HEIGHTS, TO PURCHASE LAND IN AGANA HEIGHTS, FOR A 4-H TOUR TO JAPAN, AND TO EXTEND WATER AND POWER LINES, TO CARRY OUT A STUDY OF DISABLED AND HANDICAPPED PERSONS, AND FOR PARTICIPATION OF KANTAN I TAOTAO TANO IN THE FESTIVAL OF THE PACIFIC.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

Section 1. Twenty Nine Thousand Six Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$29,630) are hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the University of Guam for the 8th Pacific History Association Conference, to be held December 4-7, 1990.

Section 2. Three Thousand Two Hundred Seventy Five Dollars (\$3,275) are hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the Agana Heights Mayor's Office to pay certain automotive expenses.

Section 3. One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) are hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the Guam Legal Services Corporation to provide legal services to the poor and the elderly.

Section 4. The grant set out in Section 3 of this Act shall be used during calendar year 1990.

Section 5. Section 9 of Public Law 20-149 is hereby amended to read:

"Section 9. Seven Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$700,000) are appropriated from the General Fund to the Guam Fire Department to hire thirty (30) additional Firefighter I's. Such amount includes salaries, benefits and supplies."

Section 6. Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) are hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the Municipal Planning Council of Inarajan to repair, renovate, expand, and furnish the Inarajan Mayor's Office.

Section 7. Six Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$6,800) are hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Parks and Recreation to fund the participation of the John F. Kennedy High School Girls Basketball team in the 1990 Far East Tournament to be held in Kadena, Japan in May. Within sixty (60) days after May 1, 1990, the Director of Parks and Recreation shall submit to the Legislature a report of all expenditures under this section, including but not limited to a balance sheet, a statement of receipts and a general description of expenses arising out of the participation of the team in the Tournament.

1 Section 8. Subsection (1) of Section 5 of Chapter III of the Act is
2 hereby amended to read:

3 "(1) \$686,125 To supplement the appropriation in Section 1 of
4 Public Law 20-8 for the construction of a gymnasium on Lot No. 12-5
5 REM and Lot No. 13 in the municipality of Agana Heights. The
6 construction and use of such gymnasium on such lots are hereby
7 authorized."

8 Section 9. One Hundred Fifteen Thousand Four Hundred Ninety Dollars
9 (\$115,490) are hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the
10 Department of Land Management to acquire Lot No. 113, originally owned by
11 Asuncion Rosendo Manley, in the municipality of Agana Heights identified on
12 Document No. 323478, consisting of two thousand eighty-three and
13 seventeen hundredths (2,083.17) square meters, for community and
14 recreational facilities.

15 Section 10. Thirteen Thousand One Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$13,160)
16 are appropriated from the General Fund to the University of Guam to fund the
17 1990 4-H Horticultural Career Club Educational Science Tour to Japan.

18 Section 11. Seven Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$700,000) are
19 appropriated from the General Fund to the Guam Power Authority to provide
20 power extensions island-wide.

21 Section 12. Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) are
22 appropriated from the General Fund to the Public Utility Agency of Guam to
23 provide water extensions island-wide.

24 Section 13. Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) are appropriated from the
25 General Fund to the Guam Power Authority to provide a power line extension
26 to Basic Lot 10072, as shown on Land Management Drawing No. L-902, Land
27 Management Check No. 366-FY-86.

28 Section 14. The Director of Administration shall conduct a study and
29 develop a government of Guam Health Insurance Program for disabled,
30 handicapped, or differently able residents of Guam. Such study shall include
31 but not be limited to:

32 (1) Defining the disabled, handicapped or differently able
33 persons who would be included in the program;

34 (2) Determining the health care coverage for such persons;

1 (3) Determining if there are health care contractors, on- or off-
2 island, who could and would provide health care coverage for such
3 persons;

4 (4) Determining whether the program is best implemented by
5 the private or public sector or jointly;

6 (5) Developing and implementing a system of identifying and
7 notifying eligible persons;

8 (6) Establishing criteria for participating private and public
9 sector health care contractors to follow in providing specific services to
10 be covered;

11 (7) Establishing procedures for excluding participants;

12 (8) Establishing appeal procedures when denial or termination
13 has occurred;

14 (9) Determining how rates will be established; and

15 (10) Making recommendations to the Legislature, including but
16 not limited to, the cost of providing health insurance protection to the
17 disabled, handicapped or differently able; proposing legislation to
18 establish a rate-negotiating body if the same is found necessary, and
19 identifying a board or commission to exercise oversight responsibilities
20 for the program.

21 The study shall be submitted to the Legislature within one
22 hundred eighty (180) days of the enactment of this Act. Thirty
23 Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) are appropriated from the General Fund to
24 the Department of Administration to carry out the provisions of this
25 section.

