



COMMITTEE REPORT ON Bill No. 12 (LS)

"AN ACT TO DEAPPROPRIATE ONE HUNDRED THIRTY FIVE THREE HUNDRED SIXTY THOUSAND (\$135, 360) FROM THE SUMS APPROPRIATED TO THE LEGISLATURE AND TO REAPPROPRIATE SAID SUM TO THE PUBLIC SCHOOL LIBRARY RESOURCES FUND."

I. OVERVIEW

The Executive Committee held a public hearing at 9 a.m. on January 20, 2005 in the Public Hearing Room, I Liheslaturan Guåhan. Public notice advertisement was given in the January 13 2005, edition of the Pacific Daily News (PDN), posted in the Government Meetings Section in the January 17, 2005 edition of the PDN, and a Public Notice Ad in the January 18, 2005 edition of the Marianas Variety, Guam Issue. A live broadcast of the public hearing appeared on Channel 61 that day (January 20, 2005).

II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY

The following bill was heard at the public hearing, during which written testimony from Gabriel and Kathleen Lombard was submitted:

BILL 12 (LS); AN ACT TO DEAPPROPRIATE \$135,360 FROM THE SUMS APPROPRIATED TO THE LEGISLATURE AND TO REAPPROPRIATE SAID SUM TO THE PUBLIC SCHOOL LIBRARY RESOURCES FUND

Gabriel and Kathleen Lombard, private citizens, presented written testimony in favor of Bill 12. They label Bill 12 as being "clearly presented and intelligently formatted." They believe the bill encompasses the necessities to restore and rehabilitate the failing public educational system on Guam. They encouraged positive endorsement for Bill 12 in its respective committee.

Speaker Forbes' Remarks:

At the end of the public hearing Speaker Forbes outlined the definition, purpose and intent of Bill 12. Speaker Forbes recognized Bill 12 as a "noteworthy" piece of legislation due to its specific appropriation towards educational needs and its reduction of Senator Klitzkie's budget. He commended Senator Klitzkie for being the first Senator to create a bill that would allow such de-appropriation and also encouraged other Senators desiring to do the same with their lapses to introduce legislation that would transfer funds to other beneficial areas of the government.

III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATION

The Executive Committee finds that the lack of adequate and necessary resources in the Guam Public School System has been an ongoing issue for public educational institutions island-wide. With increased funding to essential areas of the public school system, we can help to enhance the learning environment for children enrolled in public schools. Bill 12 helps to address this problem by increasing the funds in the Public School Library Resources Fund, which was created during the reform of the Guam Passport Agency.

As a means of providing increased funding to the public school libraries, Bill 12 will allow \$135,360 of the funds appropriated to the legislature prior to July 1, 2004 (Senator Klitzkie's savings) to be transferred to the Public School Library Resources Fund. By minimizing personnel and rent costs, Senator Klitzkie was able produce a considerable amount of savings. These savings are dedicated to increasing the needed funding for additional educational resources.

The reform of the Guam Passport Agency allows 50% of generated fees to be used by the Department of Revenue and Taxation and the other 50% to be put towards the Public School Library Resources Fund. This fund enables the purchase of books, reference materials, learning resources and necessary technologies for public school libraries. In addition to the funds generated by fees from the Guam Passport Agency, Bill 12 will allow additional monies to be allocated toward the purchase of resources by deappropriating savings from Senator's Klitzkie's budget and reappropriating those funds to the Public School Library Resources Fund. Bill 12 also allows the Fiscal Officer to reduce the allotment to Senator Klitzkie's budget by an amount equal to the sum of the deappropriation.

The Committee finds Bill 12 to be a salutary measure making an effective use of the funds appropriated to the 27th Guam Legislature (Senator Klitzkie's savings) prior to July 1, 2004. Senator Klitzkie has set a precedent through this legislation by demonstrating the beneficial impacts of frugality with the people's money. With the savings of \$135,360, the public school libraries on the island will witness a growth in resources, a problem that has been left unaddressed by the government. With the implementation of Bill 12 Senator Klitzkie's senatorial budget will be decreased by an equivalent amount of the transfer to the Public School Library Resources Fund, allowing for continued adequate use of public funds through sensible budgeting of public official allotments.

