Relative to commending and congratulating the worldwide members of Soka Gakkai International (SGI) on their tireless efforts and dedication in promoting world peace; and to further congratulating the members of SGI-USA, Guam on the Thirty-Seventh (37th) Year Anniversary of the founding of SGI.

BE IT RESOLVED BY I MINA'TRENTAI UNU NA LIHESLATURAN

2 **GUÅHAN**:

- WHEREAS, March 16 is a symbolic day for Soka Gakkai and SGI members,
- 4 commemorating the occasion on March 16, 1958, when Josei Toda, Second President
- 5 of the Soka Gakkai, then in frail health, made an impassioned speech to six thousand

1 (6,000) Soka Gakkai youth, entrusting them with the responsibility for the future of 2 the Soka Gakkai and its efforts to contribute to the creation of a peaceful world and 3 promote understanding of the humanistic philosophy of Nichiren Buddhism; and

WHEREAS, Josei Toda passed away on April 2, 1958, just two (2) weeks after the March 16 gathering, confident that his efforts would be continued by the youth in whom he had great trust; and

WHEREAS, March 16 is now viewed within the Soka Gakkai and the SGI as a day of new departures, "of eternal beginnings and perpetual hope". It is also an occasion for focusing on fostering capable youth; and

WHEREAS, throughout the world, SGI members celebrate March 16 by holding commemorative meetings led by youth members; and

WHEREAS, in response to the needs of an increasingly global community of Soka Gakkai members, the Soka Gakkai International (SGI) was formed in Guam on January 26, 1975, and on the same day thirty-five (35) years ago, one hundred fifty-eight (158) delegates from fifty-one (51) countries met for the first World Peace Conference, nominating Dr. Daisaku Ikeda, then president of Soka Gakkai, to head the new Soka Gakkai International; and

WHEREAS, Guam was selected as the venue to conduct the first World Peace Conference, given that the *Chamorro* people have suffered terribly from the ravages of war; and

WHEREAS, from this auspicious occasion, the delegates founded SGI, and thus began the worldwide grassroots activities of peace, culture and, education based on the humanistic outlook of Nichiren Buddhism; and

WHEREAS, today, SGI is a worldwide network, with eighty-four (84) constituent organizations and more than twelve million (12,000,000) members in one hundred ninety-two (192) countries and territories, sharing a common vision of global

peace and prosperity, and for thirty-one (31) years it has been accredited as a non-governmental organization (NGO) by the United Nations (U.N.); and

WHEREAS, as an NGO of the United Nations, SGI has worked tirelessly with other U.N. entities in promoting harmony and coexistence between nations in the fields of humanitarian relief and public education, with a focus on peace, environmental protection and human rights; and

WHEREAS, since 1975 to the present, Dr. Ikeda has introduced peace proposals each year addressing the power of dialogue, the adoption of a Universal Declaration Renouncing War, and the need for mutual respect in cultural exchange; and he further cited the important role of the United Nations in maintaining global security, while challenging the U.N. to become more representative of the people, rather than just nation states; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Ikeda, who has attained the status of a world-renowned Buddhist scholar and peace activist, has made it his personal mission to engage in more than one thousand five hundred (1,500) dialogues for peace with noted world leaders, such as British historian and scholar, Dr. Arnold Toynbee; Nobel Laureate and former President of South Africa, Nelson Mandela; former U.S. Secretary of State, Henry Kissinger; former Soviet Union President, Mikhail Gorbachev; Civil Rights Leader, Rosa Parks; and Peace Activist and Ivy-League Scholar, Dr. Elise Boulding; and

WHEREAS, for Dr. Ikeda's humanitarian endeavors in a range of fields, he has earned numerous honorary doctorates and awards, to include the United Nation's Peace Award; the Rosa Parks Humanitarian Award; the National Order of the Southern Cross of the Republic of Brazil; the United States Congressional Award; the Honorary Cross of Science and the Arts from the Austrian Ministry of Education; the Medal of the Grand Officer of Arts and Letters from the French Ministry of Culture;

1 the Grand Officer Award from the President of the Italian Republic; the World Poet

