WHEREAS, there were three thousand three hundred seventy-three (3,373) births in 2015, and the majority (29.3%) of the mothers were women ages twenty (20) to twenty-four (24) years old. About 63% of the women received adequate prenatal care while 6.9% had no prenatal care at all. Chamorro and Chuukese women were more likely to have inadequate or no prenatal care compared to Filipino, Caucasian, or Asian women; and

WHEREAS, access to health care services, including preventive care, primary care, and tertiary care, often depends on whether a person has health insurance. According to the Guam Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System, the number of women who responded that they had some kind of health care coverage grew by 1.56% over the 2013 data and the number of women who responded "yes" to the question, "Was there a time in the past twelve (12) months when you needed to see a doctor but could not because of cost?" decreased by 15.44% from the 2013 data: and

WHEREAS, the Healthy People 2020 breastfeeding objectives are for 81.9% of mothers to initiate breastfeeding; for 60.6% of new mothers to continue breastfeeding until their infants are six (6) months old; for 34.1% to breastfeed through one (1) year; for 46.2% to exclusively breastfeed through three (3) months; and for 25.5% to breastfeed exclusively through six (6) months. In the 2013 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Maternity Practices in Infant Nutrition and Care Report for the Island Territories, the Pacific Islands' Composite Quality Practice Score was seventy-three (73) out of one hundred (100). This was 2.81% higher than the 2011 score of seventy-one (71). Some of the strengths noted in the report were that one hundred percent (100%) of all island facilities consistently ask about and record mother's infant feeding decisions; and most, eighty-three percent (83%), include breastfeeding education as a routine element in their prenatal classes; and

WHEREAS, there is strong evidence that home visiting supports good maternal and health outcomes. Since 2010, Guam has applied for and has been awarded the Maternal Infant Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) grant funding through the Health Resources and Services Administration, known as Project Bisita I Familia ("to visit the family"), which is intended to support the delivery of coordinated and comprehensive high-quality voluntary early childhood home visiting services. The program conducted home visiting services to ten (10) pregnant women in 2015. Some topics discussed during home visits include: back pain, a birth plan, feeding (breast or formula), the benefits of breast feeding, the importance of a child car seat, stages of labor, eating for two (diet), a support network, physical exercise, and what to bring or prepare for the hospital; and

WHEREAS, infant mortality is widely regarded as a measure of a community's social and economic health and well-being. It reflects a range of factors such as medical issues, the ability of health care systems to respond to the needs of women and infants, environmental factors, and social issues such as poverty, education, and culture. Furthermore, infant mortality tells us something about women's lives, their lifestyle and personal habits, their relationships, and the stress they experience. Quantitative analysis showed that Guam's infant mortality rate was 11.26 infant deaths per 1,000 live births, an increase of 47.18% over 2014 data. Strong racial disparities are present and should be addressed to achieve health equity; and
