AN ACT TO AMEND SUBSECTIONS (a) AND (c) OF \$15201 AND \$15401 OF TITLE 17, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, AND TO ADD SUBSECTIONS (c) AND (d) TO \$15203, TO REPEAL AND REENACT \$15301, TO REPEAL THE LAST PARAGRAPHS OF SUBSECTIONS (b) OF \$15203 AND 15403, ALL OF SAID TITLE 17, AND TO REPEAL AND REENACT CHAPTER 18 TO SAID TITLE, TO REVISE THE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS AT THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM, AND TO ADD A NEW ARTICLE 6 TO CHAPTER 15 OF SAID TITLE TO ESTABLISH THE JOHN F. QUAN MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIPS IN OCEAN RESEARCH.

- BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:
- 2 Section 1. Subsections (a) and (c) of \$15201, Title 17, Guam Code
- 3 Annotated, are amended to read:

"(a) The applicant must be a bona fide resident of Guam and a United States citizen or a permanent resident alien and must have achieved an overall grade point average of a least 2.0 or its equivalent in his high school studies, or in his undergraduate studies if he is pursuing an academic graduate degree or an irrevocable letter of acceptance from a professional school in an area of a particular need in Guam as determined by the Board of Regents (the "Board")."

- "(c) The applicant must be in financial need, which shall be determined by regulations authorized by \$15105 of Article 1 of this Chapter. In addition, the applicant must complete an application for Federal Student Aid (AFSA) form as documentary evidence of need."
- Section 2. Subsections (c) and (d) are added to \$15203, Title 17, Guam Code Annotated, to read:
 - "(c) Any student granted a loan pursuant to the provision of this Article who fails to return to Guam must repay the full amount of the loan. The Board shall establish such policies prescribing the length and terms of repayment, the interest rate to be charged, the collection of delinquent accounts or in the event of default."
 - "(d) If a student is recruited to serve in active duty in a branch of the U.S. Armed Services while in attendance or upon completion of studies, the service credit shall be postponed until such student returns to Guam but in no case longer than six (6) years; provided, however, that the student applies for the postponement within ninety (90) days of entering the Armed Services and continues to maintain Guam as such student's place of residence."
- Section 3. The last paragraph of subsection (b) of \$15203 of Title 17, Guam Code Annotated is repealed.
- Section 4. \$15301, Title 17, Guam Code Annotated, is repealed and a new \$15302 is enacted to read:

"\$15301. Students Entitled to Merit Awards. There are established annual merit awards for high school students in the graduating classes of the several public and private high schools in Guam now or hereafter established. The students entitled to these awards shall be those students having the highest scholastic standing in their graduating classes. Each graduating class of each school with

at least fifty (50) graduates is entitled to two (2) such awards and an additional award for every fifty (50) graduates or fraction thereof; provided, however, that if as a result of the equal scholastic standing of two (2) or more graduates, there is a tie for the awards granted pursuant to this Chapter and there is an insufficient number of awards available for the tying graduates, additional awards shall be provided for such graduates. Each school with a graduating class of less than fifty (50) shall be entitled to one (1) annual merit award as determined by the Board. Recipients are to attend the University of Guam. However, if the recipient is a valedictorian or salutatorian whose declared major is unavailable at the University of Guam, the valedictorian or salutatorian may attend any accredited college or university in the United States where such declared major is available after the first two (2) years.

Awards shall be subject to the following limitations:

- (a) A recipient must be a bona fide resident of Guam. In addition, a recipient must be either:
 - (1) a United States citizen, or
 - (2) a permanent resident alien who has completed four(4) academic quarters in public or private high school in Guam.
- (b) If any student is ineligible for a scholarship solely because of failure to meet the requirements contained in subsection (a) of this section; or if any eligible student chooses not to accept an award when first offered such award, the award shall be granted to the eligible student with the highest scholastic rank. If an eligible student declines to accept an award when first offered, such students cannot accept such an award after it has been granted to another student.

The recipient of a merit award must notify the Board within thirty (30) days, that the award is accepted. If such recipient fails to do so, the award is thereby forfeited and the same shall be offered to the next alternate.

(c) A recipient who attends a college or university outside of Guam during the term of the award must agree that such recipient will return to work on Guam for a period of one (1) year subsequent to the completion or termination of the course of studies for which the award was granted, provided that if the recipient continues as a full-time student at a graduate or professional school such recipient may defer return to Guam until such additional studies are completed.

- (d) Awards granted on or subsequent to the effective date of this section shall be cancelled if a recipient:
 - (1) fails to maintain a cumulative grade point average of 2.5 or its equivalent, except a recipient may be allowed one academic term to regain this average without cancellation of award, or
 - (2) fails to meet the academic and other requirements governing full-time students at the institution attended, or
 - (3) is no longer a full-time student, or
 - (4) changes Guam residency status."