Accordingly, the Executive Committee, to which Bill No. 12 (LS) was referred, does hereby submit its findings and recommendations to I Mina' Bente Ocho Na Liheslaturan Guåhan TO DO PASS BILL NO. 12 (LS), "An act to deappropriate one hundred thirty five three hundred sixty thousand (\$135, 360) from the sums appropriated to the legislature and to reappropriate said sum to the Public School Library Resources Fund."



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Minor volcanic haze, acid rain over islands

SAIPAN—Residents of Saipan and Tinian are strongly urged to take precautionary measures and avoid prolonged outdoor exposure not only due to ash fall, but also because of minor volcanic haze and rainwater mixed with sulfur gases coming from the erupting Anatahan volcano.

The government yesterday expanded its health advisory to include a volcanic haze alert.

North winds are expected through at least today.

This, according to the Emergency Management Office, will continue to bring suspended volcanic dust and sulfur gases from Anatahan to the nearby islands.

Anatahan is located just about 120 km. north of Saipan.

Tropical storm Kulap, which passed east of the Marianas, as well as a strong cold front passing north of the Marianas have been impacting the wind direction for days now — resulting in Anatahan's ash plume reaching Saipan and Tinian.

EMO said the volcanic haze alert for Saipan and Tinian is extended until today.

Rudolfo M. Pua, director of EMO, yesterday said residents need to be on watch as the haze alert may be extended again, depending on the wind direction.

"We are closely monitoring the wind movement, so we can inform the public and protect the health of everyone," he said.

Pua noted that while the U.S. Geological Survey said there is no threat of "significant" volcanic smog or vog and acid precipitation, the islands have already been seeing "minor" volcanic haze, ash fall and acid rain.

All these, he said, prompted EMO and the Department of Public Health to update the public health advisory that was first issued on Saturday.

Yesterday, EMO and Public Health issued the "volcanic haze and ash health advisory."

Volcanic dust and sulfur gases, according to EMO and

Public Health, may appear like a hazy film over the sky and cause difficulties.

"If volcanic particles are visible or the odor is detectable, residents are urged to report the information to EMO," the advisory partly reads.

But as early as Sunday, residents have been aware of a "fairly strong sulfur" smell reportedly from Anatahan, said public health medical director Dr. Richard Brostrom.

Carlos Salas, executive director of the Commonwealth Ports Authority, meanwhile, said he has not received reports of any airline that diverted or conceled flights due to the volcanic haze and ash fall.

What to do

r Residents with serious lung problems like asthma should avoid prolonged outdoor air exposure or exertion during the time that ash is present in the air.

"Stay indoors until local health officials advise that it is safe to go outside." EMO and Public Health said. Residents are urged to cover their mouths and noses when outside, as volcanic ash can irritate the respiratory system.

Wearing goggles to protect the eyes is recommended.

"Volcanic smog poses a health hazard by aggravating preexisting respiratory ailments and acid rain damages crops and can get into household water supplies," said Public Health and EMO.

In areas very close to the volcano where vog is very strong, other health complaints — like head aches, breathing difficulties, increased susceptibility to respiratory ailments, watery eyes, sore throat, flulike symptoms, and general lack of energy—are routinely reported to health officials.

Residents are also urged to protect their water source from falling volcanic ash.

This includes closing and covering water cisterns and turning off roof-collection systems.

Public Health said it is not safe to drink water that has been collected from rainfall during a volcanic eruption.

Shriners medical team to provide free services

HAGÁTÑA — A medical team from the Shriners Hospital for Children in Hawaii will be providing free consultative services for island children with special health care needs.

The medical clinic, to be conducted with the cooperation of the Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS), will be held at the public health facility in Mangilao from Jan. 21-27.

The Shriners medical team will be seeing patients under 18 years of age and will provide consultative services and follow-up visits to children with special health care needs, including those afflicted with deformities, disease, and injuries involving the bones, joints, and muscles.

Staffers from DPHSS' Maternal Child Health Program and Bureau of Family Health and Nursing Services will also be on hand to help out.

Patients will be seen by appointment only and interested parties are advised to contact Arlean Kloppenburg at 735-7295 or Terry Aguon at 735-71687.

