



**AN ACT TO *ADD* A NEW CHAPTER 54B TO TITLE 10,
GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO BANNING
SINGLE-USE CARRYOUT BAGS PROVIDED TO
CONSUMERS BY RETAIL ESTABLISHMENTS ON
GUAM; AND TO CITE THIS ACT AS THE “CHOOSE TO
REUSE: *MUNGNGA MA AYEK I PLASTEK* ACT OF 2018.”**

1 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:**

2 **Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent.** *I Liheslaturan Guáhan* finds
3 that the government of Guam has a duty to protect and support the natural
4 environment, the economy, and health of its citizens.

1 Since 1964, plastic production has increased twenty (20)-fold, reaching three
2 hundred eleven million (311,000,000) metric tons in 2014 – the equivalent of more
3 than nine hundred (900) Empire State Buildings, according to a January 2016 report
4 by the World Economic Forum (WEF) discussing the *New Plastic Economy*. The
5 United Nations (UN) Environment Programme estimates the annual damage of
6 plastics to marine ecosystems to be at least Thirteen Billion Dollars
7 (\$13,000,000,000) per year, and accounting for the cost includes lost revenue from
8 fisheries, tourism, and the cost of clean-up efforts. Likewise, the Asia-Pacific
9 Economic Cooperation (APEC) estimates that the cost of ocean plastics to the
10 tourism, fishing, and shipping industries in the Asia-Pacific region is One Billion
11 Two Hundred Sixty Million Dollars (\$1,260,000,000) annually.

12 Currently, there are more than one hundred fifty million (150,000,000) metric
13 tons of plastics in the ocean. During the 2016 International Coastal Cleanup, eight
14 thousand one hundred twelve (8,112) plastic grocery bags and other plastic bags
15 were collected on Guam’s coasts according to the Ocean Conservancy’s
16 International Coastal Cleanup 2017 Report. Without significant action to reduce the
17 flow, the ocean is expected to contain one (1) metric ton of plastic for every three
18 (3) metric tons of fish by 2025. By 2050, there is expected to be more plastic by
19 weight in the oceans of the world than fish, and consequently this will impact
20 ecosystems and food supplies. In a report detailing the threat of plastic on seabirds
21 published in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Science in 2015, ninety-
22 nine percent (99%) of all seabird species will have ingested plastic by the year 2050.
23 Effective waste management policies must be considered in order to curb the
24 detrimental impacts on marine wildlife from plastic litter entering the ocean.

25 Governments around the world are being asked by the UN Environment
26 Programme, through its Clean Seas campaign launched in February 2017, to engage
27 in the fight against marine plastic litter by passing local laws to reduce plastic

1 pollution. Many of Guam’s neighboring Pacific islands, as well as fellow U.S.
2 territories, have already enacted legislation to reduce the usage of plastic bags. This
3 includes the U.S. territories of Puerto Rico, American Samoa, and the U.S. Virgin
4 Islands; the state of Hawaii; the Republic of the Marshall Islands; Yap in the
5 Federated States of Micronesia; and most recently, Palau and Fiji. The
6 Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands is also in the process of passing a
7 plastic bag ban. In October 2017, the youth of Guam took a stance against the use of
8 plastic bags by passing a bill in the Guam Youth Congress to end the use of plastic
9 bags on Guam.

10 It is, therefore, the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to listen to the voice of our
11 youth and join those nations who are working towards reducing land-based plastics
12 from entering the ocean by incentivizing the use of reusable carryout bags at retail
13 establishments.

14 **Section 2.** A new Chapter 54B is *added* to Title 10, Guam Code Annotated,
15 to read:

16 **“CHAPTER 54B**

17 **CHOOSE TO REUSE: MUNGNGA MA AYEK I PLASTEK ACT OF 2018**

18 § 54B001. Short Title.

19 § 54B002. Definitions.

20 § 54B003. Requirements for Disposable Carryout Bags at Retail or
21 Wholesale Establishments.

22 § 54B004. Enforcement and Penalties.

23 § 54B005. Prohibition on the Distribution and Use of Disposable Plastic
24 Bags.

