Dear Speaker Unpingco:

Enclosed please find a copy of Substitute Bill No. 133 (COR), "AN ACT TO AMEND THE GENERAL APPROPRIATION ACT OF 1997 (P.L. 23-128), RELATIVE TO MAKING NECESSARY CORRECTIONS AND APPROPRIATION ADJUSTMENTS; PRIORITIZE FUNDING TO MAKE PUBLIC SAFETY AND HEALTH TOP PRIORITIES; AND AUTHORIZE ADDITIONAL FUNDING.", which I have **signed** into law today as **Public Law No. 24-14.** 

This bill contains many items that are essential to the continued operation of the government for the remainder of the fiscal year. It contains appropriations for health and safety, to the Department of Public Health and Social Services for welfare payments, to the Guam Police Department for a training cycle for new police officers and the payment of overtime, to the Department of Corrections to train 20 new corrections officers and to provide increased personnel and equipment for the Department of Corrections, to the Department of Public Works to pay the Solid Waste Division, for reprogramming of funds for the payment of employee increments and for retirement COLA, for reinstatement of the group life-insurance provisions for the government of Guam employees, and other essential requirements.

The source of funding for these items has potential, however, when researching the situation, and in consultation with the autonomous agencies, we find that there are numerous obstacles to realizing actual cash.

Amendments to this legislation are critical. There are some amendments which will need to be made to the operation of the funding Office of the Speaker which is transfers from autonomous agencies, for this budget Pronion Legislation to work. Without these amendments, the source of

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funding will be unavailable. Specifically, certain language needs to be deleted:

Section 3 of the bill, page 5, line 1, the phrase "operating surpluses" needs to be replaced with "net income". By definition, rates are set for the rate-charging autonomous agencies only up to the level which covers their operating expenses. They do not show any "operating surplus" which can be tapped to fund the provisions of this bill. The provisions of the various loan agreements and bond covenants, especially with regard to the Guam Telephone Authority and the Guam Power Authority, does not allow these agencies to have an "operating surplus".

Additionally, the Public Utilities Commission regulates the rates charged by these agencies to keep them at a level which only covers their needs and does not render an "operating surplus". In order for these agencies to be able to find any cash which could be transferred, this phrase needs to be deleted from the legislation.

b) The phrase "Formula decided upon by the Governor in consultation with the Boards of Directors of the above agencies" needs to be deleted. In Section 3, page 5, lines 6-8, the phrase "Formula decided upon by the Governor in consultation with the Boards of Directors of the above agencies" needs to be deleted in order to provide for any transfers by the autonomous agencies. This phrase is in violation of the loan agreements of the Guam Telephone Authority with the Rural Utilities Services (RUS); is in violation of the bond covenants of the Guam Power Authority; and is in violation of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations for the A. B. Won Pat Guam International Airport Authority.

Payments may only be made by these agencies which are related to services actually received for their operations. In other words, services rendered must be quantified, based on what each agency receives, and then the agency may pay for what it has received. An arbitrary formula of apportionment may not be used to compute payments.

- The sentence "Autonomous Agencies shall c) not increase recover these contributions, rates to but instead apply best management efforts to reduce operating costs and expenditures" needs to be deleted. In Section 3, page 5, lines 12-13, the sentence: "Autonomous Agencies shall not increase rates to recover these contributions, but instead shall apply best management efforts to reduce operating costs and expenditures," needs to be deleted. The reason that the deletion is necessary is that the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) sets rates to recover the costs of operating the agencies subject to its jurisdiction, but current rates are already set with only currently paid expenses taken into account. A transfer "in lieu of taxes" would be an additional expense, and not allowable under the orders of the PUC. The agencies do not necessarily need to raise rates to make a payment, but must justify expenditures to the PUC and all expenditures need to be listed.
- Day the Guam Legislature in order to reduce the interest rates currently paid by the Guam Power Authority from 6% to 3%. The Administration has transmitted legislation to the Twenty-Fourth Guam Legislature which would authorize the Guam Power Authority to issue tax exempt commercial paper. This would refinance the current debts of the agency and make it possible for the current 6% interest paid by the utility to be reduced to 3%, thereby freeing up cash presently used for paying the difference in interest rates. This legislation is presently pending in the Committee on Finance and Taxation, and I urge the Legislature to enact this legislation at the next opportunity.
- Payments made by Port Authority of Guam at this time would necessitate the delay of the port container yard expansion. Transfer payments made by the Port Authority of Guam at this time would put the Guam's port expansion on hold. The Port Authority of Guam (PAG) has planned a port container yard expansion which would greatly increase the volume that could be handled by the Port, and would thereby increase the economic vitality of the territory. A delay of this project would seriously weaken the backbone and underpinings of our economy. It would severely constrict the lifeblood of our island's economic activity, the shipment of goods.

