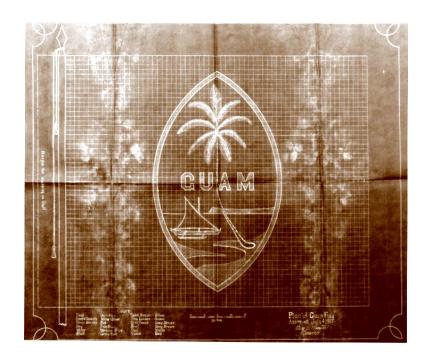

Hafa Adai. Pursuant to 5 GCA Chapter 4 §4107, transmitted herewith is the proposed Fiscal Year 2010 program and financial plan for the government of Guam.

The past two years for the government of Guam has witnessed the ups and downs of both the tourism and military economy, from credit watch to watch release, from consent decree to receivership, from bond upgrade to market crash, and more recently a change of Administration whose policies may alter the world stage in a way no one can predict.

While the government of Guam financials has made marked improvements, the global economic, military, and political situations continue to threaten Guam's economic stability and sustainability. The rapidly evolving and very fluid situations occurring worldwide could affect Guam's economic and financial outlook over the near term and have a lingering effect over the long term way beyond FY 2010. Global challenges affecting interest rates and exchange rates, bailout packages and bankruptcy declarations, home foreclosures, rising unemployment, and tax policy changes are just some of many factors that could render even the most confident forecaster apprehensive.

Just as Guam's financial outlook was showing strength with revenue collections on the rise in each of the immediate past four years and reinforced by the promising potentials of the military buildup, the September financial market crash dealt a blow to major world economies and its trickle down effects are yet to be seen, let alone measured. As a result, the FY 2010 budget was crafted with very guarded assumptions of potential revenues and employs the usual frugal distribution of precious resources in these uncertain times.

The revenue forecast for FY 2010 reflects a 2% increase over FY 2009 adopted levels. Gross revenues are expected to reach \$533 million from which \$522 million will go to government operations and \$10.7 million to deficit reduction pursuant to PL. 29-113. Recent adjustments to the General Fund's deficit elimination pro-forma factored the

preliminary unaudited financials for FY 2008, the adopted budget for FY 2009, and the potential for \$246 million in bond proceeds for deficit reduction authorized by PL 29-113. The updated deficit pro-forma indicate that by Fiscal Year 2014 the deficit will be brought to a more manageable level at \$160 million and its complete elimination is conceivable by FY 2017. The deficit pro-forma was an integral component of the presentation made to ratings giant Standard and Poors on the state of Guam's financials which resulted in the bond upgrade Guam received in October 2008.

Of the \$533 million in General Fund projected revenues, deficit reduction receives \$11 million (2%), education receives \$219 million (42%); health receives \$96 million (18%); public safety receives \$70 million (14%); while all others receive \$137 million (26%).

Special Fund sources projected at \$108 million is at the same level as FY 2009. Federal Matching Grants-In-Aid is at \$37.7 million up from \$34.1 million in FY 2009 primarily attributable to various indigent programs at the Department of Public Health and Social Services including Food Stamp, Public Assistance, and Medicaid.

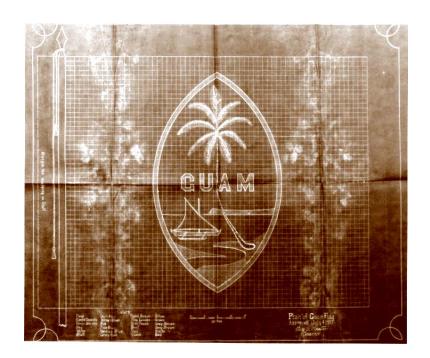
The long term economic / financial outlook is with guarded optimism with most credit to the impending military buildup. The short term outlook is not as predictable with that credited to market uncertainties and unknown trickle down effects of the new Administration's tax policies and stimulus initiatives.

As always, my Administration looks forward to constructive and productive dialogue in the coming months on the FY 2010 budget and other fiscal issues facing our great Territory of Guam.

BUDGET PROCESS



THE BUDGET PROCESS

As required under law (5 GCA §4103 & §4106), the Governor directs the preparation and administration of the Executive Budget for the government of Guam on an annual basis. The Executive Budget represents the Governor's financial proposal with priorities for recommended allocating resources. The budget process is important and necessary for the enactment of a budget and review of government operations.

The Budget Process for FY2010 occurs in four essential phases: formulation, adoption, execution, and audit.

During the **formulation phase** the economic forecast and the program and financial plans are prepared for the various departments. Economic data and statistics are utilized in developing projected revenues for the upcoming fiscal year.

Once revenues have been projected, a budget call is distributed to all the line agencies. This process starts when the Bureau of Budget & Management Research (BBMR) issues guidelines to each line agency in the preparation and development of their respective budgets.

The formulation phase culminates in the transmittal of the Program and Financial Plan (Executive Budget) with the Governor's Budget Message to the Legislature for its consideration.

The **adoption phase** is the process in which the Legislature considers the Governor's proposal and passes the overall revenue and spending plan under a General Appropriations Bill. The Bill usually

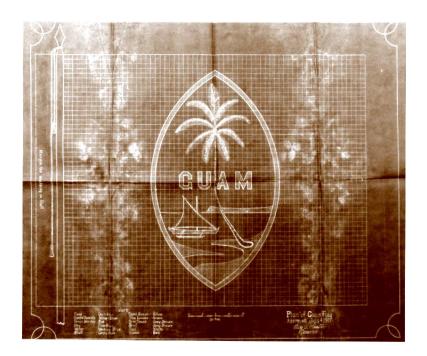
receives more detailed hearings within the auspices of the applicable legislative committees. Usually, a series of hearings will be called during which department heads and staff members give an overview of the Governor's proposed budget and are expected to provide explanations when their department's / agency's appropriations are Finally, the Legislature may considered. pass a General Appropriations Bill. The Bill is then transmitted to the Governor for approval. Other bills include to amendments during the fiscal year may be introduced for enactment into law.

The execution phase involves the release of appropriated per funds the General Appropriations Act. Each department prepares allotment of appropriations and may request revisions, legislative or administrative transfers, or supplemental appropriations. BBMR must approve such revisions to allotments. The Bureau also monitors and assists agencies in carrying out the approved budget in line with the established policies of the Governor.

The audit phase involves the evaluation of departments / agencies to identify areas in need of improving compliance procedures with applicable laws and regulations. During the audit phase, financial transactions, accounts and reports are analyzed improve assessed and to accountability, effectiveness, and efficiency in the achievement of goals and objectives. This phase is also to assure economic use of resources to enhance achievement of public services.

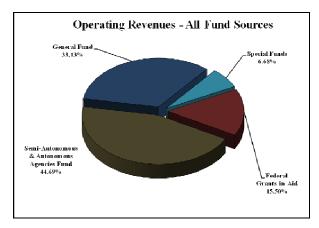

REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE OVERVIEW

The Government of Guam's operating revenues are composed of four classifications: General Fund, Special Funds, Federal Grant-in-Aid, and Semi-autonomous and Autonomous Agencies Operating Funds.



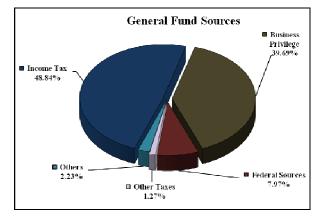

General Fund

The General Fund is the fund into which all government revenues, not otherwise restricted by statute, are deposited and from which appropriations are made. The Government of Guam is the only taxing authority and there are no separate municipal, county, school district or improvement district taxes.

The three primary sources of General Fund revenues are Income Taxes, Business Privilege Taxes, also known as gross receipt tax (GRT), and Federal Sources. Income taxes account for 48.84% and Business privilege taxes for approximately 39.69% of total General Fund revenues. Under the Organic Act, Guam's Income Tax Code mirrors the United States Internal Revenue Code. As a result, the income tax laws in force in the United States are applied to the residents of the Island, however, payable to the Treasury of Guam. Gross receipts taxes are levied on a broad base of goods and services, including the sale of tangible personal property and the provision of professional service. The Fiscal Year 2010 revenue forecast is reflective of collection experience up through the month of December 2008. The revenue tracking will be updated as actual data is received. This information will be made available as part of the upcoming budget process and dialogue between the Executive Branch and the Legislature for the Fiscal Year 2010 Budget.

Federal Sources include Section 30 funds. Section 30 of the Organic Act of Guam requires that all customs duties and Federal income taxes, quarantine, passport, immigration, and naturalization fees collected on Guam shall be covered into the Treasurer of Guam. These include federal income taxes from military personnel based on-island or consider Guam as their state of legal residence.



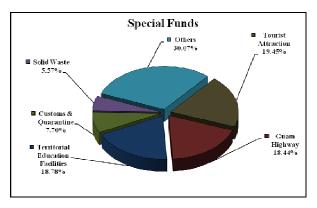

Special Revenue Funds

Special Revenue Funds are created by statute or Executive Order with an identified source of revenue or appropriation. Expenditures from such funds are restricted to purposes set by statute or as sources for debt service payment for bonds issued for constructing and improving major facilities and infrastructure. Several of the most significant Special Revenue Funds include the Tourist Attraction Fund, Guam Highway Fund,

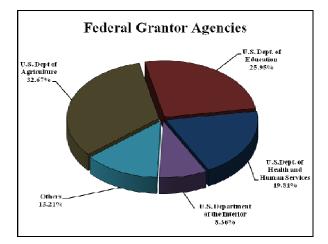
Territorial Educational Facilities Fund, Customs & Quarantine Inspections Fund and the Solid Waste Management Fund.

Federal Grants-in-Aid

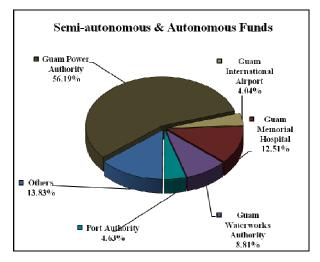
Federal Grants-in-Aid are funds received by the Government for public service delivery, either for specific programs or for general purpose aid. Federal Grant funds, which may require local matching funds, are requested through various Federal agencies and are spent according to the terms and conditions approved by the respective Federal grantor agency. Major Federal grantor agencies include the United States Department of Agriculture, Education, Interior and Health and Human Services.

Semi-autonomous and Autonomous Agencies Operating Fund

These funds are financed and operated in a manner similar to a private business enterprise where the cost of providing services to the public on a continuing basis is financed or recovered primarily through user charges. Autonomous agencies such as the Guam Power Authority, Guam International Airport, and Guam Waterworks Authority generate revenues to fund operational and capital requirements. Other agencies, such as the Guam Visitor's Bureau, University of Guam and Guam Community College, require subsidies from the General Fund and other external sources to meet their operational requirements. Most autonomous agencies will prepare for their Fiscal Year 2010 budgets between the months of April through June. Listed below are operational budget amounts from the semi-autonomous and autonomous agencies for FY 2009.

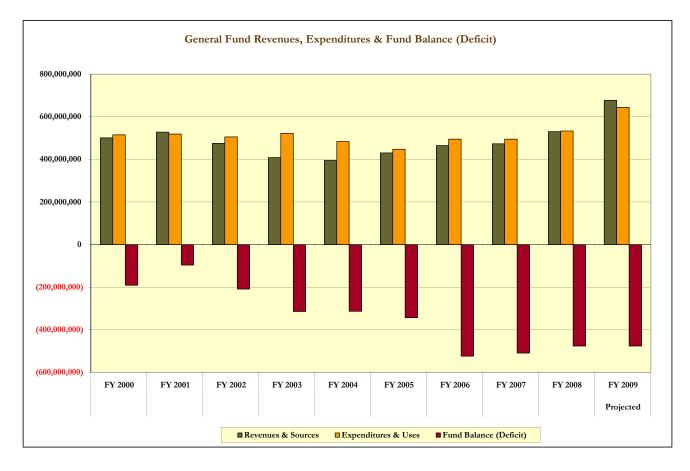
Government of Guam Revenues, Expenditures and Fund Balance (Deficit) Fiscal Years 1999 - 2009

