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WHEREAS, Catholic Social Service (CSS) is a non-profit non-stock social service agency arm of the Archdiocese of Agana, and was established on April 3, 1979 to provide services to the poor, the elderly and disadvantaged individuals; and

WHEREAS, Catholic Social Service, modeled after the example messages of Jesus that each human being is of infinite value, is dedicated to the dignity of the human person with its aim to encourage spiritual, intellectual, economical and social development of individuals and families of the Island of Guam; and

WHEREAS, an appointed, dedicated fifteen (15) member Board of Directors has been guiding Catholic Social Service since 1979, and continues to do so up to the present; and

WHEREAS, the mission statement of Catholic Social Service is to enable individuals to develop his / her potential; to develop a comprehensive range of human services; to promote social justice and work to effect change; to assist the poor, the disadvantaged and marginalized; to affirm cultural diversity and collaborative efforts to promote relationships in keeping with Christian ideals; and to protect the environment of all Micronesian Islands; and

1	WHEREAS, Catholic Social Service has provided our community with
2	the following much-needed programs and services:
3	"Isa" Residential Treatment Center providing counseling and
4	treatment to clients for drug and alcohol-related intervention from 1979-
5	80;
6	•"Food Bank" provides emergency food to the needy since
7	November 1990;
8	•"ALEE I" provides shelter for victims of family violence since
9	January 1981;
10	•"ALEE II" provides shelter for abused and neglected children
11	since 1983;
12	"Case Management" provides casework for the elderly in need of
13	an advocate to network needed services since October 1981;
14	•"Thrift Shop" provides a second-hand merchandise sales and
15	distribution outlet to assist those in need of emergency clothing and
16	household items since July 1983;
17	•"Father David A. Quitugua Foundation" provides financial
18	assistance to those diagnosed with catastrophic illnesses that need off-
19	island care since March 1986;
20	"Finger Painting" services for employment and immigration
21	validation since June 1986;

1	 "Elderly Nutrition" daily meal service for the manåmko in
2	designated sites, as well as the homebound, since December 1986 to
3	September 2003.
4	"Qualified Designated Agency" (QDA) under the Amnesty
5	Program from January 1987-1992;
6	•Patient Meals provider for the Guam Memorial Hospital from
7	November 1987 to September 1991;
8	•"Youth Program" for the de-institutionalization of youthful status
9	offenders (ages 7-17) from June 1986 to April 1991;
10	• "Guma San Jose I" provided temporary housing for the homeless
11	from July 1988-1993;
12	•"Guma San Jose II" provides emergency housing for the homeless
13	since April 1990;
14	•"In Home Service", merged with Homemaker, provides home &
15	chore services, supervision & personal care to family members who take
16	care of their elderly relations since September 1988;
17	"Supported Employment Program" provided job training to
18	disabled adults from October 1990 to September 1995;
19	•"Guma Sagrada Familia" provides an emergency receiving home
20	hotline and shelter to abused elderly and disabled adults since May
21	1991;

•"Employees Fund-raising Initiative for CSS Programs and Building Fund" to help support the building which houses offices of CSS programs since 1994;

- •"Archdiocese Livelihood Improvement Foundation" (ALIF) extends small loans to improve the livelihood of residents whose household income is fifty percent (50%) below the U.S. Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Adjusted Median Income since January 1995 to September 1999.
- •"Americorps" Program (National Service Movement) offered training for volunteers and stipends, including college financial awards, after completion of seventeen hundred (1700) hours of volunteer service from July 1995 to September 1997;
- •"Adult Day Care I" and "Adult Day Care II" provides daily care for frail, elderly clients from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. on weekdays since October 1995 and October 1997, respectively;
- •"Transitional Home/*Guma Pelegrino*" program provided a temporary shelter for the homeless from April 1996 to March 1999;
- •"Community Habilitation Program" provides daily care and developmental training for disabled persons since May 1996;
- •"Respite Care" provides sixteen (16) hours of time-out support relief to caretakers of disabled individuals since May 1996;

•"Guidance and Counseling Services" provided after-hours / weekend / holidays crisis intervention and intake emergency / rape crisis counseling from March 1997 to February 1999;

- •"Work Activity Program" provided work activity, vocational evaluation and work stimulation to disabled individuals through supervised training from June 1998 to February 1999;
- •"KARIDAT I & II" provides a 24-hour Residential Placement and Support Service for minors and adults with mental retardation, developmental disabilities, with or without severe behavioral challenges, since October 1998.
- •"LIHENG I and LIHENG II Transitional Home Program (Learning by Integrating Housing with extended Needs and Goals)" provides short-term assisted housing and employment training to economically disadvantaged families since January 1999;
- •"HOUSING COUNSELING" provides individual and group counseling sessions, focusing on resolving financial crisis, the home buying process, setting up a budget, and the importance of good credit since 2001;
- •"GUMA HINEMLO" provides a 24-hour Homecare for adults with serious mental illness who, at time of admission were determined to be homeless, are clinically stable, but are not able to live independently without supervision since 2007; and