and is not advised by bond counsel and a rating agency's opinion to an advisor of the Guam Economic Development Authority. The bond counsel, Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe, has advised that the payments required by Substitute Bill No. 133 could not be made without rate adjustments. As such, bond rating companies may downgrade the credit rating of the autonomous agencies should they be required to make the transfer payments called for by this legislation. This, in turn, would cause the agencies to suffer a decline in credit-worthiness, and make it very difficult for them to obtain financing. It is noted that the credit-worthiness of the autonomous agencies is relied upon in this legislation on page 6, Subsections (b), (c), and (d) of Section 4, with the proposal that the Governor negotiate a loan that the autonomous agencies would pay.

Alex. Brown, a rating agency that has issued a written opinion to an advisor of the Guam Economic Development Authority, has also stated in regard to this legislation that ". . . depending on the degree of revenue loss to the government's general fund, we believe a significant loss would appear to have a negative impact on the general obligation credit."

#### **SUMMARY:**

While this legislation corrects many deficiencies of Public Law No. 23-128, the General Appropriation Act of 1997, in order to make the concept work, amendments need to be made and an additional source of cash funding needs to be found. Should these changes not be forthcoming, we will find ourselves being unable to provide for appropriations for health and safety, for welfare payments made by the Department of Public Health and Social Services, for a training cycle for new police officers and the payment of overtime to the Guam Police Department, for training 20 new corrections officers and to provide increased personnel and equipment for the Department of Corrections, for operating expenses and payroll of the Solid Waste Division of the Department of Public Works, for reprogramming of funds for the payment of employee increments and for retirement COLA, for reinstatement of the group life-insurance provisions for the government of Guam employees, and other essential requirements.

The budget submitted to the Legislature by the Governor in January of 1996 for Fiscal Year 1997 was balanced. The budget corrections bill transmitted to the Legislature by the Governor on February 21, 1997 also provided for a balanced budget until the end of the fiscal year, and provided a secure and stable source of funding. Bill No. 133, while containing many desirable items, needs to have a secure and stable source of funding inserted into the language. The Legislature must address this situation in the very, very near future to avoid disastrous consequences.

AN ACT TO AMEND THE GENERAL APPROPRIATION ACT OF 1997 (P.L. 23-128), RELATIVE TO MAKING NECESSARY CORRECTIONS AND APPROPRIATION ADJUSTMENTS; PRIORITIZE FUNDING TO MAKE PUBLIC SAFETY AND HEALTH TOP PRIORITIES; AND AUTHORIZE ADDITIONAL FUNDING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

Section 1. Short Title. This Act may be cited as the "Budget Correction and Supplemental Act of 1997." Except as otherwise provided by this Act, the appropriations made by this Act shall be available to pay for obligations incurred on or after October 1, 1996, but no later than September 30, 1997. In the event that any portion of this Act is found contrary to Federal Law, all portions of this Act not so found shall remain valid.

Section 2. Legislative Intent. (a) The Legislature finds that necessary corrections and appropriation adjustments to Public Law No. 23-128, the General Appropriation Act of 1997, need to be made. Furthermore, additional sources of supplemental funding must be authorized to adequately meet urgent and top priority needs in public safety and health. Reallocation of operational appropriations and supplemental funding are also necessary to meet other important operational and program shortfall needs. Many incidences of senseless violence associated with illegal drug activities have been occurring on Guam and adversely impacting on the public safety and quality of life of Island residents. The Legislature finds that the territory must concentrate its resources towards eliminating this violence.

Although many resources have been directed towards the Guam Police Department, the Customs and Quarantine Agency, the Plant Protection and Quarantine (PPQ) Division of the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Corrections, and the prosecutorial arm of the Department of Law, these resources are still inadequate and need to be strengthened.

There are not enough police officers, corrections officers and customs officers to provide an adequate level of public safety protection expected by the people of Guam, and which will make them feel safe in their homes, as well as on the streets and neighborhoods.