2 Laureateship from the World Poetry Society; the Order of Friendship from Russia;

and an Honorary Doctorate from the University of Guam; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Ikeda's philosophy of world peace is not something that can be realized simply by politicians signing treaties, or by business leaders creating economic cooperation. Instead, Dr. Ikeda professes that true and lasting peace may only be realized by forging bonds of trust between people at the deepest level, in the depths of their very lives; and

WHEREAS, in the nearly fifty (50) years since becoming President of the Soka Gakkai lay Buddhist Association at the age of thirty-two (32), Dr. Daisaku Ikeda has pursued a diverse range of activities in the pursuit of global peace. His energetic efforts include personal diplomacy during the Cold War, ongoing dialogues with a broad range of individuals from around the world, numerous publications and proposals, and the founding of various peace-related institutions; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Ikeda has also been a continuing source of inspiration for the SGI's global grassroots activities in such areas as human rights protection, nuclear abolition, disarmament, sustainable development, and cultural exchange; and

WHEREAS, Dr.Ikeda's commitment to peace grows from his experience as a young teenager during World War II. His interactions with Soka Gakkai Second President Josei Toda in the aftermath of the war helped shape Ikeda's antiwar sentiments into a philosophy that supports a multi-faceted peace movement; and what sustains Dr. Ikeda's energetic engagement is his Buddhist belief in the sanctity of life and the creative potential of individual human beings; and it shores up his faith in the power of dialogue to bridge the distances between people; and

WHEREAS, for Dr. Ikeda, peace is far more than the mere absence of war. Rather, it points to a set of conditions in which cultural differences are embraced and

- 1 appreciated and in which dialogue is firmly established as the means of choice for
- 2 resolving conflict. In recent years, the idea of a "culture of peace" has gained
- 3 widespread currency in the world. From his writings and actions, it is clear that Dr.
- 4 Ikeda has been a pioneering practitioner of this concept; and
- 5 WHEREAS, Dr. Ikeda has encouraged the members of SGI to devote their
- 6 lives to planting seeds of peace throughout the world, rather than seeking to bring the
- 7 flowers of their own lives to bloom; and
- 8 **WHEREAS**, the members of the SGI resolve to contribute to the prosperity of
- 9 their respective societies and countries, while respecting individual cultures, customs
- and laws; and
- WHEREAS, Dr. Daisaku Ikeda and Mrs. Kaneko Ikeda have received
- worldwide recognition for fulfilling the dreams of Mr. Tsunesaburo Makiguchi and
- 13 Mr. Josei Toda, with the establishment of the Soka Education system, which includes
- 14 elementary to university-level institutions in Japan, and the Soka University of
- America, located in Aliso Viejo, California; the establishment of the Min-On Concert
- 16 Association; and the creation of the Tokyo Fuji Art Museum; and
- WHEREAS, each year since 1975, SGI President Daisaku Ikeda has presented
- 18 peace proposals on behalf of the International Lay Buddhist Organization, to which
- 19 Soka Gakkai belongs. In them, he articulates Buddhist ideals and philosophy as a
- 20 framework for addressing the manifold problems our global society faces in its efforts
- 21 to realize human security and world peace; and
- WHEREAS, the members of SGI-USA Guam have pursued activities to
- 23 advance the cause of peace in dedication to the commitment by Dr. Ikeda; and
- WHEREAS, on January 2000, SGI-USA Guam commemorated the Twenty-
- 25 Fifth (25th) Year Anniversary of the founding of SGI-USA by co-sponsoring, with the

