Dear Madame Speaker:

I am pleased to sign into law Bill 169-35, An Act to Add a New § 104115.1 to Article 1 of Chapter 104, Title 21, Guam Code Annotated, Relative to Public Awareness of Radon Risks and the Reporting of Radon Results, Upon the Sale of Real Property. The bill is now **Public Law 35-42**.

Radon is an odorless and tasteless gas that is emitted from the soil, rocks, and from some concrete buildings present on Guam. Furthermore, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, some areas on Guam have high concentrations of radon due to our geology.

This legislation would help to increase awareness of this potentially dangerous substance and mandate the testing and reporting of this gas--a gas which is the first leading cause of lung cancer in non-smokers and the second leading cause in smokers. Radon is a health risk, as it is not detectable and does not cause noticeable symptoms until its transformation into lung cancer.

As your Governor and a registered nurse, I am glad to empower property owners with the information they need to keep their families safe from the potential dangers of radon exposure. We all deserve the power that comes from informed choices.

AN ACT TO ADD A NEW § 104115.1 TO ARTICLE 1 OF CHAPTER 104, TITLE 21, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO PUBLIC AWARENESS OF RADON RISKS AND THE REPORTING OF RADON RESULTS, UPON THE SALE OF REAL PROPERTY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

- 2 Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds
- 3 that radon is a radioactive, colorless, and odorless gas and a known carcinogen,
- 4 considered by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) as the
- 5 second leading cause of lung cancer in the United States. In addition to cancer, recent

studies reveal that radon could impede the function of other vital organs, such as the

2 thyroid gland that produces hormones that control heart rate, blood pressure, body

3 temperature, metabolism, and weight. On Guam, a 2009 radon exposure survey

4 conducted by the Guam Environmental Protection Agency (GEPA) found nearly

one-third of all structures tested on Guam were above the recommended action level

of four (4) picocuries per liter of air. Radon levels were highest in villages in the

northern half of Guam, where two-thirds of Guam's population reside.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that information empowers our community to educate and protect themselves against the threat of radon. As such, I Liheslatura seeks to mandate that information regarding the potential for exposure to radon be made available to the purchaser, and that radon testing results also be made available, upon the sale of real property.

Section 2. A new § 104115.1 is hereby *added* to Article 1 of Chapter 104, Title 21, Guam Code Annotated, to read:

"§ 104115.1. Information on Radon Upon the Sale of Residential Real Property.

- (a) Every purchaser of any interest in residential real property on which a residential dwelling exists *shall* be notified by the selling broker, in writing, that said property may present the potential for exposure to radon.
- (b) The Guam Environmental Protection Agency (Agency) *shall* develop the content of written information that the selling broker *shall* provide to the buyer, in accordance with Subsection (a) of this Section, of any interest in residential real property on which a residential dwelling exists. The information *shall* describe potential hazards of exposure to radon, methods and resources for radon testing and remediation, and any other relevant information the Agency deems appropriate.

(c) The seller of any interest in residential real property on which a residential dwelling exists is required to provide the buyer with any information on radon from tests or inspections conducted on such property or dwelling in the seller's possession, and notify the buyer of any known radon hazards.

- (d) Nothing in this Section is intended to or shall be construed to imply an obligation on the seller to conduct any radon testing or mitigation activities."
- **Section 3. Effective Date.** This Act *shall* be effective three (3) months after enactment.
 - **Section 4. Severability.** If any provision of this Act or its application to any person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such invalidity *shall not* affect other provisions or applications of this Act that can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Act are severable.