The Legislature considers public safety a top priority and in this Act authorizes funding for a cycle of training for police officers and corrections officers; supplemental funding for Guam Police Department and Department of Corrections; and funding for increased overtime for the Guam Police Department for the position of Police Sergeant II and below.

(b) Funding Source. In order to fund the necessary "beefing up" of public safety and health agencies and functions, additional sources of funding must be found. Also, the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority will be in need of an infusion of cash to head off a crisis in funding for health care at the only facility available for our people. Section 3 identifies a funding source and scope of application to current fiscal needs as described in this Act. Section 44 authorizes funding approaches to address the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority's needs.

and functions were inadequately addressed in Public Law No. 23-128. Among these agencies and functions are: retirement COLA, reinstitution of statute for government employee life insurance, salary increments, the Solid Waste Division of the Department of Public Works, the Chamorro Language Commission, the Department of Administration, the Department of Public Health and Social Services, the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse, the Department of Law, the Public Defender Service Corporation, the Workers Compensation Fund, the Guam Community College, the Guam Educational Telecommunications Corporation, the Guam Fire Department, the Residential Treatment Fund, the Department of Public Works, the University of Guam, the Veterans Affairs Office and the Land Survey Division of the Department of Land Management.

(d) This Act, in part, provides corrections and changes to Public Law 23-128, as an immediate effort towards attaining a balanced and workable budget for the government of Guam for fiscal year 1997.

(e) The Legislature recognizes the sanctity and utmost importance of public education in our territory and stands firm in its commitment to support the Department of Education. Furthermore, the Legislature acknowledges the inviolate nature of the Department of Education's fiscal year 1997 Budget, as appropriated in Section 14 of Chapter III, Miscellaneous Appropriations, of Public Law 23-128, notwithstanding the corrections and adjustments to Public Law No. 23-128.

This commitment includes a firm desire to ensure that the One Hundred Sixty Million Dollars (\$160,000,000) appropriated from the General Fund to the Department

of Education for their fiscal year 97 operations shall not be compromised by budgetary reductions through the Administration's allotment process in executing the General Appropriation Act of 1997 (P.L. 23-128).

Section 3. Amendment to Section 44 of Public Law No. 18-15. Section 44 of Public Law No. 18-15 is amended to read:

"A new Section 6127 is added to the Government Code to read:

'Section 6127. Transfer of Autonomous Agency Revenues to Autonomous Agency Infrastructure Collections Fund.

- (a) It is the Legislature's findings that for the risk assumed by Guam's taxpayers in operating the power, telephone, water, sewer, and air and sea port operations, a fund transfer policy should be instituted as a reimbursement. It is furthermore found that these non-taxpaying entities benefit from services provided by the General Fund, such as through police and fire protection, road systems, and other governmental facilities. In many cases, several of the services require additional General Fund expenditures. Further, rather than assess the actual levy of real estate taxes, as if they were of a private venture, which is commonly called 'payment-in-lieu-of-taxes,' a transfer policy would be more equitable and fair.
- (b) The Guam International Airport Authority, the Guam Power Authority, the Port Authority of Guam and the Guam Telephone Authority are hereby assessed in the aggregate the sum of Three Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,500,000) in lieu of taxes and other charges as may normally be assessed against a private company for utility easements, gross receipts taxes, taxes on audited income, government development fees, such as water wells and monetary fees. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Governor and the Boards of Directors of the Port Authority of Guam, the Guam Power Authority, the Guam Telephone Authority and the Guam International Airport Authority shall transfer in the aggregate sum of Three Million Five Hundred Thousand

Dollars (\$3,500,000) from operating surpluses generated by these agencies to the Autonomous Agency Infrastructure Collections Fund of the government of Guam by the end of each fiscal year. The proportionate contribution of each of the above agencies, which will in the aggregate make up the Three Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,500,000) transferred, shall be determined by a formula decided upon by the Governor in consultation with the Boards of Directors of the above agencies. In no event shall the formula decided upon or the transfer of sums from the agencies to the Autonomous Agency Infrastructure Collections Fund violate the terms or conditions of any bond covenant of any of the above agencies that is in effect on the effective date of this Act. Autonomous Agencies shall not increase rates to recover these contributions, but instead shall apply best management efforts to reduce operating costs and expenditures.

