

Dear Mr. Speaker:

Enclosed is Substitute Bill 1037 which I have signed into law today as Public Law 20-201.

This law recognizes the need to protect one of the Territory's most valuable resources, our public parks. However, the park patrol will not be operational because of a technical error in Section 3 of this law. According to Section 4, the park patrol provision takes effect on November 18, 1990. However, the appropriation for operations expires on September 30, 1990. I request that the legislature amend Section 3 to change the date to September 30, 1991.

AN ACT TO ADD CHAPTER VII TO TITLE XXVII OF THE

ANNOTATED, TO INCLUDE PARK PROTECTION OFFICERS
AS UNIFORMED PERSONNEL.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

2 Section 1. Legislative intent.

3 WHEREAS, pursuant to §26011, Government Code of Guam, the
4 Department of Parks and Recreation, through the Parks Division, controls,
5 manages, develops and maintains all parts of the Guam Territorial Park
6 System, and offenses against persons and property are continually committed
7 within the areas of the System; such occurrences creating an adverse impact
8 upon the natural, tranquil, and historical features of these areas and causing
9 persons within these areas to fear for their safety, such occurrences making
10 these areas unattractive and accordingly discourage visits to them; and

11 WHEREAS, parks are unique areas accessible to the public for
12 appreciation of their natural, tranquil, and historical features and not for the
13 use of public recreational facilities situated therein; and

14 WHEREAS, the establishment of a Park Protection Section within the
15 Parks Division, Department of Parks and Recreation, will provide effective and
16 specialized protection of the Guam Territorial Park System; now, therefore,

17 Section 2. A new Chapter VII is hereby added to Title XXVII of the
18 Government Code to read as follows:

19 "Chapter VII

20 Park Protection Section

21 §26900. Statement of purpose. The Legislature hereby finds that
22 there exists a special need to provide for general visitors services,
23 protection of persons and property, and the enforcement of laws and
24 rules and regulations within all parts of the Park System. It is
25 determined that the establishment of a Park Protection Section within
26 the Department of Parks and Recreation will effectively meet these
27 objectives.

28 §26901. Definitions. As used in this Chapter:

29 (a) 'Department' means the Department of Parks and
30 Recreation.

31 (b) 'Director' means the Director of Parks and Recreation.

32 (c) 'Park System' means the Guam Territorial Park System
33 as described in §26007 of this Code.

1 §26902. Creation: Park Protection Service. There is hereby
2 established within the Department a Park Protection Section which shall
3 be responsible for the effective and specialized protection of the Park
4 System. The Director shall select persons based on qualifications
5 prescribed by the Civil Service Commission as employees of the
6 Section's Territorial Park Patrol. The Park Protection Section shall be
7 under the Parks Division of the Department, and it shall coordinate its
8 functions and activities with other government of Guam agencies,
9 particularly law enforcement agencies.

10 §26903. Territorial Park Patrol: Powers. A Territorial Park
11 Patrol Officer, while within the Park System and acting within his
12 official capacity, shall have the authority and powers conferred by law
13 on a peace officer, including, but not limited to, the following:

14 (a) The power to arrest persons for public offenses
15 committed within the Park System;

16 (b) The power to enforce all laws, rules and regulations
17 relating to the Park System;

18 (c) The power to enforce the Vehicle Code of Guam; and

19 (d) The power to enforce the Litter Control Law.

20 §26904. Same: duties. The duties of a Territorial Park Patrol
21 Officer shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

22 (a) Enforcement of all laws, rules and regulations relating
23 to the Park System;

24 (b) Patrol of the Park System to provide information,
25 assistance, and protection for visitors and to protect park
26 resources;

27 (c) Issuance of litter citations within the Park System;

28 (d) Investigation and preparing reports on motor vehicle,
29 boat and personal accidents; and

30 (e) Arrest of persons for the commission of public
31 offenses within the Park System.

32 §26905. Same: Training. A Territorial Park Patrol Officer shall
33 be required to complete training with a minimum of at least 120 hours
34 on the laws of arrest, search, seizures, the Vehicle Code of Guam, the

1 Criminal and Correctional Code, the Criminal Procedure Code, laws, rules
2 and regulations relating to the Park System, the use and handling of
3 firearms, and such other training as is required to effectively carry out
4 such officer's duties and responsibilities as a peace officer. Such
5 training shall be primarily conducted by the Guam Community College,
6 applying the standards used in the training of the police officers for the
7 Guam Police Department.

8 §26906. Rules and regulations. The Department shall, pursuant to
9 the Administrative Adjudication Law, establish rules and regulations as
10 may be deemed necessary to implement the provisions of this Chapter."

11 Section 3. Two Hundred One Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$201,100)
12 are hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Parks
13 and Recreation to implement Section 2 of this Act. This appropriation shall
14 expire September 30, 1990.

