

COMMITTEE REPORT DIGEST

I. OVERVIEW

Bill No. <u>198-33</u> (LS) was introduced on October 27, 2015, by Senator Brant T. McCreadie and was subsequently referred by the Committee on Rules to the Committee on Guam US Military Relocation, Public Safety and Judiciary on October 28, 2015.

The Committee on Guam US Military Relocation, Public Safety and Judiciary convened a public hearing on Bill No. <u>198-33</u> (LS) on a Wednesday, December, 30 2015 at 2:00PM in I *Liheslatura's* Public Hearing Room.

II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY & DISCUSSION

Chairman Aguon:

This public hearing sponsored by the Committee on the Guam U.S. Military Relocation, Public Safety, and Judiciary is hereby convened. We do have three pieces of legislation that we will be entertaining this afternoon. In the following order, Bill No. 197, which is relative to extending the duties of the Guam Police Department community assisted policing efforts CAPE volunteers to include event supervision of the 12th FESTPAC of the Pacific Arts sponsored by Speaker Won Pat, T.C. Ada and T.R. Muna Barnes.

Chairman Aguon:

Bill No. 198-33(LS) which is relative to creating the uniform interstate enforcement of domestic violence protection orders sponsored by Senator B.T. McCreadie, and then we will conclude with Bill No. 215-33 (COR) which is relative to recognizing the successful rehabilitation and treatment of individuals convicted of first offender drug cases between 1998 and 2005 sponsored by Vice-Speaker B.J.F. Cruz and Majority Leader R.J. Respicio. As we proceed with this public hearing I would like to recognize the members of the committee and the members of the legislature that are here. Vice Speaker B.J Cruz, thank you very much Mr. Vice-Speaker for joining us. Senator Rory Respicio, Senator Mary Torres and Senator Tony Ada. Thank you Senators again for joining us this afternoon. One other piece of item first of all for notification in compliance with the open government law, the initial notification on this particular public hearing was disseminated on December 22nd and the second notices were disseminated on December 28th. If anyone would like copies of the messages that were disseminated to the stakeholders and the community as well as the print ads by all means, contact my office. We will proceed ladies and gentlemen with the next legislative measure that's on the agenda. Bill No. 198 and as I invite the following individuals to take a seat at the table, I would like to recognize one of the senators in terms of providing a brief with regards to this piece of legislation and if I can invite Mr. Eric Miller, Phil Tydingco, and Richard Dirkx. If there is anyone else in the audience that would like to provide testimony, please you're more than welcome to sign up ad join us at the table. This Bill No.198 which is relative to creating the uniform interstate enforcement of domestic violence protection orders act sponsored by Senator McCreadie and Senator Tony Ada has been asked by Senator McCreadie to provide the opening statements. Senator.

Senator Tony Ada:

Thank you Mr. Chairman. On behalf of Senator McCreadie he regrets that he wasn't able to be here today as he is still currently off island. Bill 198-33 seeks to adopt the uniform interstate enforcement of domestic violence protection orders act, which establishes uniform procedures for the enforcement of domestic violence protection orders across state lines. Adopting this act will mean that Guam courts and law enforcement must enforce all terms of valid protection orders form other states and territories until the order expires. An individual may register a protection order to the Superior Court of Guam and this registration will help facilitate effective enforcement of the order by law enforcement officers. A law enforcement officer upon finding probable cause that the order has been violated must enforce the order. The act has been adopted in at least 18 states and two territories. The issue of enforcement discrepancies of protection orders form other states was brought to Senator McCreadie's attention by Chief Prosecutor Phil Tydingco who has much knowledge and experience regarding this. Seeing its urgency for its victims of domestic violence and especially for those looking to come back to Guam and escape from domestic abuse. Senator McCreadie readily introduced this legislation in October, which was opportune as the month was declared domestic violence awareness month by President Barack Obama and although current law, which was passed almost two decades ago allows for individuals to register a protection order with the Superior Court as pointed out by the Judiciary, Bill 198 does not require registration of the order to enforce it as stated on page 5 line 7. This is what differentiates Bill 198 from current law.

Senator Tony Ada:

It addresses the non-judicial enforcement of protection orders by specifically providing law enforcement officers rules of enforcement as outlined on page 4 line 13 to page 5 line 8. Bill 198 adds another layer of protection for victims of domestic violence and removes a layer of bureaucracy. As Bill 198 further protects officials from civil and criminal liability for enforcement of a protection order if they act on good faith and most importantly provides for a more comprehensive approach in the enforcement of the protection orders and current law fails to address non-judicial enforcement. An amendment to Bill 198 to reconcile or repeal current law almost two decades old is forth coming and hopefully we'll be able to see those amendments and work with the committee and the Chairman for a mark up on this. On behalf of Senator McCreadie he thanks you all very much for being here and for providing your testimony for Bill 198-33. Thank you Mr. Chairman.