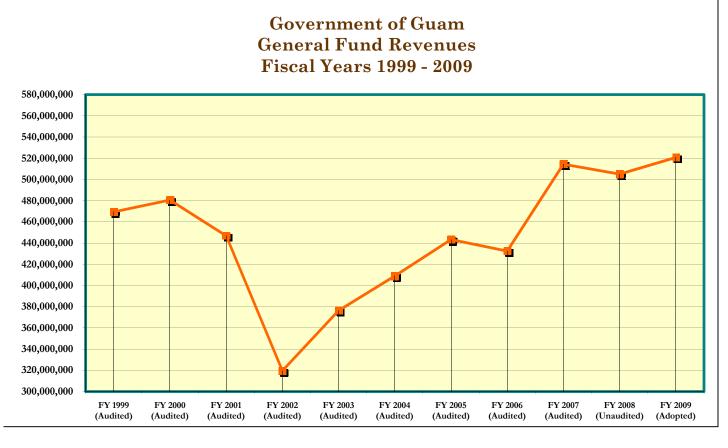

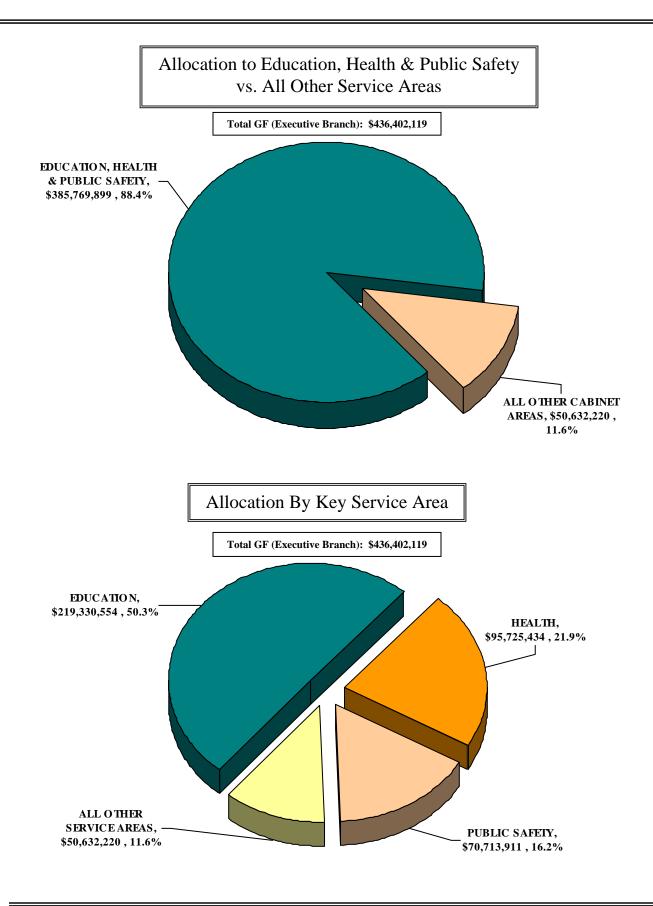

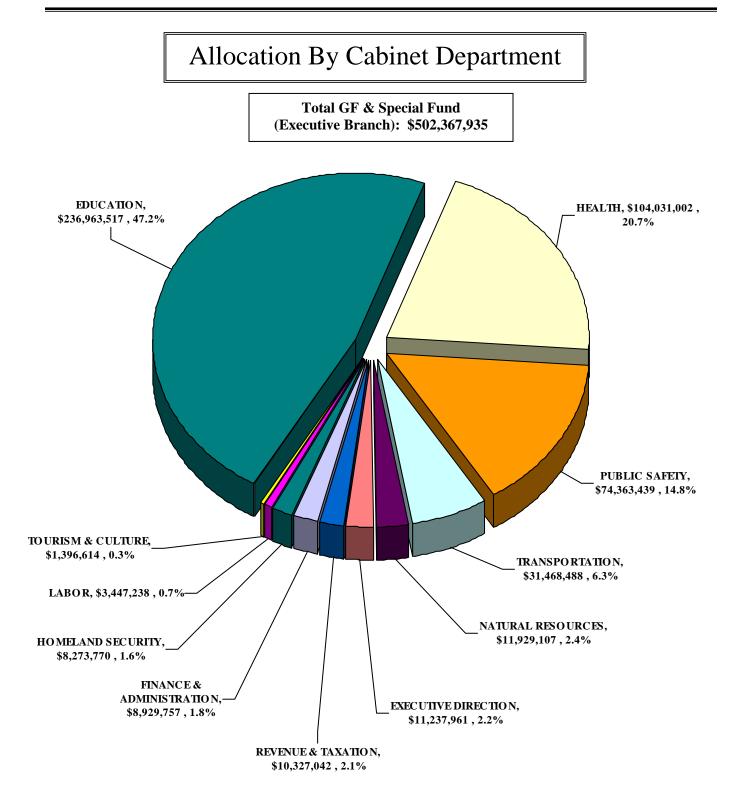
FY 2010 GENERAL FUND (GF) ALLOCATION



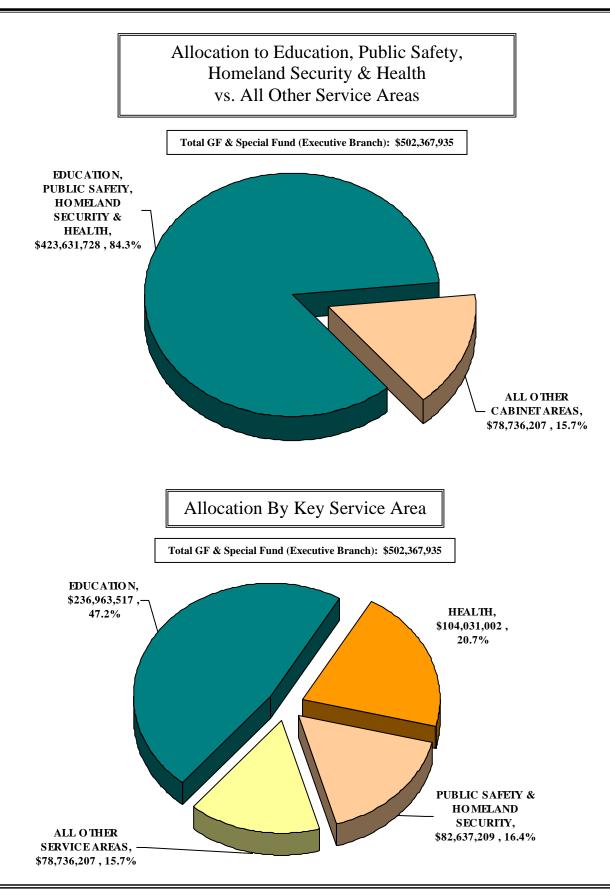
FY 2010 GENERAL FUND (GF) ALLOCATION



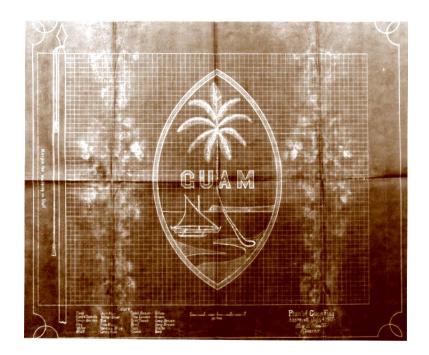
FY 2010 GENERAL FUND (GF) & SPECIAL FUND ALLOCATION

ECONOMIC OUTLOOK



The Fiscal Year 2010 economic outlook for Guam, in the aggregate, appears reasonably likely to experience a temporary flattening of the growth curve established in recent years with accelerating growth in late 2010 expected contingent on commencement of scheduled Marine relocation construction. Recent years have shown consistent annual growth in the Government of Guam General Fund revenues. Based on current trends and available planning information, economic activity may continue near the plateau level reached in 2008 through 2009 and 2010 The previously anticipated growth for Fiscal Year 2010 is expected to be negatively impacted by current economic and financial issues in the U.S. Reduced tourism arrivals and associated employment and revenue in recent months appear likely to continue going forward and may be off-set in the economy as a whole by increased federal defense related and local government construction.

The outlook is somewhat tenuous as a number of issues in the global economic, financial, military, and political situations are currently evolving rapidly and are in a fluid state. How these situations evolve could considerably affect the outlook for FY 2010.

These issues are not limited to the following but these are of special note:

- the international financial situation including banking systems, interest rates and credit
- exchange rates
- recessions in the United States, Japan, a looming recession in South Korea, slashed growth rates in China
- major restructuring, bailout packages, possible bankruptcy in the U.S. automotive industry
- continued foreclosures in the U.S. housing industry
- political situations which could disrupt the production or distribution of oil
- changes in U.S. tax code
- economic stimulus programs in the U.S. and abroad
- leadership changes in the U.S. and Japan
- possible unforeseen natural disasters and health issues
- international military and political situations

External flows of funds to Guam could change considerably through the forecast period due to volatility in tourism, investment and federal and local government expenditures.

Key issues on the table that could significantly alter this path include:

- Dump Closure Federal Consent Decree construction and financing.
- The outcome and timing of legislative authorized and other proposed bond issuance
- Major changes in tourist arrivals or expenditure levels
- Federal budget authorizations for Guam for FY 2010 including those related to Marine relocation
- Policy decisions and timing regarding construction for the Marine relocation construction scheduled to commence in late FY 2010.

Construction:

Building permits had been on an upward trend until 2008 when they declined considerably. Total building permits for FY 2007 were \$320 million but declined 34 percent for FY 2008 to \$210 million. DOD construction contracts exceeding \$5 million dollars reached a record high in 2008 at \$295 million for the calendar year and \$252 million for the fiscal year. The total combined value of building permits and

construction contracts for calendar year 2008 was \$506 million, a 14 percent increase over calendar year 2007. The House of Representatives passed the FY 2009 Defense Authorization Act authorizing \$180 million in military construction funding for Guam. These projects are listed as follows:

- \$62.4 million for construction of Bachelor Enlisted Quarters on Naval Base Guam;
- \$50.0 million for completion of the Kilo Warf Extension;
- \$30.0 million for construction of a new central utility plant at the Naval Base Guam;
- \$26.1 million for upgrades to the wastewater collection system at Naval Base Guam:
- \$5.4 million for the realignment of Arc Boulevard on Andersen Air Force Base; and
- \$5.2 million for construction of a combat communications maintenance facility at Andersen Air Force Base.

Historical experience indicates construction activity, employment and revenues in the industry follows changes in permit and contract levels with a lag of one to two years. Based on this high level of permits and contracts construction activities should remain strong throughout 2009 and 2010. While the Department of Defense decline in construction funding authorizations in Public Law No: 110-417 for FY 2009 of \$180 million in comparison to \$345 million in FY 2008 was severe, \$165 million, a 48% drop, a number of major projects awarded in FY 2008 are of such a scale that the construction from the FY 08 contracts will continue through FY 2009 and FY 2010. These include:

- \$24, 588,717 Phase I of potable water system recapitalization at Naval Base Guam to DCK Pacific, LLC, Honolulu, Hawaii expected to be completed by April 2010.
- \$40,000,000 Extension and necessary dredging to the Kilo Warf at the Commander Naval Region Marianas Main Base expected to be completed in May 2010.
- \$52,587,000 Helix Electric, Inc. Harden Electrical System, Main Base, Agana, Guam expected to be complete July 2010.
- \$33,150,728 DCK Pacific, LLC design and construction of a fitness center at Naval Base Guam expected to be completed by December 2010.
- \$15,399,603 DCK Pacific Guam, LLC, Repair and alteration of existing facilities to administrative offices for the Joint Region Marianas Headquarters at Nimitz Hill expected to be completed by March 2010.
- \$43,838,018 IBC/TOA Corp., extension and necessary dredging to the Kilo Warf at the Commander Naval Region Marianas Main Base, Guam. An additional \$43,038,018 will be funded upon the passage of FY 2009 Military Construction Appropriation Bill, making the total amount \$83,838,018. It is expected to be completed by March 2010.

In addition to the appropriations funding specifically for Guam projects, a contract was awarded as part of a \$4 billion Sustainment, Restoration and Maintenance Acquisition Task Order Contract (SATOC) with the Air Force Civil Engineer Support Agency (AFCESA) as follows:

 \$50.7 million to Perini Corporation awarded September 27, 2008 for repairs to the South Runway at Andersen Fir Force Base, Guam which includes removal and replacement of an existing runway as well as runway and approach lights. The project is expected to take approximately one year, with an estimated completion date of April 1010.

Major private and public scheduled for FY 2010 construction include:

- The consent Decree Financial Impact statement lists cash requirements for dump opening of just over 71 million in FY 2010 of the estimated total project cost of 160 million. This should translate into roughly corresponding construction expenditures and activity.
- Emerald Ocean View Park project construction is scheduled for FY 2009 10. The \$100 million dollar project will include 260 condo units and 20 villa-style luxury homes.
- Outrigger Hotel Tower Bayview Projects Phase V. Addition scheduled for completion late 2010. \$60 million

Real Estate:

The decline in real estate transactions from \$686.8 million in 2007 to about \$350 million in 2008 as well as the decline in building permits was exasperated by the moratorium imposed on developers by the Guam Waterworks Authority in May 2008, due to sewer system capacity constraints. While the moratorium is expected to be lifted in April 2009, some of the sales and construction previously planned has since been cancelled or is on indefinite hold due to business and financing issues. Real estate buyers are taking a wait and see approach due to global economic and financial uncertainties. Weakness in sales may translate into reduced future construction.

Tourism:

The number of tourist arrivals had been on an upward trend almost continuously since 2003 following the recovery from the events of 911, and subsequent SARS and typhoon Pongsona. In September 2008 the levels fell by around 20 percent in comparison to prior years monthly figures. It appears that a trend is emerging indicating a significant reduction in tourism which could persist throughout 2009 and 2010 based on statements from leading economists, which predicted that an economic recovery could take several years. Tourism is related to Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and Japanese travelers have indicated in exit surveys that economic concerns are a factor in their decision to embark on travel. As this trend is recent with approximately five months experience, it could exhibit some volatility as time goes on. Also some businesses such as hotels, restaurants and retail trade may have held off making business and employment downsizing decisions to some extent until after the Christmas and New Year holiday travel and shopping. There has been recent anecdotal information on a number of employers who had reduced staff, hours or other employment benefit in recent months which has not yet been fully reflected in the monthly or quarterly economic statistics. Additional reductions are in tourism related employment as business continues to adjust to reduced tourist levels over time.

A 2007 report by Global Insights for the Guam Visitor's Bureau found that travelers total economic impact on Guam ranges from 20 percent to over one-third of the total island economy. In terms of employment, tourism is the catalyst for 15,177 jobs, or 35.5% of the private (non-governmental) employment base. As tourism is a significant component of the economy of Guam, arrival reductions will be measurable on the economic bottom line.

In forecasting the short term future of tourism arrivals from Japan a report from Japan's Central Bank may be insightful. A January 23, 2009 statement reported in Bloomberg that:

"Japan's economic conditions have been deteriorating significantly," the central bank said in a report in Tokyo today, using the most pessimistic language to describe conditions since January 1998, when they started publishing the report. The global slowdown has spurred record declines in exports and factory output in the world's second-largest economy and the central bank expects the slump to deepen. Governor Masaaki Shirakawa and his policy board said they expect gross domestic product to shrink 1.8 percent in the year ending March 31 and two percent the following year. Japan's exports plunged 35 percent in December, the most on record, from 27 percent in November. Factory output dropped 8.5% in November, the most in more than 50 years. Weakness in Japan's economy makes a quick rebound in tourism to Guam increasingly unlikely.

In the longer term, the possibility of visa-free entry for nonimmigrant visitors from eligible countries to Guam for business and leisure travel could be expanded to additional markets by including such entry for persons from Russia and China. Tourism officials have indicated that could mean an additional 200,000 to 300,000 Chinese arrivals within several years of implementation as well as higher spending visitors from Russia who currently vacation in Saipan. Issues of security and travelers overstaying are issues of concern that need to be addressed in an ongoing efforts to seek expanded visa-waiver inclusion of China and Russia.

Section 702(a) of the Consolidated Natural Resources Act of 2008, signed into law May 8, 2008, extends U.S. immigration laws to the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands (CNMI). Section 702(b), which is implemented by the interim final rule, establishes a new Visa Waiver Program for Guam and the CNMI which extends visiting time from 15 to 45 days. The program is scheduled for implementation June 1, 2009 subject to a provision authorizing requests for delay in implementation. The new visa waiver program adds Hong Kong to the list of countries authorized for the program. Travel industry leaders hoped China and Russia would have been included in the interim final rule but additional steps remain for that to occur. The existing visa waiver program implemented in October 1988 included the United Kingdom as well as those with British National Overseas (BNO) passports. On July 1, 1997, Hong Kong, under British rule for 156 years came under the control of China. As the passports of Hong Kong residents with BNO passports expired, the number of persons eligible for travel to Guam under the current visa-waiver program dwindled. Specific inclusion of Hong Kong with a population estimated to exceed seven million could reinvigorate Hong Kong as a visitor market for Guam in its' own right. Furthermore, it could facilitate reestablishment of direct flights from Hong Kong as a gateway for mainland Chinese travelers. In 2007, the U.S. Embassy and Consulates in China issued 417,146 B1/B2 visas (visitors for business and pleasure) to the United States. Convenient direct flight schedules could supplement the Hong Kong to Guam market with Chinese who already have visas for travel to the U.S. or who could obtain one under current regulations.

