

Nothing in this section shall prevent the government of Guam from using a Social Security number for internal verification and administrative purposes, so long as the use does not result in, or require the release of, the Social Security number to persons not designated by the public agency to perform associated functions authorized by law.
- (c) The Office of Attorney General shall enforce this act by bringing an action for injunctive relief in the Superior Court of Guam.
 - (d) This act takes effect ninety (90) days after enactment.
- **Section 3. Severability.** If any provision of this Law or its application to any person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Law which can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application, and to this end the provisions of this Law are severable.

This law imposes penalties of second degree felony if a value of at least \$5,000 is obtained by the person using a false identity; otherwise, it is a felony of the third degree. In addition, the person found guilty of this crime must pay back the victim for the financial loss caused by the illegal use of identifying information. I. OVERVIEW

The Committee on Finance, Taxation, and Commerce held a Public Hearing on Friday, August 19, 2005, 9:30 a.m. at *I Liheslaturan Guåhan's* Public Hearing Room on Bill No. 135 (EC), "An Act Relative To Limiting The Availability Of An Individual's Social Security In order To Reduce Identity Theft". Notices of this public hearing were disseminated throughout all local media via facsimile and are attached herein.

a. Senators present:

II. SUMMARY OF VERBAL AND WRITTEN TESTIMONIES:

Following introductory remarks by Chairman Edward J.B. Calvo, Senator Judith Won Pat, author of Bill No. 135 (EC), discussed the importance of an individual's Social Security Number and that there is no other form of personal identification that plays such a significant role in a person's life. She expressed that one of the original purposes of the Social Security Numbers was to track employee earnings and eligibility for retirement. According to Senator Won Pat, Social Security Numbers are now being used for other purposes such as identification numbers on driver licenses, health insurance

cards, application forms, and contest entry forms. Senator Won Pat introduced similar legislation during the 26th Guam Legislature to discontinue the practice of printing an individual's Social Security Number on driver licenses. However, the Department of Revenue and Taxation issued new driver licenses at the time and continued the same practice. She congratulated the Department of Revenue and Taxation for taking the lead in protecting the privacy of the holders of driver licenses on Guam. She noted that other entities both public and private are still utilizing Social Security Numbers for identification purposes, which is the reason why she introduced Bill no. 135(EC). Senator Won Pat recognized that Social Security Numbers for internal verification purposes should be permissible, but that these numbers should not be publicly displayed or posted for viewing by the general public. Senator Won Pat concluded by encouraging her colleagues to support this measure, which would help limit the use of Social Security Numbers, thereby, reducing the threat of identity theft.

Following comments made by Senator Won Pat, Mr. John Carlos from the Department of Revenue and Taxation acknowledged that identity theft issues are facilitated by the availability of Social Security Numbers and other private information that are in view of the general public. Mr. Carlos also recognized current federal statutes that seek to address matters of identity theft found throughout the country. Mr. Carlos provided examples of how Social Security Numbers are made available such as on contest entry forms and personal checks, both of which are perfect recipes for identity theft. Mr. Carlos concluded his remarks in support of Bill no. 135 (EC).

Chairman Calvo recognized the gravity of identity theft in the United States and that personal information of individuals can be accessed via the internet. The Chairman also recognized that individuals who have access to information of individuals through the internet, which can negatively affect a person's bank account or even their reputation. The Chairman suggested that additional language be included regarding the dissemination of a person's Social Security Number through the internet, which should also be classified as a criminal offense.

Senator Robert Klitzkie provided comments in support of Bill no. 135 (EC) and recognized that the measure does not provide for criminal sanctions for those found guilty of identity theft. However, the measure will allow for the Attorney General to bring action for an injunctive relief. Senator Klitzkie explained that the real thrust of this bill is to avoid the unnecessary use of Social Security numbers, and that he is opposed to making it difficult on people by invoking criminal sanctions for what may be very innocent errors.

Chairman Edward J.B. Calvo extended his appreciation to those in attendance for presenting testimony on Bill no. 135 (EC). The Chairman informed the public that an additional ten (10) working days is provided for individuals wanting to submit written testimony on said legislation and subsequently moved to the next item on the agenda.

III. COMMITTEE FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee on Finance, Taxation, and Commerce finds that the broad use and public exposure of Social Security Numbers (SSN) has been a major contributor to the tremendous growth in identity theft and other forms of credit fraud. The widespread use of SSN in both the public and private sectors, combined with their key role in identity theft, has raised important concerns about the ability of identity thieves to gain access to the SSN of others. With the Social Security Number accessible to so many people, it is relatively easy for someone to fraudulently use another person's SSN to assume their identity and gain access to their bank account, credit accounts, utilities records, and other sources of personal information. Identity thieves can also establish new credit and bank accounts in their name. Therefore, it is the intent of the Committee to help reduce the risks to individuals of the inappropriate disclosure and misuse of Social Security Numbers by limiting their use and display.



AN ACT RELATIVE TO LIMITING THE AVAILABILITY OF AN INDIVIUDAL'S SOCIAL SECURITY INORDER TO REDUCE IDENITIY THEFT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

- 2 Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds
- 3 that nationwide the broad use and public exposure of Social Security
- 4 Numbers has been a major contributor to the tremendous growth in identity
- 5 theft and other forms of credit fraud. Therefore it is the intent of the I

- 8 their use and display.
- 9 Section 2. Limiting the Availability of an Individual's Social Security
- Number. (a) No person, including any public or private entity, shall:
- 11 (1) Publicly post or display in any manner an individual's Social
- 12 Security number.

(2) Print an individual's Social Security number on any card required for the individual to access products or services provided by the person or entity.

- (3) Print an individual's Social Security number on any materials that are mailed to the individual, unless Guam or federal law requires the Social Security number to be on the document to be mailed, except that applications and forms sent by mail may include Social Security numbers.
- (b). Nothing in this section shall prevent the government of Guam from using a Social Security number for internal verification and administrative purposes, so long as the use does not result in, or require the release of, the Social Security number to persons not designated by the public agency to perform associated functions authorized by law.
- (c) The Office of Attorney General shall enforce this act by bringing an action for injunctive relief in the Superior Court of Guam.
 - (d) This act takes effect ninety (90) days after enactment.
- **Section 3. Severability.** If any provision of this Law or its application to any person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Law which can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application, and to this end the provisions of this Law are severable.
