Relative to recognizing the observance of "National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month" on January 19, 2019 and the efforts to combating human trafficking in our community and throughout the world, and to emancipating the estimated forty (40) million people enslaved in today's world, with between fourteen thousand five hundred (14,500) and seventeen thousand five hundred (17,500) of them trafficked into the United States each year; and to preventing additional women, children and men from being trafficked, by encouraging greater awareness of human trafficking, and all other forms of modern day slavery.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMITTEE ON RULES OF I MINA'TRENTAL SINGKO NA LIHESLATURAN GUÂHAN:

WHEREAS, human trafficking in the United States, and on Guam, continues to be on the rise. Threatening the basic rights and freedom of others, and combating it must

involve the American people and the United States government, and the residents of

Guam and Micronesia; and

WHEREAS, human trafficking is present day slavery, involving the recruitment,

transportation or sale of persons for forced labor; and through the use of violence,

threats and coercion, enslaved persons may be forced to work in the sex trade, domestic

labor, factories, hotels or restaurants, agriculture, peddling or begging; and

WHEREAS, human trafficking primarily involves exploitation, which comes in 1 many forms, including, forcing victims into prostitution; subjecting victims to slavery 2 or involuntary servitude; compelling victims to commit sex acts for the purpose of 3 creating pornography; and misleading victims into debt bondage; and 4 WHEREAS, according to some estimates, approximately seventy-nine percent 5 (79%) of human trafficking involves sexual exploitation; and fourteen percent (18%) 6 7 involves labor exploitation; and WHEREAS, according to the U.S. State Department, six hundred thousand 8 (600,000) to eight hundred thousand (800,000) people are trafficked across international 9 borders every year. More than eighty (80%) are female. The average age a teen enters 10 the sex trade in the U.S. is twelve (12) to fourteen (14) years old, of which many of the 11 victims are runaway girls who were sexually abused as children; and 12 WHEREAS, the International Labor Organization estimates that women and 13 girls represent the largest share of forced labor victims, with 11.4 million trafficked 14 victims (or 55%), compared to men and boys at 9.5 million (or 45%); and 15 WHEREAS, the problem of human trafficking continues to reach epic 16 proportions, and is the third largest international crime industry, behind illegal drugs 17 and arms trafficking. It reportedly generates a profit of 32 billion dollars every year; 18 and of that number, 15.5 billion dollars is made in industrialized countries; and 19 WHEREAS, in 2000, the Trafficking Victims Protection Act (22 U.S.C Sec. 20 7101 et seq.) was enacted by the U.S. federal government to "combat trafficking in 21 persons, a contemporary manifestation of slavery whose victims are predominantly 22 women and children to ensure just and effective punishment of human traffickers, and 23 to protect their victims' now, therefore be it 24 **RESOLVED**, that the Committee on Rules of I Mina'trentai Singko Na 25
