Relative to ensuring that a fair and competitive telecommunications landscape is preserved, maintained and promoted on Guam for the benefit of all island consumers.

## 1 BE IT RESOLVED BY I MINA'TRENTA NA LIHESLATURAN

## 2 GUAHAN:

- 3 WHEREAS, in the Guam Telecommunications Act of 2004, Title 12,
- 4 Guam Code Annotated, Chapter 12, I Liheslaturan Guåhan (the Guam
- 5 Legislature), I Maga'lahen Guåhan (the Governor of Guam), and the entire
- 6 community supported the privatization of the nation's last government-
- 7 owned and operated telephone entity in the United States, then called the
- 8 Guam Telephone Authority; and
- 9 WHEREAS, in that Act, policymakers posited that "it is in the public
- 10 interest to provide the people of Guam with modern, innovative, accessible and
- 11 affordable telecommunications services and products"; and
- 12 WHEREAS, in that Act, policymakers further mandated in their
- 13 findings that "investment in telecommunications infrastructure encouraged through
- 14 competition will further economic growth in Guam and meet the growing demands of
- 15 Guam's consumers"; and
- 16 WHEREAS, policymakers stated that they "encourage the entry of new
- 17 providers of telecommunications services, encourage the introduction of new
- 18 telecommunications services and products for the consumers and Guam, and increase
- 19 investment in telecommunications infrastructure in Guam"; and
- 20 WHEREAS, after enacting the Guam Telecommunications Act of 2004,
- 21 the Guam Telephone Authority was subsequently privatized to enable the
- 22 intent of that policy through private investment and competition within a
- 23 regulated framework for the benefit of island consumers; and

WHEREAS, since that time, competition in telecommunications has flourished, and as a result, Guam today has one of the most extensive telecommunication networks in the United States, with our island being one of the most connected places on earth with twelve (12) submarine cables linking us with the rest of the world, and three (3) cable landing stations that allow local interconnections for alternate cable routing and diversity; and

WHEREAS, there are multiple fiber rings with overlapping island-wide coverage enabling ultra-fast Ethernet services, and other high-capacity broadband services, and every school, library, village community center and government building on the island has broadband access, with much of this infrastructure buried and supported by back-up power to ensure that these important anchor institutions continue to have broadband access in the event of a typhoon or other emergency situation; and

WHEREAS, according to the Federal Communications Commission, about ninety (90%) of all Guam homes and businesses already have broadband access with speeds up to 20Mbps; only four (4) other states and territories in the entire country having broadband penetration rates higher than Guam; and

WHEREAS, there are presently numerous providers, including four (4) wireless carriers and multiple Wireline and pay TV operators (including one (1) provider of last resort), competing in the deployment of broadband infrastructure, and for the delivery of broadband services to community anchor institutions and all other kinds of customers; and

WHEREAS, of all the infrastructure challenges and issues that our island faces, ranging from water and wastewater to electricity and the Port Authority of Guam to roads and solid waste, telecommunications infrastructure has been heralded as an infrastructure on island which is up to par, ready and capable of handling current and anticipated future demands, including the military build-up of our island, as evidenced in Civilian-Military Task Force Reports, Industry Forums, and common knowledge; and WHEREAS, in the wake of the successful privatization of this market, the people of Guam are interested in ensuring that this competitive balance is maintained and that private investment continues to be stimulated without any one (1) competitor being given government assistance to overbuild existing network facilities; and

WHEREAS, while we applaud the goals of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act to ensure that all un-served and under-served communities receive the needed stimulus funding to develop state-of-the-art broadband networks, we are concerned that such funds, if channeled to one (1) entity or competitor, could have a disruptive effect on the businesses and companies already established there and the fair, competitive landscape in place; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that *I Mina'Trenta na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, request that the National Telecommunications Information Administration (NTIA) recognize that any American Recovery and Reinvestment Act award that would provide funds for an overbuild of

- 1 existing telecommunications infrastructure in Guam could result in adverse,
- 2 unintended consequences on the competitive market and effective
- 3 infrastructure that is presently in place and working to meet consumer
- 4 demands ahead of the National Broadband Plan; and be it further
- 5 **RESOLVED**, that I Mina'Trenta na Liheslaturan Guåhan does hereby
- 6 recommit to affirm its policy articulated in the Guam Telecommunications Act
- 7 of 2004 to vigorously preserve and promote free market principles for the
- 8 island's telecommunications industry; and be it further
- 9 **RESOLVED**, that the NTIA, if awarding or approving broadband grant
- 10 monies for any entity in Guam, equally apportion such grant monies to all
- 11 established telecommunications companies, to ensure that the fair, level and
- 12 competitive playing field in the island telecommunications industry is
- 13 preserved, maintained and enhanced with such stimulus funds; and be it
- 14 further
- 15 **RESOLVED**, that the Speaker certify, and the Legislative Secretary
- 16 attest to, the adoption hereof, and that copies of the same be thereafter
- 17 transmitted to Lawrence Strickling, NTIA Administrator; to the U.S.
- 18 Department of Commerce; and to the Honorable Felix P. Camacho, I
- 19 Maga'lahen Guåhan.