Employment:

Employment trends have been generally showing slight growth in both the number of employees and wages, resulting in combined moderate growth in total payroll. Over the last few years, construction employment increases have dominated and driven increases in total payroll. Payroll is important as one of the largest revenue categories for income tax including withholdings. The increase in minimum wage schedule has and will further increase hourly earnings in some occupations and industries. The federal and corresponding Guam minimum hourly wage increased from \$5.85 to \$6.55 on July 24, 2008 and will increase again to \$7.25 on July 24, 2009. The prevailing wage rates for H-2 workers made effective October 6, 2008 will increase the rates paid to construction workers over time. The new rates apply to new and renewal employment which time varies by employee. The increases will continue to affect the average construction pay levels over the next year. Limited Government of Guam increases have been or are in the process of being implemented but a general classification and compensation study has been authorized by Public Law 29-52.

Tourism related retail and hotel employment is expected to decline somewhat to be consistent with the first quarter's 15 percent reduction in arrivals; although the employment declines are expected to be less than 15 percent in tourist related businesses, they will not be inconsequential. New establishments with announced openings in FY 2009 include Chili's in Tamuning, Payless Markets Mangilao, Hooters and Burger King, Tumon Bay. This newly created employment should continue through to the FY 2010 employment totals. A new tower for the Outrigger hotel is under construction with scheduled completion for late 2010.

Bond Issues:

Bond financing authorized in PL: 29-113 for payment of COLA and income tax returns could inject \$92.0 million and \$112.0 million respectively, into the economy. When the current financing hurdles, brought about by the market decline, stabilize the Government is poised to approach the market and the proceeds of these funds could shortly thereafter be distributed and available for residents' disposal. Other authorized and proposed bond funding would substantially increase the amount of construction activity and funds in circulation. These include funding for projects of: Guam Memorial Hospital, Guam Public School System (JFK High School), Guam Waterworks Authority, Port Authority of Guam, Department of Land Management, and the landfill construction under federal receivership. The total amount and timing of these financing may occur within the upcoming months and will inject additional construction activities and funds into Guam's economy.

Credit ratings are an important factor in the availability of bond financing and the cost of financing. Standard and Poors (S&P) raised the Government of Guam's existing general obligation bonds from 'B' to 'B+' with stable outlook in October 2008, citing an improved balance sheet that resulted from "greater political consensus to enhance revenue and control expenditure growth". The rating action "affects about \$236.7 million of outstanding general obligation debt as of September 30, 2007. Standard and Poors also noted that fiscal year 2007 for Guam marked the "first ever financial audit with an unqualified opinion, as well as the third consecutive time the audit has been completed on a timely basis. In December 2008, Standard & Poors raised the Guam Power Authority's existing revenue bonds to an investment grade of 'BBB-" from 'BB+' with stable outlook. The rating agency cited several factors in its upgrade, including better operational and financial performance and continued support from the Public Utilities Commission. In January 27, 2009 in the course of routine surveillance, Fitch Ratings affirms the 'BB' rating and changed the Rating Outlook to positive on Guam Waterworks Authority's \$99.3 million in outstanding water and wastewater system revenue bonds, series 2005. Fitch press release noted:

The revision in Rating Outlook to Positive from Positive from Stable reflects GWA's substantial progress to date in meeting regulatory requirements stemming from a stipulated order (the order). The Outlook revision also reflects the progress management has made with regards to capital and financial planning, which provide a blueprint for continued success in returning the system to regulatory compliance and ensuring financial integrity.

Because of its strategic location, U.S. military operations historically have been the main economic engine of the island, and over the next six to eight years the military's economic impact is expected to increase substantially more as the island undergoes a massive buildup of military personnel from relocation of troops from other parts of the globe and consolidation of operations.

The ratings upgrades for the Government of Guam's and well as two of the larger autonomous agencies, Guam Power Authority and Guam Waterworks Agency reflect increasing confidence in the financial management of these organizations as well as the outlook for the economy of Guam.

Federal Policy:

The first non-construction buildup contract in the amount of \$100 million was awarded October 3, 2008 to Pacific Program-Design Management Services Joint Venture, of Pasadena, California, the Program Support Services contract for the Guam military buildup. The company is a joint venture led by Parsons Corporation. The contract involves:

Various projects covered by the Defense Policy Review Initiative and other projects in the [Naval Facilities Engineering Command] Pacific area of responsibility.

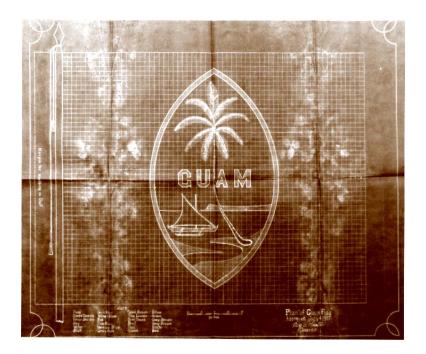
The primary project locations for work on this contract are in Guam, (80%), Hawaii (10%), and may include work in the Northern Mariana Islands, (7%), and locations anywhere in the Pacific and Indian Oceans (NAVFAC Pacific's AOR) (3%), and is expected to be completed by September 2013.

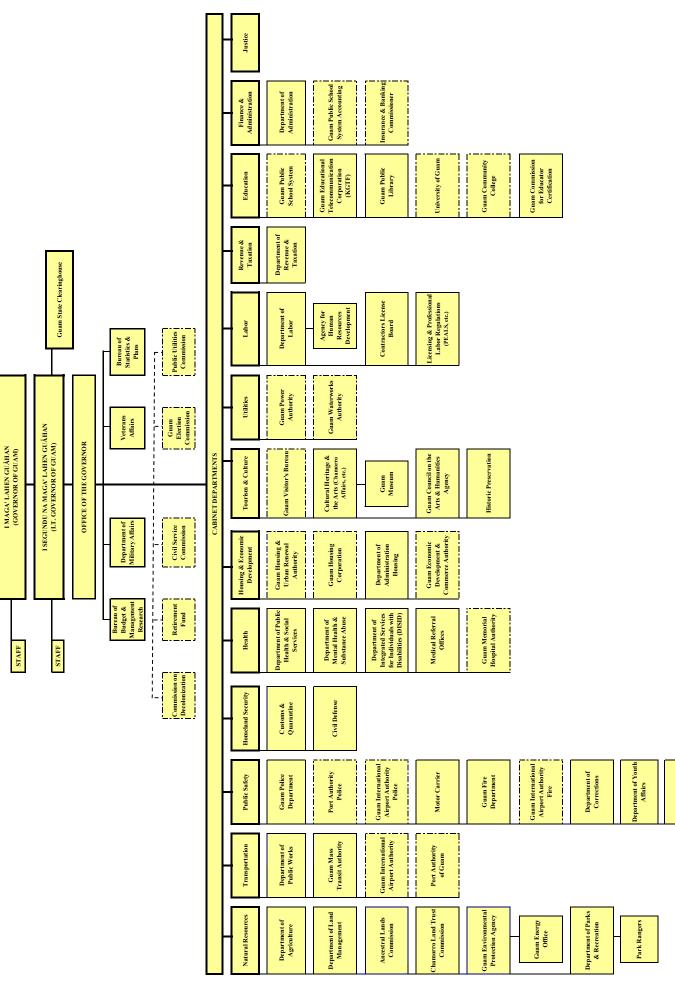
The Consolidated Natural Resources Act of 2008, in addition to the visa-waiver provision excludes Guam and CNMI from the numerical limitations on Nonimmigrant workers during the transition period effective on the first day of the first full month commencing 1 year after the date of enactment [June 1, 2009] and ending December 31, 2014. This is one of a number of steps to ensure availability of the workforce necessary to complete the facility construction for the Marines relocation to Guam.

Economic stimulus efforts in the coming year through tax rebates, tax reductions, federally funded infrastructure or federal state and local bond financing guarantees could significantly affect Guam's economy depending on the timing and nature of these policies. The FY 2010 budget authorizations could include substantial funding related to Marine relocation activities. If projects are contracted early in the fiscal year, they could still have significant impact in FY 2010. Such funding could also support confidence in Guam's economic future and support additional private sector financing and projects.

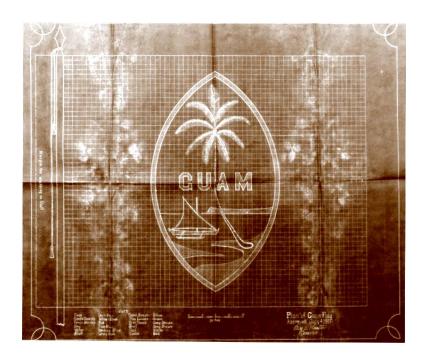
ORGANIZATIONAL CHART

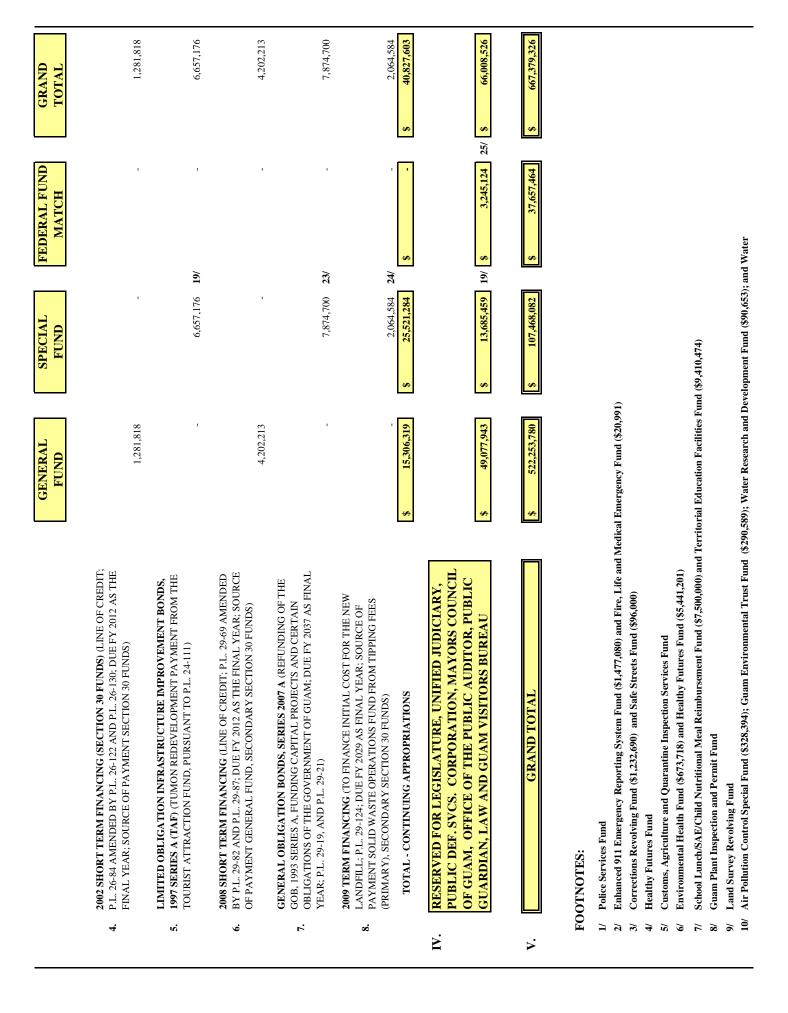

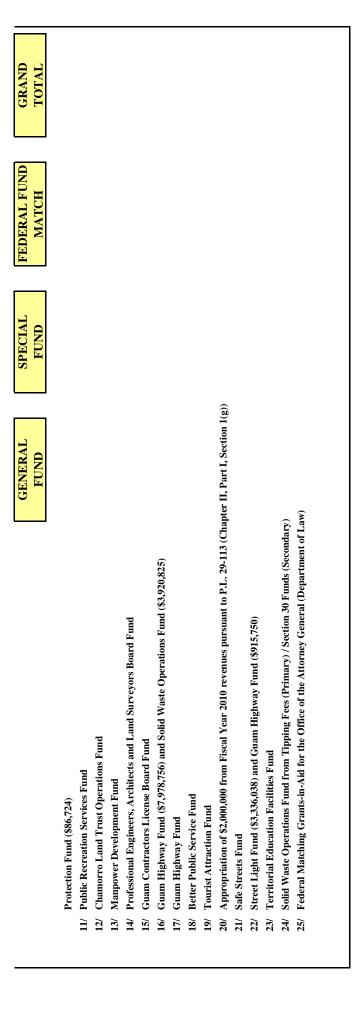

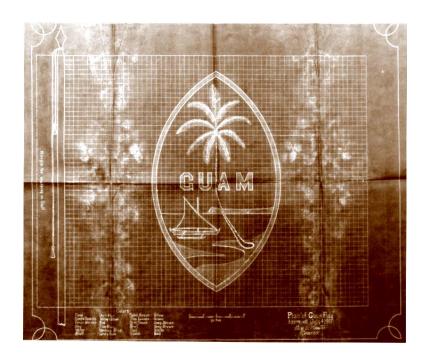

EXECUTIVE DIRECTION

Executive Direction rests with the Office of I Maga'lahen Guåhan and I Segundu Na Maga'Lahen Guåhan to provide leadership and policy direction, for the safety of the island and well-being of its people, to ascertain its future political relationship with the United States of America, and to execute local and federal laws affecting the Government of Guam. Other major roles include fiscal, management, planning information, and utilities oversight services, ensuring an orderly election process, services to veterans, government employees and retirees, formulating regional policies, and filing reports with I Liheslatura and the Federal Government.

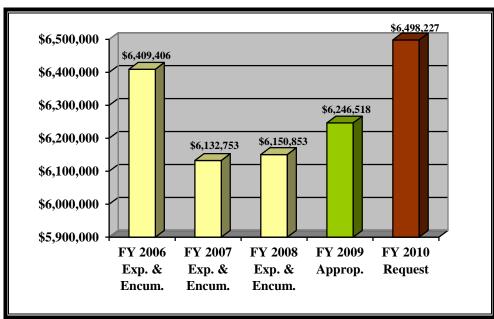
The Commission on Decolonization, Civil Service Commission, Guam Election Commission, Bureau of Budget and Management Research, Department of Military Affairs, Office of Veterans Affairs, Bureau of Statistics and Plans, Retirement Fund, and Public Utilities Commission fall under Executive Direction, of which the Retirement Fund and the Public Utilities Commission are autonomous and as such do not require operational fund assistance under the Executive Budget.



OFFICE OF I MAGA'LAHEN GUÅHAN AND I SEGUNDU NA MAGA'LAHEN GUÅHAN

The Office of I Maga'lahen Guåhan and I Segundu Na Maga'lahen Guåhan, the Governor and Lieutenant Governor of Guam respectively, provides executive direction and develops policies and priorities to enhance government operations, and provides general supervision and control of all departments, bureaus, agencies, and other instrumentalities of the executive branch. Programs administered include Executive Direction, Government House, Governor's Community Outreach Federal Programs Office, Guam Homeland Security Office, Bureau of Women's Affairs, Bureau of Information Technology, Medical Referral Offices, and the Guam State Clearinghouse. Recently, P.L. 28-46 transferred the Veterans Affairs Office and the Office of Civil Defense as offices within the Office of I Maga'lahen Guåhan.

