AN ACT TO *REPEAL* AND *REENACT* § 76602 OF ARTICLE 6, CHAPTER 76, TITLE 21, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO RESTORING FUNDING COLLECTED FOR BUILDING PERMIT FEES TO THE GUAM PRESERVATION TRUST FUND.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

2 Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds 3 that the Guam Preservation Trust was created thirty-one (31) years ago to protect 4 and preserve Guam's historical sites, culture, ethnography and oral history for the benefit of our people and for future generations. As a nonprofit corporation 5 6 established by Public Law 20-151, amended by Public Law 21-07, and codified into 7 law as Article 6, Chapter 76, Division 2 of Title 21 of the Guam Code Annotated 8 and further re-codified by Public Law 27-89, the Guam Preservation Trust received its income from fees and fines collected pursuant to 21 GCA §§ 66408 and 76211. 9

In addition to the revenue provided from fees and fines, the Guam Preservation Trust was mandated to seek outside grants and donations; acquire title to threatened Guam properties for the preservation of their historical value, whether in fee simple, by leasehold, or by easement, and whether through donation, transfer, dedication or purchase; to award grants for historic property documentation and

historic register nomination, architectural and archeological history 1 and 2 documentation of historic structures and sites; protection of historic structures and 3 sites through stabilization, rehabilitation, reconstruction or restoration, including 4 lighting when appropriate on such sites being utilized for non-profit and noncommercial purposes, such as private homes, schools, churches, public building and 5 6 facilities, ethnography and oral history; archival and archaeological research and investigations for locating, recording and protecting sites of historic or prehistoric 7 value; and to support other activities directly related to increasing the public 8 9 appreciation of, and benefit from historic places including public interpretation and presentation. 10

11 I Liheslatura further finds that the Guam Preservation Trust has completed 12 the following capital projects since its inception: the historic Guam Congress 13 Building (Guam Legislature), Historic Lujan House, Hagåtna; Plaza de Espaňa, 14 Hagåtna; Agana Cathedral Basilica, Hagåtna, Palacio Feasibility Study, Hagåtna; Takaifak Bridge, Hågat; San Dionisio Church, Humåtak; Fort Nuestra de la Solidad, 15 16 Humåtak; Magellan Monument, Humåtak; Humåtak Revitalization Plan; Malesso Kombento, Malesso; Malesso Belltower, Malesso; M.G. Cook School, Malesso, 17 18 Inalåhan Revitalization Plan; Saint Joseph Church, Inalåhan; Mayor Doris Flores 19 Lujan House, Inalåhan; Juan Flores House, Inalåhan; Inalåhan Community Center, Inalåhan; Antonia Chargualaf House, Inalåhan; Asanoma House, Inalåhan, Ana 20 Leon Guerrero House, Inalåhan, Jose Cruz House Inalåhan; Joseph Flores House, 21 22 Inalåhan; Josefina Flores House, Inalåhan; Pågat, Yigo (Landmark Lawsuit to save Pågat village from the construction of a firing range complex); Chaguian Massacre 23 Site Yigo (National Register of Historic Places); Manenggon Concentration Camp, 24 25 Yona (National Register of Historic Places/National Historic Landmark), and the 26 Atantåno Heritage Preserve, Santa Rita/Piti.

The Guam Preservation Trust has also facilitated the Marianas History
 Conference, Micronesian Island Fair, Pacific Heritage Youth Summit, Guam
 History Day, Pacific Preservation Summit/Training Series, World Heritage
 Workshop, Archaeology Field Technician Training, and Ekugnok Estoria-ta (Listen
 to our Stories) *CHamoru* Language Project.

I Liheslatura further finds that the Guam Preservation Trust is currently
working to address the repairs and reconstruction of the F.Q. Sanchez, *Humåtak*,
Rosario House, *Hagåtna*, Jose and Josefina San Nicolas House, *Inalåhan*; and the
George Flores House, *Inalåhan*.

I Liheslatura further finds that the Guam Preservation Trust Property
Acquisition Program has acquired the following properties to the Trust inventory: *Atantåno* Lot 15 and Lot 16 (Property Value (\$9,908,701) Rosario House Lot 55 and
62 (Property Value: \$161,325), San Nicolas House Lot 38 (Property Value:
\$11,903), San Nicolas House Lot 39 (\$51,962) George Flores House (Property
Value \$89,844), Richard Conrad Perez Salas, Jr. Land Donation (Property Value
\$281,561) Taniguchi Kinya Trustee Donation (Building Value \$24,080)

In addition, the Guam Preservation Trust is working with a private landowner in partnership with the Department of Defense's Readiness Environmental Protection Integration (REPI) program Protection on a proposed 100-acre Conservation Easement Project to acquire and protect the archeological sites at *Hila'an*.