New patients are required to obtain a referral and a medical summary from their private physician, an updated shot record, a copy of their birth certificate, and a copy of their insurance card.

Patients are also reminded to provide x-ray and/or laboratory results as previously instructed.

X-ray and laboratory orders can be picked up at the DPHSS medical records office in Mangilao.

Investors pledge \$5M in initial investments to start up medical school

SAIPAN —The Filipino-American investors planning to put up a private medical school on Saipan pledged start-up capital of at least \$5 million to begin their project.

In their proposal submitted to the State Board of Regents, the proponents of the Loyola Medical College Foundation Inc. which seeks to establish the Loyola Health Science College said they are infusing \$5 million over a period of five years in equipment, classrooms, laboratories and facilities for faculty and a dormitory.

Their proposed facilities should be able to accommodate their initial target of 500 students, mostly from Southeast Asia including the Philippines, where even professional doctors are switching to nursing in

hopes of finding greener pasture overseas.

Dr. Johnny Fong, the principal proponent, said their project should be able to bring in additional revenues for the cashstrapped government.

"The Loyola Health Science College shall bring a multitude of students and their families to the CNMI. This brings about rental income, sales revenue, added taxes, new offices and apartment buildings.... After renting for a period of two to three years, the Loyola Health Science College shall build its own permanent college facilities. This will generate income for new construction, employment and taxes for the CNMI," said Fong in the proposal.

Loyola's proposed school is envisioned to offer a two-year Associate in Arts degree in nursing, and a full four-year degree in Doctor of Medicine. Doctor of Pharmacy and Doctor of Dentistry

Its focus is to educate and train quality health professionals, particularly nurses, because of the great demand for such throughout the United States.

"The opportunity to offer a U.S. type two-year program in nursing to supply the estimated shortage of 150,000 trained nurses, for the USA market over the next 5 to 10 years presents a very interesting challenge that merits a focused effort," said Fone

Acting as consultant, former Philippine Consul General to the Northern Marianas Julia Heidemann, now a retired ambassador, accompanied Fong, his wife, Dr. Grace Fong and businessman Gerardo Borromeo to discuss their project proposal with key local officials.





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Republicans re-file bills ignored by past Legislature

TWO Republican senators have re-introduced several bills that were brought in but not taken up by the Democrat-led 27th Legislature. Most of the bills filed by the Sens. Bob Klitzkie and Larry Kasperbauer on the first day of the Republican dominated 28th Legislature's session on Monday were related to education and business.

Republicans, who complained that Democrats had swept several minority bills under the rug during the past Legislature, are hoping to get most of their bills passed this time now that their party is in charge. Klitzkie's Bill 1, titled Every Child is Entitled

to an Adequate Public Education Act of 2005, seeks to establish at least a minimal definition of an adequate education.

"The bill provides that resources of the whole government must first be directed toward providing an adequate public educational system. The legislation directs GovGuam agencies that are directly and indirectly involved in providing education to children, be responsible for providing an adequate public educational system," Klitzkie said.

Through Bill 12, Klitzkie also insists on transferring savings from his office, amounting to \$135,360, to the Public School Library Resources Funds.

He offered to transfer these savings when the 27th Legislature was discussing the 2005 budget bill, but his proposal didn't make it to the final budget law.

Three other bills filed by Klitzkie are as follows:

- Bill 13, titled the Educator Appreciation Act, which extends the functional equivalent of the Qualifying Certificate (The Educator's Qualifying Certificate and tax rebate, on a much smaller scale, to teachers.
- Bill 14, which proposes to allow government employees to participate in business opportunities by allowing them to bid on outsourcing contracts.

This bill was publicly heard

during the last Legislature, but didn't make it to the floor.

• Bill 15 allows the governor to reorganize the government through executive order.

Kasperbauer, chairman of the education committee, meanwhile, reintroduced a bill that prohibits the employment of offenders in government agencies and government contracted businesses frequented by children.

He also filed Bill 4, which appropriates \$4 million from the education facilities fund of the Department of Education for repair of air conditioning in public schools.