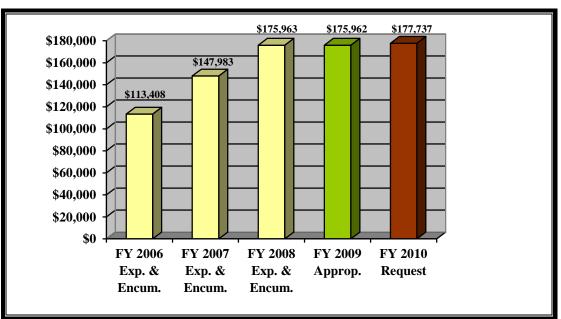

Once the desire of the Chamorro people of Guam is ascertained, the Commission shall transmit that desire to the President and Congress of the United States and the Secretary General of the United Nations. The Commission has created three (3) Task Forces comprising of the political status options for Guam including the Independence, Free Association and Statehood Task Forces.

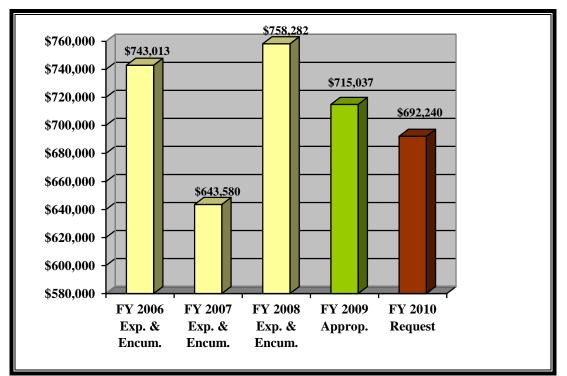

CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION

The Civil Service Commission is primarily responsible for the adjudicatory functions, specifically, to hear adverse action appeals relative to employee suspension, demotion or dismissal from the classified service, whether such right to appeal to the Commission is established in the personnel rules governing the employee; entertain grievance appeals pursuant to rules and regulations; investigate upon receipt of report on political activity involving an employee of the government; and responsible for enforcement and administration on ethics in public contracting in the government of Guam via investigations, recommendations, and orientations. The Commission is also responsible for reviewing and investigating all classified personnel actions for compliance with personnel rules and regulations.

The Office of Veterans Affairs is responsible for the administration of all local laws applicable to veterans of the Armed Forces of the United States. 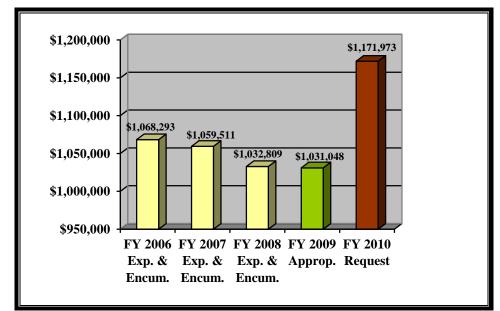

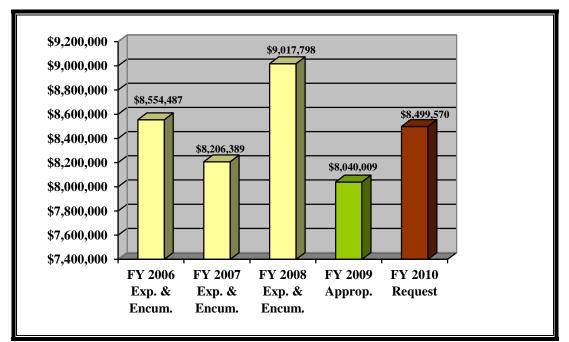

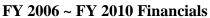


ADMINISTRATION

The Department of Administration provides administrative, fiscal and policy direction for execution of government-wide support services. Its administrative support services includes the provision of orientation and training programs, as well as provides data for statistical, payroll wage and other related purposes. Additionally, the Department also handles recruitment and placement of eligible applications, administration of employee fringe benefits and enrollment into the government of Guam retirement system, and non-adjudicatory authority relative to functions regarding rulemaking, the creation of new positions, pay scales, personnel rules and the like, in accordance with P.L. 28-68. Support services include procurement of supplies, equipment, storage and distribution of donated surplus properties, as well as the preservation and disposal of government records. The Department's financial responsibilities include ensuring the availability of revenues for obligations and investments, proper governmental accounting and computer, technical and consultations services.

REVENUE & TAXATION

The primary mission of this cabinet is to provide taxpayers quality service by helping them understand and meet their tax responsibilities and by applying the tax law with integrity and fairness to all. 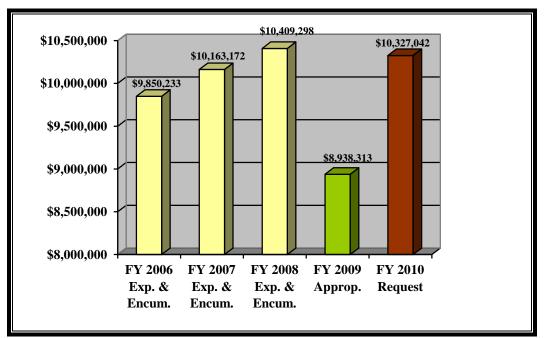

DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE & TAXATION

The department provides timely tax data, minimizing the amount of delinquent taxes, thus reducing the recording and processing time for payments received. It protects the general public from unethical and/or unfair business practices through the enforcement of local and federal licensing, examination and registration laws. In addition, the Department is responsible for the administration of the Guam Passport Office.

The Offices serve not only the medically indigent but all residents of Guam and those residents referred off-island by assisting in coordinating appropriate medical appointments, temporary housing and transportation services.

MENTAL HEALTH & SUBSTANCE ABUSE

The Department of Mental Health & Substance Abuse (DMHSA) is responsible to provide mental health programs and services for clients suffering mental disorders, emotional disturbances, behavioral problems, familial dysfunctions, and drug and alcohol abasements. The Department also maintains residential and day treatment services such as the Guma Man Hoben, Guma Ifil and New Beginnings programs. In November 10, 2008, DMHSA, under E.O. No. 2008-25, became the primary agency to manage the Level of Care and Guma Bethesda Programs that were transferred from the Department of Integrated Services for Individuals with Disabilities. It also operates an acute psychiatric inpatient facility and provides emergency consultations to related agencies and clinics, and offers a 24-hour telephone crisis intervention to all island residents and provides educational training for mental health and drug prevention and abuse programs.

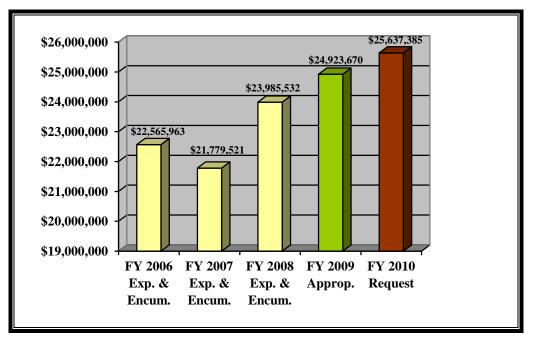

The Motor Carrier Safety Assistance Program, a one hundred percent federally funded program is also under this cabinet.



GUAM POLICE

The Guam Police Department is responsible for deterring and suppressing all crimes and providing overall protection of life and property from injuries and loss. The Department provides island-wide police coverage, to include investigative services in the areas of criminal, juvenile, traffic, special investigations and crime laboratory.

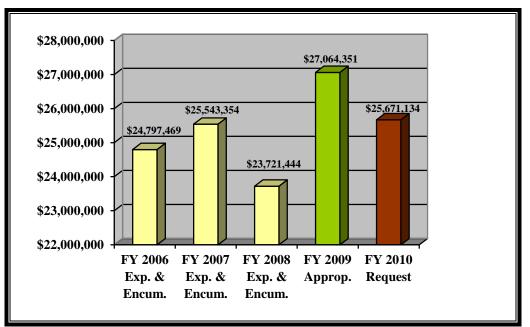

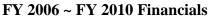

The Guam Fire Department is charged with enforcement of the Uniform Fire Code and of local fire laws and regulations. It provides emergency assistance and responds to fire emergencies, hazardous material incidents and other emergency situations to ensure the safety of all the residents. The department is responsible for conducting fire drills, inspections of premises and areas relative to the prevention of fires, fire hydrant inspections, land and sea rescue operations as well as provide on-scene stabilization, and transport of patients to the nearest and appropriate medical facility, rescuing victims in extreme situations that includes high-angle and trench rescues, and to isolate, identify, notify, mitigate and terminate hazardous incidents.

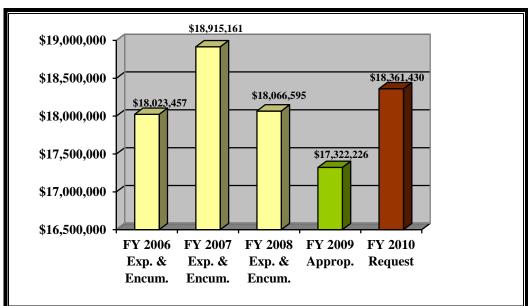

CORRECTIONS

The Department of Corrections shall protect the public from the destructive action of law offenders by operating a safe, secure, humane and efficient corrections system, and provide staff services for the judiciary, the Parole Board, probation officers and interested agencies of the Executive Branch. The Department provides custodial care to prison inmates, and the parole and detainee population in accordance with judicial disposition. Custodial care is provided for inmates on-island and off-island and includes services for rehabilitation, security, transportation, and treatment. The Department also makes recommendations for the potential release of inmates to the Territorial Parole Board.

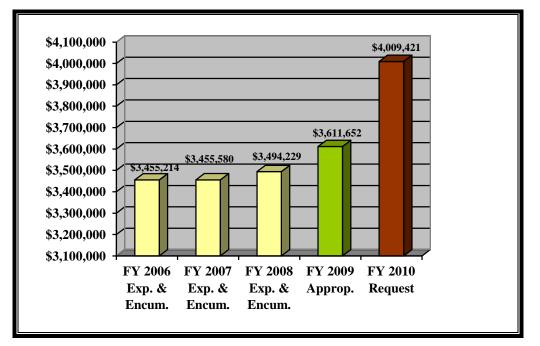

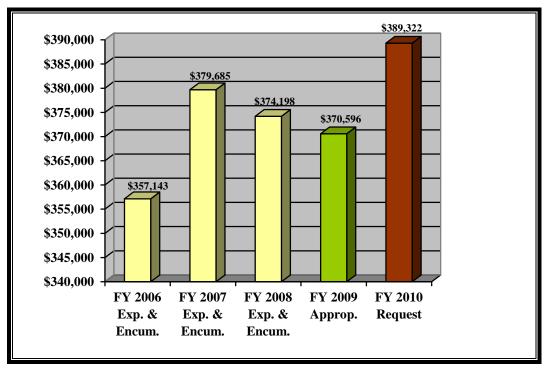

HOMELAND SECURITY

In response to the growing threat of global terrorism, Executive Order 2003-13 established the Office of Homeland Security (OHS) under the purview of the Office of I Maga'lahen Guåhan. The mission of the OHS is to develop and coordinate the implementation of a comprehensive plan to protect Guam and its people from terrorism, invasion, insurrection, rebellion, lawless violence or the threat thereof and illegal importation of prohibited items and commodities.

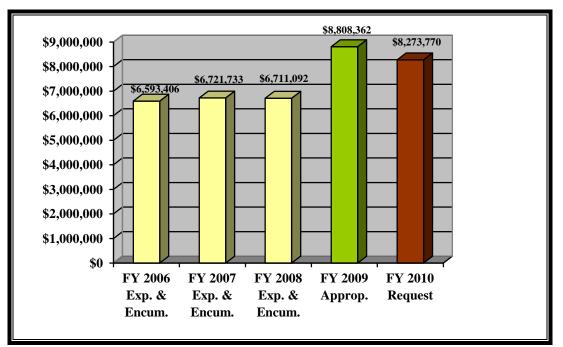
In coordination with the OHS, the Customs and Quarantine Agency and the Office of Civil Defense are included under this cabinet department and have been designated to assist in carrying out the mission of homeland security for Guam.



CUSTOMS & QUARANTINE

The Customs and Quarantine Agency plays a vital role in preventing the illegal importation of prohibited items and commodities into Guam. The Agency inspects and examines both imported and exported cargo, as well as civilian and military aircrafts, passengers, bags, luggage and livestock. In addition, the Agency also investigates and resolves all customs and quarantine violations and provides methods for inspection, safeguard, treatment, destruction and quarantine activities to control and eradicate pests and diseases in Guam.

LABOR

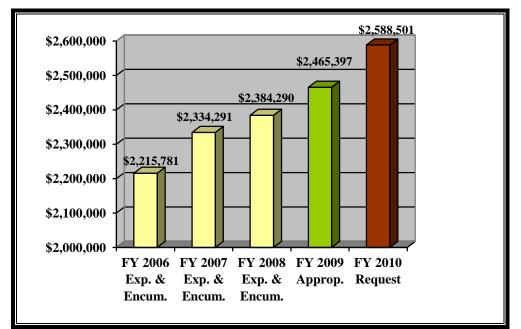

DEPARTMENT OF LABOR

The Department of Labor is responsible to promote, develop, and improve the welfare of wage earners on Guam. It provides job placement assistance, outreach, and consultation to increase awareness of employment practices, senior employment programs, and alien labor certification. The Department enforces the prevailing wage schedule, Fair Labor Standards Act, Occupational Safety and Health standards, and administers workers compensation. Additionally, it oversees labor market and occupational information systems as well as provides statistical information regarding Guam's manpower and labor situation. It houses and supervises the Agency for Human Resources Development and the Serve Guam Commission.

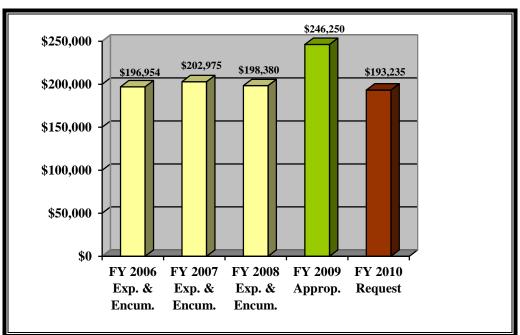

LICENSING & PROFESSIONAL LABOR REGULATIONS (PEALS, etc.)

