WITNESS PRESENT: Mr. Frank L.G. Castro, Director, Dept. of Land Management (DLM).

SUMMARY OF TESTIMONIES

DLM Director testified in support of the intent of Bill No. 1032.

The Chair, sponsor of the Bill, stated that the Center will be available to house cultural, military, and civilian organizations spread out all over the island. Many of these organizations have contributed tremendously to the welfare of Guam and its people. The Center will also make a great tourist attraction in that pavilions would be decorated in their native ways--Chamorro, Japanese, Filipino, Chinese, Korean, fraternal organizations, and veterans group.

The project will include two playground facilities for the children and possibly two pavilions for induction ceremonies. Therefore, the acreage should be increased. The Bill should also be amended to consider two locations, one on the North and another on the South.

The Director of DLM testified that his department and the Department of Parks and Recreation should have a designated site within two to three weeks for the Committee's consideration. He agreed that the land size noted in the Bill is insufficient and should be increased.

Mr. Michael J. Reidy, Director of Bureau of Budget and Management Research, wrote that enactment of the Bill will not directly impact on the General Fund. However, it would entail future costs in the design, construction, furnishing, and operations of the proposed cultural centers. Therefore, User fees for the centers should be considered as a revenue generating measure, which would alleviate the burden to be placed on the General Fund.

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When questioned re bill relative to the planned cultural center proposed at the Agana swamp area, the Chair explained that the center proposed in Bill 1032 is not intended to be a cultural shopping center and things of that nature.

FINDINGS/RECOMMENDATIONS

Bill No. 1032 is an Act to set aside and develop public lands for the establishment of cultural community and family centers.

The Committees find that Guam enjoys an amount of surplus public land suitable for building centers for activities sponsored by the island's diverse civic, fraternal, and ethnic organizations that have contributed tremendously to the welfare of Guam and its people.

Based on the testimonies, the Bill will be amended as follows:
1) Identify two sites, one on the North and another on the South; and
2) Increase the land area to twenty acres each site.

The Committees, hereby, recommend Bill No. 1032, as Amended, to Pass by the Twentieth Guam Legislature.

Bill No. 1032(COR) is an Act to set aside and develop public lands for the establishment of cultural community and family centers.

Enactment of the Bill will not directly result in a fiscal impact on the General Fund. However, it entails future costs in the design, construction, furnishing and operations of the proposed cultural centers. Estimates for multi-year fund requirements are not available at this time.

User fees for the centers should be considered as a revenue generating measure in the operations of such a complex. Collections from levying user fees would contribute in alleviating the burden placed on the General Fund.