The Preservation Trust has also funded projects for archaeological research, public interpretation and presentation, archival research, architecture research and historic property documentation and register nomination of historic places.

I Liheslatura further finds that subsequent legislatures have since appropriated
 Guam Preservation Trust funds for non-related purposes to include the passage of

Public Law 33-19 that authorized up to One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) for the
 demolition of the Manuel F.L. Guerrero Administration Building.

3 I Liheslatura further finds that Public Law 33-66, further reduced Guam Preservation Trust funds from One Hundred Percent (100%) to fifty percent (50%) 4 5 of all fees collected with One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) to be transferred to the Historic Preservation Archaeological Mitigation Fund in equal 6 monthly installments; the creation of a DPW Building and Design Fee Account that 7 reduced the funds provided to the Preservation Trust by twenty-five percent (25%) 8 for the purpose of hiring licensed professional engineers in the unclassified service 9 at DPW; and the creation of the Guam Museum Fund that further reduced Guam 10 Preservation Trust funds by an additional twenty-five percent (25%). The substantial 11 12 decrease of funding by half of its operational revenue to the Guam Preservation Trust was incorporated into the budget bill for Fiscal Year ending September 30, 2016, 13 with no public notice, no public hearing or input from the Historic Preservation 14 Board or the general public. 15

16 Public Law 33-120 further appropriated an additional Three Hundred 17 Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) from the Guam Preservation Trust Fund to the 18 Department of Public Works for the repair of the *Umåtac* Bridge Towers.

I Liheslatura further finds that the 33rd Guam Legislature, within a two-year period, appropriated a total of \$5.8 million from the Guam Preservation Trust Fund that was unrelated to the Preservation Trust mandates further impacting its ability to carry out its mission to protect and preserve Guam's historical sites.

Therefore, *I Liheslatura* intends to *repeal* and *reenact* 21 GCA § 76602 to fully restore funding to the Guam Preservation Trust Fund to ensure the continuity of the protection and preservation of Guam's historical sites, culture, ethnography and oral history for the benefit of our people and for future generations.

- Section 2. § 76602 of Article 6, Chapter 76, Title 21, Guam Code 1 2 Annotated, is *repealed* and *reenacted* to read:

3 "§ 76602. Guam Preservation Trust Income. (a) Fifty percent (50%) of all fees collected pursuant to § 66408 of Division 2 of Title 21 of the Guam 4 5 Code Annotated, shall be deposited in the Guam Preservation Trust Fund. Fines collected under § 76211 of Division 2 of Title 21 of the Guam Code 6 7 Annotated, shall be deposited into the Guam Preservation Trust Fund. Guam 8 Preservation Trust funds shall be maintained separate and apart from all other 9 government funds. The Department of Administration, as custodian for the 10 fees and fines collected pursuant to this Section, shall transfer all such funds to the Trust no less than on a quarterly basis. Any and all interest accrued on 11 12 such funds shall also be transferred to the Trust. The amounts within the Guam 13 Preservation Trust Fund shall be used by the Trust only for the purposes 14 expressed in this Article 6, and shall not be subject to any transfer authority 15 of I Maga'låhen Guåhan (the Governor).

- 16 (b) Revenue for Historic Preservation Archaeological Mitigation Fund. One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) of the fees collected pursuant to 17 subsection (a) of this Section shall be transferred to the Historic Preservation 18 19 Archaeological Mitigation Fund in equal monthly installments.
- § 76602. Guam Preservation Trust Income. Notwithstanding any 20 other provision of law, one-hundred percent (100%) of all fees collected 21 pursuant to § 66408 of Division 2 of Title 21 of the Guam Code Annotated, 22 shall be deposited in the Guam Preservation Trust Fund. Fines collected under 23 § 76211 of Division 2 of Title 21 of the Guam Code Annotated, shall be 24 deposited into the Guam Preservation Trust Fund. Guam Preservation Trust 25 funds shall be maintained separate and apart from all other government funds. 26 The Department of Administration, as custodian for the fees and fines 27

collected pursuant to this Section, shall transfer all such funds to the Trust no
 less than on a quarterly basis. Any and all interest accrued on such funds shall
 also be transferred to the Trust. The amounts within the Guam Preservation
 Trust Fund shall be used by the Trust only for the purposes expressed in this
 Article 6, and shall not be subject to any transfer authority of *I Maga'håga Guåhan* (the Governor)."

Section 3. Severability. If any provision of this Act or its application
to any person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such
invalidity *shall not* affect other provisions or applications of this Act that can
be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end
the provisions of this Act are severable.