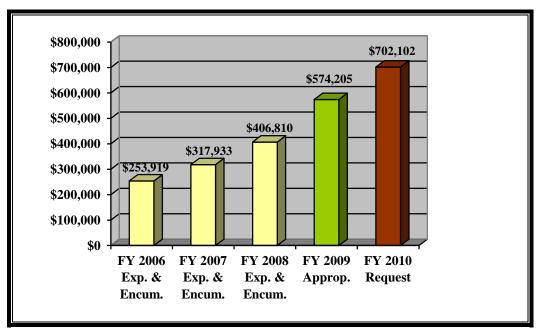

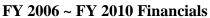

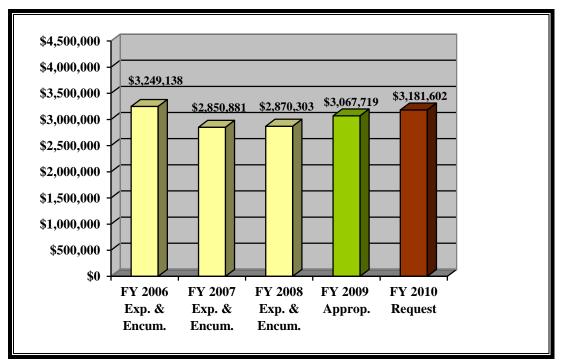

AGRICULTURE

The Department of Agriculture ensures the development, conservation, and productivity of the island's agricultural sector, including the livestock, forestry and commercial fishing industries. It assists farmers and others engaged in agriculture, mariculture, and aquaculture. Other functions involve the provision of equipment subsidies, spraying services and technical assistance. The Department promotes forestry, soil, and water resource conservation practices; provides seedlings and fruit trees through its plant nursery program; enforces conservation laws against illegal hunting or fishing; and implements animal health programs.

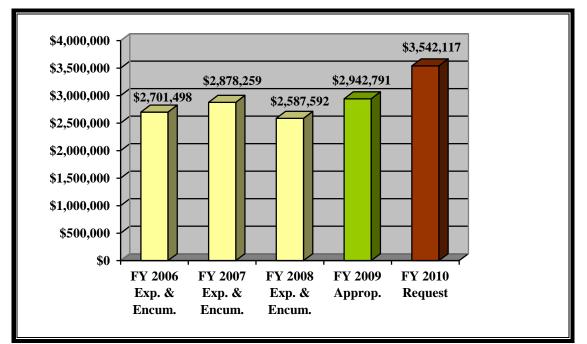

LAND MANAGEMENT

The Department of Land Management is tasked with the management of government land resources in a manner that maximizes public benefit and preserves public trust. Its primary planning activities focuses on facilitating the development and maintenance of a comprehensive land use program that is capable of ensuring maximum yield on government and non-government lands. Secondary goals include the fostering of orderly growth, as well as the harmonious development and enforcement of land-use regulations. The Department's recording functions involve storing all land records such as land titles, maps, land exchanges, subdivisions, on microfilm, blueprint, and other electronic means, in accordance with the Geographical Informational System. Additionally, survey activities ensure the complete plotting of all government lands on the island's cadastral map, in compliance with the Guam Geodetic Triangulation Network system.

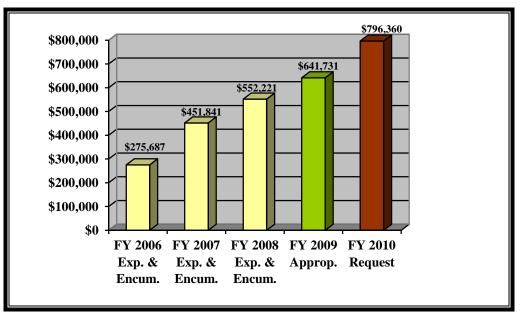

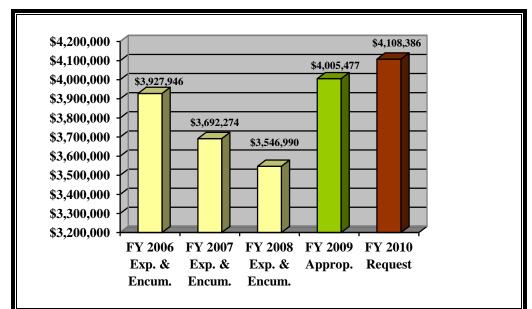

PARKS & RECREATION

The Department of Parks and Recreation's primary mission is to protect and enhance designated parks, recreation facilities, and areas for the enjoyment of the island community. Its major activities include the administration, acquisition, design, development, operation, maintenance, and protection of all park areas on Guam. The Department also provides memorial services for three (3) public cemeteries. It coordinates recreational activities such as leagues and tournaments, health and fitness programs, special events and provides lifeguards and other recreational services. Additionally, its historic resource activities include the preservation, identification, survey and inventory of properties of historical value. Lastly, the Department also employs Park Rangers who are responsible for the enforcement of all park and civil regulations, the dissemination of park information and the protection and assistance to all park visitors and vendors.

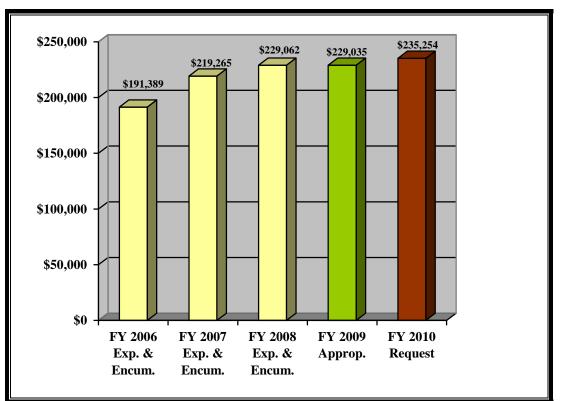

The Ancestral Lands Commission aims to restore and recognize the rights of landowners to the use of their ancestral lands, specifically, lands present and future declared excess either by the federal government or the government of Guam. 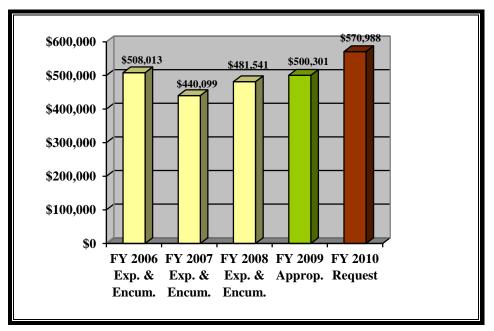

The primary mission of this cabinet department is to promote tourism to bring stable economic growth to the island, increase opportunities for the appreciation and enjoyment in the arts and humanities, foster an appreciation for Guam's cultural and natural heritage, preserve and enhance the cultural traditions and practices of our island for public benefit.

Departments and agencies in this area consist of the Cultural Heritage and the Arts (Department of Chamorro Affairs), Guam Council on the Arts and Humanities Agency. Historic Preservation, which is a one hundred percent federally funded program and the Guam Visitors' Bureau, an autonomous agency, are also under this cabinet department.

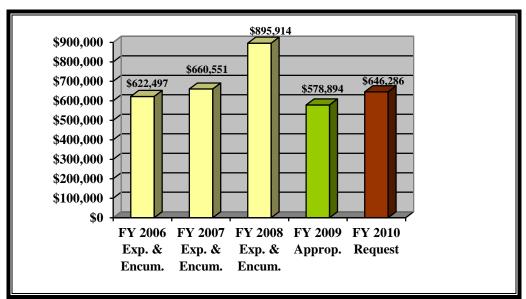


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GUAM COUNCIL ON THE ARTS & HUMANITIES AGENCY

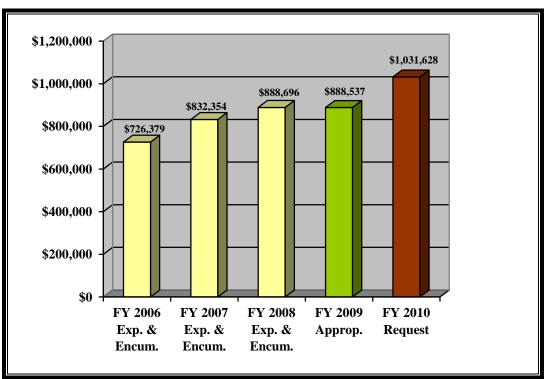

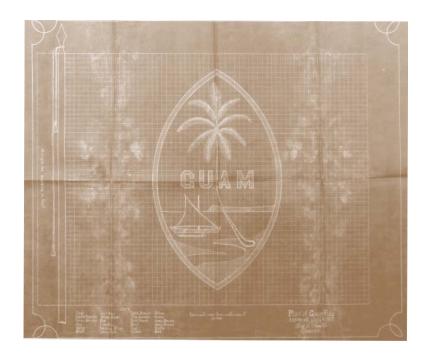

TRANSPORTATION

The entities under this cabinet are to ensure the maintenance and administration of Guam's transportation and capital improvement related services. Services provided are relative to air and sea transportation; energy efficiency; highway, parking, and infrastructure development; bus transportation for students during the school year; and public transportation including para-transit service.

Entities included under this cabinet are the Department of Public Works, Guam Mass Transit Authority, Guam International Airport Authority (GIAA) and the Port Authority of Guam (PAG). Autonomous agencies under this cabinet not requesting funding include GIAA and PAG.

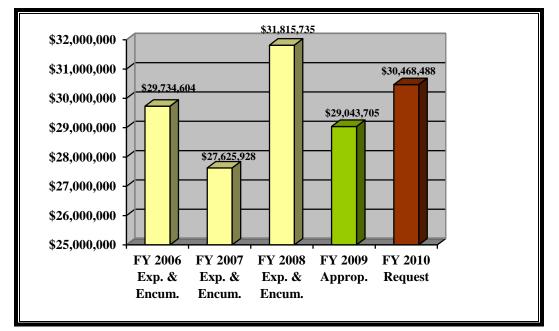


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PUBLIC WORKS

The Department of Public Works provides engineering services in accordance with industry standards and regulations, reviews and approves, inspects, and monitors all proposed construction and government capital projects, to ensure compliance with building codes, construction laws and procurement regulations to government contracting. It oversees all highway construction and rehabilitation projects in conjunction with Federal highway regulations, and additionally, provides island wide maintenance support for roadway beautification programs, flood and hazard mitigation controls, disaster preparation and recovery measures, and highway and traffic program services. Furthermore, the Department is responsible for maintenance of government buildings and vehicles. It is also tasked with solid waste collection and disposal services for residential homes and government agencies. Lastly, the Department is tasked with providing safe and efficient bussing services to both public and private schools as well as providing transportation services for emergency evacuation and civil activities as authorized by the Governor or his designee.

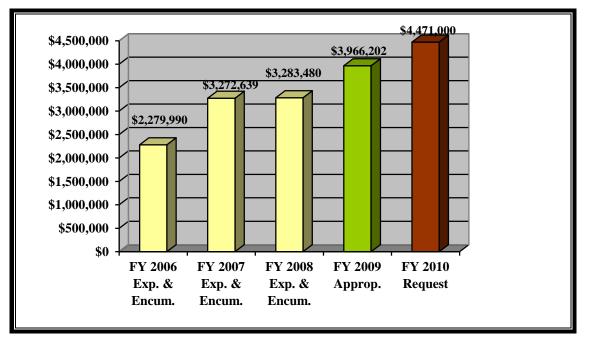

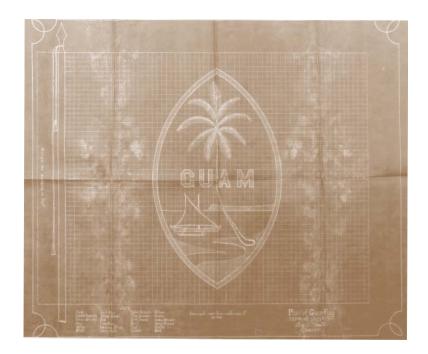

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JUSTICE

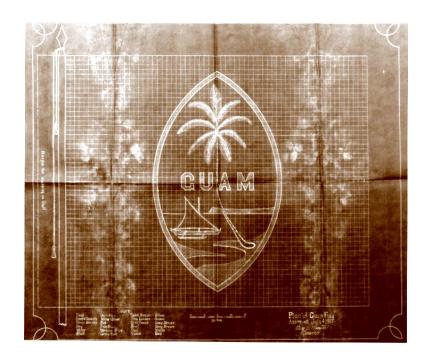

Major roles in this cabinet are to prosecute all offenses against the laws of Guam; enforce all consumer protection laws; represent Guam in criminal and civil appeals and litigate all other cases on behalf of Guam; provide legal counsel and hearing officers; undertake the defense of legal actions against government employees; commission all notaries of Guam; and establish and enforce child support obligations.

The Department of Law (Office of the Attorney General) is the single department in this cabinet.

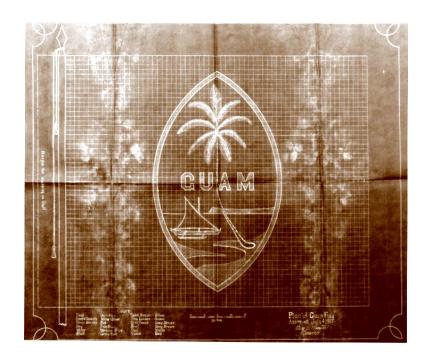

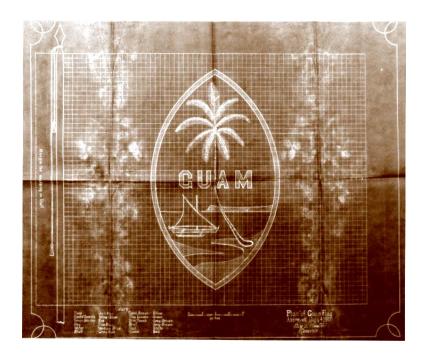

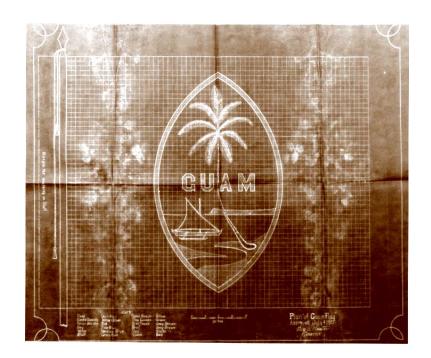

AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE OPERATIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE BRANCH OF THE GOVERNMENT OF GUAM FOR FISCAL YEAR ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 2010 AND MAKING OTHER APPROPRIATIONS, AND ESTABLISHING MISCELLANEOUS AND ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS.

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:
2	CHAPTER I
3	GENERAL PROVISIONS
4	Section 1. Short Title. This Act shall be known as the "General Appropriations
5	Act of 2010". Except as otherwise provided by this Act, the appropriations made by this
6	Act shall be available to pay for obligations incurred on or after October 1, 2009 but no
7	later than September 30, 2010. If any appropriation in this Act is found contrary to
8	federal law, all other portions of this Act shall remain valid.
9	Section 2. Estimated Revenues for Fiscal Year 2010. I Liheslaturan Guåhan,
10	the Guam Legislature, adopts the following revenue estimates for Fiscal Year 2010 as the
11	basis for the appropriations contained in this Act.