26 Section 15. Section 1 of Public Law 20-140 is hereby amended to read:

27 "Section 1. Appropriation. Eighty Thousand Two Hundred Fifty
28 Dollars (\$80,250) are hereby appropriated from the Tourist Attraction
29 Fund to the Guam Council on Arts and Humanities ("CAHA") for Guam's
30 participation in the 1990 Cultural Fair to be held in Long Beach,
31 California, and Twenty-Seven Thousand Six Hundred Eighty Dollars
32 (\$27,680) are appropriated from the Tourist Attraction Fund to CAHA
33 for "Kantan I Taotao Tano" to participate in the Sixth Festival of the
34 Pacific in Hawaii."

AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE TWENTY NINE THOUSAND SIX HUNDRED THIRTY DOLLARS (\$29,630) FROM THE GENERAL FUND TO THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM FOR THE 8th PACIFIC HISTORY CONFERENCE ENTITLED "MICRONESIA: HISTORICAL IMAGES AND INTELLECTUAL DISCOURSES".

PREFACE

The Committee on Education conducted a scheduled public hearing on Tuesday, March 27, 1990 at 9:00 a.m. in the Legislative Session Hall. Committee members present at the hearing were as follows:

Senator Franklin J. A. Quitugua, Chairman
Senator Edward R. Duenas, Member

BACKGROUND

Testimonies heard on Bill No. 1251 were as follows:

1. Dr. Donald Rubinstein, Ph.D., Steering Committee for the 8th Pacific History Association Conference, University of Guam

Dr. Rubinstein presented a written testimony on behalf of the University's steering committee for the conference. Dr. Rubinstein testified that the University of Guam had been selected as the site of the 8th Pacific History Association Conference in December 1990. The conference being titled "Micronesia: Intellectual Images and Historical Discourses", will consist of sessions devoted to a wide range of topics in regional history and culture. Among them would include problems of cultural preservation and economic development, and new social and political movements in Micronesia and the Pacific.

He noted that this would be the first occasion for the Pacific History Association to meet in our part of the pacific. Dr. Rubinstein also stated that the purpose of this association was to promote interest in historical studies of the Pacific Islands and to encourage the participation of students and Pacific islanders in professional studies and development.

Dr. Rubinstein went on to mention that the conference will bring several benefits to the University of Guam and the community. He pointed out that the conference would be an important educational opportunity for the University students here, public school teachers and university faculty with interests in the History and Culture of Guam and Micronesia.

Dr. Rubinstein also stated that the conference would be free and open to the public, conference papers would also be edited and published. Dr. Rubinstein and other members on the steering committee for this conference believe that the conference would serve to enhance an understanding of Guam and Micronesia among the greater Pacific community. He stated the conference would provide an opportunity for the University of Guam to excel in its leadership in regional Micronesian studies and to promote wider scholarly interest and understanding of our local cultures and islands.

He also noted that the University would be able to match the locally appropriated funds on a one to one basis, with funds raised by the Micronesian Area Research Center from foundations in the United States.

Discussions following the above testimonies were as follows:

a. Senator Quitugua thanked Dr. Rubinstein for his testimony and had asked if he would be able to supply the committee with the necessary breakdown of the costs for the conference.

b. Dr. Rubinstein commented that they received two (2) grants, one (1) from the Asia foundation for Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) this amount is to be used for travel participation. He also stated that they had received Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) from the SCAGS foundation, a California based foundation that supports regional history and arts. Dr. Rubinstein mentioned the funds that are still pending are from the Winner Grin Foundation in New York City for Ten Thousand Dollars, for travel participation by Micronesian individuals. Dr. Rubinstein also itemized the amount of Twenty Nine Thousand Six Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$29,630) requested from the Legislature.

c. Senator Quitugua commented to Dr. Rubinstein that he was pleased that the Committee had sought outside funding for the travel portion.

d. Senator Duenas asked Dr. Rubinstein who would be covered under these travel expenses to participate in Guam's History Conference.

e. Dr. Rubinstein responded to Senator Duenas by informing him of the University's first opportunity to participate in bringing in off-island scholars to the conference.

f. Dr. Rubinstein indicated that they are anticipating a much larger turnout for this conference than others that were held in the past.

g. Senator Duenas commented to Dr. Rubinstein that he hoped the conference committee would be successful in accomplishing other funding sources to bring in participants for the History Conference, being Guam's first opportunity to host such a conference.

h. Senator Duenas asked Dr. Rubinstein what type of membership did this association consist of.

i. Dr. Rubinstein had answered most of them were historians and that there are 150 members so far and eight (8) of them are from Guam and are University based.

j. Senator Quitugua had asked Dr. Rubinstein to submit necessary documents to the president and to be transmitted to the Legislature for a complete breakdown of the funding and how it is to be disbursed.