Chairman Aguon:

Thank you very much Senator Tony Ada. I take it Phil they are all looking in your direction. The office of the Attorney General. So please can you identify yourself for the record.

Mr. Phil Tydingco:

Thank you Mr. Chair Senator Aguon. Good afternoon Speaker Won-Pat, Senator Tom Ada, Vice-Speaker B.J. Cruz, Senator Respicio, Senator Torres and Senator Tony Ada. As present with me is Janice Camacho, staff council to the Attorney General. On behalf of Attorney General Barret Anderson and the Office of the Attorney General, we urge the legislature to support this proposed bill. I think it it allows this jurisdiction to join 18 others and adding the statue to its books and orders to having enforcement that includes again, not withstanding the fact that we do have on the books in Title 19 Chapter 14 the registration of civil protection orders. What this provides and its a lot more comprehensive is an opportunity for a person who can show with probable cause that they have a protection order involving a domestic violence to be enforced by an officer without having to do the whole registration and that whole process ordinarily requires obtaining council and waiting for the courts to open and so forth. In addition, the statute also provides some civil immunity protections, which is absent nor present in the current statute of Chapter 14 Title 19, which of course was good for its day because that's what was enacted by the 24th Guam Legislature nearly 20 years ago. So in fact to be consistent with that chapter I think the only amendment I would probably offer is on page 5 under 16105 under registration order line 10 where it says it also has a registration section that perhaps we should add an amendment to subsection 8 that says any individual may register their form protection order in this state under 19 GCA Chapter 14 or under this section. That way you don't have to imply that express or repeal that other one but this is a lot more comprehensive and so we ask that you consider enacting this bill. Thank you.

Chairman Aguon:

Thank you very much Mr. Tydingco. Attorney Miller

Mr. Eric Miller

Good afternoon. My name is Eric Miller. I am the Executive Director of the Public Defender Service Corporation. We are very concerned about protecting the victims of domestic violence.

Mr. Eric Miller

I think that this statute is well intended, and it will a lot to help those victims especially those traveling form other jurisdictions. I'm going to defer to my colleague Mr. Dirkx through his unique unintended consequence through this statute and it has to do with the content of Guam's order protection law. With your permission, if I can defer to Mr. Dirkx to point out this issue.

Chairman Aguon:

Thank you very much Attorney Miller. Attorney Dirkx.

Mr. Richard Dirkx:

Good afternoon Senators. I appreciate this opportunity to have some input. I appreciate that the law we have been functioning under is about 20 years old, but I don't know that it's broke or that it needs to be fixed. The Public Defender has been providing protective orders for people for 40 years. Before there was a family violence law or criminal code. Before protective orders were called protective orders. Since 1995 we've had a federal grant to help provide this service to victims. We have a specialist in our office and we like Guam Legal Services can usually provide one-day service in getting protective orders. We see out of jurisdiction orders and roughly two different types of cases. My concern is for the unintended consequences for a person coming back to Guam to avoid an abusive relationship from the states especially if they are coming back if there are children involved, especially if the don't have money. Guam, like most jurisdictions has provided mechanisms to provide protective orders for free. We even have a Kiosk over at the courts so people can get themselves if they don't want to avail themselves to Guam Legal Services or us. Similar thing is going on at the states. It's very easy for a person to walk in, apply for a protective order. The protective order can cover the petitioner, it can cover any children who are in the petitioner's custody, or who are alleged to be in the petitioner's custody and the order can go into place by a judge who has heard the whole proceeding. It can go into place because one side didn't show up for the hearing and different states have different procedures on what is necessary to prove you gave notice to the other side. Here in lies the problem. For a person fleeing another U.S Jurisdiction coming back here and seeking to register their off Guam protective order, I think the law we have now functions quite well. At least in 25 years I've never had a client come in and say the court wouldn't register it, the police wont enforce it. Usually when they are coming back with a foreign order they are leaving the other party behind. My concern is for the ones who flee without an off island protective order. Come back here with to rejoin their family's and leave a relationship that might not even be a merited one. I'd like to focus on two problems. One is. Did you have my annotated copy there. On the bottom of 16103, which is the third page of the order about the middle at subsection C. This law expressly provides that Guam has to enforce any provisions of a valid foreign protection order which govern custody and visitation. Which means that any custody decision made about the children will be controlled by the off-island order even if the children are here. This will strip the Guam Court of Jurisdiction to examine the ... We have to make a. There's a fine determination to be made here. If the custody order is a valid order in a domestic case form the states, we have to enforce it anyway because of the uniform child custody jurisdiction. If however, it is something obtained in a protective order where the judicial supervision in the states will not be as careful as it is in a domestic case the certainly not as careful as in our courts here. There is the danger that a person returning here will be facing a custody determination that was made as a result by an ex-party application in another jurisdiction.