CHAPTER III

1	MISCELLANEOUS APPROPRIATIONS
2	Section 1. University of Guam for Scholarships and Training Programs.
3	(a) Student Scholarships, Financial Assistance Programs and Program
4	Administration. The sum of Two Million Three Hundred Eighty Seven Thousand Nine
5	Hundred Ninety One Dollars (\$2,387,991) is appropriated from the General Fund to the
6	University of Guam for Fiscal Year 2010 for: Merit Awards, Student Loans, Nurse
7	Training Programs, Professional and Technical Awards, Reserve Officer Training Corps
8	(ROTC), Regent Scholarships, Marine Lab Graduate Assistance Programs, Early High
9	School Admission Programs, Pedro "Doc" Sanchez Scholarship Programs, John F. Quan
10	Memorial Scholarship Program and the administration of all student financial assistance
11	programs. The President of the University of Guam shall allocate this appropriation in
12	order to fund said student scholarships, financial assistance programs and program
13	administration.
14	(b) Dr. Antonio C. Yamashita Educator Corps. The sum of One Million
15	Two Hundred Thirty Eight Thousand One Hundred Twenty Seven Dollars (\$1,238,127)
16	is appropriated from the General Fund to the University of Guam for Fiscal Year 2010.
17	The President of the University of Guam shall disburse, pursuant to the directives and
18	policies of the Educator Corps Council, stipends for the Dr. Antonio C. Yamashita
19	Educator Corps and funds for the administration of said program pursuant to Title 17

20 GCA Chapter 18 and §15107 of Title 17 of the Guam Code Annotated, as *amended*.

The President of the University of Guam *shall* post on the University of Guam's
 website all reports mandated by this Act regarding the Dr. Antonio C. Yamashita
 Educator Corps.

Section 2. Appropriation for Aquaculture Development and Training
Center. The sum of One Hundred Thirty One Thousand Eight Hundred Forty Six
Dollars (\$131,846) is appropriated from the General Fund to the University of Guam for
Fiscal Year 2010 for the *sole* purpose of funding the continued operations of the
Aquaculture Development and Training Center. Said funds *shall* not be transferred or
used for any other purpose.

10 Section 3. Appropriation for WERI's Guam Hydrologic Survey. The sum 11 of One Hundred Ninety Two Thousand Three Hundred Seven Dollars (\$192,307) is 12 appropriated from the General Fund to the University of Guam for Fiscal Year 2010 for 13 the sole purpose of funding the Guam Hydrologic Survey (GHS) administered by the 14 Water and Environmental Research Institute of the Western Pacific (WERI). WERI *shall* 15 continue to administer the GHS for those purposes previously established by Guam law. 16 Such funds shall *not* be transferred *or* used for any other purpose.

17 Section 4. Appropriation for WERI's Comprehensive Water Resource 18 Monitoring Program. The sum of One Hundred Sixty Three Thousand Eight Hundred 19 Seventeen Dollars (\$163,817) is appropriated from the General Fund to the University of 20 Guam for Fiscal Year 2010 to fund the Water and Environmental Research Institute of 21 the Western Pacific (WERI). Such funds *shall* be used for the *sole* purpose of matching 22 the Federal funding for the Comprehensive Water Resource Monitoring Program. WERI 23 *shall* continue to administer the Comprehensive Water Resource Monitoring Program for those purposes previously established by Guam law. Such funds shall *not* be transferred
 or used for any other purpose.

3 University of Guam for the College of Natural and Applied Section 5. 4 The sum of One Hundred Seventeen Thousand Seven Hundred Twenty Sciences. 5 Dollars (\$117,720) is appropriated from the General Fund to the University of Guam for 6 Fiscal Year 2010 for the College of Natural and Applied Sciences, provided that said 7 amount shall be divided equally between the Northern and Southern Soil and Water 8 Conservation Districts Programs. Such funds shall *not* be transferred *or* used for any 9 other purpose.

10 Section 6. University of Guam for KPRG (Public Radio). The sum of 11 Ninety Four Thousand One Hundred Seventy Six Dollars (**\$94,176**) is appropriated from 12 the General Fund to the University of Guam for the KPRG (Public Radio) Fiscal Year 13 2010 operations. The President of the University of Guam shall disburse the funds to 14 KPRG. No later than thirty (30) days after the close of each fiscal quarter of FY 2010, 15 the General Manager of KPRG *shall* submit to the President of the University of Guam, 16 and post on KPRG's website, all reports mandated by this Act.

Section 7. Guam Community College LPN and Vocational Guidance
Programs. The sum of Six Hundred Forty Four Thousand Two Hundred Nine Dollars
(\$644,209) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Guam Community College for
Fiscal Year 2010 to support the operations of the Licensed Practical Nursing Program
and Vocational Guidance Program.

Section 8. Appropriation to the Guam Community College Lodging
Management Program/ProStart Program. The sum of Twenty Four Thousand One

Hundred Fifty Four Dollars (\$24,154) is appropriated from the Tourist Attraction Fund to
the Guam Community College for Fiscal Year 2010 for the Lodging Management
Program/ProStart Program. Unexpended funds appropriated for the Guam Community
College Lodging Management Program/ProStart Program *shall* not lapse and *shall*remain available for use in succeeding fiscal years until all said sums are expended.

6 Section 9. **Appropriation** to the Guam Community College 7 Apprenticeship Program. The sum of Eight Hundred Twenty Six Thousand Three Hundred Sixty Seven Dollars (\$826,367) is appropriated from the Manpower 8 9 Development Fund to the Guam Community College for the Guam Community College 10 Apprenticeship Program for Fiscal Year 2010.

11 **Guam Public School System Operations Fund Appropriation.** Section 10. 12 Pursuant to §§52101 and 52102 of Chapter 52, Division 2 of Title 11 Guam Code 13 Annotated, the sum of One Hundred Sixty Nine Million Five Hundred Sixteen Thousand Six Hundred Ninety Dollars (\$169,516,690) is appropriated from the General Fund and 14 15 Nine Million Four Hundred Ten Thousand Four Hundred Seventy Four Dollars 16 (**\$9,410,474**) is appropriated from the Territorial Education Facilities Fund in Chapter II, 17 Section 1, Part V (A) of this Act, are appropriated to the Guam Public School System 18 Operations Fund for Fiscal Year 2010. This appropriation shall be expended in accordance with the cash disbursement schedules required by §52101(b). 19

20 Section 11. Interscholastic Sports Fund. For Fiscal Year 2010, the sum of 21 Four Hundred Twenty Six Thousand Five Hundred Eighty One Dollars (\$426,581) is 22 appropriated from the Healthy Futures Fund to the Interscholastic Sports Fund administered by the Guam Public School System to be expended pursuant to Title 17
 GCA §7108.

Section 12. Health and Physical Education Activities. For Fiscal Year 2010,
the sum of Two Hundred Seventy One Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty Four Dollars
(\$271,754) is appropriated from the Healthy Futures Fund to the Guam Public School
System for Health and Physical Education programs, intramural sports, and similar
activities.

8 Section 13. Office of the Education *Suruhanu*. The sum of One Hundred 9 Sixty Three Thousand Forty One Dollars (**\$163,041**) is appropriated from the General 10 Fund to the Office of the Education *Suruhanu* for its operations in Fiscal Year 2010.

11 Section 14. Summer School. From the Summer School Fund established 12 pursuant to §6119 of Article 1 of Chapter 6 of Division 1 of Title 17 Guam Code 13 Annotated, such sums as are necessary to fund the operations of the 2010 Summer School 14 Program are appropriated to the Guam Public School System (GPSS). The 15 Superintendent of Education shall submit a detailed report to I Maga'lahen Guåhan and 16 the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* regarding the receipt and expenditure of said funds 17 no later than thirty (30) days after the close of summer school and post the same on the 18 GPSS website. Such report *shall* include the following:

19

(1) total revenues received, including identification of each revenue source;

- 20 (2) total expenditures and encumbrance by object classification and by school;
 21 and
- 22 (3) the fund balance.

Section 15. Public Assistance Program. The sum of Two Million One
 Hundred Twenty Thousand Seven Hundred Forty Eight Dollars (\$2,120,748) is
 appropriated from the General Fund for Fiscal Year 2010 to the Department of Public
 Health and Social Services for the local match requirement of the Public Assistance
 Program.

6 Section 16. Medically Indigent Program (MIP). The sum of Fifteen Million
7 Eight Hundred Twenty Two Thousand Nine Hundred Seven Dollars (\$15,822,907) is
8 appropriated from the General Fund for Fiscal Year 2010 to the Medically Indigent
9 Program Payment Revolving Fund (MIPPR) for the Medically Indigent Program (MIP).

10 Section 17. Medicaid Program. The sum of Thirteen Million Nine Hundred 11 Fifty Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$13,950,750) is appropriated from the 12 General Fund to the Department of Public Health and Social Services for Fiscal Year 13 2010 for the local match requirement of the Medicaid Program.

Section 18. Medicines for the Community Health Centers. The sum of Two Hundred Eighty Two Thousand Five Hundred Twenty Eight Dollars (\$282,528) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Public Health and Social Services' Community Health Centers for Fiscal Year 2010 for the purchase of medicines.

Section 19. Enhanced Allotment Plan. The sum of Four Hundred Forty Two
Thousand Three Hundred Forty Seven Dollars (\$442,347) is appropriated from the
General Fund to the Department of Public Health and Social Services for Fiscal Year
2010 for the Enhanced Allotment Plan (Medicaid Part D).

Section 20. MHSA – Detoxification & Rehabilitation Services. The sum of
 Five Hundred Sixty Five Thousand Fifty Six Dollars (\$565,056) is appropriated from the

General Fund to the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse for Fiscal Year
 2010 for outsourcing of drug and alcohol detoxification, rehabilitation, and prevention
 services, *provided* that the expenditure of such funds shall comply with Title 48 USC
 §1421b(p).

5 Section 21. Guam Memorial Hospital Authority Pharmaceuticals Fund 6 Appropriation. Pursuant to §§26208 and 26208.1 of Chapter 26, Division 2 of Title 11 7 Guam Code Annotated, the sum of Thirteen Million Ninety One Thousand One Hundred 8 Ninety Four Dollars (**\$13,091,194**) as appropriated from the General Fund in Chapter II, 9 Section 1, Part IV (E) of this Act is appropriated to the Guam Memorial Hospital 10 Authority Pharmaceuticals Fund for Fiscal Year 2010.

Section 22. Appropriations to Retirees' for Supplemental Annuity Benefits and for Other Costs.

13 (a) The sum of Eleven Million Seven Hundred Thirty Six Thousand One 14 Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$11,736,120) is appropriated from the General Fund to the 15 Supplemental Annuity Benefits Special Fund for Fiscal Year 2010 for direct payments to 16 government of Guam retirees who retired *prior* to October 1, 1995, or their survivors, for 17 the continuing payment of Four Thousand Two Hundred Thirty Eight Dollars (\$4,238) 18 per year in supplemental annuity benefits, consisting of the sums of One Thousand Two 19 Hundred Dollars (\$1,200), One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500), Seven 20 Hundred Dollars (\$700), and Eight Hundred Thirty Eight Dollars (\$838) in annual 21 benefits authorized by various General Appropriation Acts.

(b) *No* retiree who is eligible for Retiree Supplemental Annuity Benefits
provided for in Subsection (a) hereof *shall* receive said Benefits *if* his annual retirement

annuity, *excluding* survivor benefits and excluding the Supplemental benefits authorized
herein, is *greater than* Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000). No retiree who is eligible for
Retiree Supplemental Annuity Benefits *shall* receive *more than* the sum of Forty
Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) in combined retirement annuities and Supplemental Annuity
Benefits in any one Fiscal Year.

6 (c) The Director of Administration *shall* disburse to the retirees *or* their 7 survivors, the supplemental annuity benefits provided for in Subsection (a) of this 8 Section. The Government of Guam Retirement Fund *shall* provide the Director of 9 Administration with the information he needs to effect disbursement.

(d) Funds held in the Supplemental Annuity Benefits Special Fund *shall not* be
commingled with the General Fund *or* any other fund, *shall* be held in a separate bank
account that *shall* continue to be administered by the Director of Administration and *shall not* be subject to *I Maga'lahen Guåhan's* transfer authority.

14 **(e)** For Fiscal Year 2010, the Guam Power Authority, the A.B. Won Pat 15 International Airport Authority, the Guam Economic Development and Commerce 16 Authority, the Guam Housing Corporation, the Government of Guam Retirement Fund, 17 the Jose D. Leon Guerrero Commercial Port, the Guam Waterworks Authority and the 18 Guam Visitors Bureau *shall* remit to the Department of Administration an amount equal 19 to the number of retirees eligible pursuant to subsection (a) hereof who have retired from 20 that entity multiplied by Four Thousand Two Hundred Thirty Eight Dollars (\$4,238). 21 Said remittances *shall* be paid in two (2) equal installments on *or* before October 10, 2009, and April 15, 2010, respectively. Said remittances shall not be subject to I 22 23 Maga'lahen Guåhan's transfer authority.

- (f) The sum of Twenty Million Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$20,200,000)
 is appropriated from the General Fund to the Government of Guam Retirement Fund to
 pay the following two (2) items for current retirees for Fiscal Year 2010:

- Retiree group health, dental and life insurance premiums (to continue existing programs currently contained in the semi-monthly payments); and
- 7 (2) Retiree life insurance subsidy (to continue existing programs
 8 currently contained in the semi-monthly payments).

9 **(g)** For Fiscal Year 2010, the Guam Power Authority, the A.B. Won Pat 10 International Airport Authority, the Guam Economic Development and Commerce 11 Authority, the Guam Housing Corporation, the Government of Guam Retirement Fund, 12 the Jose D. Leon Guerrero Commercial Port, the Guam Waterworks Authority and the Guam Visitors Bureau shall remit to the Government of Guam Retirement Fund 13 14 payments for medical, dental, and life insurance payments for retirees who have retired 15 from those respective agencies. Said remittances shall be paid in two (2) equal 16 installments on *or* before October 10, 2009 and on *or* before April 1, 2010, respectively. 17 The agencies' remittances for medical, dental and life insurance mandated herein are ex 18 gratia payments and are for Fiscal Year 2010 only.

(h) For Fiscal Year 2010, the sum of Six Hundred Eighty Four Thousand
Dollars (\$684,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Government of Guam
Retirement Fund to pay the cost of Medicare premiums for government of Guam retirees
and their survivors who are eligible to receive Social Security income benefits and who

are required by the government of Guam Group Health Insurance Program to pay said
 premiums to participate therein.

3 (i) For Fiscal Year 2010, the sum of One Hundred Forty Five Thousand Dollars
4 (\$145,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Government of Guam
5 Retirement Fund for *I Maga'lahi* and *I Segundu na Maga'lahi/I Segundu na Maga'haga*6 Pensions.

7 (j) For Fiscal Year 2010, the sum of Four Hundred Fifty Eight Thousand Four 8 Hundred Forty Eight Dollars (**\$458,448**) is appropriated from the General Fund to the 9 Government of Guam Retirement Fund for retirement annuities for former judges and 10 justices of the Superior Court and Supreme Court of Guam.

