Dear Speaker Unpingco:

Enclosed please find Bill No. 383 (COR), "AN ACT TO ADD ARTICLE 12 TO CHAPTER 68 OF TITLE 21 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO ESTABLISHING THE TIYAN TRUST", which I have signed into law today as **Public Law No. 24-214.** 

This legislation establishes a trust for the property known as "Tiyan", in favor of the original landowners. The net income from the use of Tiyan is to be retained or invested and the proceeds distributed to the original landowners.

Before this legislation can be properly implemented, a number of clarifications need to be made. Some needed changes are the following:

- 1. The Trust should not be controlled by 4 Beneficiaries. This legislation provides that a majority of the Trustees are to be also Beneficiaries. If 4 individuals who are also Beneficiaries control the actions of the Trust, there would be the possibility of abuse of discretion in the management of the Trust.
- 2. The definition of who is are the beneficiaries is circular. On page 6, lines 3-6, the beneficiaries are stated to be: landowners of Tiyan as of the date of the acquisition of Tiyan by the United States, and the living descendants of such landowners." Then, on page 3, lines 1-5, the legislation

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states that beneficiaries means: "those original owners of Tiyan and their descendants as identified by the Trustees of the Tiyan Trust. A descendant of such owner must be able to show to the Trustees his or her direct decent [sic] from such owner." The definition of who is a beneficiary is subject to favoritism or interpretation by the Trustees, who are controlled by a clique of "beneficiaries". The definition of beneficiaries should not be open to interpretation.

- 3. It is not clear whether I Liheslaturan Guåhan is appropriating money for the Tiyan Trust in the current rentals of government agencies who now occupy Tiyan property in the interim, before this property is turned over to the government of Guam.
- 4. The Trustees are to serve without bond and are not responsible for accounting errors or errors in judgment. This is not an adequate standard, and would not be acceptable if a bank were the Trustee, or other reliable trust institution.
- 5. This legislation needs the full review of all of the original landowners of the property known as "Tiyan". The committee report of Bill No. 383 does not show that these individuals were contacted or were invited to testify, or are in concurrence with this legislation as presently drafted. Until a full review of the legislation is concurred in with the original landowners, and until legal review of the legislation is undertaken so that the interests of the original landowners are protected, this legislation will not be put into effect.

AN ACT TO ADD ARTICLE 12 TO CHAPTER 68 OF TITLE 21 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO ESTABLISHING THE TIYAN TRUST.

### 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

- 2 **Section 1.** Article 12 is hereby *added* to Chapter 68 of Title 21 of the Guam
- 3 Code Annotated to read as follows:

### "ARTICLE 12.

### THE TIYAN TRUST.

Section 68980. Statement of Legislative Findings and Purpose.

I Liheslaturan Guahan finds that the principle of returning to the original landowners those Guam properties taken for military defense purposes and then turned over to the government of Guam when defense needs no longer exist is fair and equitable and is supported by all branches of the government of Guam. However, in certain instances, when only a relatively small proportion of a particular piece of excess military property can be returned to the original landowners, it is unfair to the majority of such owners whose land cannot be given back that only one (1) small set of owners benefits from the return of the ancestral property. I Liheslaturan Guahan finds the return to the government of Guam of the military property known as, 'the United States Naval Air Station Agana' ('Brewer Field') and now known as, 'Tiyan,' its original Chamorro name, is such an instance since as long as the Guam International Air Terminal remains in its current location abutting Tiyan, most of the land cannot be returned to its original owners.

I Liheslaturan Guahan therefore declares that the purpose of this Article establishing the Tiyan Trust is to set aside all the net income derived from Tiyan into a trust fund to be administered for the benefit of the original owners of the Tiyan property and their descendants, since in this way, all of the original owners of Tiyan and their progeny can be fairly treated.

**Section 68981. Definitions.** For purposes of this Article.

Section 68981.1. Beneficiary. 'Beneficiary' or 'Beneficiaries' mean those original owners of Tiyan and their descendants as identified by the Trustees of the Tiyan Trust. A descendant of such owner must be able to show to the Trustees his or her direct decent from such owner;

Section 68981.2. Funds. 'Funds' for purpose of the transfer of Tiyan funds to the Trust as required by §§68982 and 68984, infra, means those funds available for such transfer after all the costs and expenses of operating the lands from which such funds are derived have been deducted therefrom so that when the transfer to the Trust of such funds is completed, there will be no debt or obligation that such funds must cover;

**Section 68981.3**. **GEDA**. 'GEDA' means the Guam Economic Development Authority, created in Chapter 50, Division 2 of Title 12 of the Guam Code Annotated;