Kasperbauer also introduced the following bills:

• Bill 6, which proposes to regulate the sale of butane propane and other

inhalants to minors:

- Bill 7, which sets the maximum student enrollment limits for school consolidations or mergers.
- Bill 8, which adds investment banking and security trading to the list of eligible activities for Qualifying Certificates;
- Bill 10, which would authorize a land exchange for the development of recreational facilities in Dededo: and
- Bill 11, which would exempt the wholesale of telecommunication services and off-island sales from Gross Receipt Taxes.

Klitzkie introduces two measures on public education

JUST two days after being inaugurated for his second term. Sen. Robert Klitzkie went right to work by introducing a couple of measures to assist with the islands' educational system.

One of the measures, Bill #1, introduced on Monday would establish at least a minimal definition of an adequate education system. The bill name "The Every Child is entitled to an Adequate Public Education Act of 2005," sets guidelines for Guam public schools to provide adequate education.

Klitzkie's proposed legislation defines adequate education as "a system of public schools that provides an adequate public education to public school students."

Bill#1 also reads that in order to provide children with adequate education in Guam's public schools, the government of Guam must provide: a certified teacher for every classroom, certified professional administrators, a certified guidance counselor for each school, a certified school health counselor for every school, properly ventilated classrooms with a sensible air temperature, a supply of potable water sufficient to provide each student a daily ration of drinking and washing water, a reliable source of electricity, proper sanitation including flushable toilets, clean restrooms, dining areas and classrooms.

The measure would also allow for adopted textbooks and workbooks to be issued to each public school student for the classes in which they are enrolled, libraries that are up to par with standards of the American Association of School Librarians (ASL) and have at each public school a certified librarian, a healthful, safe, sanitary learning environment and have at the least 180-instructional days in each school year with school years ending no later than

June 10 to allow for an adequate education.

According to the measure, "The legislature finds that the Organic Act requires the government of Guam to provide an adequate system of public education. The Organic Act Bill of Rights mandates compulsory education for children between six and 16. The interplay of these provisions creates a right to an adequate public education for children that is analogous to a constitutional civil right."

The measure would rename the Department of Education to the Guam Public School System effective Oct. 1 if signed into law by the governor. The measure would keep the Guam Education Policy Board in existence.

Another measure introduced by Kiltizkie would create tax rebates to teachers for educator expenses and would enact the Educator Appreciation Act of 2005.

The measure states that teach-

ers spend their own money to purchase supplies they need for educating the islands public school students and although the expenses are deductible as unreimbursed business expenses for a teacher on their income tax return, the election of the standard deduction means that most teachers bore the entire cost of their purchases.

United States Congress in tax year 2002 recognized the predicament of teachers and allowed a deduction of \$250 from the adjusted gross income line in taxforms that allowed teachers and other educators to deduct these qualified expenses, even if the educator did not itemize the deductions on their tax return.

The measure recognizes that the \$250 tax deduction for educators may be sufficient in some areas however it is inadequate for many educators in the Guam Public School System.

The measure, if passed into Guarn law, would allow educators to receive \$500 of personal

expenditures, which is over and above the \$250 deduction allowed by the Internal Revenue Code, according to Bill #13.

Klitzkie also introduced Bill #12 which would deappropriate \$135,360 of his office savings to be reappropriated into the Public School Library Resources Fund.

According to Klitzkie's site at www.bobsoffice.org, he began government service 31 years ago as a social studies and history teacher at George Washington High School. He got his Master's in Education at the UOG and went on to get his Juris Doctor, graduating Magna Cum Laude, from the University of New Mexico.

He describes himself as "recovering lawyer," having practiced on Guam from 1974 to 1985. From his site, "Bob retired from the position of Director of Education (when school started on time and the textbooks were ordered early) in February 1995 having guided the more than 4000 employee department for a year."

Kudos to Sen. Klitzkie for position on leave

Annual leave for senators has always, in my mind, bordered on being an oxymoron. Once again, Sen. Robert Klitzkie leads the way in taking a moral and ethical high road.

I find it interesting that several former employees who have "retired" or attempted to retire cannot because their respective agency has not paid its share of the employees' retirement to the Retirement Fund. I realize the money paid for "annual leave" is not sufficient to cover the retirement debt, but it does reflect on the personal priorities of those who can make a change.