(k) The Government of Guam Retirement Fund Board of Trustees *shall* enact
and, *if* necessary, amend administrative regulations that establish procedures to ensure the
proper submission, receipt and accounting of all sums remitted pursuant to Subsections
(e) and (g) hereof.

15 Section 23. Survivor Supplemental Annuity Additions. Title 4 GCA 16 §8135(d)(6) is *amended* to read:

17 "(6) the prospective payment of supplemental benefits for the period of
18 [October 1, 2008, through September 30, 2009] October 1, 2009, through
19 September 30, 2010, for survivors of those employees who retired *prior* to
20 October 1, 1995, to be paid in the following manner:

21 (i) Four Thousand Two Hundred Thirty-eight Dollars (\$4,238.00) in
22 Retiree Supplemental Annuity Benefits, known as the sum of One
23 Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00), One Thousand five

1 Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00), Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00), 2 and Eight Hundred Thirty-eight Dollars (\$838.00) in annual benefits formerly contained in various General Appropriation Acts. 3 4 No person eligible for Retiree Supplemental Annuity Benefits (ii) 5 provided for in this Section shall receive such benefits if his regular annual retirement annuity *exclusive* of the supplemental 6 7 amounts authorized hereby exceeds Forty Thousand Dollars No persons eligible for Retiree Supplemental 8 (\$40,000.00). 9 Annuity Benefits *shall* receive more than the sum of Forty 10 Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) in combined retirement annuities 11 and supplemental retirement annuities." 12 Section 24. **Disability Supplemental Annuity Additions.** Title 4 GCA 13 §8129(g) is *amended* to read: 14 "(g) Any disability retirement annuitant who commenced receiving a 15 disability retirement annuity prior to October 1, 1995, and who is entitled to disability retirement benefits under this Chapter shall receive, during the period 16 commencing on [October 1, 2008, and ending on September 30, 2009] October 1, 17 18 2009, and ending on September 30, 2010, prospective non-cumulative 19 supplemental annuity benefits as follows: 20 (1)Four Thousand Two Hundred Thirty-eight Dollars 21 (\$4,238.00) in Retiree Supplemental Annuity Benefits, 22 known as the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars 23 (\$1,200.00), One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars

5 *No* retiree who is eligible for Retiree Supplemental Annuity (ii) 6 Benefits provided for in this Section *shall* receive such benefit *if* 7 his regular annual retirement annuity, excluding the supplemental 8 amounts authorized herein and survivor benefits, exceeds Forty 9 Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00). A retiree who is eligible for 10 Retiree Supplemental Annuity Benefits shall receive no more than 11 Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) in combined retirement 12 annuities and supplemental retirement annuities."

13 Section 26. Appropriation for Cost of Living Allowance (COLA). (a) I 14 Maga'lahen Guåhan shall provide, by a single lump sum payment, a "Cost of Living" 15 Allowance" (COLA) of One Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$1,100) to each retiree of 16 the Government of Guam Retirement Fund who is retired as of September 30, 2009, or 17 his survivor. The sum of Seven Million Six Hundred Seventy Thousand Dollars 18 (\$7,670,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Administration to pay said Cost of Living Allowance (COLA). 19

(b) The Guam Power Authority, A. B. Won Pat International Airport Authority,

Said 15 funds *shall* be deposited into the Judicial Client Services Fund account, as created by 16 Title 7 GCA, Division 1, Chapter 9.6, and *shall not* be subject to any transfer authority.

17 Section 29. Adult and Juvenile Drug Courts. The sum of Four Hundred 18 Ninety Eight Thousand Three Hundred Seventy Four Dollars (\$498,374) is appropriated 19 from the General Fund to the Judiciary of Guam for the operations of the Adult and 20 Juvenile Drug Courts for Fiscal Year 2010.

21 Section 30. Family Visitation Center. The sum of Ninety Nine Thousand 22 Four Hundred Ten Dollars (**\$99,410**) is appropriated from the Safe Streets Fund, for 23 Fiscal Year 2010, to the Judiciary of Guam to pay for contractual services for the 1 operation of the Family Visitation Center, provided, that the Judiciary must comply with 2 Title 16 GCA §18125 (c) and (d) and Title 7 GCA §9211 (b).

Public Streetlights Appropriations. 4 **Appropriations.** The sum of Three Million Three Hundred Thirty Six Thousand Thirty 5 Eight Dollars (\$3,336,038) is appropriated from the Street Light Fund and the sum of 6 Nine Hundred Fifteen Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (**\$915,750**) is appropriated 7 from the Guam Highway Fund to the Department of Public Works to pay the Guam 8 Power Authority for the installation and operation of public streetlights in Fiscal Year 9 2010.

10 General Fund Appropriation. The sum of One Million Eighty Four **(b)** 11 Thousand Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$1,084,250) is appropriated from the General 12 Fund to the Department of Public Works to pay to the Guam Power Authority for the 13 installation and operation of public street lights in Fiscal Year 2010.

Support of Child in Custody - 19 GCA §5116. The sum of Six Section 32. 15 Hundred Eighty Four Thousand One Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$684,170) is appropriated 16 from the General Fund for Fiscal Year 2010 to the Department of Administration for the 17 sole purpose of paying orders of the court pursuant to 19 GCA §5116.

18 Section 33. **Residential Treatment Fund.** The sum of One Million Two 19 Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,200,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the 20 Department of Administration (DOA) in Fiscal Year 2010 to pay the expenses of persons 21 under the jurisdiction of the Superior Court of Guam who require residential care because 22 of physical, mental or emotional disabilities or severe emotional disturbances. All such 23 persons and their escorts referred off Guam for treatment and care shall submit to the 1 Director of Administration appropriate documentation to justify and receive 2 reimbursement of their travel expenses. The Director of Administration *shall* submit a 3 report to *I Maga'lahen Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* a report 4 describing all expenditures made pursuant to this appropriation *no later than* thirty (30) 5 days after the end of each quarter of the fiscal year and post the same on the DOA 6 website.

Section 34. Government Claims Fund. The sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Administration for the Government Claims Fund for payment of approved government claims in Fiscal Year 2010. The Director of Administration shall, *no later than* thirty (30) days after the close of each quarter of Fiscal Year 2010, submit to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* a report describing expenditures made pursuant to this appropriation and post the same on the Department's website.

14 Section 35. Government of Guam's General Purpose Financial Statement 15 and Single Audit Report. The sum of Three Hundred Fifty Three Thousand Six 16 Hundred Fifty Six Dollars (\$353,656) is appropriated from the General Fund to the 17 Department of Administration for the Fiscal Year 2009 Audit of the Government of 18 Guam's General Purpose Financial Statement and the Single Audit Report. The Public 19 Auditor *shall* administer said funds and *shall* oversee the annual audit.

20 Section 36. Single Audit Report on Tourist Attraction Fund. The sum of 21 Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000) is appropriated from the Tourist Attraction Fund to 22 the Department of Administration for the Fiscal Year 2009 Audit of the Government of 1 Guam's Tourist Attraction Fund Financial Statement and Single Audit Report. The 2 Public Auditor shall administer said funds and shall oversee the annual audit.

Section 37. Single Audit Report on Guam Highway Fund. The sum of 4 Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000) is appropriated from the Guam Highway Fund to 5 the Department of Administration for the Fiscal Year 2009 Audit of the Government of 6 Guam's Highway Fund Financial Statement and Single Audit Report. The Public 7 Auditor shall administer said funds and shall oversee the annual audit.

8 Section 38. Maintenance and Repair of Public Restrooms. The sum of Five 9 Hundred Twenty Thousand One Hundred Sixty Six Dollars (\$520,166) is appropriated 10 from the Tourist Attraction Fund to the Department of Parks and Recreation for the 11 maintenance and repair of restroom facilities in public parks island-wide, purchase of 12 equipment and hiring of lifeguards for Fiscal Year 2010.

13 Section 39. Youth Program Appropriation. The sum of Three Hundred 14 Seventy One Thousand Six Hundred Seventy Seven Dollars (\$371,677) is appropriated 15 from the General Fund for Fiscal Year 2010 to the Department of Youth Affairs (DYA) 16 to fund programs contracted out to non-governmental organizations for youths who are 17 runaways, homeless, or victims of abuse.

18 Appropriation to the Worker's Compensation Fund. The sum Section 40. 19 of Seven Hundred Ninety Eight Thousand Five Hundred Ninety Three Dollars 20 (\$798,593) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Labor for the 21 Worker's Compensation Fund for Fiscal Year 2010 for Worker's Compensation 22 payments pursuant to Title 22 GCA §9144, including obligations incurred in past years 23 and in the future. Said appropriation may be used to pay for medical, surgical, and other treatment; nurses; hospital services; medical travel and per diem costs; medicine; crutches; and equipment required by a claimant for such period as his injury and the recovery there from may require. Said appropriation *shall not* be expended for disability compensation payments for FTE's funded by this Act. The Director of Labor may use *no more than* Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) from said appropriation to pay for legal services for Worker's Compensation hearings.

7 Section 41. Federal Matching Grants-In-Aid for Office of the Attorney
8 General. The sum of Three Million Two Hundred Forty Five Thousand One Hundred
9 Twenty Four Dollars (\$3,245,124) is authorized from Federal Matching Grants-in-Aid to
10 the Office of the Attorney General for its operations in Fiscal Year 2010.

Section 42. Consent Decree. The sum of Two Million Five Hundred Thousand
Dollars (\$2,500,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Public
Works for goods and services identified by Gershman, Brickner & Bratton, Inc.
("Receiver") as necessary to enforce the terms of the Consent Decree in the United States
District Court of Guam, Civil Case No. 02-00022.

Section 43. Appropriation to COMRIGHT-21. The sum of Thirty Thousand
Four Hundred Seventy Three Dollars (\$30,473) is appropriated from the General Fund to
the Bureau of Statistics and Plans for the operations of the Modernization and Rightsizing
Commission (COMRIGHT-21) in Fiscal Year 2010.

Section 44. Guam Commission for Educator Certification (GCEC). The
sum of Two Hundred Sixty Nine Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty Two Dollars (\$269,752)
is appropriated from the General Fund to the Guam Commission for Educator
Certification for its operations in Fiscal Year 2010.

1 Section 45. Appropriation to Expend Indirect Cost Fees Collected for 2 Fiscal Year 2010. The Bureau of Budget and Management Research develops the 3 annual central cost allocation plan and indirect cost rate proposal for the collection of 4 government of Guam's share of indirect costs associated with the administration of 5 Federal grants and contracts, and the Department of Administration ensures this indirect 6 cost rate is applied and charged to the applicable Federal grants and contracts. The sum of 7 Fifty Nine Thousand Four Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$59,470) is appropriated from the 8 General Fund to the Bureau of Budget and Management Research, and the sum of Fifty 9 Nine Thousand Four Hundred Sixty Nine Dollars (\$59,469) is appropriated from the 10 General Fund to the Department of Administration for costs such as training, supplies and 11 equipment associated with negotiating and administering the government of Guam's 12 indirect cost rate in Fiscal Year 2010.

Section 46. Guam Territorial Band. The sum of Twenty Five Thousand
Dollars (\$25,000) of the General Fund appropriation contained in Chapter II, Section 1,
Part IX (B) of this Act *shall* be used to fund the operations of the Guam Territorial Band
in Fiscal Year 2010.

Section 47. Department of Agriculture – Animal Shelter. The sum of Fifty
Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of
Agriculture to fund a contract with a private entity to manage and operate the Yigo
Animal Shelter in Fiscal Year 2010.

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CHAPTER IV

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

3 Section 1. Retirement Option for Government of Guam Employees. A 4 member of the Government of Guam Retirement Fund who is eligible for retirement may 5 retire upon the complete remittance of his outstanding individual contributions to the 6 Fund, including the employee and employer retirement contributions. Any and all fees, 7 interest at actuarial rates, and penalties required by the Government of Guam Retirement 8 Fund *shall* be paid by the Government.

9 This Section *shall not* restrict the continuing remittance of existing Retirement 10 Fund contributions as required by law *or* by the Government of Guam Retirement Fund. 11 By the fifteenth (15th) day of each month, the Director of the Government of Guam 12 Retirement Fund *shall* provide a detailed report to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* 13 regarding said remittances and the number of retirements pursuant to this Section during 14 the previous month. Nothing herein *shall* be construed to abrogate any provision of 15 Public Law 28-38.

16 Section 2. Volunteers and Donations for Skinner Plaza, Plaza De 17 Espana and Guam Congress Building. The Executive Director of *I Liheslaturan* 18 *Guåhan* may receive donations, including, but *not* restricted to, donations of goods, 19 materials and services, for the purpose of maintaining and renovating Skinner Plaza, the 20 Plaza De Espana, and the Guam Congress Building (also known as the Old Legislative 21 Building).

22 Section 3. Temporary Employment of Retired Corrections Officers. 23 The Department of Corrections may hire retired Guam Corrections Officers *if* a critical

1 need arises. Retired corrections officers hired under this Section may receive their 2 retirement annuity while employed on this temporary basis. Officers may only be hired under this section only to fill positions left vacant because of military activation of 3 4 corrections officers filling those positions and *shall* be terminated when the incumbent 5 returns from military service. Retired officers may be hired only in the ranks of 6 Corrections Officers Supervisor I, at Step I only, and *shall not* receive sick and annual leave. Officers hired under this section shall meet requirements for the position in 7 8 question *except* for written examinations and the Director of Corrections *shall* certify that 9 every retiree hired is fit for duty. Notwithstanding Title 4 GCA §8121(a), a retiree hired 10 pursuant to this Section may continue to receive his annuity.

11 **Temporary Employment of Retired Guam Police Officers.** Section 4. 12 The Guam Police Department may hire retired Guam Police Officers if a critical need 13 arises because of military activation of police officers. The retiree hired shall fill such a 14 vacant position and shall be terminated when the incumbent returns from military service. 15 Retired officers may be hired only at the ranks of Sergeant I and below, only at Step I, 16 and shall not receive sick and annual leave. Officers hired under this Section shall first 17 meet the requirements, except for written examinations, for the position in question and 18 the Chief of Police shall certify that every retiree hired is fit for duty. Notwithstanding 19 Title 4 GCA §8121(a), retirees hired temporarily pursuant to this Section hereto may 20 continue to receive retirement benefits.

Section 5. Temporary Employment of Retired Guam Fire Fighters. The
 Guam Fire Department (GFD) may hire retired GFD firefighters *if* a critical need arises
 because of military activation of GFD firefighters. The retirees hired *shall* fill such a

vacant position and shall be terminated when the incumbent returns from military service.
Retired fire personnel may be hired only at the ranks of Fire Specialist and below, only at
Step I, and shall not receive sick and annual leave. Retired firefighters hired under this
Section shall first meet the requirements, except for written examinations, for the position
in question and the Fire Chief shall certify that every retiree hired is fit for duty.
Notwithstanding Title 4 GCA §8121(a), retirees hired temporarily pursuant to this
Section hereto may continue to receive retirement benefits.