25 **§ 54B001. Short Title.**

26 This Chapter *shall* be known as the “Choose to Reuse: *Mungnga Ma Ayek I*
27 *Plastek* Act of 2018.”

1 **§ 54B002. Definitions.**

2 For the purposes of this Chapter:

3 (a) *Agency* means the Guam Environmental Protection Agency;

4 (b) *disposable carryout bag* means any bag that is provided to a
5 consumer by a retail or wholesale establishment at the point of sale to carry
6 purchases. A disposable carryout bag *shall not* include any of the following:

7 (1) a bag provided to the consumer for use in a retail or
8 wholesale establishment to package bulk items, such as fruits,
9 vegetables, nuts, grains, candy, meats, poultry, or fish;

10 (2) a bag provided to the consumer for use in a retail or
11 wholesale establishment to package small hardware items;

12 (3) a bag to contain or wrap flowers, potted plants, or other
13 items where dampness may be a problem;

14 (4) a bag to contain non-prepackaged food items or bakery
15 goods;

16 (5) a bag provided by a pharmacy to carry prescription drugs;

17 (6) a bag used for newspapers;

18 (7) a bag used for laundry dry-cleaning;

19 (8) bags sold in packages containing multiple bags intended
20 for garbage, pet waste, or yard waste;

21 (9) a bag used to package and secure fragile merchandise;

22 (10) a bag used to help insulate frozen items; or

23 (11) a reusable carryout bag as defined by this Chapter;

24 (c) *reusable carryout bag* means a bag specifically designed and
25 manufactured for multiple reuse, and is made of cloth, fiber, or other machine
26 washable fabric;

1 (d) *retail establishment* means any entity that engages in the
2 business of selling tangible property to others for consumption or use by the
3 purchaser, and not for resale;

4 (e) *wholesale establishment* means any entity that engages in the
5 business of selling tangible property for the purpose of resale.

6 **§ 54B003. Requirements for Disposable Carryout Bags at Retail or**
7 **Wholesale Establishments.**

8 Retail or wholesale establishments may offer for sale or distribute
9 reusable carryout bags to consumers. Retail or wholesale establishments *shall*
10 *not* offer for sale or distribute disposable carryout bags unless such bags meet
11 the following criteria:

12 (a) Disposable carryout bags made of paper.

13 (b) Disposable carryout bags made of plastic, including plastics
14 made from bio-based polymers, *shall* be biodegradable or compostable; and
15 if otherwise not biodegradable or compostable, be made of high-density
16 polyethylene (HDPE) film marked with the SPI resin identification code 2.

17 **§ 54B004. Enforcement and Penalties.**

18 The Agency *shall* be responsible for the enforcement of the provisions of this
19 Chapter. Any entity violating the provisions of this Chapter *shall* be subject to a civil
20 penalty not to exceed Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) for the first offense; an amount
21 not to exceed One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) for the second offense; and an amount
22 not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) for any offense thereafter during a
23 one (1)-year period. No more than one (1) penalty shall be imposed upon any entity
24 within a seven (7)-day period. Any entity who was provided with a notice of
25 violation and imposed a civil penalty under this Chapter may appeal this decision
26 and request a hearing from the Agency pursuant to the Agency's procedures. Fees
27 collected under this Section *shall* be deposited into the Recycling Revolving Fund

1 to be used for the enforcement of this Chapter. The Administrator of the Agency, in
2 coordination with the Chief Technology Officer of the Office of Technology, *shall*
3 establish and promote an email address or other tool for digital reporting that
4 consumers and businesses may utilize to report violations, or to ask questions
5 regarding the implementation of this Chapter, with a prompt response from the
6 Agency.

7 **§ 54B005. Prohibition on the Distribution and Use of Disposable Plastic**
8 **Bags.**

9 Beginning on January 1, 2021, no retail establishment, wholesale
10 establishment, or any other entity licensed under Chapter 70 of Title 11, Guam Code
11 Annotated, to do business shall purchase or sell or distribute to consumers any
12 disposable carryout plastic bag, except disposable carryout bags listed in §
13 54B002(b)(1) through (11) of this Chapter, within Guam. Any entity found in
14 violation of this Section *shall* be subject to a civil penalty pursuant to §54B004 of
15 this Chapter. All fees collected pursuant to this Chapter *shall* be deposited in the
16 Recycling Revolving Fund.”

17 **Section 3. Effective Date.** This Act *shall* become effective on January 1,
18 2019.
