Dear Senator San Agustin,

Thank you for the opportunity to present our position on the amended Bill No. 1-35. Earlier in the year, the Guam Chamber of Commerce wholeheartedly supported the original legislation, since it provided some relief to small businesses that could use the proceeds to invest in their businesses in a variety of ways. Our organization has always been a staunch supporter of amending this program to not only increase the qualifying threshold but to increase the qualifying amount for more entities to participate in the incentive. Unfortunately, the revised legislation as written, limits the benefit to a maximum of \$1,000 a year, which, while it allows for some assistance, is not a significant savings element for small businesses attempting to build their companies in today's economic conditions.

We understand the concerns of the Guam Economic Development Authority with providing exemptions on business privilege taxes (BPT) which are pledged to the bond market. However, the reality is that such pledges have existed for years, and yet greater exemption programs continue to be provided. While we absolutely support incentives to attract large investors or industries to Guam to create economic opportunities, we should also equally consider providing decent incentive programs for island residents who want to create financial independence by starting a small business.

We respectfully ask the Guam Legislature to reconsider the original legislation which provided BPT exemptions on the first \$50,000 of income generated by a small business earning less than \$50,000 a year. This provided a savings of \$2,500 for small businesses; monies that could be used as employee incentives, increments or even technology upgrades. If this is not possible, then we suggest the legislation be amended to allow a 2-point BPT exemption on the first \$100,000 of income (while keeping the qualifying threshold on those making at least \$250,000 a year). This would provide a small business at least \$2,000 in a savings element to try and reinvest in their operations.

The Chamber of Commerce commends the Guam Legislature in its efforts of finding solutions to support small businesses to assist in their growth; however, amending the "Dave Santos Small Business Enhancement Act" does not address the concerns of risings costs of goods and services on island.

It is with this conviction that our organization continues to plead with the government to reconsider the measure adopted in 2018 that increased the Business Privilege Tax from 4% to 5% indefinitely. This tax increase needs to be reversed, as this has dramatically impacted the operational expenses of businesses, who have passed over these costs to consumers. We are further concerned that with discussions of a minimum wage increase looming, that many small businesses will be gravely impacted financially. We highly encourage that any such actions be carefully thought through and not arbitrarily rushed.

In closing, the Guam Chamber of Commerce supports the revised Bill 1-35 as long as one of the two recommendations provided are included. We are open to further discussion on this legislation with you and your Committee. Thank you.

The Guam Women's Chamber of Commerce (GWCC) submits this testimony in support of the revised Bill 1-35, which proposes to increase the benefit and gross income threshold of the Dave Santos Act of the Guam Code Annotated in order to spur economic growth by providing tax incentives to small business owners. GWCC is pleased that the revised bill took into consideration our previous testimony and that of other entities regarding possible violation of the Business Privilege Tax bond indenture of the government of Guam should the first rendition have been passed into law. GWCC applauds the revision, which retains the required 3% business privilege tax for businesses per the government's bond covenant, yet provides a 2% gross receipts tax break to small businesses whose gross annual income is between \$50,000 - \$250,000. The GWCC commends the bill's authors for working with GEDA and the Department of Revenue and Taxation to clarify the bill's language with regard to the parameters of the government's bond covenant.

This bill, if passed into law, will allow small businesses to reinvest their tax savings through hiring more employees and improving products and services, which will in turn contribute to Guam's overall economy. GWCC understands that if passed into law, this bill is projected to positively impact more than 600 small businesses on our island. Our organization represents 262 Guam businesses. Two thirds of our business memberships are either individual/sole proprietors or small businesses, so the positive impact of Bill 1-35 to the GWCC membership is substantial.

The GWCC is in support of measures such as the revised Bill 1-35 that provide growth incentives for small businesses on Guam. We stand ready to work with the members of the 35th Guam Legislature to have such measures passed into law, for the benefit of our members and Guam's entire business community.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony with regard to the revised Bill 1-35.