**Section 68981.4. Income.** 'Income' for purpose of distribution of Tiyan income to the Beneficiaries as required by §§68985 and 68987, *infra*, means the net income of the Tiyan Trust after deduction therefrom of all authorized expenses of the Trust, as determined by the Trustees;

Section 68981.5. Tiyan. 'Tiyan' means the property constituting the former United States Naval Air Station Agaña also known as 'Brewer Field' returned to the possession of the government of Guam and now under the control of the Tiyan Reuse Authority, the Antonio B. WonPat Guam International Airport

Authority and GEDA set-aside for Industrial Development;

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Section 68981.6. Tiyan Reuse Authority. 'Tiyan Reuse Authority' means that local agency, formerly known as the Komitea Para Tiyan, created to act as caretaker of Tiyan under Executive Order Number 95-02;

Section 68981.7. Trust. 'Trust' means the Tiyan Trust created in this Article; and

Section 68981.8. Trustees. 'Trustees' those mean persons charged with administration of the Tiyan Trust who shall be, ex officio, the Administrator of the Guam Economic Development Authority ('GEDA'), the Administrative Director of the Chamorro Land Trust Commission, and seven (7) members of the public to be appointed by I Maga'lahen Guahan with the advice and consent of I Liheslaturan Guahan for a term of five (5) years. Four (4) of the members shall be beneficiaries as defined under §68981.1 of Article 12, Chapter 68 of Title 21 of the Guam Code Annotated. The terms of the ex officio members shall be conterminous with their respective terms of office. The Trustees shall elect a chairperson from among themselves.

Section 68982. Creation of the Tiyan Trust. The government of Guam hereby creates a trust fund ('Tiyan Trust Fund') of all the monies hereafter derived from Tiyan by way of lease or purchase or other method, which funds are to be delivered by either the Tiyan Reuse Authority or GEDA to the Trustees in trust for the purposes stated in this Article.

Section 68983. Purpose of the Tiyan Trust. The purpose of

the Tiyan Trust is the promotion of the health, education, welfare and well-being of the Beneficiaries of the Trust.

Section 68984. Transfer of Trust Funds. The government of Guam, the Tiyan Reuse Authority and GEDA ('grantors') hereby give, grant and transfer to the Trustees all of the funds hereafter derived from the use and development of Tiyan by the grantors, together with its income and profits and any other sums that may be transferred to the Trustees or their successors pursuant to the terms of this Article, to hold in trust for the uses and purposes set forth in this Article.

Section 68985. Investment and Application of Trust Fund and Income. The Trustees shall hold the Trust Fund and, in their discretion, invest it or parts of it in securities in which trustees are permitted to invest under the laws of Guam, or retain the monies in cash, and collect the income. The Trustees shall, on a quarterly basis, and in such amounts as in their discretion the Trustees shall deem proper, devote and apply the Trust Fund and income from the Trust Fund exclusively to the Beneficiaries in the proportions set out in §68987, *infra*.

Section 68986. No Self-Dealing, Etc. The Trustees shall make distributions at times and in a manner so as not to subject the Trust to tax under §4942 of the Internal Revenue Code ('Code'), as applicable to Guam, and shall *not* engage in any act of self-dealing as defined in §4941 of the Code. The Trustees shall not retain any excess business holdings as defined in §4943 of the Code and shall not make any investments as defined in §4944 of the Code nor make any taxable expenditure which would subject the Trust or the Trustees to tax under §4945 of the Code.

Section 68987. Identification of Beneficiaries: Division of The Trustees shall establish a roster of **Income Among Beneficiaries.** beneficiaries consisting of the names of all of the landowners of Tiyan as of the date of the acquisition of Tiyan by the United States, and the living descendants of such landowners. The income of the Trust shall be divided among the Beneficiaries as follows: after each original landowner of Tiyan is identified, the aggregate area of his or her parcel or parcels of land in Tiyan shall be determined and the share that such landowner and his or her direct descendants shall have in the income of the Trust shall be in the proportion that such parcel or parcels of Tiyan land bear to the total size of Tiyan. The Department of Land Management is directed and the Superior Court of Guam is respectfully requested to assist the Trustees identifying both the Beneficiaries and the original sizes of the separately-owned parcels of land in Tiyan prior to their taking by the United States.

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Section 68988. Restriction on Use of Trust Fund. The Trust Fund and the income of the Trust Fund shall be devoted exclusively to the purposes described in this Article and shall in no part and in no event be given or contributed to or inure to the benefit of any private person or corporation other than a Beneficiary. No part of the Trust Fund shall be used to carry on propaganda or otherwise attempt to influence legislation, or to participate in any political campaign.

