Guam Code Annotated is hereby amended to read:
- 21 "§ 3305. Mandatory Safety Helmets.
- 22 Any driver under eighteen (18) years of age and any passenger under eighteen (18)
- 23 years of age shall wear a safety helmet, of a type approved by the Department of
- 24 Revenue and Taxation, when riding on a motorcycle, including a bicycle equipped
- 25 with a motor. Anyone who violates this section shall be subject to a fine of not less
- than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and not more than Five
- 27 Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00)."

- **Section 3.** This Act shall be effective upon enactment.
- Section 4. Severability. If any of the provisions of this Act, or the
- 3 application thereof to any person or circumstance, is held invalid, such invalidity
- 4 shall not affect any other provision or application of this Act, which can be given
- 5 effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end, the provisions
- 6 of this code are severable.
