AN ACT TO REPEAL AND REENACT § 1103 AND TO ADD NEW §§ 1103.1 AND 1103.2, ALL OF CHAPTER 1, DIVISION 1, TITLE 10, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO THE MEDICAL REFERRAL ASSISTANCE OFFICE.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

- 2 Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan
- 3 recognizes that the provision of assistance to Guam residents in seeking medically
- 4 necessary off-island health care is needed and valuable to successful health quality
- 5 outcomes.

1	I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that the services provided by the Medical
2	Referral Assistance Office contract have evolved and many of the referral hospitals,
3	insurance companies, and local not-for-profits are currently providing these services
4	free of charge. Besides the obvious duplication of services, the government of Guam
5	contracted services are no longer wholly needed and are needlessly costing the
6	government.
7	I Liheslaturan Guåhan, however, finds that not all residents can partake in the
8	free services currently available given their individual circumstances or eligibility,
9	and thus the Medical Referral Assistance Office's assistance function is still needed.
10	The intent of this Act is to provide a mechanism for the Medical Referral
11	Assistance Office to streamline operations, maintain high quality referral assistance,

Assistance Office to streamline operations, maintain high quality referral assistance, and enhance cost savings. The FY 2016 3rd quarter report found that the average cost per patient per quarter to the Philippines was Four Hundred Seven Dollars and Fifteen Cents (\$407.15); Los Angeles averaged Six Hundred Ninety-three Dollars and Fifty-two Cents (\$693.52); and Honolulu averaged Seven Hundred Twelve

Therefore, in an effort to improve and maximize the services of the medical assistance provided to residents seeking care off-island, it is the intent of I Liheslaturan Guåhan to change the criteria for eligibility and benefit coverage of referral services to reflect current constraints and opportunities.

Dollars and Sixty-eight Cents (\$712.68).

Section 2. § 1103 of Chapter 1, Division 1, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, is hereby *repealed* and *reenacted* to read:

"§ 1103. Medical Referral Assistance Office. There is created the Medical Referral Assistance Office (MRAO) within the Office of *I Maga'låhen Guåhan* (the Governor of Guam). The MRAO *shall* assist residents of Guam in coordinating appropriate medical appointments, as well as coordinating temporary housing and transportation."

1	Section 3. A new § 1103.1 is added to Chapter 1, Division 1, Title 10, Guam
2	Code Annotated, to read:
3	"§ 1103.1. Provision of Assistance.
4	(a) The MRAO shall develop an eligibility algorithm that will apply
5	to those benefits a resident seeking off-island medical care qualifies for.
6	Residents with commercial health insurance benefits that cover transportation
7	and lodging fees are not eligible for direct assistance from the MRAO. They
8	may, however, qualify for education and coordination assistance.
9	(b) The MRAO shall develop a Health Insurance Portability and
10	Accountability Act (HIPAA) compliant quality improvement program that
11	will consist, at a minimum, of tracking patient issues and resolutions, and a
12	patient satisfaction survey that shall be offered to each patient serviced. The
13	MRAO or contracted not-for-profit provider shall provide each patient with a
14	brochure explaining the program, and contact information. The MRAO or
15	contracted not-for-profit provider shall also provide appropriate information
16	of the destination medical facility, transportation organization, lodging
17	facility, and the surrounding area.
18	(c) The MRAO shall develop and maintain reports that include the
19	number of referred patients served, the number of patient escorts or
20	accompanying family members served, and the average cost per patient
21	referral. The MRAO shall also maintain a monthly report containing the
22	following information:
23	(1) name of patient;
24	(2) gender and age of patient;
25	(3) date of referral;
26	(4) date assisted;
27	(5) name of accepting medical facility;

1	(6) insurance provider;
2	(7) number of escorts/family members;
3	(8) departure date; and
4	(9) service rendered.
5	(d) In providing assistance to Guam residents, the MRAO shall, to
6	the greatest extent practicable, coordinate with existing services provided by
7	insurance carriers, referring facilities, and local not-for-profit organizations.
8	These services are provided free of charge, and as such may only require
9	verification of availability and notice of services to the resident utilizing the
10	service.
11	(e) For those residents who are not eligible for existing services
12	provided by health insurance companies, referring facilities, or local not-for-
13	profits, the MRAO may:
14	(1) develop a request for proposal to provide assistance
15	services from a duly registered Guam-based not-for-profit organization
16	that can provide such services, including coordination of appointments,
17	transportation, and lodging. This proposal shall use a voucher type
18	system to provide direct services to residents seeking off-island care.
19	The contracted not-for-profit shall, to the greatest extent possible,
20	coordinate with existing services provided by insurance carriers and
21	referring facilities for the provision of transportation and lodging
22	services. A limit of fifteen percent (15%) of the negotiated proposal is
23	set for administrative overhead of such proposal; and
24	(2) provide services through the development of memoranda
25	of understanding or individual contracts with required off-island
26	transportation and lodging organizations to provide transportation and
27	lodging services. The MRAO shall develop internal assistance policies

1	and procedures to guide the operation of the office. This function shall
2	reside within the Guam-based MRAO and is subject to the fifteen
3	percent (15%) administrative overhead of the approved budgeted
4	amount appropriated in the Governor's budget submission for the
5	office."
6	Section 4. A new § 1103.2 is added to Chapter 1 of Division 1, Title 10,
7	Guam Code Annotated, to read:
8	"§ 1103.2. Term of Assistance.
9	(a) The MRAO is authorized to contract with a duly registered
10	Guam-based not-for-profit for assistance services provided pursuant to §
11	1103.1(e) of this Chapter. The term of said contract shall be set for five (5)
12	years, with annual renewal, subject to availability of funds.
13	(b) If the MRAO chooses to provide assistance services "in-house,"
14	the funding for the provision of such services is subject to the budgeted fifteen
15	percent (15%) administrative overhead (salary, equipment, supplies, etcetera),
16	and is subject to the availability of funds on an annual basis."
17	Section 5. Severability. If any provision of this Act or its application to any
18	person or circumstance is found to be invalid, or contrary to law, such invalidity
19	shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Act that can be given effect
20	without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this
21	Act are severable.
22	Section 6. Effective Date. This Act shall become effective upon
23	enactment; provided, however, that no government of Guam funding is authorized

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that does not follow the provisions and methodologies provided pursuant to this Act.

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