**Section 68989.** Additional Gifts to Fund. Either the grantors or other persons may, from time to time, make additional gifts of money or property to the Trustees to become part of the Trust Fund.

Section 68990. Good Faith Duty of Trustees. The Trustees

shall be chargeable only with the exercise of good faith in carrying out the provisions of the Trust. The Trustees shall not, in the absence of bad faith, be responsible or accountable for errors of judgment in making the determinations and distribution pursuant to the provisions of §68987, *supra*. The Trustees shall serve without bond.

Section 68991. Reimbursement and Compensation of Trustees. The Trustees shall be reimbursed from revenues derived from the lease of the Tiyan properties for all expenses reasonably incurred by them in the administration of the Trust Fund. No part of such expenses shall be paid from the Trust Fund. The Trustees shall serve without compensation.

Section 68992. Decision of Majority of Trustees. The act of a majority of Trustees on all matters pertaining to the Trust, including the investment and distribution of funds, shall be conclusive. Evidence of such majority actions shall be in writing and shall be filed with the Office of *I Maga'lahen Guahan* and the Office of the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guahan*.

Section 68993. Control of Funds. A Federally-insured bank with offices in Guam selected by the Trustees shall have custody of the securities and cash of the Trust Fund. Such bank shall have the right to register securities or other property held under and pursuant to this Article in the name of its nominee.

**Section 68994. Gifts Irrevocable.** Gifts made in trust to the Trustees under this Article shall be irrevocable. If it shall be determined by the Department of Revenue and Taxation, subsequent to the creation of this Trust and the transfer of any funds to the Trustees by the grantors or any other person, that the Trust Fund is *not* exempt from the payment of

income tax upon its income or that the non-governmental donors to the Fund may not be entitled to charitable deductions for income tax purposes for contributions made thereto in the manner and to the full extent provided by the Code, then such gifts as remain in the Fund at the time of such determination shall be given by the Trustees to a qualified tax-exempt charitable organizations selected by the Trustees to best carry out the purposes of this Trust. This Trust shall thereupon terminate.

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**Section 68995. Protection of Trust Fund.** The Trustees are authorized to do all things deemed essential or advisable for the protection of the Trust Fund.

Section 68996. Dissemination of Information; Employment of Personnel. In properly carrying out and aiding the purposes and objects of the Trust, the Trustees shall have full power and authority:

**Section 68996.1**. **Employ Others.** To employ and pay attorneys, investigators, and such assistants and employees of every kind as they may deem necessary;

**Section 68996.2**. **Distribute Notices**. To buy, print, publish and/or distribute, by mail or otherwise, to whom they may think proper, appropriate cards, notices and information; and

Section 68996.3. Disseminate Information. To disseminate by all lawful means such information as in the judgment of the Trustees may be useful in carrying out the purposes of the Tiyan Trust.

Section 68997. Explanation of Trustees' Powers. No powers granted in this Article to the Trustees, or accorded them by law,

shall be interpreted to give the Trustees, the grantors or any other person the power to dispose of all or part of the Trust income or principal for less than full consideration, or to empower the grantors or any of them to borrow all or part of the trust income or principal without giving sufficient security and paying suitable interest. No person or persons except the Trustees shall have the power to vote any voting stock held by the Trust, to direct or prohibit specific investments or re-investments of Trust property, or to exchange Trust property for other property of equal value.

**Section 68998.** Trustees' Annual Accounting. The Trustees shall render an annual accounting which shall be conclusive and binding on all interested parties if no written objection is filed with the Trustees within sixty (60) days of the date of their accounting.

**Section 68999. Construction of Trust.** The Trustees shall have full power to construe any provision of this Article relating to their duties or decisions where the intention of *I Liheslaturan Guahan* may appear uncertain or ambiguous.

Section 69000. Selection of Beneficiaries by Court on Failure of Trustees to Act. The Trustees are empowered to designate the Beneficiaries, pursuant to the provisions of §68987, *supra*. In the event the Trustees shall fail to exercise this power within a reasonable time after enactment of this Article, such power may be exercised by the Superior Court of Guam.

Section 69001. Development of Rules and Regulations.

Within ninety (90) days of enactment of this Act, the Trustees shall develop rules and regulations under the Administrative Adjudication Law in order

to implement this Act and its purposes, including the administration of the Trust Fund.

**Section 69002. Severability**. If any provision of this Article or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the Article which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end, the provisions of this Article are severable."