8 Section 6. **Temporary Employment of Retired Customs and Quarantine** 9 Officers. The Customs and Quarantine Agency may hire retired Customs and 10 Quarantine Officers when a critical need arises as a result of military activation of 11 Customs officers *or* when vacancies cannot be filled within six (6) months because of the 12 lack of qualified applicants. The retired officer *shall* fill such a vacant position and *shall* 13 be terminated when the incumbent returns from military service or when a fully-qualified 14 applicant is available. Retired officers may be hired *only* in the ranks of Customs Officer 15 III and below, only at Step I, and *shall* not receive sick and annual leave. Retirees hired 16 pursuant to this Section *shall* meet requirements for the position in question, *except* for 17 written examinations, and the Director of Customs *shall* certify that every retiree hired is 18 fit for duty. The requirements of Title 17, Article 3, Chapter 32 are waived for 19 employment pursuant hereto except for §32304(b)(4). Notwithstanding Title 4 GCA 20 §8121(a), retirees hired temporarily pursuant hereto may continue to receive their 21 retirement benefits.

Section 7. Temporary Employment of Retired Department of Revenue
 and Taxation Employees. The Department of Revenue & Taxation may hire retired

employees of the Department of Revenue & Taxation when a critical need arises in the areas of Tax Collection, Taxpayer Assistance, Tax Investigation, Auditing, and Tax Processing. Said retirees *shall* be hired at Step I for the position in question and *shall* not receive sick and annual leave. Notwithstanding Title 4 GCA §8121(a), retirees hired temporarily pursuant hereto may continue to receive their retirement benefits.

6 Section 8. Locum Tenens Exemption during the Absence of the Chief 7 Medical Examiner. The Office of the Chief Medical Examiner is exempt from the 8 government of Guam Procurement Law in contracting for the professional services of a 9 qualified medical examiner to be provided when the Chief Medical Examiner is absent 10 from work.

Section 9. Advance Payments for Medical Services. In order to expedite acceptance of MIP clients by facilities in California, Hawaii or Manila for medical treatment approved by the Medically Indigent Program, the Director of Public Health and Social Services may advance payments for said medical treatment, and may establish escrow accounts for immediate and advance payment of medical treatment at those Joint Commission Accredited hospitals determined by the Director to be best able to serve Medically Indigent Program clients.

18 Section 10. Transfer of Employees. Notwithstanding any other provision of 19 law, and in recognition of personnel shortages in certain areas, *I Maga'lahen Guåhan* is 20 authorized to transfer employees within *or* between any department *or* agency of the 21 government of Guam, *except* that:

(a) This Section shall *not* apply to any employee of the Legislative *or* Judicial
Branches of government;

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(b) The transfer of an employee shall *not* result in a loss of pay *or* salary;

2 (c) *No* employee *shall* be transferred if the employee has filed a viable 3 grievance with the Civil Service Commission for discrimination based on political 4 affiliation, gender, *or* sexual harassment, *unless* the employee consents to said transfer;

5 (d) No employee of an autonomous agency may be transferred to a line
6 department *or* agency;

(e) *I Maga'lahi shall* transfer the funding authorized for that employee's
position from the transferor agency to the transferee agency, including GMHA, DPHSS,
DMHSA, unless the transfer is from a line agency to an autonomous agency; and

10 (f) This Section *shall not* be used to transfer employees acting in good faith 11 who report *or* expose bad business practices, illegal activities, *or* inappropriate conduct 12 by public officials.

13 Section 11. Moratorium on Compensation for Boards and Commissions. 14 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, rule, or regulation, except for the Civil 15 Service Commission, the Guam Education Policy Board, and the Consolidated 16 Commission on Utilities, a moratorium is hereby placed on the compensation of all 17 members of government boards and commissions for their attendance at hearings or 18 meetings, through the end of Fiscal Year 2010.

Section 12. Contracts. (a) *Except* for positions filled in accordance with the
merit system at the University of Guam, the Guam Community College, the Guam Public
School System, the Judiciary of Guam, the Department of Law, the Guam Police
Department, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, and licensed health professionals at the Guam
Memorial Hospital, the Department of Public Health and Social Services and the

Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse, positions in the classified and
unclassified service *shall* not be filled pursuant to a contractual arrangement. The
Judiciary may hire judges and justices pro tem, law clerks and legal interns by contract.
The University of Guam, the Guam Public School System and the Guam Community
College may hire retired faculty by contract.

6 (b) Subject to Title 5 GCA Chapter 5, government of Guam departments and 7 agencies may contract with independent contractors, provided that *no* agency may 8 contract for services customarily provided by employees in the classified service *except* 9 as permitted by law.

10 (c) This Section *does not* prohibit the use of independent contracts to obtain 11 professional services, such as licensed health professionals, licensed architects, licensed 12 engineers, legal services, actuarial services and auditing services (to include the 13 Government of Guam Annual Financial Audit) by those agencies that *do not* customarily 14 obtain such services through an employee.

15 **(d)** The Attorney General may contract with attorneys as independent 16 contractors who can provide assistance in areas in which it is impracticable for the 17 Department of Law to proceed with its existing civil service attorneys such as anti-trust, 18 maritime and admiralty law, patent and copyright law, prosecution of white collar crime, 19 utilities regulation, the issuance of bonds, special tax issues, and complete civil litigation. 20 The Attorney General *shall* file a copy of every such contract with the Chief Procurement 21 Officer and the Director of Administration together with a written certification stating 22 why it was impracticable to handle the matter with the Department's civil service 23 attorneys and justifying the hiring of an independent contractor.

1	Section 13. Amendment to the Better Public Services Fund. §161101 (b),
2	Chapter 161 of Title 11, Guam Code Annotated is hereby amended to read as follows:
3	"(b) Ten percent (10%) of all fee and license revenues received by the
4	Department of Revenue and Taxation, to exclude fees and licenses affecting
5	Guam Highway Fund and the Street Light Fund, shall be deposited into said
6	Fund."
7	Section 14. Repeal of Article 15 to Chapter 22, Division 2 of Title 5, Guam
8	Code Annotated relative to the Indirect Cost Fund. Article 15 to Chapter 22,
9	Division 2 of Title 5, Guam Code Annotated is hereby repealed in its entirety.
10	Section 15. Amendment to Comparative Revenue and Expenditure
11	Reporting. §4109 (c) (3), Chapter 4 of Title 5, Guam Code Annotated is hereby
12	amended to read as follows:
13	"(3) Modify or withhold the planned expenditures at any time
14	during the appropriation period if the Bureau of Budget and Management
15	Research finds that such expenditures are greater than those necessary to
16	execute the programs at the level authorized by I Maga'lahi (the
17	Governor) and I Liheslatura (the Legislature), or that the receipts and
18	surpluses will be insufficient to meet the authorized expenditure levels,

If revenues are 5 tracking below projected revenues for the year, the Bureau of Budget and Management Research shall adjust and sequester an amount of the 6 7 remaining allotments equal to the percentage of revenues that are below the fiscal year's projected revenues. The Director of the Bureau of Budget 8 9 and Management Research, the Director of Administration, and the 10 Director of Revenue and Taxation *shall* certify said reports, which *shall* be 11 transmitted to I Maga'lahen Guåhan and the Speaker of I Liheslaturan 12 *Guåhan no later than* fifteen (15) days after the end of each the last day of the succeeding month." 13

1	CHAPTER VII
2	ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS
3	Section 1. Authorization for Matching Requirements for Federal Grants-
4	In-Aid. All departments are authorized to expend funds appropriated in this Act for
5	matching requirements of Federal grants.
6	Section 2. Carryover of Local and Federal Matching Program Funds
7	for Grants. The Local and Federal Matching Funds for programs whose expiration dates
8	extend beyond September 30, 2010 shall not lapse and may be expended throughout the
9	period of the grant award.
10	Section 3. Government of Guam Retirement Fund Rate of
11	Contribution. In accordance with §8137(e) of Article 1, Chapter 8 of Title 4 of the
12	Guam Code Annotated, the government rate of contribution to the Retirement Fund
13	throughout Fiscal Year 2010 shall be 26.33%.
14	Section 4. Autonomous Agency Revenues and Expenditures Reported
15	to I Maga'lahen Guåhan and I Liheslaturan Guåhan. Notwithstanding any other
16	provision of law, every autonomous and semi-autonomous agency or public corporation
17	in the government of Guam shall report all revenues and expenditures for all funds under
18	its purview and administration to the I Maga'lahen Guåhan and the Speaker of I
19	Liheslaturan Guåhan on a monthly basis and post the same on its website. Each monthly
20	report shall be due no later than ten (10) days after the end of each month.
21	Section 5. Revenue Tracking Report. The Director of the Bureau of
22	Budget and Management Research, in collaboration with the Director of Revenue and
23	Taxation and the Director of Administration, shall determine, after the end of each month

of the fiscal year, the revenue tracking for the balance of the fiscal year, based upon the actual collections of the preceding month, and prepare a statement comparing "actual" and "projected" revenues. Said statement *shall* be certified as to its accuracy by each of the aforementioned Directors, and submitted to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan no later than* thirty (30) days after the end of each month of the fiscal year. Said statements *shall* be posted quarterly on the Bureau of Budget and Management Research's website.

7 Section 6. Special Fund Transfer. *I Maga'lahen Guåhan* is authorized to
8 transfer to the General Fund any cash available from any appropriated Special Fund *or*9 Revolving Fund to fund the appropriations authorized by this Act.

10 All cash from Special funds *or* Revolving funds transferred to cover the 11 appropriations authorized by this Act *shall* be promptly reimbursed to the Special *or* 12 Revolving Fund from which it was withdrawn as cash becomes available.

I Maga'lahen Guåhan shall submit a report to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* on the fifth (5th) day of every month on all transfers made pursuant to this Section. Said report *shall* enumerate the amount of each transfer, identify the funds to and from which the transfer was made and state the purpose of each transfer.

Section 7. Transfer Authority of I Maga'lahen Guåhan. I Maga'lahen *Guåhan* is authorized to transfer funds between Fiscal Year 2010 General Fund
Executive Branch appropriations, but *shall* not transfer appropriations made to the
Judiciary, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, and the Office of Finance and Budget.

21 Section 8. Secondary and Tertiary Road Projects. *I Maga'lahi*, after 22 consultation with the Village Mayors, may delete and add secondary and tertiary road 23 repair projects to the list in Part IV of Chapter II of Public Law 28-68, if such amendment is necessitated by changes in cost estimates, availability of funds *or* critical needs,
 provided that the repair of potholes on primary and secondary roads *shall* remain a high
 priority and *shall* commence as soon as practicable.

4 Section 9. Independent Contractors. The Office of *I Maga'lahi*, the Office
5 of *I Segundu Na Maga'lahen Guåhan* and the Guam State Clearinghouse may enter into
6 agreements with independent contractors pursuant to Guam procurement laws.

7 Section 10. Facilities Insurance Requirements. Every department and
8 agency of the government of Guam, as part of its appropriations for operations contained
9 in this Act, may expend such sums as necessary for facilities insurance requirements.

10 Section 11. Reporting Requirements for Non-Profit Organizations. All 11 non-profit organizations that receive funds pursuant to this Act *shall* maintain financial 12 records that accurately account for said funds and *shall* provide a budgetary breakdown 13 by object category to the department *or* agency that oversees the appropriation. The non-14 profit organization *shall* also provide to said department:

15 (a) A quarterly report describing its activities during the reporting
16 period and the results it achieved *no later than* twenty (20) days after the
17 end of each quarter;

18 (b) Notification of all procurement of equipment and services of Five
19 Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or more prior to awarding the contract
20 therefor;

21 (c) Access to the overseeing department *or* agency's duly authorized
22 representative, and Government of Guam auditors, to appropriate records

1for the purpose of audit and examination of books, documents, papers and2records of funds expended under the appropriation;

3 (d) Submission of a detailed inventory listing of each year's purchases,
4 as certified by its certifying officer; and

(e) A Final Report to the overseeing department *or* agency for
submission to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* containing a full disclosure of all
expenditures of funds appropriated by this Act *no later than* November 15,
2010. The overseeing department *or* agency *shall* post the same on its
website.

10 (f) Non-compliance with these reporting requirements will subject the 11 non-profit organization to a three percent (3%) reduction of its 12 appropriation(s) and the overseeing agency's contract with the 13 organization *shall* so provide.

14Section 12.Appropriations from the Guam Contractors License Board15Fund and Professional Engineers, Architects and Land Surveyors Board Fund to16revert to the General Fund for Fiscal Year 2010. At the end of Fiscal Year 2010, any17unexpended or unencumbered appropriations to the Guam Contractors License Board18(GCLB) Fund and the Professional Engineers, Architects and Land Surveyors (PEALS)19Board Fund shall revert to the General Fund. Any revenues collected in excess of the20appropriations to these funds shall revert to the General Fund.

21 Section 13. *Unless* otherwise specified in this Act:

(a) General Fund Reversion. All unexpended *or* unencumbered
 appropriations made from the General Fund pursuant to this Act *shall* revert to the
 General Fund on the last day of Fiscal Year 2010;

4 (b) Tourist Attraction Fund Reversion. All unexpended or
5 unencumbered appropriations made from the Tourist Attraction Fund pursuant to
6 this Act *shall* revert to the Tourist Attraction Fund on the last day of Fiscal Year
7 2010.

8 (c) Healthy Futures Fund Reversion. All unexpended *or* 9 unencumbered appropriations made from the Healthy Futures Fund pursuant to 10 this Act *shall* revert to the Healthy Futures Fund on the last day of Fiscal Year 11 2010.

12 Section 14. Restriction on the Home Use of Government of Guam 13 Vehicles. Except when *expressly* permitted by Title 4 GCA §1103(c), *no* government of 14 Guam owned, leased *or* rented vehicles may be driven home by an employee *unless* such 15 employee is on call as an emergency first responder.

Section 15. Authorization for Payment of Prior Years' Obligations.
Appropriations made in this Act may be expended for the payment of prior years'
obligations.

Section 16. Professional Engineers, Architects and Land Surveyors Board
Fund Collections. The Professional Engineers, Architects and Land Surveyors Board is
authorized for its Fiscal Year 2010 operations to expend up to the level of revenues
collected for the Professional Engineers, Architects and Land Surveyors Board Fund in
Fiscal Year 2010.

1 Section 17. Land Survey Revolving Fund (LSRF) Appropriation 2 Provision. Notwithstanding §60602, Chapter 60 of Title 21 GCA, the appropriation 3 made from the Land Survey Revolving Fund to the Department of Land Management by 4 Section 1, Part VII (D) of Chapter II of this Act may be expended for the Department of 5 Land Management's operations in Fiscal Year 2010.

6 Section 18. Severability. *If* any provision of this Act or its application to any 7 person or circumstances is held invalid, the invalidity shall *not* affect other provisions or 8 applications of this Act which can be given effect without the invalid provision or 9 application, and to this end the provisions of this Act are severable.