15 Section 4. The provisions of Section 2 of the Act shall become effective
16 on the ninetieth (90th) day following the enactment of this Act.

17 Section 5. Subsection (p) of §8104, Title 4, Guam Code Annotated, is
18 hereby amended to read:

19 "(p) "Uniformed Personnel" means Guam Police Department
20 officers, Guam Fire Department firemen, Customs and Quarantine
21 Officers in the Department of Commerce, Conservation Officers of the
22 Department of Agriculture, Territorial Park Patrol Officers of the
23 Department of Parks and Recreation, Corrections Officers of the
24 Department of Corrections, Security Personnel at the A.B. Won Pat
25 International Airport and Port Authority of Guam Security personnel.
26 In all matters involving the security forces of the International Airport,
27 the Port of Guam or the Department of Parks and Recreation, the Guam
28 Police Department shall have concurrent jurisdiction with such forces."

PREFACE

A public hearing on Bill No. 993 was held by the Committee on Youth, Senior Citizens, Cultural Affairs, and Human Resources on Tuesday, January 23, 1990, at the Legislative Session Hall.

Present at the hearing were Chairperson, Senator Elizabeth P. Arriola and attended by Senators Ted. S. Nelson, Pilar C. Lujan, Ernesto M. Espaldon, Martha C. Ruth and Doris F. Brooks.

TESTIMONY

Mr. Anthony C. Mariano, Director, Department of Parks and Recreation, appeared before the Committee in support of Bill No. 1037.

Mr. Mariano testified that the Park Protection Section would be responsible for the enforcement of the park rules and regulations, litter laws and other applicable laws in the territorial park and recreational areas. The intent is to reduce vandalism and litter. The Bill would upgrade the Park Patrol Program which would be highly visible to assist tourists and the general public in the park and recreational areas. They would be performing general visitors services, protection and resource management duties in the Guam Territorial Park System.

The Committee asked if the Territorial Park Patrols would be enforcing local statutes, Mr. Mariano answered that they would be deputized to enforce laws, rules and regulations within the jurisdiction of the Park System. The Territorial Park Patrols would be required to complete training conducted by the Guam Community College applying the standards used in the training of the police officers for the Guam Police Department.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee on Youth, Senior Citizens, Cultural Affairs, and Human Resources wishes to report Bill No. 1037 (COR), "*AN ACT RELATIVE TO ESTABLISHING A PARK PROTECTION SECTION WITHIN THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKS AND RECREATION*" has had the same under consideration, and now wishes to report back the same with the recommendation of the Committee members **TO DO PASS** as substituted by the Committee.



Dear Senator Arriola:

I am testifying on Bill No. 1037, an act relative to establishing a Park Protection Section within the Department of Parks and Recreation.

Our department fully supports the need to protect our park resources and visitors through the establishment of the Park Protection Section. This section will be responsible for the enforcement of the park rules and regulations, park vendor rules and regulations, litter law and other applicable laws in territorial park and recreational areas. As enforcers, they will be able to protect our properties. They would be highly visible to assist our tourists and the general public thus indicating our concern not only for the welfare of our visitors to our parks but also our park and recreational areas. One result would be the reduction in litter and vandalism cost.

We do suggest a few technical amendments to produce an improved bill. Page two lines 19 to 21 should be rewritten to read "The Director shall select persons based on qualifications prescribed by the Civil Service Commission as employees of the Section's Territorial Park Patrol. Page two, line 25 should not restrict the authority and powers to only areas within the Guam Territorial Park System. This would prevent their enforcement of laws in emergencies. Personnel in this section would serve primarily within the Territorial Park and Recreation System, but in an emergency, they could be utilized elsewhere. Therefore, we recommend "only while on the areas within the Guam Territorial Park System." Third, page three, lines 27 to 29 should be amended to increase our current fiscal year budget by the amount indicated and to increase our number of classified positions by eight.

Therefore, we strongly support passage of Bill No. 1037 as a priority of our department.



8 **Section _____.** **Definitions.** As used in this Chapter:

9 (a) 'Department' means the Department of Parks and Recreation.

10 (b) 'Director' means the Director of Parks and Recreation.

11 (c) 'Park System' means the Guam Territorial Park System as described in
12 Section 26007 of the Government Code of Guam.

13 **Section _____.** **Creation: Park Protection Service.** There is hereby established
14 within the Department a Park Protection Section which shall be responsible for the effective and
15 specialized protection of the Guam Territorial Park System. The Director shall select persons based on
16 qualifications prescribed by the Civil Service Commission as employees of the Section's Territorial Park
17 Patrol. The Park Protection Section shall be under the Parks Division, and it shall coordinate its functions
18 and activities with Government of Guam agencies particularly law enforcement agencies.