ANALYSIS OF BILL NO. 1251

Bill No. 1251 seeks to make public law that Twenty Nine Thousand Six Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$29,630) be appropriated from the General fund to the University of Guam for the purpose of hosting Guam's first Pacific History Conference, entitled "Micronesia: Historical Images and Intellectual Discourses", to be held from December 4-7, 1990.

COMMITTEE FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

1. The Committee finds that Bill NO. 1251 needs to be studied further for recommended points for further considerations.

2. Upon receipt of additional information requested, the committee will recommend approval of the funding request by the legislature.

Testimony on Bill 1251 (LS), an ACT TO APPROPRIATE \$29,630 TO FROM THE GENERAL FUND TO THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM FOR THE 8TH PACIFIC HISTORY CONFERENCE ENTITLED "MICRONESIA: INTELLECTUAL IMAGES AND HISTORICAL DISCOURSES"

Chairman Quitugua, and Esteemed Members of the 20th Guam Legislature:

Thank you for your support and interest in the development of historical and cultural studies of Guam and Micronesia at the University of Guam.

UOG has been selected as the site of the 8th Pacific History Association Conference, in December 1990. The Conference is entitled "Micronesia: Intellectual Images and Historical Discourses." Sessions will be devoted to a wide range of topics in regional history and culture, including interpretations of early historical contact between islanders and outsiders, local conceptions and cultural expressions of history, changing images of family and gender in Micronesia, geopolitical and regional perspectives on the Pacific, problems of cultural preservation and economic development, and new social and political movements in Micronesia and the Pacific.

This will be the first occasion for the Pacific History Association to meet in our part of the Pacific. The Association was founded for the purpose of promoting interest in historical studies of the Pacific Islands, and of encouraging the participation of students and Pacific Islanders in professional studies and development. The Association includes over a hundred members from throughout the Pacific, the US, Europe and Asia. Every two years the Association holds a conference at some site in the Pacific Islands or in the rimlands.

For the University of Guam and the community as a whole, the Conference will bring several benefits. First of all, the conference will be an important educational opportunity for our University students, public school teachers, and university faculty with interests in the history and culture of Guam and Micronesia. The Conference will be free and open to the public. Conference papers will also be edited and published by the Micronesian Area Research Center.

As the first such conference to focus on Guam and Micronesian history and related issues of culture, economics and politics, the conference will serve to enhance an understanding of Guam and Micronesia among the greater Pacific community. There will be participants from throughout Micronesia and the Pacific Islands, and from the metropolitan Pacific Rim countries. Several distinguished scholars are also coming from Spain and Germany. This conference will provide an opportunity for the University of Guam to demonstrate its leadership in regional Micronesian studies, and to promote wider scholarly interest and understanding of our local cultures and islands.

Bill 1251 (LS) would appropriate \$29,630 to UOG for support of the planned conference. These funds will be used for clerical assistance, conference planning and coordination, rental of meeting and lecture rooms, hospitality service for conference participants, and preparation and publication of conference papers.

It should be noted that the University will be able to match the locally appropriated funds on a 1:1 basis, with funds raised by the Micronesian Area Research Center from foundations in the US. MARC has raised an additional \$25,000 towards the cost of this conference, and other outside funding requests, now pending, are also anticipated to be successful. These outside funds will be used to support the travel and participation of scholars from Micronesia and the independent south Pacific countries, and for additional conference costs such as printing and photocopying.

On behalf of the University's Steering Committee for the Conference, which includes Dr. George Boughton, Dr. Donald Rubinstein, Dr. Laura Souder, and Dr. Robert Underwood, I thank you for your recognition and support of this effort.

BILL NO. 1251: AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE TWENTY NINE THOUSAND SIX HUNDRED THIRTY DOLLARS (\$29,630) FROM THE GENERAL FUND TO THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM FOR THE 8TH PACIFIC HISTORY CONFERENCE ENTITLED "MICRONESIA: HISTORICAL IMAGES AND INTELLECTUAL DISCOURSES".

The Committee on Ways & Means held a public hearing on Thursday, March 29, 1990 beginning at 9:00 a.m. at the Legislative Conference Room to gather testimony on Bill No. 1251. Senator Ted S. Nelson conducted the hearing, being joined by Senators J. George M. Bamba, Martha C. Ruth and Doris F. Brooks.

TESTIMONY

Mr. Jesus U. Torres, Chairman, Board of Regents submitted written testimony in support of Bill No. 1251. Chairman Torres stated that "this will be the first occasion for the Pacific History Association to meet in our part of the Pacific. The Association was founded for the purpose of promoting interest in historical studies of the Pacific Islands, and of encouraging the participation of students and Pacific Islanders in professional studies and development. The Association includes over a hundred members from throughout the Pacific, the U. S., Europe and Asia."

