Relative to memorializing and acknowledging the late Carlos P. Taitano for his contributions to the Richard Flores Taitano Micronesian Area Research Center, and to the preservation of *Chamorro* culture and heritage.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMITTEE ON RULES OF I

- 2 MINA'TRENTA NA LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN:
- WHEREAS, the late Speaker Carlos P. Taitano was born on March 14,
- 4 1917, to the late Jose San Nicolas Taitano and the late Dolores Diaz
- 5 Pangelinan in *Hagåtña*; and
- 6 WHEREAS, as a child, the late Speaker Taitano showed early signs of
- 7 precociousness, and his education was nurtured by his parents through the
- 8 Number One School, Dorn Hall, the Alamacen, Seaton Schroeder, and the
- 9 Guam Institute, before his graduation from McKinley High School in
- 10 Hawaii; and
- 11 WHEREAS, he earned a Bachelor of Science degree from the
- 12 University of Hawaii, and was attending graduate school while working as
- 13 a police chemist when the Second World War began; and
- 14 WHEREAS, he served as Infantry Officer and World War II Captain in
- 15 the United States Army under Gen. Douglas MacArthur, and as one of the
- 16 first three (3) Chamorros to be commissioned military officers, he was sent
- 17 as part of a special unit assigned to Tagatay Ridge to fight for the liberation
- 18 of the Philippines; and
- 19 WHEREAS, during his 1946 station at Fort Meade, Maryland, he met
- 20 and married Marian Agueda Johnston, and returned home to Guam with
- 21 his young bride; and

- 1 WHEREAS, Speaker Taitano later graduated from Georgetown
- 2 University School of Law, and became a practicing attorney and successful
- 3 businessman; and
- 4 WHEREAS, he effected great change and progress for Guam,
- 5 cementing the island's position in federal affairs, while serving as a
- 6 member of the Guam Congress and the Third (3rd) Guam Legislature, as
- 7 Guam Delegate to the South Pacific Conference, and as the Speaker of the
- 8 Eighth (8th) Guam Legislature; and
- 9 WHEREAS, the granting of U.S. citizenship to Chamorros, and the
- 10 democratically-elected government that now serves the people of Guam
- 11 were direct results of the historic Guam Congress Walkout he led on March
- 12 5, 1949; and
- 13 WHEREAS, his testimony before U.S. Congressional Committees in
- 14 1965, during his term as Speaker of the Eighth (8th) Guam Legislature, led
- 15 to the establishment of the elected offices of Governor of Guam and
- 16 Delegate to the U.S. House of Representatives; and
- 17 WHEREAS, being an artist and a patron of the arts, Speaker Taitano
- 18 produced and directed "A History of Guam in Songs and Dances" in 1949;
- 19 he owned and operated the Micronesian Village Art Gallery from 1957
- 20 through 1962; and he conceived and consulted on the production of Guahu
- 21 Taotao Tano, presenting three (3) periods of Marianas history, which was
- 22 performed before audiences on Guam in 1984, and at the 1986 Festival of
- 23 Pacific Arts in Tahiti; and

1 **WHEREAS**, he envisioned the *Chamorro* performance, *Na'la'la I Taotao* Tano, and choreographed its execution at the Third (3rd) Annual Pacific 2 Islander Festival of Los Angeles, and consulted on cultural authenticity and 3 4 presentation at the Festival in 1997; and WHEREAS, in 1998, he founded Pa'a Taotao Tano, the organization that 5 administers all Chamorro cultural dance groups on Guam, the CNMI, and 6 California, and served as historian, mentor, and honorary lifetime member; 7 8 and 9 **WHEREAS**, he was also the founder of the Guam Territorial Society in 10 Washington, D.C.; Guam Delegate to the South Pacific Conference in New Guinea in 1965; consultant and benefactor of the 1998 Pacific American 11 Foundation Leadership Center of the Charles Drucker School of 12 Management at Claremont University; Chairman of the Guam Memorial 13 Hospital Board of Trustees; and President of the Guam Bar Association, the 14 Rotary Club of Guam, and the Reserve Officers Association of Guam; and 15 WHEREAS, the stores of his historical and political knowledge made 16 him an invaluable resource to the people of Guam, whom are fortunate to 17 have preserved his manuscripts of Political and Cultural History of the 18 19 Chamorro People; Status Tensions Between Guam and the United States: Participant-Observer Accounts; Hale'-ta Series – I Manfayi: Who's Who in 20 21 Chamorro History and Issues in Guam's Political Development; Guam History: Perspectives; and The Commemoration of the One Hundred (100) 22 23 Years of U.S. Rule in *Guam* for the U.S. Congressional Record; and

1 WHEREAS, the late Speaker Carlos P. Taitano was, at once, making 2 history and preserving it, his later years brought to him the honor as a 3 living resource, as his works were constantly referenced and he was 4 ceaselessly consulted for his knowledge and experience in Guam history, law, politics, culture, and language, until the day of his tranquil passing on 5 March 25, 2009, in Los Angeles, California, at the age of ninety-two (92) 6 7 years; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED, that the Committee on Rules of I Mina'Trenta Na 8 9 Liheslaturan Guåhan does hereby, on behalf of I Liheslaturan Guåhan and the 10 people of Guam, recognize and acknowledge Carlos P. Taitano for his accomplishments and contributions to the Richard Flores Taitano 11 Micronesian Area Research Center, and to the preservation of Chamorro 12 culture and history, and does further extend Un Dångkolo Na Si Yu'os 13 Ma'åse to the late Speaker Taitano for his many years of dedication to the 14 15 island of Guam; and be it further RESOLVED, that the Speaker and the Chairperson of the Committee 16 on Rules certify, and the Legislative Secretary attest to, the adoption hereof, 17 18 and that copies of the same be thereafter transmitted to Mrs. Linda Taitano 19 Reyes, daughter; and to the Honorable Felix P. Camacho, I Maga'lahen 20 Guåhan.
