Relative to remembering and memorializing the late Joseph Charles Murphy on his legacy as Guam's foremost journalist and columnist; and to honoring him for his service to our island and offering condolences to his family, on behalf of the people of Guam.

- WHEREAS, the people of Guam lost an icon of journalism on February
- 4 5, 2009, when the great columnist, writer, and editor Joseph Charles Murphy
- 5 passed on; and

WHEREAS, Joseph Charles Murphy, better known as "Joe" to his 1 2 family, friends, and readers, was born on February 23, 1927, in Appleton, 3 Wisconsin; and 4 WHEREAS, Joe Murphy married his high school sweetheart, Marion 5 Muth, sixty-two (62) wonderful years ago and were blessed with eight (8) 6 children: Colleen, Maureen, Shannon, †Kerry, Timothy, Erin, Megan and Joey; 7 twenty-seven (27) grandchildren; and seventeen (17) great grandchildren; and 8 WHEREAS, during World War II Joe Murphy joined the U. S. Navy at 9 the age of seventeen (17) years, and returned home after war to finish high 10 school. He eloped with Marion on the night of their high school graduation, and later went on to earn a degree in journalism from the University of 11 12 Wisconsin at Madison, and has worked as a journalist ever since; and 13 WHEREAS, Joe Murphy worked as a reporter, editor and columnist in 14 Wisconsin, Oregon and California, before taking a job in Guam in 1965; and WHEREAS, Joe Murphy arrived on Guam on December 8, 1965, Our 15 Lady of Kamalen Day, and joked that the procession was a welcoming parade 16 17 just for him, as he knew Guam would be his home for the rest of his life; and 18 WHEREAS, Joe Murphy took a job managing what was then known as the "Guam Daily News", and is now known as the "Pacific Daily News", 19 20 where he became the editor, and also was writer of the column for which he is 21 most well known, "Pipe Dreams," and other daily editorials on topics such as 22 new developments, the economy, innovative ideas, and politics. He later

- 1 traveled around the Pacific to produce more editorials about the region, as the
- 2 issues related to Guam; and
- 3 **WHEREAS**, Joe Murphy loved adventure and took advantage of offers
- 4 to try many different things and write about them, and is the author of two (2)
- 5 books: "Guam is a Four Letter Word" and "Son of a Four Letter Word"; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Joe Murphy later retired as editor of the Pacific Daily News
- 7 in 1988, but continued to write his column, which changed titles from "Pipe
- 8 Dreams" to "Murphy's Law" after he quit smoking; and
- 9 WHEREAS, upon retirement and raising his children to adulthood, Joe
- 10 Murphy took his great love, Marion, and traveled the world because of his
- 11 love for history, geography, culture and politics and was always looking for
- 12 new ideas that might work on Guam, his beloved home, and he shared those
- thoughts in his column in the Pacific Daily News; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Joseph Charles Murphy's legacy lives on in the island of
- 15 Guam and with its people, but most especially in his children, who have
- 16 carried on his passion for writing and journalism and have followed in his
- 17 footsteps and made it their business, just like their father; and
- 18 WHEREAS, in February 2007, Joe Murphy wrote a column about his
- 19 80th birthday where he reflected on his passionate life, wild youth and the
- 20 changing island; and
- 21 WHEREAS, Joe Murphy always believed in equality, pushing his
- daughters, as well as his sons, to find their passions and to excel in life; and he

- 1 thought highly of the island people and, together with his wife, passed on
- 2 their attitudes about islanders to all those whom they encountered; and
- 3 WHEREAS, the people of Guam will sorely miss the writings, the
- 4 thoughts, and the humor that we grew up with and that enriched our lives for
- 5 more than four (4) decades as we all mourn the passing of Joseph Charles
- 6 Murphy, journalist extraordinaire; now, therefore, be it
- 7 **RESOLVED,** that the Committee on Rules of *I Mina'Trenta Na*
- 8 Liheslaturan Guåhan does hereby, on behalf of I Liheslaturan Guåhan and the
- 9 people of Guam, grieve over the loss of the late Joseph Charles Murphy, and
- does offer its condolences and sympathies to his wife and children; and be it