Mr. Richard Dirkx:

To make things worse, our local protective order statute does not allow our judges to grant permanent custody to visitation as part of the protective order process. So if the lady comes here with her children, gets a protective order because she's afraid of the man coming from off island. The judge will grant her temporary custody, temporary visitation but current law does not allow Guam Judges to grant her anything more. If mean while the father or other parent of the children in the states applies for a protective order and under their law gets a grant of custody, our court here, has to enforce the off-island order, and our court here is powerless to help this lady even if she may have the children here. In fact, even though the children may never have left island. If the couple leaves off-island and the children are here, they might have been here all the time. The Guam Court should have control over that. The Guam Court should have some power to act in the best interest of the children. There's one other provision that I think is especially trouble some. Especially in combination with the one we just examined. At the bottom of the same page, one of the requirement is that in case of an order ex-party. In other words, an order obtained by one person without notice to the other, the respondent, who will be the person here on Guam who was given notice and has had or will have an opportunity to be heard. Which means, she comes back with the children, application is made off-island. She gets notice hear that there's a hearing in Dallas in 6 days, our court under this law will be required to enforce the Texas order rather than considering her application before the Guam Court even though she might have applied first. That's my concern. There's no requirements that she actually have had an opportunity to be heard before the order presented. All that's required is that we receive an off-island order, she has an opportunity to be heard. Somewhere under the U.S Flag that's enough that Guam has to enforce it. So she gets an ex-party order saying that she's ordered to stay away from the children, the Texas court may have no idea that the children may have always been here with her. They are entirely reliant on what the applicant back there is telling them and I know that the intention here is to protect victims, but our courts sort out the real victims, the real petitioners from the ones who are trying to do this to compete for a person's divorce. If I have the car and I have the kids this weekend and I file for a protective order, I've got what I want. The other side now has to hire a lawyer. The other thing is that the beginning, its made clear that the Guam Court has enforce these orders should this bill be passed. Even if our local court does not have the power to grant that same relief. So it makes it very clear that even our local judges in a protective order application do not have the power to make permanent custodies. It makes it very clear that that same judge who cant grant relief to the person in front of him is required to follow the order from off-island even though there might not have been a final hearing. This is a complicated thing to obtain but I hope that we will carefully consider the needs of Guam litigants when we look at this. It's a good thing to have orders enforced nationwide, but our folks here face a special problem when they are told to appear in a court thousands and thousands of miles away. It's not like driving from Iowa to Minnesota and this specifically allows custody determination and that can cause a lot of pain and hardship on us if its done carefully. I hope that the final draft of this bill if we pass it will take into consideration the possibility of letting our local judges have some authority to do the right thing in unusual ... so.

Chairman Aguon:

Thank you very much for your testimony this afternoon Attorney Dirkx. I'm certain and confident that the committee is going to look at the guidance coming from both offices as it reports this particular version out with any amendments that will be intact because we certainly want to be on the side of the victim and ensuring that whatever circumstances are that you representing these individuals will be able to make the best decision to hopefully in their steps.

Chairman Aguon:

So I really appreciate your testimony this afternoon. Senator any questions or comments. Mr. Vice-Speaker.

Vice-Speaker B.J. Cruz:

Thank you very much for your testimony because I was concerned about that too because when we passed the custody act, we worked out some of those kinks when we did that 6-8 years ago, but just for my colleagues to completely understand is what could happen if husband and wife could be living in the states and you were using this as an example, the children could be living here with grandma. They have a fight in Tennessee. She wants to get out of the abusive relationship. She jumps on a plane and flies back here. He knows where she is going to go and he is following her back here. Before he leaves Nashville, he goes and applies for protective orders. He gets custody of the children who have never lived in Tennessee and he flies to Guam with a protective order. There had been no hearing. It was ex-party. She even if it wasn't ex party, if she could fly back in March for a hearing, she has an opportunity to present her side, but between now and March the local court will have to enforce the Tennessee order, which is to give custody to the allegedly abusive parent and the children have to be flown back to Tennessee.

Mr. Richard Dirkx:

That's entirely correct and if she can't afford the trip, she loses the kids forever. That's exactly the problem. I'm glad you're one of the good guys.

Chairman Aguon:

Thank you very much Mr. Vice-Speaker.

Mr. Richard Dirkx:

What I'm saying though is that there are attorneys that will help an unscrupulous person who wants to take the kids away, walk through this mine field and they can get an order without the other side if substituted service is allowed they will serve her by sending the papers to the place she moved out of a week ago. The husband or ex-boyfriend knows it, but if it's adequate service in the local law back there, that's what they'll do. I just like to make sure that our judges here, who I would say in almost every case are more careful and are better connected to the community are going to make a very good decision. I would just like them to have some power to do so. Thank you.

