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Relative to posthumously recognizing Kwang-ming Chen M.D. for his nearly forty (40) years of medical service to the people of Guam, and to further extend our sincere condolences to his family on behalf of a grateful community.

## BE IT RESOLVED BY I MINA'TRENTAI SINGKO NA LIHESLATURAN GUÅHAN:

WHEREAS, Kwang-ming Chen M.D. was born in a small Taiwanese town on July 26, 1930. Dr. Chen was inspired by the altruistic teachings of his father a priest of a Presbyterian Church and his mother who was a midwife and was determined to serve others by becoming a medical doctor. In 1956 Dr. Chen came one step closer to realizing his dream when he received his medical degree from the prestigious National Taiwan University College of Medicine. After receiving his medical degree Dr. Chen went on to complete his residency in psychiatry in 1959 and his residency in neurology in 1961 at the Department of Neurology and Psychiatry at the National Taiwan University. He then served as the department's Chief Resident for neurology and psychiatry from 1961-1962. After completing his service as the department's Chief Resident Dr. Chen

became an instructor in psychiatry from 1962-1963 and a lecturer in neurology from

2 1963-1964 at the National Taiwan University; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Chen began his medical service in the island of Guam in 1964 when he served as a Research Scientist in Neurology at the Guam Research Center, Epidemiology Branch, National Institute of Neurological Disease and Blindness, National Institutes of Health. Dr. Chen would receive his Guam medical License and began practicing medicine at Guam Memorial Hospital (GMH) on August 25th, 1965. However, after dedicating two years of medical service to our island community Dr. Chen eventually went on to further his medical education at the renowned Mayo Graduate School of Medicine in Rochester, Minnesota in 1967, and would later become an associate professor at the National Taiwan University Hospital in 1970; and

WHEREAS, Against the objections from his colleagues and family Dr. Chen decided to return to Guam in 1972 and forgo several opportunities that awaited a Doctor of his pedigree. Upon his return, Dr. Chen continued his work to treat those afflicted with Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS) and Parkinsonism-Dementia Complex (PDC) in Guam or as they were more commonly known as Lytico and Bodig. Lytico and Bodig are chronic neurodegenerative disorders that were highly prevalent in the native Chamorro population of Guam for many decades. Lytico refers to progressive paralysis that resembles ALS and Bodig which exhibits characteristics similar to PDC and combines the tremor of Parkinson's disease with the memory loss of Alzheimer's disease. During the early 1970s Lytico and Bodig were the most fatal diseases in Guam with a mortality rate as high as thirty percent (30%); and

WHEREAS, Dr. Chen would dedicate nearly forty (40) years to the study and treatment of Lytico and Bodig on Guam and would go on to make over twenty (20) presentations through the world including Tokyo, Chicago, Manila, New York, Taiwan, San Francisco, Washington DC, and Guam to help educate others about Lytico and

1 Bodig. In 1982 Dr. Chen furthered this education campaign through community

2 outreach with the establishment of the Lytico/Bodig Association; and

WHEREAS, After the disappearance of the Lytico and Bodig on Guam in 2005

Dr. Chen authored the book The Mysterious Diseases of Guam which discussed the

5 history, discovery, identification, and research on possible causes of Lytico and Bodig

on the island. He would go on to retire that same year and receive recognition from the

United States Congress and the Guam Legislature for "his superior medical practice and

lifetime contribution to Guam residents;" and

WHEREAS, Dr. Chen died in his sleep on June 19, 2020, and the age of eightynine (89). He is survived by his wife Eiko, their three children, and their grandchildren;

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WHEREAS, as one of the few doctors on island specializing in neurology, Dr. Chen has seen thousands of patients on Guam throughout his career. Dr. Chen was an important and influential member of Guam's community and was beloved by his patients, doctors, and the people of Guam. Dr. Chen will be sadly missed; and now therefore be it

**RESOLVED**, that the Committee on Rules of *I Mina'trentai Singko Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* does hereby, on behalf of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* and the people of Guam, posthumously recognize Kwang-ming Chen M.D. for his nearly forty (40) years of medical service to the people of Guam, and to further extend our sincere condolences to his family on behalf of a grateful community; and be it further;
