BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMITTEE ON RULES OF I MINA TRENTAI SINGKO NA LIHESLATURAN GUÁHAN:

WHEREAS, Sanctuary Incorporated of Guam (Sanctuary, Inc.) was established in 1971 by Capuchin Frar Father Robert Phelps, OFM Cap, and founding Executive Director Mr. Luis Martinez to create a safe and temporary alternative to correctional detention for Guam's troubled youth; and Sanctuary, Inc. has since expanded its mission, facility, and programs as a community-based organization that exists to improve the quality of life for our island's youth, to promote reconciliation during times of family conflicts, to foster the development of responsible community members, and to advocate for their needs in an effort to preserve family unity by providing a multitude of service; and

WHEREAS, in its tireless efforts to fulfill its mission of "Helping Youth and Families Help Themselves," Sanctuary, Inc. has been providing invaluable assistance to the greater community by remaining at the forefront of delivering services to runaways, homeless, and troubled youth, and their families; expanding its programs to better address the needs of our island's children and youth who confront many difficult issues such as physical and substance abuse; and helping to provide a firm foundation that will assist children and youth to be better able to face the challenges of the future; and

WHEREAS, Sanctuary, Inc. has served two hundred thirty-one (231) youth and families in Fiscal Year 2019 and continues to strive to implement programs, initiatives, and services to assist youth and families, to include: three (3) shelters and a residential treatment facility; a range of supportive and educational classes and groups, including two (2) levels of outpatient drug and alcohol classes, and specialized support groups for parenting skills, adult and youth anger management, and a strengthening families program; a youth heritage summer and afterschool program; a twenty-four (24)-hour crisis hotline; client advocacy; case management services; tobacco cessation courses; and aftercare services; and

WHEREAS, at the crux of the services provided by Sanctuary, Inc. are the three (3) temporary housing programs utilized by sixty-six (66) clients in Fiscal Year 2019. Thirty-nine (39) clients were served by the CO-ED Emergency Shelter in *Chalan Pago*, a temporary housing facility that provides thirty (30) days respite to youth ages twelve (12) to seventeen (17) years who are runaway, homeless, or victims of abuse, and is now capable of housing up to twenty-four (24) clients. A total of eleven (11) runaway and/or homeless youth and/or young adults, ages sixteen (16) to twenty-two (22), were served by the *Sagan Linau* (a place for a better life) Transitional Living Program in *Chalan Pago*. A total of sixteen (16) clients, were served by *Sagan Na'homio* (a place to heal) in *Mangilao*, the island's only drug and alcohol residential treatment facility for substance dependent youth ages twelve (12) to seventeen (17) years. Fondly called the "Lujan House" since its donation by Attorney David Lujan in the mid-1990s, this facility provides a three (3) to six (6) month residential program that implements an evidence-based Matrix Model curriculum encompassing five (5) phases of treatment (Orientation, Awareness, Enhancement, Enlightenment, and Empowerment). As clients live in a therapeutic community, youth and families participate in counseling services related to substance use and abuse, relapse prevention, emotional wellness, and adolescent education; and

WHEREAS, Sanctuary, Inc. was successful in retaining three (3) federal grants, to include the continuation of the *Sagan Linau* (a place for a better life) Transitional Living Program, which was awarded and implemented in Fiscal Year 2017, and the Basic Center Program, which was re-awarded in October 2019 by the Family and Youth Services Bureau (FYSB) under the Administration for Children and Families (ACF), whose mission is to promote safety, stability and well-being for people who have experienced or been exposed to violence, neglect or trauma, including runaway homeless youth; and the *Infa Manohk* (to make right) Summer/Afterschool Cultural Program, awarded in 2018 and implemented in 2019 by the Administration for Native Americans (ANA) grant, which is to build resiliency among youth through traditional teachings; and