(c) There is hereby created an 'Autonomous Agency Infrastructure Collections Fund,' which shall be maintained separate and apart from any other funds within the government of Guam, and independent records shall be maintained in connection therewith. Said Fund shall be used solely for the purposes relating to the health and public safety of the people of Guam and public works. The Department of Administration shall be responsible for the administration of the Autonomous Agency Infrastructure Collections Fund.'"

# Section 4. Application of Section 44 of Public Law 18-15, as amended.

(a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Governor shall negotiate with the Board of Directors of the Port Authority of Guam, the Guam International Airport Authority, the Guam Telephone Authority and the Guam Power Authority and settle no later than thirty (30) days after enactment of this Act, on proportionate contributions and payment terms and conditions for outstanding amounts due since fiscal year 1986. Cumulative settlement covering the fiscal year 1986 to fiscal year 1997 shall be at least Twenty-three Million Dollars (\$23,000,000).

Autonomous Agencies shall not increase rates to recover these contributions, but instead shall apply best management efforts to reduce operating costs and expenditures.

- (b) The Autonomous Agencies shall either make payment of the full amount within 45 days of this Act becoming law, or agree to pay the full amount, including finance charges over a five (5) or ten (10) year period. The Autonomous Agencies shall choose the best payment option consistent with the agencies' best management efforts plan to reduce operating costs and expenditures that lessens the annual cost to its rate payers.
- 9 (c) If any or all the Autonomous Agencies decide to pay over five (5) or ten (10) years, the Governor is authorized to negotiate a financing method for those agencies that chose this option that would:
- 12 (1) Make available the Twenty-three Million Dollars (\$23,000,000) 13 for use in the current fiscal year's budget, and
  - (2) Use the payments over five (5) or ten (10) years from the Autonomous Agencies to pay the principal and all financing costs of the financing method.
  - (d) The sum of Twenty-three Million Dollars (\$23,000,000) is appropriated from the Autonomous Agency Infrastructure Collections Fund to meet funding needs in the areas of public health, safety and public works as identified in Public Law 23-128 and this Act. Funding shortfalls due to pending payments as a result of negotiations based on Subsection (a) of this Section shall be off-set from accumulated General Fund reserves generated as a result of compliance with the Public Law 23-14:6(b) mandate.
- This off-set amount is not an appropriation but a financial management transaction which will be reimbursed as negotiated payments are made.
  - Section 5. Title 11 Guam Code Annotated §28105 Amendment and Application. (a) 11 GCA §28105 is hereby amended to add new subsections (e) through (g) to read:
    - "(e) The Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency shall collect the use tax mandated by this chapter on behalf of the Department of Revenue and Taxation on:

1 taxable property which comes in at the Guam (1) Commercial Port, or any other seaport in Guam, with any tax for which an 2 exemption is not claimed, to be collected prior to release; 3 4 taxable property which comes in as freight (2) unaccompanied baggage at the A.B. WonPat International Airport, or any 5 6 other airport in Guam; and 7 taxable property which comes in as accompanied baggage at the A.B. The Governor shall allocate the One Million Seven Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,700,000) to the above categories.

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3 Section 10. The Legislature declares there exists an emergency within the Department of Corrections (DOC) due to the February 23, 1997 facility fire. The 4 Governor is hereby directed to take all emergency procurement measures consistent 5 with law, rules and regulations in order to facilitate full repair and reconstruction of 6 those facilities at DOC damaged by fire, and for such other expenses related to the 7 proper temporary detention of prisoners during repairs and reconstruction of those 8 facilities at DOC damaged by fire. The emergency procurement provision contained in 9 Title 5 Guam Code Annotated §5215 is extended for purposes of this Section to a 10 maximum of One Hundred Eighty (180) days. 11 Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) is appropriated from the Autonomous Agency Infrastructure Collections 12 Fund to the Department of Corrections for emergency repairs and related expenses 13 necessary as a result of the fire at Buildings C and D on February 23, 1997. All repairs 14 shall comply with the Guam Building Law and all applicable codes. Section 11. Addition of Definition of "operating expenses". A new Subsection (v) is added to Section 5 of Chapter I, General Provisions, of Public Law No. 23-128 to read:

"(v) 'Operating expenses' means the individual and collective budget categories of 'travel,' 'contractual services,' 'supplies,' 'equipment,' 'office space rental,' 'utilities' and 'miscellaneous.'"

