AN ACT TO PROHIBIT THE USE OF ELECTRONIC AND MECHANICAL VOTING MACHINES IN GUAM ELECTIONS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Statement of Legislative Findings and Intent. I Mina'Bente

Ocho Na Liheslaturan Guahan finds that publicity about problems in the voting

process, both in Guam and the fifty (50) states, has been growing since Guam's

1998 elections and the 2000 Presidential elections in the United States. I

Liheslatura finds that the use of electronic voting machines has been problematic,

leading many voters, national and state political parties, and voting rights

organizations to believe that such devices have increased the likelihood that some voters may be disenfranchised by their use.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan has determined that the use of electronic and mechanical voting machines has been at the center of many voting problems across the United States and in Guam in recent years, their use having become more prevalent at the urging and support of the federal government. Concerns have been raised in numerous jurisdictions that the machines can easily be manipulated to give different results. Frequent complaints from voters and poll workers alike include the apparent loss of votes, inaccurate or improper registering of actual votes cast, erasure of memory chips holding voting data, improper programming, improper instructions from the on-site staff of the Guam Election Commission (GEC), inability of voters to select the candidate of their choice, and other problems.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that utilizing electronic or mechanical voting machines in Guam elections has not specifically been authorized by law.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan therefore finds that the use of electronic or mechanical voting machines in Guam elections should be prohibited until such time that the GEC is able to train qualified staff, properly educate the public and establish adequate protocols for handling possible problems, so that the use of electronic and mechanical voting machines in Guam will be no more problematic than using paper ballots.

- Section 2. Prohibition of the Use of Electronic and Mechanical Voting Machines. (a) The use of electronic and mechanical voting machines in any election conducted by the Guam Election Commission (GEC) is prohibited.
- (b) Prohibition not Applicable to Machines Used to Count Paper Ballots. For the purposes of this Act, electronic and mechanical voting machines means electronic or mechanical devices by which voters cast votes. Nothing in

- this Act means that electronic or mechanical devices shall *not* continue to be used
- 2 for the sorting and counting of paper ballots already cast by voters.
