I. OVERVIEW

The Committee on Criminal Justice, Public Safety, Youth & Foreign Affairs conducted a public hearing on February 10, 2005 in the Legislative Public Hearing Room, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*. Public notice was printed in the Pacific Daily News on February 3 and February 8, 2005.

II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY

Douglas Moylan, Attorney General of Guam, submitted written testimony (see attached) in general support of Bill No. 38 but did note that there were several problems. Mr. Moylan pointed out that the Bill is too ambiguous and no clear definitions are given.

David R. Craddick, General Manager, Guam Waterworks Authority, provided oral and written (see attached) testimony in support of Bill No. 38. Mr. Craddick pointed out that GWA has experienced problems with persons tampering and disabling with the water meter backflow devices. He stated that while nothing is stolen it is a crime against the community when contamination is allowed to backflow into the water system.

III. FINDINGS

The Committee on Criminal Justice, Public Safety, Youth & Foreign Affairs finds that most crimes, in general, affect one or more persons within the community but there are certain crimes that affect the community as a whole. These types of crimes such as stealing a generator used to operate a water pump or cutting open a water bladder used for providing water to a school has adverse effects on the community.

The Committee has drafted a substitute Bill No. 38(EC) to deal with the concerns raised by the Attorney General. Bill No. 38(EC), as substituted addresses the *Committee Report - Bill No. 38(EC), as substituted Page 1 of 2*

ambiguity created in the original bill by describing what is considered to be a government service. Also, Bill No. 38(EC), as substituted allows for the court to suspend the term of incarceration and impose a term of probation.

IV. RECOMMENDATION

The Committee on Criminal Justice, Public Safety, Youth & Foreign Affairs hereby reports out Bill No. 38, as substituted: "An act to add a new §43.31 to Chapter 43 of Article 1, Title 9, Guam Code Annotated, relative to establishing a special allegation to be known as a Crime Against The Community" to *I Mina Bente Ocho Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* with the recommendation **TO PASS**.

LEGISLATIVE TESTIMONY Bill Number 38

(Public Hearing on Thursday, February 10, 2005)

The Office of the Attorney General currently is in general support as to the above identified legislation as drafted, but it has several problems. The reasons are set forth below.

The Bill creates ambiguity which will be attacked by the defense as to what is "<u>necessary</u> for the delivery of public services." No definition is provided, and this point will be unnecessarily litigated in a trial.

The Bill also does not state the degree of culpability (mental state), which should be specified. Also, § 43.31(c) may unconstitutionally ambiguous because the accused may not know what the original intent was.

Section 43.31(d) is too ambiguous and does not give an accused notice of what may be illegal.

The Bill does not provide for a lesser included misdemeanor charge because it requires a minimum mandatory one (1) year in jail.

The Bill provides that a sentence shall not be suspended, nor parole or work release for the 3^{rd} degree felony. The Legislature has in the past reserved such punishment to 1^{st} and 2^{nd} degree felonies. The Bill must also exempt itself from 9 G.C.A. § 80.31, which allows the Court to suspend a sentence for 1^{st} time offenders.

Finally, this Bill affects government corruption and creates very harsh mandatory penalties. We recommend that the AG's Office be afforded the discretion to negotiate plea agreements by not requiring mandatory jail time. Our Office is currently securing plea agreements with a commitment of never working for the Government of Guam again, which the Bill with its mandatory jail time will cause accused's to go to trial and not have that option if found guilty.

AN ACT TO ADD A NEW §43.31 TO CHAPTER 43 OF ARTICLE 1, TITLE 9, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO ESTABLISHING A SPECIAL ALLEGATION TO BE KNOWN AS A "CRIME AGAINST THE COMMUNITY".

GWA is very much in support of this bill.

Tampering with and disabling water meter backflow devices is also a major system vulnerability issue. Although nothing may be stolen it is a crime against the community when contamination is allowed to backflow into the water system because protection devices have been disabled. There will be a concern over how the disabler is identified so we suggest would be the responsibility of the property owner when this occurs.

The law should be clarified that activity of this nature is also covered under this law.

Backflow requirements under current GWA rules and regulation, that have the force and effect of law, are rarely prosecuted. I suspect this is because of the lack of understand of the great risk the community is subjected to when backflow devices are disabled.

GWA will be installing backflow prevention devices on all meters. Commercial accounts and agricultural accounts are currently required to have backflow prevention. So legislation of this type is timely and warranted.

Thank you for your efforts in this critical matter.






A crime against the community constitutes a felony of the third (e) 4 5 degree and the court shall impose a sentence of imprisonment of a minimum 6 term of one (1) year and may impose a maximum sentence of imprisonment of 7 up to three (3) years; the minimum term imposed shall not be suspended nor 8 may probation be imposed in lieu of the minimum term nor shall parole or 9 work release be granted before completion of the minimum term. In addition 10 to imprisonment, the court shall include, as part of the penalty, a mandatory 11 sentence of five hundred (500) hours of community service to be performed 12 upon completion of the prison sentence."

AN ACT TO ADD A NEW §43.31 TO CHAPTER 43 OF ARTICLE 1, TITLE 9, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO ESTABLISHING A SPECIAL ALLEGATION TO BE KNOWN AS A "CRIME AGAINST THE COMMUNITY".

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Short Title. This Act shall be known as the "Crime Against
the Community Act".

4 Section 2. Legislative Statement of Intent. Most crimes adversely affect one or more persons within our community and are not to be tolerated. 5 However, committing crimes that affect the community as a whole are 6 7 particularly heinous. These types of crimes may include the theft of government property or services that result in a threat to the public health or 8 9 public safety. The theft of government property (i.e.: a generator used to sustain the operation of a water pump after a typhoon), damaging property 10 (i.e.: cutting open a water bladder placed at a school) or using services for 11 purposes not related to the original intent for which the property or services 12

were provided and any other action(s) that result in a denial of government property or services necessary to sustain life, can cause far-reaching negative consequences. It is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* that any person who is charged with the theft of any government property or services whether owned, leased, or borrowed, or the denial of the same, shall have the special allegation *"Crime Against the Community"* added to the charge sheet.