Section 12. Reprogram of Payments for Retirement Cost of Living Allowance (COLA). Subsection (a) of Section 20 of Chapter III, Miscellaneous Appropriations, of Public Law No. 23-128, is amended to read:

"(a) The sum of Five Million Six Hundred Fifty-two Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$5,652,900) is appropriated from the source identified in Subsection (b) of Section 21 of Chapter III, Miscellaneous Appropriations, of

Public Law No. 23-128 to the Government of Guam Retirement Fund for the purpose of funding a One Thousand One Hundred Dollar (\$1,100) lump sum cost of living allowance, for an estimated 4,920 government of Guam retired employees and survivors, all for fiscal year ending September 30, 1996. Retirees and survivors, as of October 1, 1996, shall receive a lump sum cost of living allowance payment in the full amount of One Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$1,100) per retiree or survivors thereof, to be paid no later than December 1, 1996. "

Section 13. Amendment to Source of Funding for Employee Increments and COLA. Subsection (b) of Section 21 of Chapter III of Public Law No. 23-128 is amended to read:

"Notwithstanding any other provision of law, and with the exceptions of the Territorial Highway Fund, the Tourist Attraction Fund, the Territorial Educational Facilities Fund, the Manpower Development Fund, the Guam Housing Corporation Revolving Fund, the Land for the Landless Revolving Fund and the Chamorro Home Loan Fund, any excess amounts over that which is already mandated by law to be expended from all special funds of the government of Guam shall be utilized for the purposes of the appropriation in this Section and in Section 20 (a) of this Act."

Section 14. Appropriation for retirement cost of living allowance (COLA). New Subsections (c) and (d) are added to Section 20, Chapter III, Miscellaneous Appropriations, of Public Law No. 23-128, to read:

"(c) Autonomous Agencies to pay COLA for their respective retirees and survivors. For fiscal year 1997, the Guam Power Authority, the Guam Telephone Authority, the Guam International Airport Authority, the Port Authority of Guam, the Guam Economic Development Authority, the Guam Housing Corporation, the Government of Guam Retirement Fund, the Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Authority, the Guam Mass Transit Authority, and the Guam Visitors Bureau shall remit to the Government of Guam Retirement Fund an amount of money equal to the number of employees who retired from

each respective agency, multiplied by the amounts per retiree or survivor listed in Subsection (a) of this Section. The remittance shall be made in two (2) equal installments; the first installment is due on December 31, 1996 and the second installment is due on March 31, 1997.

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Procedures. The Government of Guam Retirement Fund is authorized to establish administrative procedures to ensure the proper submission, receipt and accounting of sums remitted pursuant to Subsection (c) of this Section. These administrative procedures are not subject to the Administrative Adjudication Law."

Section 15. Section 47143 of the Government Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

"**§47143**. Customs, Agriculture, and Quarantine Inspection Services Charge Established. Each aircraft landing at the A.B. WonPat Guam International Air Terminal shall be levied a Customs, Agriculture and Quarantine Inspection services charge reasonably related to the costs incurred by the Customs and Quarantine Agency and the Department of Agriculture in providing, maintaining and operating the service charge facilities, and shall be allocated among air carriers in such a manner reasonably related to the relative demand for such services attributable to each carrier. Each consignment of air and sea cargo and each passenger landing at a sea port shall also be levied a Customs, Agriculture and Quarantine Inspection services charge, except for those passengers which may be exempted under the rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to Section 47149 of the Government Code of Guam. charges shall be reasonably related to the costs incurred by the Customs and Quarantine Agency and the Department of Agriculture in providing, maintaining and operating the service charge facilities.

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the establishment, modification or adjustment of any service charge levied pursuant to this Section shall be subject to the provisions of the Administrative Adjudication Law."

Section 16. Reinstatement of Residential Treatment Program. Section 20 of Chapter IV, Miscellaneous Provisions, of Public Law No. 23-128 is repealed and Section 25 of Public Law No. 20-220, as amended in Section 6 of Chapter IV of Public Law No. 21-136, is reenacted to read:

"Section 25. (a) There is hereby created separate and apart from other funds of the government of Guam the "Residential Treatment Fund" (the "Fund") to be administered by the Director of Administration. Money from the Fund shall be expended upon order of the Superior Court of Guam to send a person under the jurisdiction of the court for residential care arising from a physical, mental or emotional handicap or a severe emotional disturbance. Such money shall be expended for diagnosis, evaluation and treatment fees, medical expenses, room and board, and, if sent off-Island, transportation and incidental costs for the person."