- 1 University of Guam, Soka University of America and SGI-USA, the first Pacific
- 2 Islands New Millennium Peace Conference; and
- 3 WHEREAS, the conference brought together government leaders and high
- 4 chiefs from many of the Pacific Islands to share the horrors or experiences of the
- 5 Pacific War and resolve to never again allow such violence; and
- 6 WHEREAS, on January 2005, SGI-USA Guam commemorated the Thirtieth
- 7 (30th) Year Anniversary of the founding of SGI by hosting numerous commemorative
- 8 events in the name of peace, including the opening of two (2) traveling exhibits,
- 9 "Building a Culture of Peace for the Children of the World" and "Morehouse
- 10 College's Gandhi, King, Ikeda: A Legacy of Building Peace;" these traveling exhibits
- were displayed at the office of the Governor of Guam, the University of Guam, and
- 12 the Guam Community College; and
- WHEREAS, SGI-USA Guam hosted the Second Pacific Islands New
- 14 Millennium Peace Conference for educators, focusing on "Humanistic Education:
- 15 Fostering a Culture of Peace," and sponsored a cultural festival celebrating the diverse
- 16 culture of mankind; and
- WHEREAS, on January 2007, on the Thirty-Second (32nd) Year Anniversary
- 18 of the founding of SGI-USA Guam, SGI-USA realized another milestone with the
- 19 grand opening of its new Activity Center, an occasion that members of SGI-USA,
- 20 Guam have been working hard on for years in order to accommodate their members
- and Buddhist activities; and
- WHEREAS, on January 2010, SGI-USA Guam commemorated its Thirty-Fifth
- 23 (35th) Year Anniversary by encouraging the advancement of innovative ideas that
- 24 focus on positive changes that promote a stronger, stable, and more sustainable world,
- 25 beginning with the self and extending into the local community, and expanding
- 26 throughout our global society; and

WHEREAS, during its Thirty-Fifth (35th) Year Anniversary, SGI-USA Guam hosted various events throughout Guam, including a conference at the Guam Community College and an exhibit at the Agana Shopping Center offering a variety of 3 speakers and performing artists promoting the theme "Seeds of Change: The Earth 4 Charter and Human Potential"; and awarding of honorary Professorship to President Daisaku Ikeda at the Guam Community College; and the unveiling of a Peace 6 7 Monument and the dedication naming of a pavilion at the *Tamuning* Community Park, 8 across the street from the International Trade Center (ITC) where the first World 9 Peace Conference was held in 1975; and

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WHEREAS, SGI-USA Guam believes that the creation of lasting peace and the elimination of violence, rather than the promotion of high level social reform, ultimately lies upon the ability of each individual on Earth to inherently embrace the spirit of peace in their hearts; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Daisaku Ikeda and Mrs. Kaneko Ikeda have dedicated more than sixty (60) years of their lives to the promotion of peace, culture, and education through their committed efforts as leaders of SGI; and they continue to serve as inspiring examples of how one person's committed efforts can transform the lives of millions of people around the world, including those of us here on Guam; and

WHEREAS, in adopting this Resolution, I Mina'Trentai Unu Na Liheslaturan Guåhan acknowledges the need to mitigate deepening conflict and division in the world; acknowledges that peace, the advancement of knowledge, and healing of all peoples may be achieved through dialogue and the perpetuation of goodwill throughout the world; and further acknowledges that as fellow humans we may conquer the ills of the world through a collective human spirit of cooperation; and that it is incumbent upon the people of Guam to demonstrate our interconnectedness and shared common commitment to peace, knowledge, and goodwill; now therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that *I Mina'Trentai Unu Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* hereby adopts this Resolution as a symbol of our people's firm determination, action and persistence in the continuity of effort towards the preservation of peace, knowledge, and goodwill; and as an expression of the people of Guam's appreciation for Soka Gakkai's advancement of humanism, engagement of global problems, and fostering of trust and peace between peoples; and be it further

RESOLVED, that *I Mina'Trentai Unu Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, recognize and commend the worldwide members of

RESOLVED, that *I Mina'Trentai Unu Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does hereby, on behalf of the people of Guam, recognize and commend the worldwide members of Soka Gakkai International (SGI) on their tireless efforts and dedication in promoting world peace, which is ever more relevant in the age of terror and war; and does further congratulate SGI-USA Guam on the Thirty-Seventh (37th) Year Anniversary of the founding of SGI; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Speaker certify, and the Legislative Secretary attest to, the adoption hereof, and that copies of the same be thereafter transmitted to President Daisaku Ikeda and Mrs. Kaneko Ikeda of Soka Gakkai International (SGI); to SGI-USA Headquarters, Guam; and to the Honorable Edward J.B. Calvo, *I Maga'lahen Guåhan*.
