But on Guarn, there are 64.2 reported rapes per one hundred throusand (100,000) people. 

WHEREAS, the Healing Hearts Crisis Center's 2016 statistics show that of the eighty-seven (87) sexual assault cases reported, sixty-four percent (64%) of the sexual assault perpetrators were family members of the victim; twenty-seven percent (27%) of the sexual assault perpetrators were acquaintances of the victim; five percent (5%) of the sexual assault perpetrators were strangers to the victim; and four percent (4%) of the sexual assault perpetrators were unknown to the victim; and

WHEREAS, the Healing Hearts Crisis Center's 2016 statistics show that of the eighty-seven (87) sexual assault cases reported, thirty-nine percent (39%) were Chamorro; seventeen percent (17%) were of mixed ethnicities; twelve percent (12%) were Filipino; nine percent (9%) were Chuukese; seven percent (7%) were Caucasian; four percent (4%) were Pohnpeian; three percent (3%) did not disclose their ethnicity;
 two percent (2%) were Japanese; two percent (2%) were Yapese; one percent (1%) were
 Kosraean; one percent (1%) were African-American; one percent (1%) were Chinese;
 one percent (1%) were Korean; and one percent (1%) were Palauan; and

5 WHEREAS, according to the Guam Police Department, in 2017, a total of two 6 hundred twenty-eight (228) sexual assault-related cases were reported; and, of the two 7 hundred twenty-eight (228) sexual assault-related cases reported, one hundred nine 8 (109) cases resulted in arrest; and