Section 17. Three Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$350,000) to the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse. Three Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$350,000) is appropriated from the Autonomous Agency Infrastructure Collections Fund to the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse to be allocated for the contractual services of a Forensic Psychiatrist, a Pediatric Forensic Psychiatrist and needed equipment for the use of the physicians.

Section 18. Reinstatement of Group Life Insurance for Government of Guam Employees. Section 4303 of Title 4, Guam Code Annotated, repealed in Public Law 23-128, is reenacted, with the amendment shown in item (4) of Subsection (e) of that Section, to read:

"§4303. Group Life Insurance. (a) The Governor is authorized to enter into contracts with one or more insurance companies authorized to do

business in Guam for Group Life Insurance for all employees or separate groups of employees for the government of Guam.

- (b) Participation by employee, as employees are defined in Subsection (d) of this Section, in such contracts of life insurance shall provide coverage for up to a face amount of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000), and shall be non-contributory by the employees, the premium to be paid by the government of Guam.
- (c) Contracts of life insurance procured under the foregoing Subsection (b) shall be limited to a face amount of up to Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000), including charges for accidental death and dismemberment. Coverage under such non-contributory plan shall commence after an employee has served six (6) consecutive months service in the government on entry or re-entry. Retirees and survivors of retirees are covered as of the day they become retirees or survivors of retirees.

Supplemental coverage may also be procured as an added benefit for an active employee only. The face amount of such supplemental coverage shall be at least Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000), the premium for which shall be paid entirely by the employee. Such supplemental insurance shall be on a voluntary basis and may include such features as accidental death and dismemberment, and waiver of premium. Dependent coverage may be included as part of the supplemental coverage. The government of Guam shall provide payroll deduction for payment of the premiums for such supplemental coverage.

- (d) Employees as used in this Section include officers, survivors of officers, survivors of employees, retired employees and survivors of retired employees who are receiving annuity benefits.
- (e) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the government of Guam shall self insure the government of Guam's group life insurance program then in effect as of April 30, 1986, for a period not to exceed sixty (60) days from April 30, 1986, or until a private insurance company becomes the insurer for the government of Guam's group life insurance program, whichever occurs first.

(1) There is hereby established a Group Life Insurance Fund from which claims shall be paid consistent with the terms and conditions in the government of Guam's group life insurance policy then in effect prior to April 30, 1986.

- (2) Premiums deducted from eligible subscribers on the government's group life insurance policy then in effect prior to April 30, 1986, shall be remitted to the Group Life Insurance Fund.
- (3) The government is authorized to fund the Group Life Insurance Fund effective May 1, 1986 with projected premium receipts covering the period of self-insurance.
- (4) Effective January 1, 1997, the Group Life Insurance Fund is hereby abolished and dissolved and any and all remaining balances of the Group Life Insurance Fund are reverted to the General Fund. All revenue previously in this Fund, or which was earmarked to be placed in this Fund, shall continue to be collected and credited to the General Fund."
- Section 19. Teacher Personal Leave for Fiscal Year 1997. Section 30 of Chapter IV, Miscellaneous Provisions, of Public Law No. 23-128, is amended to read:
  - "Section 30. Teacher Personal Leave. For the fiscal year 1997 Department of Education Budget, the Territorial Board of Education is hereby authorized to convert any unused personal leave hours earned by teachers during a school year to the cash value of eight (8) hours for each eight (8) hours of unused personal leave, payable in lump sum from the Department of Education allotments, at the end of the fiscal year."

Section 20. Reference to Pedro "Doc" Sanchez Scholarship Program. The references to Chapter 15, Title 4, Guam Code Annotated, contained in Sections 6, 7, 8 and 9 of Chapter IV, Miscellaneous Provisions, of Public Law No. 23-128 shall be deemed to refer to the Pedro "Doc" Sanchez Scholarship Program, as enacted in Public Law No. 23-111. The Compiler of Laws is authorized to re-codify any existing provisions of the Pedro "Doc" Sanchez Scholarship Program consistent with this Section and Public Law No. 23-111.
