Relative to recognizing and congratulating President Ma Ying-jeou on his re-election as President of the Republic of China (Taiwan)

BE IT RESOLVED BY I MINA'TRENTAI UNU NA LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN:

3 WHEREAS, Ma Ying-jeou was born in Hong Kong on July 13, 1950, and

4 moved to Taiwan a year later and has lived here ever since. as the only male

5 child in a family of five children; and

6 WHEREAS, Ma's father, Ma Ho-ling, was originally from Hengshan
7 County in Hunan Province on the mainland. From his early years, the elder
8 Ma was deeply involved in patriotic activities, joining the Youth Army and
9 fighting in the Second Sino-Japanese War (1937-1945); and
10 WHEREAS, throughout his lifetime, Ma's father Ma Ho-ling dedicated

11 himself to his government and country having served in various positions

and capacities in the KMT Party and government after the war against Japan
 in 1945 until his death at the age of 85 in 2005; and

WHEREAS, Ma Yingjeou's mother, Chin Houhsiu, having also devoted
her life to the government, is now a retired civil servant; and

5 WHEREAS, in 1977, Ma Ying-jeou married <u>the former</u> Chow Mei-ching.
6 <u>Together</u> they have two daughters, Ma Weichung and Ma Yuan-chung; and

WHEREAS, Ma Ying-jeou graduated from Taiwan's foremost academic
institution, National Taiwan University, in 1972 receiving a bachelor's degree
from the College of Law; and

WHEREAS, Ma Ying-jeou earned a Master of Laws (LL.M.) degree from
New York University in 1976 and a Doctor of Juridical Science (S.J.D.) degree
from Harvard Law School in 1981, specializing in law of the sea and
international economic law; and

WHEREAS, Ma Ying-jeou became the deputy director of the First
Bureau of the Presidential Office and in this post he served as President
Chiang Ching-kuo's English interpreter and secretary; and

WHEREAS, he was concurrently served as deputy secretary general of the KMT's Central Committee. In 1986, he was assigned by President Chiang the heavy task of researching the possibility of lifting martial law, relaxing restrictions on cross strait contacts (e.g. by permitting residents in Taiwan to visit their mainland relatives), and reforming the parliament; and

NAMES AND ADDRESS AND ADDRESS ADDR

WHEREAS, on October 7, 1986, President Chiang granted an interviewto Katherine Graham, publisher of The Washington Post. During theinterview Chiang announced that Taiwan would act as soon as possible to liftmartial law and the ban on forming new political parties. This event markeda momentous turning point in Taiwan's democratic development; and

6 WHEREAS, as the president's English secretary at the time, Ma Ying-7 jeou was witness to this historic milestone in Chinese Civilization. 8 Subsequently, in 1988, Ma Ying-jeou was appointed Chairman of the 9 Research, Development, and Evaluation Commission of the Executive Yuan. 10 Concurrently, he was also assigned to form a Mainland Affairs Task Force 11 and subsequently became the body's executive secretary; and

WHEREAS, three years later, Ma Ying-jeou was appointed to the newly established Mainland Affairs Council, becoming its first-ever vice chairperson while concurrently serving as a KMT representative at-large in the Second National Assembly; and

WHEREAS, in 1993, Ma Ying-jeou was appointed Minister of Justice, in
 which position he launched an aggressive campaign to fight against
 corruption and drugs, investigated allegations of vote-buying ; and

WHEREAS, on May 20, 2008, Ma Ying-jeou was inaugurated President of the Republic of China (ROC). During the presidential election, Ma Yingjeou campaigned on a platform to revive Taiwan's fledgling economy and restore the core values of benevolence, righteousness, diligence, honesty,

generosity, and industriousness. On election day Ma Ying-jeou secured a
 landslide victory with a total of 7.65 million ballots, or 58.5 percent of the
 vote. This election represented Taiwan's second peaceful transfer of political
 power, marking a milestone in the island's democratic development

WHEREAS, on January 14, 2014, President Ma Ying-jeou was re-elected
as the thirteenth (13th) term president, with 6.89 million ballots, or 51.6 percent
of the vote; and now therefore be it

8 **RESOLVED,** that *I Mina' Trentai Unu Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does hereby, 9 on behalf of the people of Guam, recognize and congratulate President Ma 10 Ying-jeou on his re-election as President of the Republic of China (Taiwan); 11 and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Speaker certify, and the Legislative Secretary attest to,
the adoption hereof, and that copies of the same be thereafter transmitted to
President Ma Ying-jeou; and to the Honorable Edward J.B. Calvo, *I Maga'lahen Guåhan*.
