AN ACT TO ADD A NEW § 3132 TO ARTICLE 1 OF CHAPTER 3, TITLE 5, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF OPERATIONAL CONTINUITY PLANS FOR EACH AGENCY OF THE GOVERNMENT OF GUAM.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

- 2 Section 1. Short Title. This Act shall be cited as the "Responsible 3 Operational Continuity Plans Act."
- 4 Section 2. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds
- 5 that the continuity of operations for the government of Guam in the event of any
- 6 emergency resulting from a natural or other disaster or hostile action is necessary for

the security of individuals and property on Guam. Additionally, some circumstances may adversely impact operational continuity for agencies that do not arise from emergency conditions, such as loss of personnel by attrition, breakdown of equipment, the loss of records due to a systems failure, unavailability of a facility necessary for the provision of services, or a reduction in available funding during the fiscal year due to unforeseen circumstances.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that in recent years, system failures have undermined quality and timely service at the Department of Public Health and Social Service's Office of Vital Statistics and the Department of Revenue and Taxation. The establishment of an operational continuity plan for each agency can address establishing protocols to minimize the loss of electronic records from such failures when they occur in the future.

I Liheslatura finds that on Monday, August 31, 2015, a fire had broken out in the Cabras 3 and 4 power stations. The temporary loss of the Cabras 3 and 4 power stations, respectively, posed significant challenges for the Guam Power Authority. The establishment of operational continuity plans for the loss of generating capacity under a number of alternative plausible scenarios could ultimately translate to better preparation of personnel and capital equipment in such events, if they may occasionally occur in the future.

I Liheslatura further finds that unforeseen circumstances, such as a natural or man-made disaster, a sudden downturn in tourism due to an unanticipated geopolitical situation, or the enactment of a large income tax cut while Guam's territorial income tax remains mirrored on the federal income tax, could have negative effects on the funding levels available to support government operations.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that, as Governor Edward J.B. Calvo wrote in a letter dated November 27, 2013 to Speaker Judith T.P. Won Pat, Ed.D. on this issue, "Public health and safety is a priority for this Administration and the Government of

Guam." In that spirit, *I Liheslatura* intends that the policy framework be established to ensure the health and safety of our community during and after disasters, natural or otherwise.

I Liheslatura further finds that such agency operational continuity plans as outlined in this Act may become components of an overall plan to assure the continuity of operations in government.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that operational continuity is a basic function of any agency of the government. Disasters occur, whether there are operational continuity plans in place or not. When a disaster occurs, a government that plans in advance is in a better position to respond than a government that is not guided by established procedures and plans.

It is, therefore, the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* that each agency of the government of Guam should establish and maintain an up-to-date operational continuity plan to achieve maximum operational continuity during events that would disrupt the ability of the agency to operate.

Section 3. Agency Operational Continuity Plans. A new § 3132 is hereby added to Article 1 of Chapter 3, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, to read:

"§ 3132. Agency Operational Continuity Plans.

The Director or equivalent officer of each agency and instrumentality of the government of Guam *shall* establish an operational continuity plan. Each such plan *shall* be reviewed annually for adequacy and so ratified by the governing board or, in the absence of a governing board, *I Maga'låhen Guåhan*, on or before October 1st with amendments. Copies of each plan, to include those annually reviewed, *shall* be transmitted to *I Maga'låhen Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* no later than five (5) working days following the ratification thereof. Such plan *shall* include, but not be limited to, provisions for:

1	(a)	events that would disrupt the ability of the agency to operate,			
2	such	as:			
3		(1) loss of personnel by retirement, whether known or			
4		unknown in advance, national guard deployment, military			
5		reserve deployment, sickness, death, or other contingencies;			
6		(2) loss, malfunction, or breakdown of equipment necessary

12		(5) unanticipated reduced funding levels during the fiscal year

16		foreseeable instances, such as a natural or other disaster or act,			
17		or omission of the agency or other entities, including hostile acts;

21	(b)	the maintenance of maximum operational continuity in the event

25	vulne	rabilities, pursuant to Subsection (a) of this Section, which pose a