Section 5. \$15401, Title 17, Guam Code Annotated, is repealed and a new \$15401 is enacted to read:

"§15401. Students Entitled to Awards. There are established professional and technical annual awards for graduate studies. On or before December 1st of each and every year, the Board shall conduct a public hearing to receive the opinion and recommendation of various groups or associations professional and the Guam Occupational Information Coordinating Committee or its equivalent, to determine those areas in which additional professional and technical skills are From those hearings, the Board shall establish a list of needed. occupational priorities for Guam prior to considering applications for the awards. The number of awards and occupational priorities to be recommended shall be submitted to the Legislature no later than January 1st of each year. The provisions of this section shall also be applicable to students who are to receive loans under \$15201 of this Chapter.

Funds appropriated to provide loans and professional and technical awards and which are not totally expended may be used in succeeding years so as to increase the number of annual awards. The awards provided in this Article are subject to the following limitations:

- (a) The applicant must be a bona fide resident of Guam and a United States citizen or a permanent resident alien and must have achieved an overall grade point average of 3.0 or its equivalent in such applicant's undergraduate studies if pursuing an academic graduate degree, or an irrevocable letter of acceptance from an accredited professional school.
- (b) The applicant must agree that after completion or termination of the course of studies for which the award was granted, such applicant return to work on Guam for a period of one (1) year for each Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) received under the award.
- (c) The applicant must present to the Board prior to granting of the award satisfactory proof that such applicant has been admitted to the college or university as a full-time student to pursue a program of study in the field applied for.
- (d) The colleges or universities must be properly accredited and must be approved by the Board; provided, however, that no award shall be granted for studies at an off-island institution in a specific academic program that is available at the University of Guam.
- (e) The Board shall select the recipients of the awards upon the basis of scholastic ability, financial need, aptitude and health as well as the likelihood of the recipient returning to Guam to fill its professional needs.

In determining financial need, the applicant must complete an application form of Federal Student Aid (AFSA) as documentary evidence of need."

Section 6. The last paragraph of subsection (b) of \$15403 of Title 17, Guam Code Annotated is repealed.

Section 7. Title 17, Guam Code Annotated, Chapter 18 is repealed in its entirety and a new Chapter 18 is enacted to read:

"CHAPTER 18

TEACHER EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Section 18101. Establishment. There is established at the University of Guam, a 'Teacher Education Scholarship Program', to be awarded to junior, senior and graduate students at the University.

Section 18102. Eligibility criteria. In order to be eligible to receive a Teacher-Education Scholarship, the applicant must meet the following criteria:

- (a) Be a bona fide resident of Guam:
- (b) Be a citizen of the United States or a permanent resident alien:
- (c) Must have graduated from an accredited high school, or have completed the equivalent of a high school program, with an overall grade point average of not less than 2.5; and
- (d) Must be admitted to the College of Education in accordance with its admission policy.

No person who is receiving benefits for education under a Government of Guam financial assistance program, including in-service training, shall be concurrently eligible for a Teacher Education Scholarship.

Section 18103. Scholarship Rules and Regulations. The University shall, subject to the approval of the Board of Regents (the "Board"), prescribe and promulgate rules and regulations not inconsistent with the provisions of this Chapter, relative to the selection and retention of scholarship recipients and to the general administration of the program. In the event of limited space or funds, priority in the selection of recipients shall be given to students who are closer to the completion of their baccalaureate or graduate degree programs.

Section 18104. Scholarship Benefits. Each scholarship recipient shall be entitled to the following benefits from funds appropriated for the Teacher Education Scholarship Program:

- (a) Registration, tuition and other fees normally assessed by the University and an allowance in an amount of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200) shall be allowed per regular semester, and One Hundred Dollars (\$100) per summer session, in which a person is enrolled to cover the cost of textbooks and supplies.
 - (b) Monthly stipends to be distributed as follows:
 - (1) Recipients without dependents: \$300 for junior, \$400 for senior, and \$500 for graduate students.
 - (2) Recipients who are heads of households or with dependents:

\$350 for junior, \$450 for senior and \$550 for graduate students.

As a condition for continuing entitlement to the benefits provided for in this chapter, recipients must maintain a full-time enrollment of 15 semester credits per semester, 6 semester credits per summer session, and good academic standing in the teacher education program in accordance with the scholarship rules and regulations provided for in \$18103 of this Chapter. No student may receive benefits beyond the number of calendar years normally required to complete such student's program.

Section 18105. Substitute Teachers - Eligibility. Any student enrolled in the Teacher Education Scholarship Program shall be eligible to work as a substitute teacher with the Department of Education subject to rules and regulations promulgated by the Board regarding maximum hours per week and academic standing.

Section 18106. Employment of Recipients: Reimbursement.