Chairman Torres in his testimony went on to say that "the Conference will bring several benefits to the University of Guam and the community as a whole. The conference will be an important educational opportunity for our University students, public school teachers, and university faculty with interests in the history and culture of Guam and Micronesia."

Chairman Torres stated that "as the first such conference to focus on Guam and Micronesian history and related issues of culture, economics and politics, the conference will serve to enhance an understanding of Guam and Micronesia among the greater Pacific community. There will be

participants from throughout Micronesia and the Pacific Islands, and from the metropolitan Pacific Rim countries. Several distinguished scholars are also coming from Spain and Germany. This conference will provide an opportunity for the University of Guam to demonstrate its leadership in regional Micronesian studies, and to promote wider scholarly interest and understanding of our local cultures and islands."

In his testimony, Chairman Torres further stated that, "the University will be able to match the locally appropriated funds on a 1:1 basis, with funds raised by the Micronesian Area Research Center from the foundations in the U.S. MARC has raised an additional \$25,000 towards the cost of this conference, and other outside funding requests, now pending, are anticipated to be also successful.

After the above testimony was received a period of comments and questions and answers followed.

Senator Brooks asked the Micronesian Area Research Center Director, Mr. Donald H. Rubinstein, PhD., what is the estimated cost of the total conference. Rubinstein indicated that the cost would be about \$65,000. Of the remaining \$35,000, they have raised \$25,000, and have the last proposal for \$10,000 pending with a foundation in New York City.

A Fiscal Note was submitted by the Bureau of Budget and Management Research.

RECOMMENDATION

The Committee on Ways & Means recommends that Bill No. 1251 be passed by the Twentieth Guam Legislature as Substituted.

CONFERENCE ON MICRONESIAN HISTORY

Sponsored by the Micronesian Area Research Center at the University of Guam

The Micronesian Area Research Center at the University of Guam is seeking support for an international conference on Guam and Micronesian history. The conference, entitled "Micronesia: Intellectual Images and Historical Discourses," will be held December 4-7, 1990, under the auspices of the Pacific History Association.

The Pacific History Association (PHA) was founded in 1979 for the purpose of promoting interest in historical studies of the Pacific Islands, and of encouraging the participation of the Pacific Islanders in professional studies and development. The PHA includes over a hundred members from throughout the Pacific, the US, Europe and Asia. Every two years the Association holds a conference at some site in the Pacific Islands or in the rimlands.

The 1990 Guam conference will be a significant departure from previous regular meetings of the PHA. This conference will be the first time that the Association has met north of the equator, and the first time that it has devoted a biannual conference to the consideration of issues in Micronesian history and culture. In its format, the conference will also depart from tradition. We envision a multi-disciplinary conference that will include sessions on history, anthropology, political economy, and issues in development versus preservation.

This conference will serve two linked objectives. As the first such conference to focus on Guam and Micronesian history and related issues of culture, economics and politics, the conference will serve to enhance an understanding of Guam and Micronesia among the greater Pacific community. Few members of the Pacific History Association have visited or worked in Micronesia, and few scholars from the independent Pacific countries have had the opportunity to visit Micronesia. Secondly, the conference will provide an opportunity for Micronesian regional scholars and students to gain a broader acquaintance with scholars from other parts of the Pacific who have similar interests.

We anticipate about 30 formal presentations during the four-day conference. Each presentation will be followed by open discussion, and audience members will be given opportunities to talk with session presenters informally during breaks in the program. Fifty participants are expected to come to Guam from throughout the region, including Australia and New Zealand, the Pacific Islands, and the U.S. We anticipate another 50 to 100 participants from Guam, and we expect to draw many of the local participants from the University of Guam faculty and students, the public and private school teachers on the island, and Guam government officials who are involved in historical preservation and cultural issues. The conference will be open to the public.

There will be an opening banquet on the evening of December 4, followed by three full days of presentations and sessions. Sessions will be devoted to issues around early historical contact between islanders and outsiders, indigenous paradigms and uses of history, changing images of family and gender in Micronesia, geopolitical and regional perspectives on the Pacific, problems of cultural preservation versus economic development, and new social and political movements in Micronesia and the Pacific.

Conference participants will be given an opportunity to visit archaeological and historical sites of cultural importance on Guam. Tours of the Guam Museum will be arranged, and historical exhibitions are being planned in the University's Isla Center for the Arts Gallery, and in the Guam Council on Arts and Humanities Gallery. Participants will have a chance to view the Santa Marian

Camalin festivities on December 8. Also planned are optional one-day outings to the neighboring islands of Saipan and Rota, to visit historic sites. Other cultural activities, exhibitions, and presentations on Guam will be organized for the conference participants.

Proceedings of the conference will be edited and published, in order that the formal presentations and edited transcripts of the discussions will become available to a wide audience of interested scholars.