### I. OVERVIEW

The Committee on Rules, Government Reform and Federal Affairs held a public hearing on Tuesday, March 10, 1998 at 10:35 a.m. in the conference room of the Chairman of the Committee on Rules, Government Reform and Federal Affairs. Public Notice of the hearing was announced in the March 5<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup>, and 10<sup>th</sup>, 1998 issues of the Pacific Daily News.

### II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY

Ms. Beverly Laguana Borja read prepared testimony (attached) in favor of Bill No. 383. In her testimony, Ms. Borja described how her grandfather, the late Jose Padilla Laguana, farmed on the more than seven hectares of land in "Tuyan" (Tiyan), which he inherited from his father, Jose Aguon Laguana. She recounted how her grandparents worked hard farming their land, in order to provide sustenance for their family. She told of how they had to resort to hiding their livestock during the Japanese occupation of Guam. Ms. Borja related the story of her grandfather's departure from the farm to work as a carpenter, first for Dillingham and eventually for the Naval Hospital. During this time, Jose Padilla Laguana left the cultivation of his family's farm to his two sons, Carlos and Jose. Soon after, Jose was approached by a man in uniform, who told him that his farmland at Tiyan was needed by the U.S. government. In return for Jose's land, the man in uniform stated that he would receive compensation through a land exchange. However, upon his death in 1968, Jose Laguana was never given title to any land by the U.S. government. In closing, Ms. Borja appealed to the Committee and the members of the Legislature to correct this injustice.

Mr. Ronald T. Laguana, Ms. Borja's brother, also presented oral testimony **in favor** of Bill No. 383. Mr. Laguana stated that he represented his family and other Chamorro families who lived in Tiyan. Mr. Laguana vehemently stated that this highly important issue had to be addressed and that there had to be some resolution for the families of the Tiyan landowners. Mr. Laguana appealed to the Committee to pass this bill, as a start, because their families have no land. He asked that the Legislature act on Bill 383 and "give a little" so that his family can be fairly compensated for the land taken from his grandfather, the late Jose Padilla Laguana.


The Chairman, Senator Forbes indicated his strong support for this measure and indicated his desire to co-sponsor Bill 383. Senator Frank Aguon also stated that he supports the passage of Bill 383.

### III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATION

The Committee on Rules, Government Reform and Federal Affairs finds that Bill No. 383 would help provide redress for the unjust taking of lands from those Chamorros living in Tiyan. These original landowners were promised fair compensation for their land by the U.S. government decades ago. The Committee finds that Bill 383 provides a mechanism by which the heirs of the original landowners can receive compensation for those lands which cannot be given back to them. Due to the operations of the Guam International Air Terminal, it would not be feasible to return these properties to their original landowners. However, they and their descendants should not be left without any redress at all. Therefore, the Committee finds that the establishment of the Tiyan Trust wherein all the net income from Tiyan would be deposited into a fund administered for the benefit of the original landowners in Tiyan and their descendants, would help correct the grave injustice committed against these people.

Accordingly, the Committee on Rules, Government Reform and Federal Affairs, to which Bill No. 383 was referred does hereby submit its findings and recommendations to the Twenty-fourth Guam Legislature TO DO PASS BILL NO. 383 "An act to add Article 12 to Chapter 68, Title 21, Guam Code Annotated, to establish the Tiyan Trust for the benefit of the former owners and their descendants of that property now in the possession of the government of Guam consisting of the former U.S. Naval Air Station Agana known as Brewer Field now under the control of the Tiyan Reuse Authority and the Guam Economic Development Authority."

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TESTIMONY ON BILL NO. 383

Good Morning Mr. Chairman and Members of this Committee:

My name is Beverly Tenorio Laguana Borja, and I am, the great-grand-daughter of Jose Aguon Laguana;

the grand-daughter of the late Jose Padilla Laguana, and the daughter of the late Carlos Cruz Laguana

(dec.1991). I am here to tell you a short but true story told to me by my late father Carlos, and by his

vounger brother Jose Cruz Laguana who is unable to be here with us today. I do this because this story is

a very "touching" one. One that I hope may even touch you and others in this room.... one that my 9

brothers and sisters and I feel "should be told".