WHEREAS, in line with its community development efforts, Sanctuary, Inc. is also host to the largest AmeriCorps program on Guam with eighty (80) members; and its *Ayuda Para I Komunitad* (help for the community) programs provide its members with enrichment activities and opportunities to assist and mentor youth at the Sanctuary shelters, as well as at three (3) Department of Youth Affairs resource centers and a number of Guam Department of Education (GDOE) middle and high schools; and they co-facilitate Sanctuary support groups, attend various conferences and workshops, and receive training in community emergency response, first-aid, and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR); and

WHEREAS, as the first human services organization in the Pacific region to receive full accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF) International in 2008, Sanctuary, Inc. has since maintained its three (3)-year accreditation from CARF International. Accreditation by CARF International signifies that Sanctuary, in the Child and Youth Services Field, met annual conformance requirements in over one hundred twenty-five (125) quality standards that enhance the lives of the children and families that Sanctuary serves. The intensive survey of Sanctuary administration and programs took place on May 17-19, 2017, with CARF Administrative Surveyor, John Page, ACSW, LAPSW, and Program Surveyor, Conny Anderson, Ph.D. visiting the organization. The 2017 Accreditation is an indication of Sanctuary's dedication to delivering quality service, and marks Sanctuary, Inc.'s fourth (4th) successful Accreditation Survey; and

WHEREAS, receiving an outpouring of support from individuals, private businesses, and the general public over the last forty-eight (48) years, Sanctuary, Inc. is an indisputable partner of the community and is made up of a diverse group of individuals who are passionate and committed to helping youth and their families. Its Board of Directors is comprised of Chairperson Mrs. Rindray Lirmitaco, Vice Chairperson Mrs. Marilyn Boria, Treasurer Ms. Maria Leon Guerrero, Incumbent Secretary Mr. Shane Black, Former Secretary Dr. KristiAnna Santos, and Members *Pak* Mike Crisostomo, Ms. Guadalupe Guzman, Mrs. Jackie Perez, Mrs. Crispin Solberg, Ms. Julie Murrell, Ms. Cynthia Cabot, Mr. Shane Moore, and Youth Representative Mr. Javan Santos. Mr. Victor Camacho currently serves as the organization's Executive Director and heads a staff of fifty-two (52) dedicated individuals; and

WHEREAS, a true asset to society, Sanctuary, Inc. has serviced thousands of clients since its founding, with many of our youth benefiting from its outreach, prevention, and rehabilitation programs yearly; and Sanctuary, Inc. continues in its efforts to increase awareness about its programs and services by encouraging island residents to participate in various events throughout the month of November 2019; now therefore be it

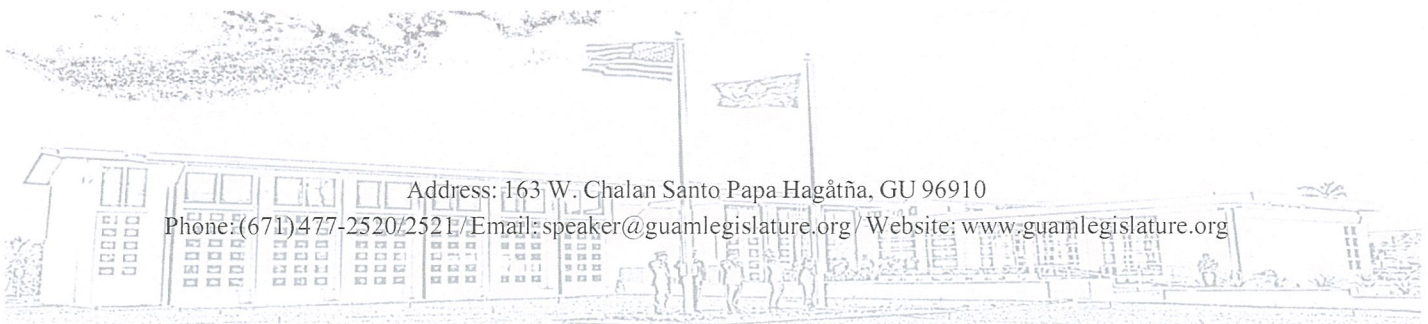