- (a) As a condition for selection and enrollment in the program, each recipient shall agree to accept employment as a teacher in the public school system of Guam, and to continue in such employment for a period of time equal to the period of enrollment under the program.
- (b) The recipient shall further agree that in the event of failure or refusal to fulfill the obligation set forth in subsection

(a) of this section, such recipient shall then repay the government of Guam an amount equal to the total financial assistance received while in the program. The Board shall demand immediate repayment; provided, however, that the Board may extend the time of repayment for a period not to exceed two (2) years upon written request of the student and upon a showing to the satisfaction of the Board of good cause for such extension. Any such repayment shall be remitted to the Teacher Training Education Scholarship Fund account at the University of Guam.

 (c) The Department of Education shall place graduates of the Teacher Education Scholarship Program on a priority list for employment in public schools as a teacher.

Section 18107. Establishment of Fund. There is within the University of Guam a 'Teacher Training Education Scholarship Fund', separate and apart from any other funds of the government, to be used for paying stipends, tuition and other fees to students enrolled in the Teacher Training Education Program."

Section 8. A new Article 6 is added to Chapter 15 of Title 17, Guam Code Annotated to read:

"ARTICLE 6

John F. Quan Memorial Scholarship

for Ocean Resource Science and Research

\$15601. Declaration of Public Policy. It is and shall be the policy of the government to advance the understanding of the vast ocean resources surrounding Guam through support for the education of deserving Guam students in the scientific field of ocean resource studies.

\$15602. Purpose. The Legislature establishes the John F. Quan Memorial Scholarship for Ocean Resource Science and Research to commemorate the leadership of the Honorable John F. Quan as an advocate of Guam's ownership rights to the ocean resources surrounding the island -- both in Guam and as a member of the Council of State Governments Western Legislative Conference.

The John F. Quan Memorial Scholarship for Ocean Resource Science and Research shall be given to deserving undergraduate and graduate students of Guam who are accepted into programs which will help to advance Guam's scientific understanding of its ocean resources, living and non-living, on and below the sea floor, and to protect Guam's Exclusive Economic Zone from external impediments which potentially threaten resources within Guam's waters. Preference for University of Guam programs should be considered, as appropriate.

\$15603. Entitlement to Scholarship. The Board is authorized to approve one (1) scholarship per year for undergraduate studies or training, to qualified applicants who have been accepted or admitted into programs leading to a degree in the field of ocean resources scientific studies. The scholarships provided in this Article are subject to the following limitations:

- (a) The applicant must be a bona fide resident of Guam and a U.S. citizen who has achieved at least a grade point average of 3.0 in high school or undergraduate studies, or an irrevocable letter of acceptance from an accredited U.S. universities, colleges, or professional institutes recognized in the fields of ocean resource science, or oceanography.
- (b) The applicant must agree that after completion of the course of studies for which the scholarship was granted, such applicant will remain on or return to Guam to work on Guam for one (1) year, for each twelve (12) credits earned.
- (c) The applicant must present to the Board prior to the granting of the award, satisfactory proof that of admission to an accredited U.S. university, college or professional institute as a full time student to pursue a program of study in ocean resource science, including studies in:
 - (1) living resources;
 - (2) non-living resources such as hard seabed materials, geo-thermal venting, precious minerals, submarine currents; and other non-living resources;

1	(3) ocean research technology; and
2	(4) pollutant mitigation technology.
3	(d) No scholarship shall be granted under this Article
4	unless the Board has made a written finding that the proposed
5	award, in the specific area of study to be pursued by the
6	applicant, is needed for the development of Guam's ocean
7	resources in the future. The Board shall annually review the
8	fields of study in which ocean resource science scholarships have
9	been awarded, and shall establish a list of priorities for the
10	respective fields of study prior to considering new scholarships
11	applicants.
12	\$15604. Benefits. Students entitled to the receipt of the John
13	F. Quan Memorial Scholarship for Ocean Resource Science and Research
14	pursuant to this Article shall receive the following benefits:
15	(a) Payment of tuition, fees, and related field research
16	costs shall be as follows:
17	(1) Undergraduate Scholarship Award:
18	Associate Degree, for a period not to exceed two
19	(2) scholastic years.
20	Bachelor's Degree, for a period not to exceed four
21	(4) scholastic years.
22	(2) Graduate Scholarship Award:
23	Master's Degree, for a period not to exceed two
24	(2) scholastic years.
25	Doctoral Degree, for a period not to exceed four

27	(b) An annual grant of not more than Two Thousand Five
28	Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) per year to be disbursed in accordance

Guam students in the field of Ocean Resource Science and Research, and to promote a better understanding of the resources indigenous to Guam's Exclusive Economic Zone. The Board may submit an annual budget, and promotional proposal to the Legislature under scholarship funding requests, to enhance student awareness of Guam's ocean resources, and the availability of scholarship funding for Ocean Resource Science Research."
