Buenas yan Hafa Adai Madame Speaker:

It is widely accepted that diversity in business ownership encourages true competition, innovation and economic progress. The corollary is that the absence of diversity limits how much all of us can collectively achieve. Bill 71-36 would fill a gap in Guam that has long been implemented at the federal level by the U.S. Small Business Administration -- adopting a procurement policy that evens the playing field for women-owned businesses, which are historically underrepresented in industry. While women-owned businesses achieved unprecedented growth nationally in the years prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, women remained perennially underrepresented as business owners. Unfortunately, while most businesses experienced setbacks due to the public health emergency, women-led businesses were dealt a disproportionate blow, the impact of which cannot be overstated and may not be fully appreciated for years to come.

It is important to do what we can now to bolster the ability of these businesses to survive the setbacks of the pandemic and to regain their footing when the crisis is over. To be clear, Bill No. 71-36 is not a novelty, but rather brings Guam in line with corresponding U.S. SBA policy, with similar policies already existing in Guam for Service-Disabled Veteran Owned Businesses.





**AN ACT TO *ADD* A NEW § 5013 TO SUBARTICLE A OF
ARTICLE 1, CHAPTER 5, TITLE 5, GUAM CODE
ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO ADOPTING A
PROCUREMENT POLICY IN FAVOR OF WOMEN-
OWNED BUSINESSES, AND TO CITE THIS ACT AS
"*THE SUPPORT FOR WOMEN-OWNED BUSINESSES*
ACT."**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Short Title. This Act *shall* be known as the "*Support for Women-
Owned Businesses Act.*"

Section 2. Legislative Findings and Intent. *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* finds that women-owned businesses have been at a distinct disadvantage in Guam's economy. A review of data from the 2017 Economic Census of Guam conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau confirms that the percentage of women-owned businesses on Guam is only about seventeen percent (17%) and depending on the industry, ranges from nine percent (9%) to twenty-two percent (22%). With regard to industry categorization, in 2017 women-owned businesses represented only nine percent (9%) of local construction businesses; nineteen percent (19%) of local manufacturing and retail businesses; seventeen percent (17%) of local wholesale businesses; thirteen percent (13%) of local finance and insurance businesses; eighteen percent (18%) of local real estate companies; and twenty-two percent (22%) of local health care companies (the highest percentage of women-owned businesses in this census).

I Liheslatura further finds that current research has shown that the COVID-19 pandemic has taken a higher toll on women-owned businesses. According to a recent survey by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, the number of female business owners who ranked their business's overall health as "somewhat or very good" fell thirteen (13) points during the COVID-19 pandemic, from sixty percent (60%) in January to forty-seven percent (47%) in July 2020. By contrast, the number of male business owners reporting a "good" business health status only fell five (5) points in the same period, from sixty-seven percent (67%) to sixty-two percent (62%). The U.S. Chamber study also reported that female small business owners are also less likely to expect future success in the coming year compared to male owners with regard to revenue, investments, and staffing.

I Liheslatura further finds that programs designed to increase minority participation in government procurement help to address the traditional imbalance

1 of low minority firm participation and helps such businesses grow through greater
2 access to the large market of government contracts.

3 Therefore, it is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to add a new § 5013 to
4 Subarticle A of Article 1, Chapter 5, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, to adopt a
5 procurement policy in favor of women-owned businesses.

6 **Section 3.** A new § 5013 is hereby *added* to Subarticle A of Article 1,
7 Chapter 5, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, to read:

8 **“§ 5013. Policy In Favor of Women-Owned Businesses.**

9 (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, if any entity of the
10 government of Guam or any entity expending governmental funds intends to
11 procure any supply or service which is offered by a business concern that is
12 at least fifty-one percent (51%) owned by women, that entity *shall* procure
13 such supply or service from that business concern if the supply or service is
14 available within the period required by the procuring entity and the price for
15 the supply or service *does not* exceed one hundred five percent (105%) of the
16 lowest price bidder, and *shall* be in addition to any other procurement benefit
17 the women-owned business may qualify for under Guam law. The procuring
18 entity shall determine the lowest price to the entity in the case of more than
19 one (1) women-owned business, or a women-owned business and a service-
20 disabled veteran owned business, who are competing for the same government
21 contract.

22 (b) **Qualifications of a Women-Owned Business.** A business
23 concern is qualified under Subsection (a) of this Section if:

- 24 (1) the business concern is licensed to do business on Guam;
25 (2) the business concern maintains its headquarters on Guam;

1 (3) the business concern is at least fifty-one percent (51%)
2 owned by women, who manage day-to-day operations and make long-
3 term decisions;

4 (4) the business concern is certified as a Women-Owned
5 Small Business (WOSB) or an Economically Disadvantaged Women-
6 Owned Small Business (EDWOSB) by the U.S. Small Business
7 Administration; and

8 (5) the owner(s) of the business concern has (have) filed
9 individual tax returns on Guam for a period of at least three (3)
10 consecutive years.”

11 **Section 4. Effective Date.** This Act *shall* be effective upon enactment.