19 **Section _____.** **Territorial Park Patrol: Powers.** A Territorial Park Patrol,
20 only while on the areas within the Guam Territorial Park System and acting within his official capacity,
21 shall have the authority and powers conferred by law on a peace officer, including, but not limited to the
22 following:

23 (1) the power to arrest persons for public offenses committed within the areas of the Park
24 System;

25 (2) the power to enforce the laws and rules and regulations relating to the Park System;

26 (3) the power to enforce the Vehicle Code of Guam, Title XVI of the Guam Code
27 Annotated;

28 (4) the power to enforce the Litter Control Law, 10 GCA, Chapter 51, Article 2.

29 **Section _____.** **Same: Duties.** The duties of a Territorial Park Patrol shall
include, but not limited to the following:

- (1) enforcement of the laws and rules and regulations relating to the Park System;
- (2) patrol of the Park System for the purpose of providing information assistance, and protection for visitors and park resources;
- (3) issue litter citations within the Park System;
- (4) investigate and prepare report on motor vehicle, boating and personal injury accidents;
- (5) arrest of persons for the commission of public offenses within the Park System.

Section _____. **Same: Training.** A Territorial Park Patrol shall be required to complete training within a minimum of at least 120 hours on the laws of arrest, search and seizures, the Vehicle Code of Guam, the Criminal and Correctional Code, the Criminal Procedure Code, laws and rules and regulations relating to the Park System, the use and handling of firearms and such other training as required to effectively carry out his duties and responsibilities as a peace officer. Such training shall be primarily conducted by the Guam Community College applying the standards used in the training of the police officers for the Guam Police Department.

Section _____. **Rules and Regulations.** The Department shall establish rules and regulations as may be deemed necessary to implement this Chapter."


Section 3. The sum of Two Hundred One Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$201,100.00) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Parks and Recreation to implement Section 2 of this Act. The appropriation under this Act shall expire September 30, 1990.

Section 4. The provisions of Section 2 of the Act shall become operative on the Ninetieth (90) day following the enactment of the Act.

Section 5. Section 3 of Public Law No. 20-130 is hereby amended to read:

"(p) "Uniformed Personnel" means Guam Police Department officers, Guam Fire Department firemen, Customs and Quarantine Officers in the Department of Commerce, Conservation Officers of the Department of Agriculture, Territorial Park Patrol of the Department of Parks and Recreation, Corrections Officers of the Department of Corrections, Security Personnel at the A. B. Won Pat International Airport and Port Authority of Guam Security personnel. In all matters involving the security forces of either the International Airport or the Port of Guam, the Guam Police Department shall have concurrent jurisdiction with such forces."

PARK PROTECTION



PARKS DIVISION

The Parks Division is responsible for park and recreation planning and design, maintenance of parks and facilities, developing conservation and beautification programs; providing maintenance and supply support to the department; developing and maintaining the plant nursery; providing grounds-keeping and custodial care of park and recreational facilities; implementing the Guam Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan and the Historic Preservation Master Plan; administering the Land and Water Conservation Fund, Historic Places and the Guam Territorial Park System; managing the Guam Territorial Seashore Park, operating and administering the Territorial Park System including beaches, launching ramps, historic sites; management and operation of three public cemeteries; and establishing and enforcing applicable rules and regulations.

PARKS ADMINISTRATION AND PLANNING

Responsible for management, acquisition, development, and planning of the Guam Territorial Park System which includes maintaining an accurate park inventory; offering technical assistance in the areas of Parks and Recreation facilities and historic preservation to other Government of Guam agencies, federal agencies, and private organizations; coordinating capital improvement projects for parks, recreation, and historic preservation; preparing comments on bills and other legislative matters; participating in public hearings relative to Parks and Recreation activities; project applications for both local and federal funded projects; formal applications for federal excess properties; and coordinating with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION

Responsible for the management of the Territory's cultural and historical environment. The section's activities and responsibilities are research, documentation, identification, protection, and restoration of historical and archaeological sites. The section is responsible for the National Park Service grant program for historic preservation.

PARKS MAINTENANCE

Responsible for the maintenance of Parks and Recreation facilities in the Territorial Park system, which includes beaches, ballfields, campsites, planting strips, and facilities and structures for public use. There are a total of 70 park areas throughout the Territory, including the cemetery functions of the department.

GUAM TERRITORIAL SEASHORE PARK

Responsible for the management and maintenance of the facilities in the Guam Territorial Seashore Park. Executive Order 78-42 requires that the Department of Parks and Recreation coordinates the efforts of Government of Guam agencies affecting the Park, including the Department of Land Management, the Guam Environmental Protection Agency, the Department of Agriculture.

PARK PROTECTION SECTION

Responsible for the enforcement of the park rules and regulations, park vendor rules and regulations, litter law, etc. As enforcers, they will be highly visible to assist our tourists and the general public thus indicating our concern not only for the welfare of our visitors but also our park areas. Another result would be the reduction in litter and vandalism costs.