Chairman Aguon:

Thank you very much again. Any questions or comments on this proposal? If not thank you very much for your testimonies this afternoon.

The Committee will continue to accept written testimony on any pieces of legislation that have been entertained this afternoon until close of business Monday the 5th of January. Thank you again. Thank you Senators for joining us.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. A new Chapter 16 is hereby added to Title 19 Guam Code

- 1 § 16110. Effective Date.
- 2 § 16111. Transitional Provision.

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- § 16101. Short Title. This Chapter shall be known, and *may* be cited as the Uniform Interstate Enforcement of Domestic-Violence Protection Orders Act.
 - § 16102. **Definitions.** In this Chapter:
- 7 (1) "Foreign protection order" means a protection order issued by a tribunal of another State.
- 9 (2) "Issuing State" means the State whose tribunal issues a protection order.

Dear Chairman Aguon:

On behalf of the Judiciary of Guam (the "Judiciary"), thank you for providing me with the opportunity to submit written testimony regarding Bill No. 198-33, the *Uniform Interstate Enforcement of Domestic-Violence Protection Orders Act*, which was sponsored by Senator Brant T. McCreadie. The Judiciary is in support of the intent of Bill No. 198-33, which is to establish uniform procedures for the interstate enforcement of valid domestic violence protection orders. However, the Judiciary is concerned that the passage of Bill No. 198-33, without reconciling current Guam law allowing for the registration of foreign protection orders, may cause confusion and conflict.

As noted by the sponsor of Bill No. 198-33, current Guam law allows for individuals to register a foreign protection order with the Superior Court. Specifically, 19 GCA Chapter 14, Civil Orders for Protection already provides a process for the registration and enforcement of foreign orders for protection, as well as the maintenance of a registry for protection orders. The language found in 19 GCA Chapter 14 was passed back in 1998 and pre-dates the source of Bill 198-33, the Uniform Interstate Enforcement of Domestic Violence Protection Orders, adopted by the Uniform Law Commission.

Because current law exists regarding the registration of foreign protection orders, the Judiciary suggests that the Legislature reconcile the proposed legislation with the existing language found in Chapter 14, instead of passing legislation adding a new Chapter 16 to Title 19 of the Guam Code Annotated. Reconciling the proposed legislation with current statutory law will prevent possible confusion and conflict concerning the law to be followed.

Additionally, the Judiciary notes that the language proposed in §16105(a)(1) and (2) of Bill No. 198-33 is basically the same language—both subsections describe the procedure to be used to register a foreign protection order with the Superior Court of Guam, i.e., present a certified copy of the order to the Clerk of the Superior Court of Guam for registration. Because either subsection standing alone is sufficient, the Judiciary suggests deleting subsection (2) and reformatting the remaining language accordingly.

Thank you again for the opportunity to provide testimony on Bill No. 198-33.

- (b) Upon receipt of a foreign protection order, the office of the Clerk of the Superior Court shall register the order in accordance with this section. After the order is registered, the office of the Clerk of the Superior Court shall furnish to the individual registering the order a certified copy of the registered order.
- (c) The office of the Clerk of the Superior Court shall register an order upon presentation of a copy of a protection order which has been certified by the issuing State. A registered foreign protection order that is inaccurate or is not currently in effect must be corrected or removed from the registry in accordance with the law of this State.

(d) An individual registering a foreign protection order shall file an affidavit by the protected individual stating that, to the best of the protected individual's knowledge, the order is currently in effect.

- (e) A foreign protection order registered under this Act may be entered in any existing state or federal registry of protection orders, in accordance with applicable law.
- 7 (f) A fee may not be charged for the registration of a foreign protection order.
 - § 16106. Immunity. This State or a local governmental agency, or a law enforcement officer, prosecuting attorney, clerk of court, or any state or local governmental official acting in an official capacity, is immune from civil and criminal liability for an act or omission arising out of the registration or enforcement of a foreign protection order or the detention or arrest of an alleged violator of a foreign protection order if the act or omission was done in good faith in an effort to comply with this Act.
 - § 16107. Other remedies. A protected individual who pursues remedies under this Act is not precluded from pursuing other legal or equitable remedies against the respondent.
 - § 16108. Uniformity of Application and Construction. In applying and construing this Uniform Act, consideration must be given to the need to promote uniformity of the law with respect to its subject matter among States that enact it.
 - § 16109. Severability Clause. If any provisions of this Act or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or applications of this Act which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Act are severable.
 - § 16110. Effective Date. This Act shall be effective upon enactment into law.

§ 16111. Transitional Provision. This Act applies to protection orders issued before the effective date of this Act and to continuing actions for enforcement of foreign protection orders commenced before the effective date of this Act. A request for enforcement of a foreign protection order made on or after the effective date of this Act for violations of a foreign protection order occurring before the effective date of this Act is governed by this Act.