Once upon a time, there was a Chamoru named Jose Padilla Laguana. He farmed for a living, on more

than 7 hectares of land he had inherited from his father, Jose Aguon Laguana. This land, known as Lot

No. 2156 was at a place called "Tujan" (Tiyan). He and his wife Rita Dela Torre Cruz Laguana and his 8

children worked diligently to survive by growing rows of all kinds of vegetables and fruit trees which

included corn, beans, taro, bananas, avocados, mangoes that would bear fruit almost year-round, and even

coconuts. He would either sell his produce to the market, share and trade them with neighbors and

relatives, and with the coconuts.... he and his sons would open, dry and sell the copra for a very good

price. You see, Jose needed US\$66.00 to buy some fencing. He wanted to raise some pigs and

cows....Jose was going "big time". And he did! He raised so many pigs and cows that his sons would

always talk about how hard it was to do this kind of work....." Just to survive!", they would say.

When the Japanese came though, work became even harder. Jose would send his two sons faraway to

Machanhanao, now known as Machanao (the U.S. Government-pronounced way), where his sister "

Naniyang" (Juana Laguana Manibusan, now deceased) lived. There, Jose's sons, Carlos and Jose would

hide the cows and the pigs because they said, that "the Japanese would kill for meat". When the animals

were slaughtered. Naniyang's two sons, Jose L. Manibusan and Antonio L. Manibusan would have to

hang the meats on trees to keep the litai (iguana) and other scavengers from getting to the them. This was a funny sight for Jose and Carlos.

Then, the Americans came, Guam was so-called "liberated" and Jose Padilla Laguana was called to work as a carpenter for Dillingham, a company contracted to build for the U.S. military. Young Carlos and young Jose would then be left with all the work at the farm. One day, Jose was called to work, again as a carpenter but this time, for the Naval Hospital. A few years later Jose was approached by a somewhat distinguished man in uniform. He told Jose that his land at Tiyan was needed by the U.S. Government and that he would be compensated by receiving land in exchange for it.

He went home and told his family what happened. Carlos asked his father, "why do we have to move from here, Tata?". Jose responded tearfully, "the Captain, (his superior) was right there, so I had no choice." "They promised us land somewhere else," he said sadly. Jose's wife cried.

Mr. Chairman, I tag this story today, by telling you and the members of this committee that that land exchange never, ever took place. Jose, my grand-father was given government land to farm on, but the government never gave him title to any land. He died in 1968. He was a proud man who believed that being liberated meant not dumping 5-gallon cans of sewage/defecated waste in the ocean for the Japanese anymore. It meant the end of hostile life under Japanese rule. It meant freedom and peace again...it meant rights and opportunities...a bright future for his family...I think he was talking about what they call "the American Dream" but for us, me and siblings....we only want the Guamanian dream, the dream to touch the soil of our birthright....to stand on it ....to live on it....to pass it on so that one day, my family's children and their children will know where they came from... and know what they are truly made of. Jose Padilla Laguana, was never fairly compensated for the land that was taken away from him and his family. This land, my birthright, my brothers' and sisters' birthright, my 25 other cousins' birthright, Jose's great-grandchildren's birthright....was taken away and never returned! Sad thing is....I still see this property every time I pass by Tiyan. I can even see the banana trees, the mango trees, even the

coconut trees. And that's just it.....I can only see it. I can't even touch it! Because there's ironically a

fence around it. Not the kind that fences the pigs and cows in, but the kind that keeps me and my family

away from it. I always ask why and think...."so close...yet so far away"?

I now ask you Mr. Chairman, on behalf of the all the descendants of Jose Padilla Laguana .....to please fix

this injustice. It is too late for Tata.....too late for "Daddy".... but not too late for me....because I am still

breathing......I am alive ....I and my brothers and sisters will continue to follow through because this issue

is still unresolved. So please Mr. Chairman, urge your colleagues in the Legislature to "do the right

thing". Do it so we can move on. Do it so we can close this chapter in my family's history and the

histories of other Tiyan landowners who have their own true stories to tell as well... Stories that I am sure

are similar to my Tata's story. The futures and lives of Tiyan landowners and their descendants lie in

your hands and the hands of this Legislature. I pray that you do not allow this injustice to continue.

Thank you for holding this public hearing....and I and my family thank you for this opportunity to come

before you today.

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Bill 383 proposes to establish the Tiyan Trust for the benefit of the former owners and their descendants of the former Naval Air Station. This trust is to be created from all money derived from Tiyan via leases, purchases or any other method where funds are delivered to the Tiyan Reuse Authority or the Guam Economic Development Authority (GEDA).

In P.L. 24.59 the Komitea Para Tiyan received \$2,700,000 from the Ceneral Fund. Currently the revenue generated from Tiyan is a result of rental income from Guam Housing Corporation (GHC) which is \$135,000 to date and in turn goes into the Tiyan Revolving Fund that has been placed in reserve. If these funds are placed into a trust the Komitee may require additional funds from the General Fund to subsidize its utility obligations.
